Ball regains TSU title
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Galveston Ball head track coach Kermit Courville admittedly regards the Texas Southern University Relays more highly than the Class 4A state meet, and understandably so.

In only four appearances at the 26 -year-old classic, Courville's team has won enough gold to open up an auxiliary branch of Fort Knox.

Saturday night, in ageless Jeppesen Stadium, the talent-tadem Tors wrapped up their third TSU Relays championship in the last four years by a lopsided 31point margin.

Ball, which won the 1974 and 1975 titles - in its first two appearances in the meet - amassed 66 team points and had the title in the bag with five events yet to go.
Worthing finished a distant second with 35 points, despite a brilliant come-from-behind victory in the mile relay.

"I really didn't expect it (the victory) to be so convincing," Courville said just prior to the mile relay. "I fully expected a strong challenge from Northing and Forest Brook.'

Courville's oldest son, Britt, captured the Most Outstanding High School Athlate award. Britt long-jumped 24-1 Friday and competed in three relays Saturday night.
"He could have cleared 25 feet by now," the elder Courville said, "but he's competing in so many other events that his long jumping is suffering. I'm going to have to pull him out of one of the relay races.
"I was really glad to see him get that 24-1 yesterday," Courville continued. "He'd been shooting for 24 feet for the last three meets. Our one-two finish in the long jump and the one-three finish in the discus Firday really gave us the boost that we needed coming into today's finals.

The boys saw that they had a chance to win it and they just went out and took it."

Young Courville was joined on the Most Outstanding honor roll by Forest Brook distance runner James Green, Most Outstanding Athlete; Beaumont Charlton-Pollard's Robin Coleman, Most Outstanding Girl Athlete; Memphis Melrose's Tania Wells, Most Outstanding Woman Athlete; and TSU's Max Tolen, Most Outstanding College Athlete.

Wells, a 15 year-old sophomore, won the 1500 meters and placed second in the 880 . She was the youngest one to compete in her division in both events.
Beaumont French broke a logjam among the girls' high school teams to win with 31 points. Pollard was second at 30 and Forest Brook was third at 29.
The Texas Southern men shared the college title with Northwest Louisiana and the Prairie View women retained their title.
