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Inside dope

Sprints - North Salinas' Antho-Toney looks unbeatable in the nu 200 and will put his second effort in Campbell of Mt. Pleasant in the 400. Toney, who's also running on the school's 400 relay team, will most likely scratch the 100, where Eric Washington (Woodside) and Ken Smith (Palo Alto) will contin-ue their duel from the Region II meet. The top three picks in the 100 were within .14 of each other in the Gilroy Invitational, and the top four in the 200 were within .13.

Middle distances -- Benny Tru illo of Gilroy will be attempting to put his name next to Los Altos' Rick Brown as the only athletes to win the same event three years in a row. In this case it's the 800 (not the 880) and Los Gatos' Scott Oliver is anxious to put his name in the books for the first time. The score between them is Oliver 2, Truillo 1 with all of the wins coming on home tracks; this will be the first fime they've met on a neutral oval Oliver recorded his best time and at SJCC. Close is the word in 1,600, with the battle for first looking as light as that for the third and final spot to the state meet, and Inde-pendence's Jesse Torres should take the first berth in the 3,200.

Hurdles - The highs could have the closest margin of victory, with the foursome from Region I dominating the Accutrak photo-finish picture (hopefully, the timing sys-tem won't pick this event to malfem won't pick this event to mal-function on). At the Top Eight Invitational, first place was 14.4 and fifth was 14.5. Jefferson's Robert Thompson (sixth last year) hasn't lost to Hillsdale's John Zukowsky, the CCS leader, in the four times they've met in the last two years. Contrary to the race in the highs, the lows may have the biggest winning marcin. have the biggest winning margin, with Gilroy's Ronnie Seanez the solid pick to lead it.

Relays - The heart of the team battle, as usual, will rest here. Mt. Pleasant looks unbeatable in both, but Silver Creek broke the ice two weeks ago in the Mt. Hamilton League finals, winning the 440 by 7 in a CCS best. Woodside is the 7 in a CCS best. Woodside is the only team among the favorites that runs its fastest leg (in this case, Washington) on the anchor. Smith (Palo Alto), Campbell (Mt. Pleasant) and Sterling (Silver Čreek) all run the second leg (backstretch). The Cardinals look less vulnerable in the 1,600 with Woodside the only team that should challenge. should challenge.

Vertical jumps - Palma's Dan liff and North Salinas' Joe Hicks (both 6-10 last year) should bring the Battle of Salinas to San Jose in the form of a high jump. Piedmont Hills' Jim Quirke, who has gone 6-6 and isn't doped to place (but realistically could) is the owner of a unique approach which he calls the "Quirke screw." It has Quirke running straight to the bar and within three feet turning com-pletely around into a "flop" position. The CCS pole vault competi-tion may have just as many as or more 15-footers than the state rheet and Greg Ellis of Menlo-Atherton will probably have more trouble defending his CCS crown than he had attaining it — Ben Mahoney (St. Francis) and D.J. Bahl (Awalt) will probably be with him vault-for-vault. Darkhorse of the meet may be Ayer's Alan Janke (14-6 the last two weeks). The surest bet is that at least one place will be decided on fewer misses.

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Horizontal jumps -- In the long iump, Buchser's Raiph Lumactod (fourth last year) has beaten Palo Smith three Alto's times, but Smith has the momenturn of beating Lumactod at the Region II and Santa Clara Valley League meets. Saline Clara Valley League Inters. Triple jumper Victor Torres of Silver Creek is due for a win in "qualifying" competition. Yerba Buena's Leonard Robinson beat him by an inch at the MHL meet and YB's Ken Taylor (second in last year's frosh-soph meet to teammate Donnie Sample) won by a half-inch at the Region III meet. More than any other event, the triple jump won't be at a loss for surprises.

Weights - Consistency is lack ing, but those who have it are Rey Mendizabel (Gunderson) and Ray Bellantoni (Del Mar) in the shot put and Dave Nagengast (Del Mar) in the discus. <u>Gunn's Dave</u> Cowell (third last year) is suc-cessfully coming back from a back injury that kept him out early in the year. Del Mar's Tim Sutro is most likely to "pop" the longest throws.

