HIGH SCHOOL RESULTS

North Coast Section Finals: (Santa Rosa, May 22) - Berkeley High School emerged as the team victor in the star-filled NCS field at Santa Rosa. Berkeley had 24 points to runnerup Richmond's 21 and third place El Cerrito's 19. Pleasant Hill had $18\frac{1}{2}$ and then the points dropped way off. In the "B" Class scoring, El Cerrito edged Pittsburg, 232 to 23, with Montgomery (Santa Rosa) with 16 in third. In the varsity competition, Mike Shavers of Albany High equalled a national sophomore record when he blazed to a 9.5 clocking to win the 100. Local fans received a disappointment when Joe DeDora was disqualified from the 100 field for two false starts in the trials. However, he came back to set an NCS record of 48.0 in the 440. In the mile, the big favorites of the race were Genwho had the 7th best previous time (4:27.4), took a big lead. He held it until 2 laps when Vian Collier caught him and held a slight lead until the final lap. Both lost the lead on the final turn as Rich Cowan sprinted into the lead and held it down the backstretch. Collier managed to stay ahead of Alexander for second, and favored Ron Genschmer took 4th for the last State place. In the two mile, the only tight race was for the final qualifying spot for the State Meet. Going into the final lap it was Palmer and Arago in a head to head battle. Arago had enough left to overtake Palmer going down the backstretch and hold on for fourth. Tom Hale, with a good 9:11, took command right from the start and outlasted Chuck Mork, who chopped a second off his best time. Admittedly, the showing was not as good as Los Altos managed last year, but nonetheless it was strong. Hamilton scored 13 points and Lompoc had 11. Then came El Cerrito and Crestmoor with 10 apiece to tie for third with another Southern school, Newport Harbor. Only other NorCal teams to break into the top 15 teams were Edison of Fresno and Castlemont, who tied for 13th with five other schools (6 points). US-USSR-World All-Stars Meet: (Berkeley, July 2-3) - The highlight of the meet was Pat Matzdorf's brilliant world record high jump of 7-6; topping the official world record of 7-5 3/4 set by Soviet Valeriy Brunel. He matched China's Ni Chih-chin's mark which will probably never be officially recognized by the IAAF. In team scoring, the US men won 126-110, but the women lost by an equal amount (76-60) and so the meet ended up an overall tie (186 each). No scores were kept between the Soviets and the World All-Star team, but the US defeated them 138-91 (men) and 79-54 (women). Film Review Gives Lompoc State Crown

Hamilton's reign as State high school track and field champion was short-lived.

A review of films of Saturday's meet at UCLA gave Lompoc's Charles Jackson a victory in the 180 low hurdles and took away the fourth-place finish of Hamilton's David Thomas in the 100.

Thus, Lompoc, with Jackson winning the 120 highs, the 180 lows and taking fifth in the long jump, totaled 13 points to 11 for Hamilton.

Thomas had originally finished fifth in the first running of the 100-yard dash, so even if the race was not re-run the Yankees would have had only 12 points.

However, it could be argued that having to run the 100 a second time took just enough out of Thomas so that he finished second in the 220. Had he won that event, Hamilton would have had two additional points.

Actually, the team hurt most by the re-run of the 100 was El Cerrito, which would have shared the crown if there had been no second race. Sammy Burns of El Cerrito finished third in the first race but was unplaced in race No. 2. Those three points would have given El Cerrito 13.

Eastbay Preps Set Marks

LOS ANGELES — Erasing
the stigma of past failures,
dedicated relay teams from
El Cerrito and Castlemont
opened and closed the 53rd
State High School Track and
Field Championships with record breeking victories yesterday.

In addition, had it not been for an historic rerum of the 100-yard dash, El Cerrito might have climaxed a day of upsets and outstanding performances by beating eventaal champion Hamilton of Lee Angeles 13-12 for the team

As it was, the Gauchos parlayed the relay win and junior Dale Scott's 1:32-flat second in the 880 into a tie for third place with 10 points.

Pending a film review of close finishes, Hamilton is first with 12 and Lampoc follows with 11.

Running in the sixth lane on UCLA's fast Tartan track, the Gauche quartet surprised a 440-relay field which included record-holding Hamilton when anchorman S a m m y Burns broke the tape in 41.1 seconds.

Castlement, awarded the pole with the fastest quality-ing time in Friday's trials, led from midway in the second turn on the first leg and wen easily in 2:132, lowering the California Interscholastic Federation meet record by 1.1 seconds.

El Cerrito's time was a 10th of a second faster than that established by the Yankees a day earlier. It was the first of five new marks witnessed by an estimated 9,500 spectators.

Glendale senior Dwight Stones, frustrated when what he thought was a record leap Friday only tied the existing record, made sure yesterday by scaling 7-1% in the high turn.

