



WEST COAST RELAYS

The high school portion of the 52nd annual West Coast Relays was held on Friday, May 4th and featured several state-wide stars: sprinter Bill Green (Cubberley, Palo Alto), triple jumper Henry Ellard (Hoover, Fresno), miler Linda Goen (North, Bakersfield), shot putter Don Mosebar (Mt. Whitney, Visalia), two miler Rob Wentworth (Livermore), and the Richmond sprint relay team.

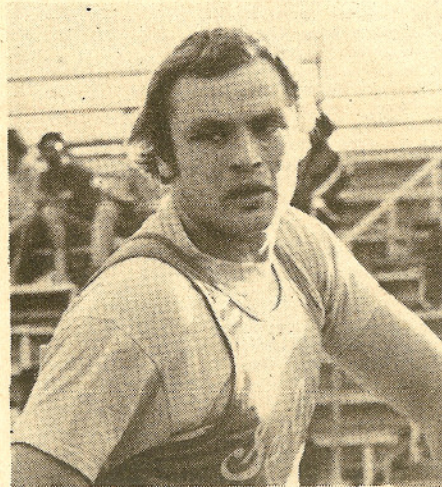
The Sigma Alpha Epsilon Fraternity Award winner was Green. He won the 100 meters in 10.59, anchored his team to first in the 1600 meter relay 3:16.66, and anchored his team to second in their section of the 400 meter relay 42.41. There was a balanced start in the 100 meter dash. Raymond Threatt (Pittsburg) was out first. Green took the lead at 50 meters and held to the finish. Ted White moved into 3rd over the last 20 meters. "I felt pretty good about my race," Green said. "I came out behind some of the faster starters, but I know that if I can stay with them at the beginning I can win. I was looking forward to running in this meet," he said. The 6-0 senior said he has no definite college

and then just block everything else out. I wasn't worried about anybody else. I knew I was going to win." This is the first time Ellard has competed in track at Ratcliffe Stadium. "The crowd really pushes me. They really gave me a lift today. I really enjoyed jumping here. The wind didn't bother me at all." Ellard also placed sixth in the long jump with a wind-aided 21-7½.

Linda Goen won the one mile run in 4:55.3, which was just two seconds over Cheri Williams record set last year. She led from the start. She came by the first lap in 70.0 followed closely by Rene Ortiz (Tulare Western) and Shelly Nieto (Merced). Goen continued to lead at the half in 2:28.7 with Ortiz and Nieto about a yard back. At the 1320 Goen and Ortiz were at 3:46.1, with Nieto eight yards back and Jennifer Heaton (Clovis West) another six yards back. Goen broke the race open over the last 150 yards to win "Goen away." (Thanks to Donna Skow for that quote.) Goen also anchored her 1600 meter relay team to victory with a 400 meter split of 58.6.

Wentworth ran a half mile leg in 1:57 about one hour before his two mile. "I was confident I would win but I didn't think I'd have that big a lead," he said. "I went out slow and I knew I'd have to set my own pace. The last three laps I was hanging on." Wentworth said he thinks he's in better shape than he was three weeks ago when he ran a 9:08.2 in San Jose. He says he hopes to run an 8:55 or better at the state meet.

The Richmond Oilers won the team title with 23 points by 3 points over Highlands (North Highlands). Sprinter Ted White anchored the Richmond 400

West Coast Relays discus record with the best throw in the world this year - 223 feet, 6 inches -- and it might have been further had it not hooked sharply.

Tuokko's throws were smooth as he twice broke the meet record of 216-9 and exceeded 214 feet five times. He used a borrowed discus because his was found to be too light. "I'm quite satisfied," Tuokko, 27, said of this third throw, which bettered his 220-6 national record.

Canadian Phil Olsen in the javelin and Richard Graybehl in the 400 meter hurdles successfully defended their West Coast Relays titles. Olsen's winning throw of 272-3, second best in the United States this year, came after he bruised or broke the little toe on his right foot as he landed wrong on an earlier toss. Graybehl, the former USC runner, now with the Pacific Coast Club, won the intermediate hurdles in 50.76.

After a promising beginning the weather turned ugly Saturday afternoon when winds gusting to 35 miles per hour spoiled a number of events and prompted some athletes to scratch from others.

The biggest disappointment for the smallest WCR crowd in years, 6,230, was the withdrawal of the University of Southern California's 800-meter relay team, which had been billed as primed for a dash at its world record in the two lapper. USC also pulled out of the 1600 meter relay, two of its standouts (David Omwansa, James Walters) missed the flight to Fresno and did not run in the invitational 800 meters, world 100 leader James Sanford scratched from that race and teammate Kevin Williams, who ran a qualifying heat, elected to bypass the final.

The University of Tennessee, however, had little difficulty making all of its scheduled events and Stan Huntsman's Vols also made a sweep of the relays -- 400, 800 and 1600 -- in the blustery conditions.