Team comments - All of Mt. Pleasant's firepower is shown ex-cept for Bobby Lister (100, 200) and Felix Soto (3,200); any points from them or higher finishes from Greg Marshall (triple jump) or Harry Campbell (200) will only aid their cause. Palo Alto's strength will ride on Ken Smith (100, 200, long jump, 400 relay) and Rod M. Green (400, 800, both relays) the brother of former Cubberley star Bill Green. (II's possible Green may scratch the 800 and put all his marbles in the 400, where he's potentially dangerous.) Mike Mc-Collum (3,200) scoring high will help, as will points from Kent Eaton (high jump, 6-4 last two weeks) and Frank Chenn (long jump, second in region to Smith). Woodside has Washington (100, 200, both relays) and sophomore Willie Williams (300 LH, both relavs) scoring, and unscored Thomas Harris (14.5 in 110 HH) and Tim Redick (38.4 in 300 LH, same section as Williams) to their lays) and credit. If there's a team with the most potential, it's Woodside. Del Mar has Troy Christy (100) on the track, but any other points will come from the vault and weights. Silver Creek, another potentially tough team, has its power in the sprints, relays and jumps. North Salinas has Toney and Hicks scor-ing and a few other unscored competitors, including discus thrower Dave Vazquez (165-11 in region).

ning in the 220, but not in the 100." Washington said. "I wasn't running with my knees up. Then I think I started picking my knees up, and I feel like I have good form now."

Tim Redick, a relatively unheralded junior, also was vital to Woodside's surprising team victory, placing second in the 300meter low hurdles with a life-best 37.75.

"I really didn't think I'd make it," said Redick, who qualified for next week's state meet, as did all of the varsity athletes who placed among the top three Friday night.

Another South Peninsula Athletic League athlete, Menlo-Atherton pole vaulter Greg Ellis, set the only meet record by clearing 15-6¹4. But Ellis, who set the old meet record of 15-6 last year, knows he may have to perform better in next week's state meet.

"I know (Fullerton resident) Greg Stall has gone 16-1," Ellis said. "But I don't think he's consistent at that height. I might be more consistent than him."

Awalt's D.J. Bahl, who also cleared 15-6¹/₄, and St. Francis' Ben

Mahoney, who cleared 15-0, also qualified for the state finals. Ellis' teammate, Robert Crumpler, missed a berth in the state meet by finishing fourth. He cleared the same 15-0 as Mahoney, but lost out because of more misses.

Palo Alto's Ken Smith won the long jump and finished third in the 100 meters, but was disqualified for a false start in the 200. Teammate Rod Green ran a 48.26 to finish second in the 400 meters, and the Vikings' Mike McCollum placed second in the two-mile in 9:14.5.

Smith's winning 22-10⁴₂ effort in the long jump came on his final attempt.

Palo Alto's shot at the team title ended when the Vikings' Darryl Bodden, running the second leg of the mile relay, fell to the track with a pulled left hamstring muscle and was unable to continue. Earlier, the

Vikings' 400 relay team had to run without one of its regular members and settled for a disappointing fourth-place finish.

Gunn's Dave Cowell, a winner in the discus throw with a mark of 166-8, was the only other Santa Clara Valley Athletic League varsity athlete to place first in the boys' competition.

Two athletes from the West Catholic Athletic League, Bellarmine's Brendan Saunders and Serra's Robert Siguenza, also earned berths in the state meet, scheduled for Friday and Saturday at University of California's Edwards Stadium.

Saunders, whose previous best in the 880 was 1:59, ran a 1:53.71 in the 800 meters to finish a close second to Los Gatos' Scott Oliver. Siguenza placed third in the 200 meters, edging Seaside's Ernest Bonner for

the section's final state berth in that event.

Carlmont won both relays in the frosh-soph division, although Mt. Pleasant took the team title with 41 points. Lynbrook finished second to Carlmont in the mile relay.

Eleven Region II frosh-soph athletes earned individual places in the top three. Homestead's Mike Kibort and M-A's Rick Galvez placed one-two in the pole vault, and Gunn's Kent Iglehart finished second in the mile. Cupertino's Joe Cerney finished second in the 100 meters.

Palo Alto's Rod Green (not related to the Rod Green who runs on Palo Alto's varsity) placed third in the 70-meter high hurdles, Buchser's Rudy Preclado finished third in the two-mile and Homestead's Dwight Robertson finished third in the high jump.

