Bommarito Eyes CIF

It would seem a second trip to the California Inter-Scholastic Federation (CIF) State track and field meet would be easier for an athlete.

Such is not the case for Crestmoor's Chuck Bommarito.

Bommarito, the Central Coast Section's premiere sprinter who won the 100 (9.8) and 220 (21.4) in the CCS championships Saturday night, went to the state meet at Berkeley last year. And quite a successful trip it was.

Bommarito clocked a 10.0 to finish third in the century and came back to garner second in the fulong at 21.7.

With the experience he gained in last year's meet and the relatively easy season he's gone through this year it should be safe to assume the chips are falling Bommarito's way.

"I'm just wondering what I'll be able to do," the muscular Bommarito said moments after setting the CCS record in winning the 220.

"The pressure will be greater this year and I am a lot more scared this time.

"Last year was a tough one and I was just looking

forward to the season ending. Frankly, I was surprised I did as well as I did in the state meet."

Bommarito, who plans a week of light workouts before leaving for the meet at UCLA on Friday, got an extra kick in beating Sunnyvale's Benny Brown in the 220. It was Brown who handed Bommarito one of his rare defeats this season when he nipped him in a 220 at the Hill Invitational.

When officials rechecked the course they found it measured 10 yards short and Brown later admitted "Chuck would have caught me."

"Setting the record makes me feel real good but I have been wanting to beat Brown," Bommarito stated.

One of the reasons Brown was able to nip Bommarito in the "210" was because of Chuck's notoriously slow start, something he believes is getting better.

"There's no doubt my best event will be the 220 because of my start, but they have been getting better in both events," he said.

"The times I have seen from Los Angeles are around 9.5 in the 100 and in the mid 21s in the 220. I think I have a good shot in the 220 but I want to at least place in both.

"The best start counts in the 100, but it boils down to whoever is ready on that day will win."

Templeman Top SPAL State Hope

WESTWOOD — Nine of the SPAL's top track and field athletes will be taking something of a journey into the unknown this weekend, even though two of them have made the trip before and they all know where they're headed.

The SPAL portion of the Central Coast Section representatives will assemble on the UCLA campus for tomorrow afternoon's State Meet trials and Saturday afternoon's finals, but as usual the competition will be fierce.

Until most of the 27 representatives from nine sections in each event are weeded out in the trials, it's anyone's meet — and frequently is.

Non-favorites seldom have a chance to place in the top three, but every now and then one sneaks through the trials to achieve the honor of making the finals.

That appears to be about the limit of the SPAL representatives' capabilities unless there are some surprises, with the exception of Carlmont's Hans Templeman.

Templeman, along with Sequoia's Cezar Oravillo the SPAL returnees, automatically qualifies for the finals in the two-mile.

Last year Templeman failed to place, but is genuinely hopeful of making the top four or five or maybe even better if he is healthy and able to run the best eight-lapper of his career. His best of 9:14.4 would probably need to be cut at least 10 seconds to place.

Oravillo qualified in both the 120 high and 180 low hurdles at last week's CCS finals, but if he makes the finals it probably will be in the lows. He hit a life best 19.1 for second place last week at the CCS meet.

The Ravenswood 440 relay team of Ed Johnson, Ernie Spencer, Darrell Augmon and Joe Prince will have to better its 42.8 best considerably to even make the finals.

While Carlmont's Paul Dempster, only a junior, has to contend with sectional rival Roger Martin of Camden in the pole vault, Gunn's Dale

Krebs and Steve Buss will try their luck in the triple jump and discus, respectively.

Martin has the state's top mark at 15-6 and is the favorite, but Dempster has improved all season and a bit more betterment could net him a coveted medal. Like most other entries, though, Dempster won't know the extent of his competition until the trials.

Krebs, healthy again after missing much of the season with an injury, figures to place in the triple jump if he hits his already-accomplished 47-foot range, but Buss will probably have to throw a life best in the discus to place. His top mark is 170-9.

CCS power may be better than ever this year, led by Crestmoor's Bob Buck, Bommarito, Santa Val's Benny Brown, Cupertino's Craig Conway, Los Altos' Scott Overton and Martin.

Bommarito, with a 9.5 wind-aided 100 and a 21.4 in the 220, will be looking to at least place in the 100 and win the 220, while Brown's 47.8 tops in the 440 stamps him as a top contender.

Likewise, Conway has a 49-5 triple jump and duplication of that mark may very well win; and the same holds true for Scott Overton's 184-9 best in the discus.

3 Carry SPAL Track Banners

WESTWOOD — Carlmont High's Hans Templeman and Paul Dempster and Gunn's Steve Buss will represent the SPAL in the California Inter-scholastic Federation track and field championships this afternoon after a torrid round of qualifying yesterday at UCLA here.

