Four national junior college records tere broken Saturday night in the 31st nnual California State Junior College tack and field championships at Cerrisos College in Norwalk.

Milton Goode of Alameda cleared 7oot-5¼ in the high jump to break the ecord of 7-5 set earlier this year by rian Stanton of Long Beach and Tyke eacock of Modesto. Peacock was secnd at 7-4¼ and Stanton third in the

tate meet.

In the women's 200 meters, Valerie risco of Long Beach was clocked in 3.49 seconds into a headwind, breaking the record of 23.56 set by Pam Marhall of Long Beach last year.

Renee Felton of Santa Monica estabshed a new standard in the 100-meter high urdles, clocking 13.72 to break her own ecord of 13.81 set earlier this spring.

The final national record was broken the men's 400-meter relay, where the asadena team of Cliff Quarrie, Sam hance, Rufus Jackson and Adrian ones was timed in 39.56 seconds, reaking the mark of 39.77 set last year y Long Beach.

Double winners in women's competion were Long Beach's Brisco, who con the 400 in 53.53 before setting her ational record in the 200, and Diana igliomeni of West Valley, who set 1981 tate bests in capturing the 800 meters 1 2:08.03 and the 1,500 meters in

De Anza's Steve Struble was sixth in the discus at 155-3.

In the women's division, Marquita Belk took fifth in the 200 (25.21), fourth in the 400 (54.91) and anchored De Anza to a fourth-place finish and school record of 47.69 in the 400 relay.

Janet Yarbrough of De Anza was second in the 100 hurdles (14.37) and a disappointing fifth in the long jump at 18-74. Wilcox High graduate Jackie Hendy of West Valley was fifth in the 400.

Mission Junior College placed six players on the All-Coast Conference baseball team, while rival Menlo placed one on the squad.

Sophomore pitcher Roy San Fillipo, who earned a 7-1 record and paced Mission to a Division II state tournament title, was one of the three pitchers named to the squad.

Also named to the team were Mission players Nick Senados, John Clark (.359 averages), John Gonsalves (.346), Mike Lent (.395) and David Ybarra (.386).

Dave Carroll, a sophomore outfielder who hit .318, was Menlo's selection to the team.

Ohlone's Ron Miles, a sophomore second baseman, was named league MVP.

West Valley's team of Susan Robinson, Diane Figiomeni, Susan Smith and Jackie Hendy clocked a :49.1, defeating De Anza by more than four seconds.

West Valley's time breaks the pending national nark of 3:49.2, set by Cerritos this year.
