NCAA CHAMPIONSHIPS

DETROIT, MICHIGAN 3-10, 11--Southern Cal won it's second NCAA indoor crown by ~~ix~~ edging Bowling Green and Michigan State by one slim point. And they did it on the strength of their field events <sup>men,</sup> ~~men,~~ rather than on their world-ranked sprinters. ~~Defending champ Villanova was~~ *Defending champ Villanova was*

This typified the entire ~~two~~ two-day meet. The sprints and hurdles took second place to the field ~~events~~ ~~department~~ and ~~the~~ distance events, as ~~eight~~ eight of 17 performances from last year's meet were bettered, and four meet records--all in the field events--were broken. And the quality depth was awesome.

It was a meet of "no-names" that was typified by Colgate's Chris Dunn who beat Wisconsin's Pat Matzdorf on fewer misses. The latter's meet record of 7'2" was broken in the process as both cleared 7'2 3/4" followed by two other seven foot ~~xxx~~ placings by Oregon State's Tom Woods and Steve Cooksey of Indiana State <sup>each</sup> at 7'0".

Alabama's Jan Johnson, Colorado's Mike Wedman, and defending champ Scott Wallick of Miami (Ohio) all cleared a meet vault record of 17'1 1/2" to break Bob Seagren's 1967 mark of 17' 1/2". But Johnson got the win on fewer ~~misses~~ misses after the bar had been upped to 17'5", ~~and~~ lowered to 17'2", and finally lowered again to 16'10" which Johnson cleared to win. <sup>Penn's</sup> Tom Blair, ~~of Penn~~ Long Beach State's Steve Smith, and Florida's Scott Hurley all cleared 16'6" for places in that order. ~~Blair~~

~~said he couldn't get used to the runway.~~

Kent State's 35 pound weight duo of Jacques Accambray and Al Schoterman switched placing position this year with Accambray breaking Schoterman's record 68'10 $\frac{1}{2}$ " toss of last year with a PR 71'3 $\frac{1}{2}$ " throw. Schoterman was an impressive second at 69'5" and Southern Connecticut's Frank Bredice was third at 66'10".

"I was happy with my throws today," said Accambray, "The AAU's were discouraging. Right before ~~the~~ we were about to throw (at the AAU's), I pulled a back muscle bending down to take off my shoes. I didn't even get into the finals. Today was better." Accambray threw an impressive series of 68'9  $\frac{3}{4}$ ", 70'6 $\frac{1}{2}$ ", 71'3 $\frac{1}{2}$ ", 70'1 $\frac{1}{2}$ ", 69'5 $\frac{1}{2}$ ", and 69'3". PR

As for Schoterman, who threw a ~~70'5"~~ at the AAU's for second, ~~at the AAU's~~, "I went from two turns to three turns in the finals here. I was behind <sup>(69'2")</sup> and I thought I'd try it, it had worked pretty well in practice but it still needs work. ~~Next weeks~~ Russian meet is the big one."

The fourth NCAA record to fall was in the triple jump as Middle Tennessee's Barry McClure weathered a broken board in the runway and the late charge of USC's Henry Jackson. When the field eventers gave them a chance, the runners looked impressive, with Bowling Green's Dave Wottle and Sid Sink, and Villanova's Brian McElroy scoring good doubles.

Wottle, McElroy, and Illinois' Lee LaBadie--who had ~~decided~~ decided <sup>to</sup> favor ~~the~~ the half mile instead of the mile--

~~was~~ floated through a ~~58~~ slow 58 first quarter in the 880, ~~and~~ ~~then~~ turning the race into a battle of the kickers. Wottle showed that he has one of the best around by topping McElroy easily 1:51.7 to 1:52.4. LaBadie was slow in responding and placed fifth at 1:54.5.

Teammate Sink employed the same tactics in the Friday two mile as he jump<sup>ed</sup> Western Michigan's Gary Harris late in the race to win ~~with~~ 8:36.5 to Harris' PR 8:37.4 with Richard Sliney (N. Arizona) and Paul Baldwin (Kentucky) following in 8:38.6 and 8:39.7.

Sink came back Saturday to run BGSU's three-quarter leg on their winning 9:49.5 distance medley relay. Running a pace-keeping 3:00.1, he planted Wottle a well-placed 1.2 seconds behind Kansas State's Jerome Howe and Georgetown. McElroy got the stick 1.7 seconds behind Howe.