A Clairemont of San Diego 12th grader appropriately named Dale Fleet sliced 1.8 seconds from the two-mile mark with a comefrom-behind 8.83.8 victory over a field in which the first four finishers, including Tom Hale of Campolindo, got under 8.58.

The final record was by Mark Stevens who beat junior Newport H a r b o r teammate Terry Albritton by almost two feet with a shot put of 67-2%.

A long jump of 25-3% by Edison of Fresno's Randy Wiliams, had it not been windaided, would have broken the record by almost a foot.

The breezes also millified a record-tying 13.6 high hurdles victory by Charles Jackson of Lompoc and fast finishing Tony Krzyzoslak of Garden Grove missed the 440 standard by a tenth of a second in

Five coaches, including Hale Roach of El Cerrito, complained to officials after Hamilton's George Reddick obviously jumped the gus to win the 100 in 5.6 Burns was placed third in that race, David Thomas of Hamilton fifth.

"No matter what happens it's not fair to the other kids," said Roach before meet referee Ernst Hartman decided to run the race over for the first time in California State Meet history.

Reddick came from behind after one false start to win the second running in identical time. Burns went unplaced and Thomas moved up to fourth.

Films of Friday's trials revealed Burns qualified in his heat while Albany sophemore Mike Shavers did not in his. Vince Brown of Pittsburg also made it to the 250 final and he or Shavers may whad up occ up y in g the vacant third place when the final's films are reviewed.

Hale, who led the two-mile for 2% laps, finished fourth in 5:57.2, be co min ng the first Easthay athlete ever to break the magic nine-minute mark while still in high school. He was relatively happy with the time but disappointed with his placing.

Gordon Innes of Upland and Jose Amaya of Wilson High in LA were favored in the two-mile run, but finished second and third in 8:54.4.

Bommarito Eyes CIF

It would seem a second trip to the California Inter-Scholastic Federation (CIF) State track and field meet would be easier for an athlete.

Such is not the case for Crestmoor's Chuck Bommarito.

Bommarito, the Central Coast Section's premiere sprinter who won the 100 (9-8) and 220 (21.4) in the CCS championships Saturday night, went to the state meet at Berkeley last year. And quite a successful trip it was.

"The pressure will be greater this year and I am a lot more scared this time.

"Last year was a tough one and I was just looking

forward to the season ending. Frankly, I was surprised I

Bommarito, who plans a week of light workouts before leaving for the meet at UCLA on Friday, got an extra kick in beating Sunnyvale's Benny Brown in the 220. It was Brown who handed Bommarito one of his rare defeats this season when he nipped him in a 220 at the Hill Invitational.

When officials rechecked the course they found it measured 10 yards short and Brown later admitted "Chuck would have caught me."

"Setting the record makes me feel real good but I have been wanting to beat Brown," Bommarito stated.

One of the reasons Brown was able to nip Bommarito in the "210" was because of Chuck's notoriously slow start, something he believes is getting better.

"There's no doubt my best event will be the 220 because of the start, but they have been getting better in both events." he said.

"The times I have seen from Los Angeles are around 9.5 in the 100 and in the mid 21s in the 220. I think I have a good shot in the 220 but I want to at least place in both.

"The best start counts in the 100, but it boils down to whoever is ready on that day will win."

Templeman Top SPAL State Hope

WESTWOOD — Nine of the SPAL's top track and field athletes will be taking something of a journey into the unknown this weekend, even though two of them have made the trip before and they all know where they're headed.

The SPAL portion of the Central Coast Section representatives will assemble on the UCLA campus for tomorrow afternoon's State Meet trials and Saturday afternoon's finals, but as usual the competition will be fierce.

Until most of the 27 representatives from nine sections in each event are weeded out in the trials, it's anyone's meet — and frequently is.

Non-favorites seldom have a chance to place in the top three, but every now and then one sneaks through the trials to achieve the honor of making the finals.

That appears to be about the limit of the SPAL representatives' capabilities unless there are some surprises, with the exception of Carlmont's Hans Templeman.

Templeman, along with Sequoia's Cezar Oravillo the SPAL returnees, automatically qualifies for the finals in the two-mile.

Last year Templeman failed to place, but is genuinely hopeful of making the top four or five or maybe even better if he is healty and able to run the best eight-lapper of his career. His best of 9:14.4 would probably need to be cut at least 10 seconds to place.

Oravillo qualified in both the 120 high and 180 low hurdles at last week's CCS finals, but if he makes the finals it probably will be in the lows. He hit a life best 19.1 for second place last week at the CCS meet.

The Ravenswood 440 relay team of Ed Johnson, Ernie Spencer, Darrell Augmon and Joe Prince will have to better its 42.8 best considerably to even make the finals.

While Carlmont's Paul Dempster, only a junior, has to contend with sectional rival Roger Martin of Camden in the pole vault, Gunn's Dale

Martin has the state's top mark at 15-6 and is the favorite, but Dempster has improved all season and a bit more betterment could net him a coveted medal. Like most other entries, though, Dempster won't know the extent of his competition until the trials.