Fremont High School claims girls' track title

SAN JOSE — Menlo-Atherton High School's Trish King landed in the high-jump pit and leaped into the air as if shot out of a cannon.

King was yelling with delight as she left the pit and spun several times in mid-air.

King had just cleared the bar at 5-9¼ to win her second straight Central Coast Section girls' title in the high jump and set a CCS meet record with a life best.

King's effort, however, wasn't enough to keep Fremont High of the De Anza Athletic League from winning the team title with 40 points Friday night at San Jose City

CCS track

College. San Carlos of the South Peninsula Athletic League finished second with 30 points.

Sherrill Miller led Fremont to the title with a victory in the 400-meter dash, while teammate Karen Robinson finished second to King in the high jump.


All competitors placing in the top three spots qualified for next week's state finals in those events.

King was the SPAL's only individual champion in the girls' competition, but San Carlos won the 400-meter relay and Carlmont won the mile relay.

King placed third in the high jump in last year's state meet, clearing 5-9.

Friday night King needed three attempts before she cleared 5-8¹/₄. Then, when she tried her third attempt at 5-9¹/₄, the bar shook as she landed in the pit — but it did not fall.

"Maybe I do better on the third try because on the first two I'm always thinking, 'Well, I always have the last one coming if I need it." King said. "I've never had to jump in this kind of wind."

When King missed her first jump at 5-4 (four inches below her previous season best of 5-8), it brought back memories.

"When I was a sophomore, I'd done 5-6 and I remember missing my first two tries at 5-2 (in the CCS finals)," King said. "I was in tears. When I missed my first jump tonight, I was afraid something like that might happen again."

San Carlos' Rhonda Robinson placed first in her qualifying heats in the 100- and 200-meter races, but placed second in each event to Live Oak's Gurtha Pounds in the finals.


Robinson also anchored San Carlos' winning 400-meter relay team, making up an eight-yard deficit and streaking by her Silver Creek opponent 30 yards before the finish line.

Paula Foianini anchored Carlmont's winning mile relay team, fourth in the state last year with three of the same team members.

Region II athletes dominated the 110 hurdles and 400 meters.

Gunn's Gretchen Mills, defending CCS champ Mary Crevelt of St. Francis and Saratoga's Kathy Reimann placed 1-2-3 in the 110 lows. Fremont's Miller, Buchser's Margaret Demorest and Sequoia's Crystal Preisser finished 1-2-3 in the 400 meters.



petually doing just that, finishing one race only to hear the first call for another.

In the region meet Brogan was the workhorse, bound to a grinding schedule by her own confusion and the need for team points. She traipsed from the 880 to the two-mile to the mile to the mile relay and was in perplexed spirits after finishing second three times, twice to King, and qualifying her Los Altos team fourth in the mile relay.

"I'm really confused about what to do," said Brogan, a runner for five years with an equally talented younger sister on the way to Los Altos next season. "I'm not really into the 880 and I like the mile and two mile but my coach (Greg Elliott of the Foothill Athletic Club) wants me to try the 880. When I run I feel like I always have to save something for the next race.

"It was hard getting psyched up for dual meets. I kind of like running against the same people in the bigger meets. I think it makes me do better. I have to get really psyched up. I'm really mental. Now that I'm running in meets I care about I'm putting a lot of pressure on myself. I'm just not sure what I should be running."

The CCS meet at San Jose City College begins with 3 p.m. field events and 4 p.m. trials. Finals start at 6.

As usual, the distance events, boys and girls, will provide some classic stretch sprints and Elliott says Brogan will be in the 800 field (scheduled for 7:10 p.m.). A good finish there could put her in the mile and a poor one will probably convince her to run in the 3,200.

In last year's CCS meet Brogan placed second in the 880 and third in the mile.

It's an odd sort of story to precede tomorrow's Central Coast Section track and field championships.

The season (the dual meets, wearing day-long invitationals, league and region finals) is over for most and just when the rest are trying to induce best ever peformances and propel themselves into the June 6-7 state meet at Berkeley, Kerry Brogan, the workoholic of area distance runners, is disturbed, tired and saying so.

