SILVER CREEK SPRINT SENSATION

Hampton, 15, May Outdo Coach

Bob Poynter, a world-class sprinter a decade ago although running in the shadow of Ray Norton, received a challenge Saturday night.

While running for Pasadena High in 1955-56, Poynter won the 220-yard dash state meet title both years and now the possibility looms large that Millard Hampton may go his coach one better.

Running easy, Hampton, a 15-year-old sophomore, won the 220 in 21.5 Saturday night — just one of his three triumphs in leading Silver Creek to the Central Coast Section track and field championships at San Jose City College.

With Hampton winning the furlong, the 100 and anchoring the Raiders' 440-yard relay team to a victory, Silver Creek edged Mount Hamilton League rival Mount Pleasant, 22½-21, for the CCS crown.

"Millard promised he would top me," Poynter, Raider sprint coach, said Sunday.

"When I was a sophomore, all I got was two fifths (100-220) in our region meet ... Millard's way ahead of me and it wouldn't surprise me at all if he wins the 220 at Oroville."

Poynter, Hampton and the rest of the CCS qualifiers won't have long to wait to see how the state meet, which is set for Oroville, develops. The meet is set for Friday trials with finals contested Saturday.

Silver Creek received a possible un-needed break in the 440 relay Saturday.

Monterey, which had set a CCS record of 42.1 in the morning trials, held a two-yard lead entering the anchor lap, but the Toreadors dropped the baton and Hampton breezed to the tape in the record-tying time of 42.1.

Although Hampton had the near-capacity crowd buzzing all night, Poynter credits Dareell Craven and Joe Wyrick as the keys to winning the team title.

"Wyrick came through with a tie for fourth in the high jump and Darrell finished third in the 100 and that was it," Poynter said. "They got us the points we needed."

In all, three CCS records fell, two were tied and several other outstanding performances were turned in on the cold but windless evening.

Besides Silver Creek's tying 440 relay effort, Hampton's 9.7 century clocking also tied the section standard.

Ike Allmond of Serramonte won the 120 high hurdles in 14.1, eclipsing Carl Florant's 14.4 trials mark. Steve Brooks, who turned in a 4:23.7 mile in the first part of the two mile, won the event in 9:07.8, one second better than the old mark set last year by Willow Glen's Bob Ebert.

The final standard to fall came in the discus as Los Altos' national record holder Scott Overton (204-5) spun the platter 191.0. The old mark was 189.3, set in 1970 by Chris Adams.

Jack Wantro of Serramonte turned in an excellent 880, winning in 1:54.3 and Carlmont's Steve Miller, a junior, claimed the mile in 4:12.5.

"I hated to see them drop it," Poynter said. "Monterey has a fine team and great competitors. We wanted them in there all the way so we could put it on them."

Los Gatos' Bret Mannon made up six inches on trials leader Dave Gherardi (St. Ignatius) in the shot put and won the event at 62-6½. Gherardi finished second at 61-11.

The CCS will be sending possibly its strongest ever discus contingent to the state meet. In addition to Overton, Leland junior Dave Hickson and Branham senior Jim Groover qualified to Oroville.

Hickson tossed the platter 181.3, while Groover, suffering from a slight muscle pull, took third at 174-1.

With the slight deficit Hampton would have had to make up, the Raiders probably would have won anyway. In the trials Hampton had about eight yards to recover and was just nipped at the tape.

Two CCS Prep Spike Marks Fall

Two Central Coast Section track marks fell early Saturday at San Jose City College as individuals began the long

day which, for some, would earn a trip to this weekend's State Meet in Oroville and, for others, end in frustration.

Running in the first trial heat of the 440-yard relay, Monterey eclipsed Overfelt's 1970 CCS standard of 42.5 with a 42.1 clocking, two-tenths of a second faster than Silver Creek.

The second shattered mark came in the last heat of the 120-yard high hurdles as Palo Alto's Carl Florant skimmed over the barriers in 14.4. The old record of 14.5 was jointly held by Jim Miller (Carlmont, 1968) and Jim Wright (Silver Creek, 1971).

Only five running events were contested during the trials. Preliminaries were also held in the shot put, discus and triple jump.

Silver Creek sophomore Millard Hampton won both sprints, claiming the 100 in 9.8 and the 220 in 21.6.

Scott Overton, Los Altos' national record holder, as expected, led all discus qualifiers at 185-2½, but Los Gatos' Bret Mannon trailed in the shot put.

Mannon, complaining he couldn't get any wrist snap, tossed the 12-pound ball 61-5, six inches short of leader Dave Gherardi (St. Ignatius).

Qualifying distances in the shot and discus carry over into the finals.