While those three SPAL athletes will be vieing for State Meet titles, five other SPAL cindermen will be watching the finals under sunny skies when they begin at noon.

Ravenswood's 440 relay team of Ernie Spencer, Darrell Augmon, Ed Johnson and Joe Prince failed to gain entry into today's finals when it finished sixth in its heat in by far its best effort of the season in 42.2.

Hamilton of Los Angeles, considered the favorite to dethrone Los Altos as team champions, set a CIF record with a 41.2 clocking.

Sequoia's Cezar Oravillo, the only SPAL trackman to qualify in two events, failed in his bid for the finals in both hurdles races.

Oravillo ran a 19.4 — three-

tenths of a second slower than he cleared the low barriers in the CCS meet last week — to finish in a non-qualifying fifth spot in his heat after early finishing ninth in the highs with no time given.

Dempster gained today's finale the hard way compared to teammate Templeman.

The junior pole vaulter cleared 13-9 in the qualifying round to join 11 other vaulters, while Templeman got the day off as there was no qualifying in the 27-man two-mile field.

Templeman will have his work cut out for him today as his best of 9:14.4 gives him the 13th fastest mark entering the finals behind junior pace-setter Gordon Innes of Upland, who clocked a 9:00.0 earlier this season.

Buss joined 11 other discus throwers in Northern California's perennially strong event when he threw the platter 166-2, for the 10th spot.

Los Altos' Scott Overton will try to win the discus title for his school for the fifth time in 12 years when he brings his qualifying mark of 183-3 into the finals.

CCS triple jump, normally good for a state meet qualifying berth, but this event won't be held today.

Last year the triple jump was held in Berkeley as an exhibition event, but other special events have replaced it this year as decided by the Southern Section which usually doesn't hold any State triple jump competition.

Overton, only a junior, will pursue a rarity in the state championships. As the favorite entering today's finals, next year, he can become the third two-time winner in the discus from Los Altos, if he sets it up with a victory today.

The others, Chris Adams (1969-70) and Bob Stoecker (1961-62), won consecutive titles for the Knights.

Sunnyvale's Benny Brown took over the title favorite role in the 440 when he set a national season best with a 47.2 clocking in the prelims.

Besides Hamilton's CIF 440 relay record, Charles Jackson of Lompoc and Dwight Jones of Glendale also set CIF standards. Jackson won the 120 high hurdles in 13.6, while Williams tied the high jump record with a qualifying mark of 7-0 1/4.

Other outstanding trial marks included McKinley Moseley's (Bakersfield) 18.5 in the 180 lows; Randy Williams' (Edison Fresno) 25-3 long jump and 16-year-old Terry Albritton of Newport Harbor, who set a national age group shot put record with a 64-8 3/4 toss.

Two athletes from each of the nine SPAL schools have been invited to compete in the meet, which will be as nearly identical to the regular decathlon as possible with the exception of the lack of a javelin throw.

The event begins with the 100-yard dash Monday at 2:45 p.m. followed by the long jump, 12-pound shot put, high jump and 440. The 120 high hurdles, discus, pole vault and mile run will be held Tuesday.

Among the favorites, if they decide to participate, will be Carlmont's Mike Hall, Sequoia's Mike Hughes, Woodside's Rich Jones, Palo Alto's Jim Austin and M-A's Jeff Jennings.

AAA Entries Cut To Two for Finals

LOS ANGELES — Tauoa Faló had an unexpectedly sizeable rooting section when he stepped into the discus ring at UCLA's track stadium.

The Balboa High Senior could spot 18 of his 19 travel companions in the stands. A few of the other Academic Athletic Association champs had planned on also being watched, but yesterday's trials of the State High School Track and Field Championships dictated otherwise.

Of the San Francisco representatives, which also included Dave Gherardi of St. Ignatius, only Faló qualified. The AAA's only other hope for points, Wolfgang Schmulewicz of Lincoln, received a bye yesterday. There were no trials in his event, the two-mile run.

An Underdog

Despite Faló's life-best effort, he entered today's finals a definite underdog to Los Altos' Scott Overton. The Peninsula star's top trial throw carried 183-3 as compared to Faló's mark of 173-4, good for third.

Still, it gave George White something to smile about. If nothing else, it was the only balm for the coach who produced more qualifiers for this meet than any other coach in the State.

"You know, I think our chat before the meet helped," said White. "I told Faló to take only two warmup throws today. Sometimes the more he practices, the worse he gets."

Two New Records

As for the rest of what happened yesterday, the record book changes should do for openers.

Two meet records were bettered, one equaled, in perhaps the greatest opening day in the California Interscholastic Federation's 53 years of state meets.