There were a number of other no-shows by notable performers for one reason or another and, if that weren't enough, the Accutrack automatic timing system failed during the 100 heats. All races therefore, not eligible for world record consideration. Despite the obvious problems, WCR Director Dutch Warmerdam took an optimistic overview, "Considering everything I think it

Henry Ellard won the triple jump and set a new record of 50-3½, which broke the old record of 50-0½ by Dave Tucker (San Joaquin Memorial, Fresno) set in 1969. Ellard had an outstanding series of jumps: 50-4(3.2 meters per second wind - 2.0 is maximum allowable), 50-3½(1.6), 49-0(3.3), 48-7½(3.3), 49-10(2.4), and 49-1(2.0). Ellard's worst jump was 10 inches better than Kevin Dye's (Highlands, North Highlands) best, who finished second. According to Ellard, "it feels real good" to be number one in the nation. "I just set my goal

Rob Wentworth set a new record in the two mile of 9:06.7, which broke Tom Hale's (Campolindo, Moraga) mark of 9:08.0 set in 1971. Wentworth took the lead during the 2nd lap and ran away from the field to win by about 170 yards. His splits were: 67, 2:14.5, 3:22.1, 4:30.5, 5:38.7, 6:49.2, 8:00.8, 9:06.7.

The Richmond Oilers won the team title with 23 points by 3 points over Highlands (North Highlands). The team was composed of Chris Lee, Mark Hill, James Wallace and Ted White, who are all seniors. Bakersfield had a slight lead over Richmond at the first exchange. Richmond took command on the next two legs to win going away. Ted White palced third in the 100 meters with 10.76 and teammate Chris Lee was eighth in 11.18. White came back in the 1600 meter relay to hold off all but superstar Bill Green.

In the 110 meter high hurdles all the competitors had an even start. Henry Andrade (Johnson, Sacramento) took a one yard lead at the fifth hurdle. Don Lonsinger (Highland, Bakersfield) moved into second over the last two hurdles.

Larry Clemons (Foothill, Bakersfield) won the long jump with a wind-aided 24-1¼ jump. His first jump in the third flight prelims survived as the winner. Kevin Dye's (Highlands, North Highlands) and Carlos Harrison's (Wasco) jumps for second and third came from the prelims as well. Clemons said: "When I hit the board I thought I was off (foul). But they told me I couldn't have hit it in a better spot. It was really a surprise for me. I hope I can get 25 feet for the Valley Meet." Last Wednesday in a dual meet against East High in Bakersfield, Larry thought he had jumped 24-11½, but unfortunately he scratched by 1 inch.

Cal Poly's Bart Willimas, who has performed sensationally in the 1979 WCR, applied extra caution in winning the College Division 400 hurdles in 50.92. The man who has clocked 49.4 this year, third fastest in the world at this time, was disqualified here last year for wrapping his trailing leg around four hurdles.

Cal Poly ran away with the College Division team title and Mustang hurdle-sprint star Bart Williams was named the top performer in that class, earning the California Raisin Advisory Board award.

Cal Poly rolled up 69 points to outdistance UC Irvine(45), Hayward State(35½), Los Angeles State(27), and defending champion Long Beach State (26).

In the Community College Division ranks it was Long Beach all the way as they rolled past co-favorite San Jose 75 to 42 in team scoring. Then followed Pasadena(40), Hancock(28) and Santa Rosa(20).

Much of the Long Beach burden was handled by Kereck Robinson who accomplished the unusual double victory in the long jump and 110 meter high hurdles. He also ran a leg on the first place 400 meter relay.

Other forces in the Viking win were Gary Williams who ran on the 400, 800 and 1600 meter relays as well as won the triple jump at 51-5½; and Jerry Sanders who won the high jump with a 7-2 leap.

This was the first time Long Beach had won the WCR since 1959; and on that team 20 years ago was Viking head coach Ron Allice.

There were other outstanding marks but it wasn't a day for records. Glendale's Mark Lewis set a WCR record in the 3000 meter steeplechase (9:00.2); Bakersfield's Greg Illorson, a West African, blazed to a national-leading 10.1 (hand timed) in the 100 meters, and Pasadena's Andre Frazier erased his own 110 high hurdles record with a 14.22 in a trial heat race.

In the two mile, Sierra teammates Greg Hitchcock and Dan Navarro did not go as far as holding hands but they purposely crossed the finish line together, both timing 9:04.3 in upsetting favored Carmelo Rios of Long Beach.

Bakersfield's Jay Kovar waited until his last throw of the day to win the discus at 169-5 and send Santa Rosa's Jeff Voorhees, who had held the lead since his second throw of 165-11, into a bout of frustration. But Voorhees frown turned into a smile later in the day when he increased his natinal leading mark in the shot put to 58-11½. Afterward Voorhees conducted his own private workout and popped a 59-11. "I've been psyching myself for 60 feet all year and now it's getting near the end of the season."

San Jose's gifted intermediate hurdler, Andre Phillips, successfully defended his WCR title in the one-lapper at 51.46. That still was slightly off his season's best of 51.1. In the javelin, West Valley's Ross Parish was nearly two and a half feet shy of his season best 237-3 but still won at 234-10. The pole vault never blossomed as Riverside's Brian Binau tied San Jose's Brian Friend at 17-6 before losing a jumpoff at 15-3.

Thanks to Kevin Lundgren's final drive to the finish with about 300 meters to go Hancock College won the distance medley from Long Beach timing 9:58.8.

The 52nd West Coast Relays are now history. As usual there were some big performances and a lot of excitement, both on the field and in the stands.

A lot of talk at the relays, however, was negative: "we're not getting the big names." "A six lane track isn't adequate" "The Pepsi meet is hurting us." "If we

don't get an all-weather track in Ratcliffe Stadium soon the meet is dead." The most depressing talk was of a big high school meet brewing up north and a big community college meet down south - all on the same weekend. Several observers felt that without the all weather track, plus the expense of travel to Fresno increasing, that next year would be the last year for the Relays in its present form.