"I'm afraid of burning out," admitted Brogan, her candid fears sounding far away from an athlete on the verge of a peak. "I really want to take a break this summer. I've done so much this year. Burning out has really been in the back of my mind."

So said, Brogan indicts her meet regimen, one that isn't typical for distance runners. Like Brogan, her most annoying competitors, Lynbrook's Tracy Weber, Ayer's Maria King and Roxanne Bier of Independence, more often than not triple in dual meets, running the 880, mile and two-mile, and they finish it all off with the mile relay.

But neither they, nor any of the area's male athletes, try those four events in the season's major meets. And that's where the Los Altos junior steps apart.

Not only is last fall's Northern California cross country champion the section leader in all three individual events, her 880 time of 2:12.4 leads the state. Brogan's time of 4:59.4 in the mile is four-tenths off the state best. And her best event in the section meet could be the two-mile (or 3,200 meter run since the meet is all metric.)

After a disheartening four-event Region II meet last Saturday, it's doubtful Brogan will win or even try to run in the three individual events. Gunn's Esther Berndt (a 15-year-old sophomore) and Prospect's Amy Esther Berndt (a 15-year-old sophomore) and Prospect's Amy Harper (who's of a rare breed: a senior) will be in contention for state berths in the 1,600 and 3,200, respectively. Belief in one's own abilities might be the hardest kind to come by, but count among the converts Gunn's Gretchen Mills, Del Mar's Ray Bellantoni and the Fremont girls track team.

They ranked with the majority of winners at the Central Coast Section track and field championships at San Jose City College Friday night - that majority, an elated but unexpected assortment.

The CCS boys title was picked off by Friday night darkhorse Woodside as favored Mt. Pleasant

faded early and Silver Creek and Palo Alto saw false starts in the 200-meter dash shred their chances.

The compact, five-member Fremont squad, won its second straight girls title after finishing in a three-way tie for the championship last year.

The meet's top three finishers in every event advance to the state meet June 6-7 at Berkeley.

It took more than the anticipated victories to ensure those team titles. Woodside's Eric Washington was the unsurprising double winner in the 100 and 200 but Tim Redick's second-place finish in the 300 low hurdles in a lifetime best wasn't counted on. That padded the eight-point victory over Palo Alto.

Fremont's untouchable Sherrill Miller eased to a second straight 400-meter dash title in a meet record 54.99, blitzing the field on the stretch to give her team a second-place finish in the mile relay. But Fremont's second and fourth in the high jump and Karen Robinson's surprising fourth in the 100 made the difference.

"Sherrill took us from last to second in the relay and everybody else came through better than expected," said first-year coach Sue Grigsby, who took over the team in February. "I went to talk to the athletic director and he said if I wanted it I could have it. I had also been approached by Los Altos. I ran there in 1974."

Mills of Gunn celebrated her first section meet - she was in London last year - by upsetting favorites Mary Crevelt of St. Francis and Kathy Reimann of Saratoga in the 100-meter low hurdles.

"This is definitely a surprise," said Mills, a senior. "I did really badly in the trials today. I felt sick all day I was so worried about the meet. Don't even ask me about the state meet."

Del Mar's field event strength and Troy Chris-

ty's stunning second in the 100 meters gave the team third place. Bellantoni helped by taking the shot put with a personal best of 58-5.

"I don't know where he (Bellantoni) came up with that one," said Del Mar coach Bob Slover."He hadn't come close to that all season, but I knew he had it in him."

Three meet records came down and six of nine defending champions kept their titles -Greg Ellis, pole vault; Miller, 400; Tracy Weber, 1,600; Roxanne Bier, 3,200; Trish King, high jump, and the Carlmont girls mile relay team.

Ellis and Awalt's D.J. Bahl set a meet record

15-6¼ in finishing one-two in the pole vault. King set another meet record at 5-9¼ and Bier won an amazing fourth CCS two-mile/3,200 meter championship.

One who didn't repeat his titles (the mile and two-mile last year) was San Jose's Fernando Balderas. Training took a backseat this year for the senior after his mother's death and a custody fight for a younger sister. But Balderas' continuing willingness to compete made him a sentimental favorite and with a searing last lap he placed fourth in the 3,200, just missing a state berth.

"I hope someone can't go (to Berkeley) next week," said Balderas.
