

Our national records at JC state track meet

Four national junior college records were broken Saturday night in the 31st annual California State Junior College track and field championships at Cerritos College in Norwalk.

Milton Goode of Alameda cleared 7-foot-5½ in the high jump to break the record of 7-5 set earlier this year by Brian Stanton of Long Beach and Tyke Peacock of Modesto. Peacock was second at 7-4¼ and Stanton third in the state meet.

In the women's 200 meters, Valerie Brisco of Long Beach was clocked in 3.49 seconds into a headwind, breaking the record of 23.56 set by Pam Marshall of Long Beach last year.

Renee Felton of Santa Monica established a new standard in the 100-meter high hurdles, clocking 13.72 to break her own record of 13.81 set earlier this spring.

The final national record was broken in the men's 400-meter relay, where the Pasadena team of Cliff Quarrie, Sam Chance, Rufus Jackson and Adrian Jones was timed in 39.56 seconds, breaking the mark of 39.77 set last year by Long Beach.

Double winners in women's competition were Long Beach's Brisco, who won the 400 in 53.53 before setting her national record in the 200, and Diana Figliomeni of West Valley, who set 1981 state bests in capturing the 800 meters in 2:08.03 and the 1,500 meters in 3:30.82.

While Figliomeni was the standout performer from the Golden Gate Conference, she wasn't the only point-getter.

Tom Campbell and Bob Ingram of West Valley each won titles, Campbell

taking the long jump at 24-6¾ and Ingram the steeplechase in 8:56.68. The latter is the No. 2 JC mark in the nation this year.

Foothill's Ralph Preiman finished second in the pole vault at 16-6, with College of San Mateo's Greg Ellis sixth at 15-6. Both are freshmen.

De Anza's Steve Struble was sixth in the discus at 155-3.

In the women's division, Marquita Belk took fifth in the 200 (25.21), fourth in the 400 (54.91) and anchored De Anza to a fourth-place finish and school record of 47.69 in the 400 relay.

Janet Yarbrough of De Anza was second in the 100 hurdles (14.37) and a disappointing fifth in the long jump at 18-7¼. Wilcox High graduate Jackie Hendy of West Valley was fifth in the 400.

Mission Junior College placed six players on the All-Coast Conference baseball team, while rival Menlo placed one on the squad.

Sophomore pitcher Roy San Filippo, who earned a 7-1 record and paced Mission to a Division II state tournament title, was one of the three pitchers named to the squad.

Also named to the team were Mission players Nick Senados, John Clark (.359 averages), John Gonsalves (.346), Mike Lent (.395) and David Ybarra (.386).

Dave Carroll, a sophomore outfielder who hit .318, was Menlo's selection to the team.

Ohlone's Ron Miles, a sophomore second baseman, was named league MVP.

De Anza women win NorCal track title

MODESTO — The De Anza College women's track and field team is only one victory away from making a clean sweep of all the 1981 major junior college championships.

De Anza, which won the Golden Gate Conference crown a few weeks ago, added the Northern California title Saturday in Modesto. De Anza piled up 64 points while West Valley and Sacramento each scored 50.

Marquita Belk of De Anza won the 400 meters in a state-best 54.8 and teammate Janet Yarbrough captured the 100 hurdles in 13.7. Yarbrough's time will be submitted as a national record.

While De Anza was running away with the team title, West Valley found solace in setting a national JC record in the 1,600-meter relay.

West Valley's team of Susan Robinson, Diane Figliomeni, Susan Smith and Jackie Hendy clocked a 3:49.1, defeating De Anza by more than four seconds.

West Valley's time breaks the pending national mark of 3:49.2, set by Cerritos this year.

While the women found success, Peninsula JC men found disappointment.