Los Altos, with Overton, Randy Patterson and Jay Pushkin qualifying in the discus, John Foster winning his heat of the high hurdles in 14.5 and the 440 relay team clocking 43.3, showed it will

Bal Coach White: A Win and Empathy

COACH GEORGE WHITE of Balboa High probably had empathy for Wilson coach Adam Banks Saturday.

White's Bucs were well on the way to winning their second straight Academic Athletic Association track championship at Kezar Stadium, piling up important points in field events, when the final race of the day was run — the mile-relay.

The relay was primarily between the two leading contenders. In the third leg, Wilson's Mike Farmer brought the Warriors from fourth to first, but in doing so, the sophomore cut in front of Bucs' runner Paul Cannon, throwing Cannon off his stride.

AFTER THE RACE, which Wilson had won in a time of 3:29.1, two officials noted the violation, and the Warrior relay team was disqualified. Balboa was named the winner in 3:29.9.

That capped the day and gave the Bucs a 152½-124½ victory — their fourth in seven years. And, again Balboa won it with overwhelming su-

periority in the field events where it outscored Wilson, 74½-38½.

But George White remembers 1969. Then, his mile-relay team was disqualified and the Bucs lost the crown to Washington, 103-97. In 1970, Balboa lost to Lincoln by ten points.

Wilson's infraction came immediately after its sophomore mile-relay team was disqualified for running out of its lane on the first leg. The varsity disqualification, however, set off hoots, jeers and some missiles (apples and bottles) from the stands and vehement protests by the Wilson coaching staff.

AFTERWARD, second-year coach Banks said, "The ruling (in the varsity mile-relay) was very unjust . . . I just don't know. We've been put down so much this week. (Banks was referring to Wednesday's disqualification of three field event competitors because of ineligibility.) I've just got to sit down and reevaluate the situation."

Glenn Dickey is on vacation.

The dispute took away some of the sweetness of Bal's victory. "It's pretty disheartening," said White. "Frankly, I don't have much to say except we did pretty much what we expected to do. We just outscored them."

Aside from the varsity team competition, there were many outstanding individual performances as four varsity and four sophomore records were set and five sophomore marks were tied.

IN VARSITY, Wilson's 440-relay team shot to a 42.0 time, 1.3 seconds off Poly's record set in 1968 and tied in 1970.

Ron Whitaker, a junior who ran the second leg, said the team wanted to run 41.0 but "our handoffs were not what we wanted. It'll be better in the State Meet (June 2-3 in Oroville).

Farmer, a sophomore who set an AAA 100-yard dash mark of 9.5 in the trials and ran 9.6 Saturday in the blustery cold of Kezar Stadium, said he got a good start on the first leg of the relay but "I messed up the hand-off."

but no one quite expected a 14.1. The four-year old CCS record had been a 14.5 by Jim Miller of Carlmont.

Kolesnikow's performance in the last few weeks has been stellar. He had been running over 15 seconds much of the season, then got down to 14.9, then 14.8 in the Region I finals the weekend before the CCS. The 6-3, 220-pound football full-back then got down to 14.7 in Saturday morning qualifying and 14.5 in the final, an outstanding effort by any standard.

Pierce had been the class of Peninsula low hurdlers all season, and left no doubts as to his CCS status Saturday night, grabbing the lead early and hurdling strong the whole way, finishing .2 ahead of second place, a fair margin in a quality meet.

Carlmont's Miller has a simple goal for the state meet. "I want to go 4:10," he said. "I don't care if I finish last as long as I run 4:10." The red-headed junior's best time before Saturday had been a 4:15.2; he was the odds-on favorite.

"I had about a 2:04 half, which was what I wanted," Miller said. "I wanted 3:09 for three quarters and I think I had 3:10. I was surprised that there weren't two or three of them up there working on me toward the end."

Several other locals placed also. Two NPL quartermilers, Ken Acosta of El Camino and Tom Henkle of South San Francisco, season-long rivals, finished in a tie for fifth at 50.4.

Crestmoor pole vaulter Bill Trueman, who had finished fifth in his own league meet, finished fourth in the CCS at 13-6. Carl-

mont's Paul Dempster matched the winning height of 14-4, but placed third with more misses than the leaders.

Mills junior Ian Burnett, who had run a life-best 9:24.3 to qualify for the meet, clocked a gutty 9:19.2 to place fifth, just ahead of Carlmont's Carl Cattarin. Burnett's MPL soph record last year was 10:02.6.

Serra senior shot putter Tom Banducci took a fifth (56-11½) behind a life-best performance by Carlmont's Paul Brandow (57-4).

There were a couple of big "ifs" in the meet that Silver Creek couldn't have counted on. First, Mt. Pleasant's top 220 man failed to show at the proper time for the morning trials, and scratched. He was good for at least a third place.