Again Wottle hung back and used his explosive kick with a lap to go. First passing a dying Georgetown, he cut down Howe easily as both recorded 4:02.5 and 4:04.0 legs to bring their teams home in 9:49.5 and 9:50.3. McElroy clipped Georgetown 9:51.7 to 9:55.1 with a 4:04.2 anchor, *and added to* ~~Said McElroy~~ Coach Jumbo, "That Wottle is something else." and that was all he could say.

As for the open and invitation miles, both were strategic races with big kicks. Michigan State's Ken Popejoy, <sup>season,</sup> third last year and a 4:00.9 performer this ~~year~~ plainly outran North Carolina's Reggie McAfee 4:02.9 to 4:03.9. ~~and~~ ~~could have been worse~~ Washington's Jim Johnson was third in 4:04.7.

Tom Von Ruden continued his winning ways by winning the invitational mile in 4:04.3 to nip <sup>Frank Murphy's</sup> ~~Chris Mason's~~ 4:04.4. The half mile pace was 2:04. ~~Ex~~ Chris Mason was third at 4:05.2 and Byron Dyce, who was never really in the race, was fourth at 4:07.2.

Almost every quarter miler in the country passed up the 600 in favor of the 440. USC's Edesel Garrison and Nebraska's Leighton Priestly ~~xx~~ never made it past the prelims. Winning the final was little-known Larance Jones of Northeast Missouri

But it was the mile relay that proved to be a hometown favorite. Southern Cal had been disqualified in the prelims for elbowing, leaving Eastern Michigan <sup>(3:13.0)</sup> and Michigan State <sup>(3:12.6)</sup> in heat one and Adelphi <sup>(3:12.2)</sup> and Nebraska <sup>(3:07.5 astrodome)</sup> in heat two.

With everyone in the 440, the 600 was up for grabs, and Mississippi State's Dale Gibson did the grabbing in a slowish 1:11.3 to edge Murray State's Fred Sowerby and Michigan ~~xx~~ State's Bob Casselman in 1:11.6.

By the time MSU's <sup>anchor</sup> Casselman got the baton, ~~xxxxxxx~~ <sup>second legman</sup> Marshall Dill had run 48.1 to give him a good lead and 15 yards on Eastern's anchor Stan Vinson. The EMU freshman had ~~xxxxxx~~ <sup>half an hour earlier</sup> placed seventh in the 600, and had ~~sixxx~~ sub-48 relay splits to his credit this season. Vinson caught Casselman ~~47x~~ with one of the fastest relay splits in NCAA history, clocking 47.3 as he tried vainly to outlean his opponent who had run 48.7. Both teams clocked 3:17.5 with MSU given the win. "Just wait until outdoors," said the long-legged Vinson.

In the second heat, Adelphi took the lead early from Nebraska and recorded ~~xxxxxx~~ consistant splits of 49.7, 49.0, 48.3, and 48.8 for Ray Lee, Keith Davis, Dennis Walker, and Clyde McPherson. Their winning time <sup>was</sup> ~~of~~ 3:15.8 ~~xxxx~~ as Garth Case's 47.7 anchor brought Nebraska home with a 3:17.0 second place.

Football and high hurdles go together like ham 'n eggs.

At least, that's how it looks in the NCAA Indoor Track and Field Championships. In the past seven years three hurdle champs have gone on to careers in professional football.

They are: Gene Washington (Michigan State); Earl McCullouch (U.S.C.); and Richmond Flowers (Tennessee).

There's no such thing as the "sophomore jinx" at the meet...if past performances are any indication.

The meet's seven-year history boasts three triple-title winners: Larry James (Villanova) 440-yard run, 1968-70; Ray Arrington (Wisconsin) 1,000-yard run, 1967-69; and Jim Ryun (Kansas) mile run, 1967-69.

All three turned in their best times in the first year of their triple crowns...when they were sophomores!!

\* \* \* \* \*

The NCAA-member schools with the most individual titles in the past seven years are Kansas and Villanova, with nine each.

Southern California has seven, Wisconsin six, and Harvard, Nebraska and Washington State four each.

\* \* \* \* \*

Relay titles during the past seven years have been dominated by Villanova, with two wins each in the mile relay and the distance medley relay.

Oklahoma State, Kansas State and Morgan State have each won two relay titles.

There's been only one sub-four-minute mile in the meet's history, a 3:58.6 clocking by Jim Ryun of Kansas in 1967.