In the first track event trial, the 440 relay, Hamilton of Los Angeles lapped the Tartan oval in a record 41.2. It was too bad the team wasn't pushed. The standard for the 120-yard high hurdles, also was altered as Charles Jackson of Lompoc sped to victory in 13.6, one-tenth of a second off the national prep record.

He wasn't pushed either, with the next finisher a full second back.

Field Events

The field events provided excitement too, when Dwight Stone of Glendale back-flopped over the high jump bar at 7-0 $\frac{1}{4}$. That tied the State meet record.

While on a record theme, another one should be noted. Sixteen-year old Terry Albritton of Newport Harbor established an age-group mark in the shot put at 64-8 3-4. As usual, the Southern California schools — probably Hamilton — appeared headed for the team title.

The Bay Area though, did have some standouts.

Chuck Bommarito of Crestmoor, the fast-closing sprinter, could double today if, overnight, he learned how to start a race.

Joe DeDora of Santa Rosa, won his heat in the 440 after running a 22.0 first 220, then anchored a doomed mile relay team with a 47.3 lap, making up about 50 yards in the process.

Bennie Brown of Sunnyvale had a 440 time of 47.2 which was a national best by a prep this season.

Hamilton Sets Fast Pace in State Track Trials, Breaks Relay Mark

Two records were broken, another was tied and Hamilton established itself as the solid team favorite on the opening day of the 53rd annual State track and field championships Friday at UCLA.

Hamilton, with five qualifiers, will attempt to give the City its first team championship since Dorsey won in 1966. Finals start today at noon with the pole vault. The first running race starts at 2 p.m.

A crowd estimated at 6,000 watched the City champion Yankees set one of the records with a 41.2 clocking in the 440 relay and advance both George Reddick and David Thomas into the finals of the 100.

Hamilton got a break when the officials heeded the plea of coach Gene Broadwater and moved Reddick out of the third heat in the 100 where he had been scheduled to run against Thomas.

Switched to heat No. 2, Reddick ran away from the field to win by five yards in 9.7 and then Thomas came through with a second place finish in his heat.

Thomas also won his heat in the 220 with the day's fastest time, a wind-aided 21.1, and Reddick qualified in the long jump.

Along with Hamilton's

41.2 in the relay, which broke the State mark of 41.4, the other record setter was CIF champion Charlie Jackson of Lompoc, who celebrated his 18th birthday by skimming over the high hurdles in 13.6, one-tenth of a second better than the mark held by four others.

Dwight Stones of Glendale equaled the State high jump mark when he cleared 7-0 1/4 on his second attempt. Stones, after qualifying at 6-7, had the bar raised to 7-0 1/2 but after he successfully negotiated the height, a remeasurement showed it was 7-0 1/4.

Stones, a Fosbury Flopper, then tried three times unsuccessfully at a national record of 7-1 1/2.

Overall, the preliminaries were a Southern Section Los Angeles dominated show.

In the 27 running events, City or Southern Section athletes won 17. And, City of Southern Section performers will fill 46 of the 82 qualifying spots in the running events, excluding the two mile.

There were no real surprises in the field events. Newport Harbor's CIF champion, Terry Albritton, came up with a lifetime best to lead the shot put at 64-8 3/4 and Fresno Edison's natty Randy Williams led the way in the long jump at 25-3. CIF titlist Tony Brown of LB Poly did a wind-aided 24-

41/4 and should stage an exciting duel with Williams today.

The marks in the field events do not carry over into today's finals.

State Meet Notes

Hamilton's relay win and Jackson's high-hurdle victory were even more impressive as both simply ran away from the competition. . . . Of the 15 returning performers who placed last year in the running events, only three failed to qualify. They were

Mel Jacobs of Channel Islands in the 100; **Larry Boen** of West Bakersfield in the 440 and **Dave Channess** of Awall in the mile. Boen was second and Channess third last year. . . . **Benny Brown** of Sunnyvale clocked 47.2 in the 440, a national prep best this year. All the other favorites in the 440 survived, setting up today's excellent final. Brown appeared all-out in his heat while **Tony Krzyzosiak** of Garden Grove (47.9) and **Bob Harrell** of Santa Ana (48.0) took it a little easier. **Ray Johnson** of Blair, with a blistering sprint in the final 100 yards, took second to Brown in 48.0. . . .

A review of the films Friday night produced four changes and the insertion of **Vince Brown** of Pittsburgh as the third place finisher in the first heat of the 220. In the 100, third place was revised in all three heats with **Sammy Burns** of El Cerritos replacing **Tony Harris** of Seaside in Heat 1. **Armond Ross** of Crenshaw ahead of **Jerry Baber** of Sacramento Grant in Heat 2 and **James Milton** of San Diego Moore displacing **soph Mike Shavers** of Albany in Heat 3.