Second, Monterey muffed the final pass in a blistering sprint relay while in the lead. Silver Creek's Hampton had his back to the finish line to take a medium-poor pass; without Monterey to contend with, he turned around and smoked everyone for the win. The Monterey anchor man, Sumpter, collapsed to the track and stayed with his head bowed for several minutes.

The top local star in frosh-soph competition was Mills' Bill Giavia, who took the high jump at 6-2 on fewer misses. Crestmoor has another pole vaulter coming up to maintain a fine tradition; Steve Kane's 12-6 matched the winning height and was good for a second place. Capuchino's Jay Ashley finished second in the 100, equalling the winning 10.1 clocking.

A pair of hurdlers from schools on the Alameda, Hillsdale's Luther Jackson and Aragon's Jim Reeves, played tag in both the highs and lows. Reeves was third in the 70 highs (8.9), Jackson fifth (9.1). Both clocked 20.5 in the lows; Jackson was third and Reeves fourth.

In the distances, Oceana's Bill LaForge ran a 4:28.3 for fourth in the mile and Hillsdale's Bob Barnett took a fourth in the two-mile at 9:39.6.

Brian Pierce of Crestmoor wanted nothing more than to break the school record in the 880; he did that, with a 2:01.1, and took fifth besides. Burlingame's Bart Shepardson was fifth in the quartermile at 51.9 and Capuchino's Kim Jensen fifth in the discus at 144-5.

Carlmont Bids for CCS Track Title Tonight

SAN JOSE — Up to 10 individual SPAL athletes appear to have at least an even chance to become part of perhaps the biggest thing to ever hit Oroville, Calif.

That's where the top three finishers in each event of today's Central Coast Section track and field finals at San Jose City College will be headed next Friday for the state

high school championships.

Some 21 SPAL individuals begin trials today at San Jose at 10:30 a.m. That field may be cut in nearly half by the time the 7 p.m. finals begin, but at least eight and maybe 10 SPAL competitors could survive the finals.

And Carlmont High has a fair chance to win the prestigious team title of the CCS, a region of 11 leagues and nearly 100 schools, in tight com-

petition with Mount Pleasant, Silver Creek and Los Altos.

Carlmont junior miler Steve Miller, senior two-miler Carl Cattarin and senior pole vaulters Paul Dempster, Chris Willett and Jim Katches are among the top state meet hopefuls.

Palo Alto hurdler Carl Florant, Woodside 440 ace Lamonte Wiley, Gunn miler Steve Crowley, San Carlos miler Ken White and Menlo-

Atherton hurdler Jim Watts are also in good contention.

Miller, who has the SPAL record of 4:13.7, will gun for the CCS mark of 4:09.5 by Wilcox' Mike Ryan (1965) as the mile favorite, but Crowley may sneak in for second and White, who runs his best at night, may surprise.

Cattarin (9:28.8) probably isn't a major threat to Mt. Pleasant's amazing Steve Brooks (9:08.0), but has a

good chance for third or so if he really turns on.

Dempster, the current Scots' other SPAL record holder at 14-6 $\frac{3}{4}$ in the pole vault, has a shot at both CCS honors and a repeat trip to the state meet. Teammates Willett and Katches have cleared 14-0, which could also win them a state spot, particularly if they don't miss much on the way up.

Florant has the section's top high hurdles (14.2), and won't

go in the lows unless he missed out in the highs.

Wiley hit 49.9 in the SPAL finals; he has the potential for CCS prominence. Watts' hurdles best is 14.9, but the 6-6 all-around Bear great has been known to come through against the best.

The rest of the SPAL field probably will need life best to place.

It includes Cubberley's Tom Morgan in the 100 and 220,

Sequoia's Marlon Murphy (100), Woodside's Neil Barker (220), Carlmont's Bruce Sayre and Sequoia's Pat Purcell (880), Carlmont's Russ Black and Ed Barney and Gunn's John Huggins (two-mile), Woodside's Jim Orr (high jump), Carlmont's Paul Brandow and San Carlos' Jeff Vetovec (shot put), Ravenswood's 440 relay team and Gunn's mile baton squad.

St. Francis' Mike Kasser of

Redwood City, only a sophomore, has a 1:56.3 in the 808. With perhaps an extension of his late-season improvement, Kasser could well become a rare state meet soph.

In the frosh-soph meet Menlo-Atherton has a shot at the team title led by sprinter Don MacKenzie, while Sequoia's Jim Data (shot put) and Gunn's John Littleboy (high jump) will be out to capture individual honors.

CCS Track Spotlight

SAN JOSE — Steve Miller came through handsomely. Jack Wandro came back heart-warmingly. And Millard Hampton . . . well, Millard Hampton came on so fast it was hard to believe he had already arrived.