Krebs, healthy again after missing much of the season with an injury, figures to place in the triple jump if he hits his already-accomplished 47-foot range, but Buss will probably have to throw a life best in the discus to place. His top mark is 170-9,

Two New Records

As for the rest of what happened yesterday, the record book changes should do for openers.

Two meet records were bettered, one equaled, in perhaps the greatest opening day in the California Interscholastic Federation's 53 years of state meets.

In the first track event trial, the 440 relay, Hamilton of Los Angeles lapped the Tartan oval in a record 41.2. It was too bad the team wasn't pushed. The standard for the 120-yard high hurdles also was altered as Charles Jackson of Lompoc sped to victory in 13.6, one-tenth of a second off the national prep record.

He wasn't pushed either, with the next finisher a full second back.

Field Events

LOS ANGELES — A rare re-running of the 100-yard dash deprived El Cerrito High of a share of the California Interscholastic Federation's 53rd State Track and Field Championship yesterday.

Quite naturally, the controversy died down when UCLA-bound Dwight Stones of Glendale set a national preprecord with a high jump of 7-1½. But at the time the re-running had the crowd of approximately 12,000 at UCLA's track stadium buzzing.

In the scheduled race, the Gauchos' Sammy Burns apparently had a third-place finish three points. However, after protests were filed by five coaches, the 100 field took off again. This time, Burns failed to place.

Gun Jumping

That was all Hamilton High of Los Angeles needed to win its first state title. The Yankees' point total of 13, lowest for a CIF champ since 1964, beat Lompoc's 11 and the 10 turned in by El Cerrito, Crestmoor and Newport Harbor.

Ironically, it was a Hamilton runner who was the object of the coaches' complaints and boos from a majority of the fans.

After Hamilton's George Reddick had false started once, he obviously jumped the gun again, leaving the other eight starters hunched in the blocks. There was no recall, Reddick winning in 9.6 with Burns third in 9.7.

Hamilton 'Wins' State Title, Subject to Films

California's finest high school track and field performers put on a fantastic show Saturday in the 53rd annual championships at UCLA.

In what has to rank as one of the greatest finals in history, one national record was broken, five California standards toppled and Hamilton survived a disappointment in the 440 relay and a controversy in the 100 to tentatively claim the title.

the 100 to tentatively claim the title.

The Yankees finished with 13 points, two more than Lompoc, pending a review of films in the 100, 220 and especially the 180 low hurdles, where many observers thought Lompoc's Charlie Jackson had finished ahead of Bakersfield's McKinley Mosley. Barring any other adjustments, that switch of points would give Lompoc a tie for the crown. crown.

From start to finish, it was an exciting show as El Cerrito opened the program with a state record 41.1 in the 440 relay and Glendale's Dwight Stones closed it with a national mark of 7-1/2 in the high jump.

A crowd of 10,500 also saw three other State reords fall as San Diego

Clairemont's Dale Fleet ran 8:53.8 in the two mile; Newport Harbor's Mark Stevens threw the shot 67-2 1/4 and Castlemont's mile relay team turned in a 3:13.2 clocking.

Randy Williams of Fresno Edison, who leaped 26-3¾ in the long jump, lost a national record when his leap was not allowed be-

cause the wind was 5.9 m.p.h. when he jumped.
Brent Tubb of Cleveland clocked 4:09.6 to take his second straight State mile crown; Tony Krzyzosiak of Garden Grove powered down the stretch relen-tlessly to take the 440 in 46.7, and Tim Quinn of Monroe, only a junior, Monroe, only a junior, cleared a lifetime best of 15-2 to win the pole vault.

And in the 100, after "winning" in 9.6, Hamilton's George Reddick was forced to do it again 20 minutes later.

Hamilton, the City champion and team favorite, faltered badly in the 440 relay with a fifth place finish in 41.6. The Yankees set a State record of 41.2 in the prelims Friday but had trouble with their passes and never challenged.

Thus, the pressure was really on Reddick going into the 100 and he responded brilliantly with a decisive win in 9.6. However, as he was standing on the victory stand with his trophy in hand, the announcement came that the race would be rerun because one competitor (Reddick) had jumped the gun.

"I've been working on that start for three years," he said. "I won it fair. Why didn't they call us back if someone

There was no answer to that question but Ernst Hartman, the meet referee explained that following the race, the committee of appeals met and unanimously agreed that the start had not been fair. start had not been fair.

The committee is made up of the starter, recall starter, commissioner of the Southern Section, meet referee and meet director. Hartman said he

The one key change in the finish gave Hamilton an additional point as David Thomas, who was fifth in Race 1, gained fourth in Race 2.

"I was naturally upset but I think I went into the

second race with more determination than the others. I was out to really prove that I was best," said Reddick.


Stones, who cleared 7-01/4 to equal the State mark in Friday's prelims, said he felt "a terrible letdown" Saturday morning.