Hampton, an incredibly smooth-striding 15-year-old sophomore, rapidly stole the thunder from several older prep super stars Saturday night in leading San Jose's Silver Creek High to the Central Coast Section track and field championship.

Hampton — who used to run for the Herbert Hoover Memorial Boys Club in Menlo Park — had a 9.7 and 21.5 sprint double, plus a zippy leg on Silver Creek's 41.1 record-setting 440 relay team, to alone outscored every section team but two at San Jose City College.

But Carlmont's Miller, only a junior, proved the class of a classy mile field at 4:12.3, a

feat about as intriguing as Hampton's on comparative performance charts.

And senior Wandro's 1:54.3 in the 880 proved a triumph in competitive spirit for the 5-6 Serra scooter, plagued nearly two months by an ankle injury and only recently back in shape.

Four locals — Miller, Wandro, junior high hurdler Carl Florant of Palo Alto and senior pole vaulter Paul Dempster of Carlmont—earned free tickets to the state finals Fri-

day and Saturday in Oroville.

Florant matched his own SPAL record-tying 14.2, but Serramonte's Ike Allmond improved four-tenths second to 14.1 for the meet's biggest surprise. Florant had to settle for second.

Dempster cleared 14-4, not far short of his SPAL record 14-6½, but placed third on more misses at 14-4. It was enough, though, for a repeat state meet trip, since the top three placers qualified in each varsity event.

Miller and Scot coach Loren Lansberry were "very satisfied" with the 4:12.3, bettering Miller's SPAL standard by 1.4 seconds.

"My goal for the state meet is 4:10," said Miller. "If I hit that, it won't matter what place I get. That was my entire season goal"—pretty lofty for a junior.

Second-placer Bob Ferrell of Overfelt "actually helped me a lot" Miller noted, by taking the mile lead during the third

lap. Miller hasn't chased many people this year.

Several other SPALers fared well, but couldn't qualify for the big one.

Carlmont's Paul Brandow climaxed a personal success story with a life topper 57-4 for fourth in the shot put.

Brandow wasn't expected to reach the 60-plus needed for state qualification; but then, at 180 pounds a small contrast to the other iron-ball behemoths, Brandow wasn't figured to win a medal either.

Serra's Tom Banducci was fifth at 56-11.

Carlmont's Carl Cattarin ran a life best (by nearly nine seconds) 9:20.1 but was sixth in the two-mile, won by Mt. Pleasant's Steve Brooks in a record 9:07.8.

St. Francis' Mike Kasser of Redwood City just missed a state berth with a fourth-place 880 of 1:55.4. But Kasser, only a soph, didn't look like he planned to miss the next two.

San Carlos' Ken White, who simply picked the wrong year to be a senior, ran an unplaced school record 4:19.5 mile, as was Jim Watt's 14.7 hurdles clocking for Menlo-Atherton. Gunn's Steve Crowley was fifth in the mile in 4:16.0.

Carlmont's team total of 11 tied Crestmoor for sixth behind Silver Creek (22½), Mt. Pleasant (21), Seaside (19), and Branham and Los Altos

(12). The Scots had hoped for at least fourth, though.

M-A, behind hustling Don MacKenzie, was fourth with 11 frosh-soph points behind Lynbrook (30), Camden (20) and Del Mar (18½).

Top local frosh-sopher was Sequoia's Jim Data. He climaxed a season of steady improvement by winning the shot by half an inch at 56-3.

MacKenzie, denied a chance to meet his best 440 competition due to separate but unequal heats, settled for second at 50.7, was fifth in the 220 in 22.9 and anchored the Bears' winning mile relay team which included Ben Parkinson, Graham Fillion and Al Robinson. MacKenzie's 440 and 220 efforts are M-A frosh-soph records.

Menlo School's Beau Willis, a lanky soph who may be up there with Kasser next season, won the 880 in 1:59.7; teammate John Crockett was second in the long jump to give Menlo a tie for fifth in team scoring with 10 points.

St. Francis' Mike Maloof (discus winner), Gunn's George Stein (discus second) and John Littleboy (high jump second), Paly's Dave Johnson (high hurdles fourth), Cubberley's Stacy Gelken (mile second) and Ferman's Jerry Emory (two-mile third) also were outstanding frosh-sophs.

Virtually ignored in varsity action was Los Altos' Scott Overton's 191-0 discuss throw for a CCS record. Overton's earlier 204-5 national mark this spring has made anything else seem tame.

Ironically, transfer from Mt. Pleasant John Wyrick, got Sil-

ver Creek its victory margin over Wyrick's ex-mates — a high jump tie for fourth for 1½ points.

Silver Creek's head track coach is crew-cut Stan Dowell. And lest anyone thinks he doesn't have big plans for movin' Millard — well, seven springs ago he coached some kid at neighboring Overfelt, name of Lee Evans.
