JUMBO ELLIOTT (1914-1981)

Education has for its object the formation of character. —Herbert Spencer

James Francis Elliott was a businessman and a track coach, but above all, he was an educator. His construction equipment firm made him wealthy. Elliott & Frantz, Inc., leased enough bulldozers to allow its president to do what ever he wanted with his spare time.

What he wanted to do was coach track at Villanova, and he did that from his graduation in 1935 until his death on March 22 at the age of 66. At first, Elliott had mixed success, but in the past 25 years his teams won 39 IC4A championships (13 outdoor, 17 indoor and 9 cross country) and 8 NCAA titles.

His runners won 28 events at the NCAA indoor championships since that meet began in 1965, a record no other school can match. He produced 22 Olympians (including 13 Americans) and they won 6 gold medals and 3 silvers.

Under Elliott's reign, a tradition of excellence in the middle distances was developed and nurtured. His outstanding milers included Ron Delany (1956 Olympic 1500 gold medalist), Marty Liquori (twice ranked No. 1 in the world at 1500-mile) and Eamonn Coghlan (current indoor record holder).

Charlie Jenkins, Dave Patrick, Frank Budd, Paul Drayton, Larry James, Erv Hall, Mark Belger, Dick Buerkle, Don Paige, Sydney Maree—these are just some of the most famous of the national champions who came under Elliott's tutelage.

No matter how great their talents were coming into the program, nearly all his runners realized their athletic potential to the fullest measure; the successes of many exceeded any reasonable expectation. As a group, they dominated collegiate track on the East coast for two-and-a-half decades, and left a notable mark nationally and internationally.

But those who were privileged to know Elliott and to know the athletes he coached saw something far more important than a bunch of runners lowering their PRs. We saw a generation of 18-year-old boys becoming poised and proud young men. By the example of his own life and his own character, Elliott impressed upon his teams the truth that you can have a highly motivated, successful career and still care about track, and about people. They also learned that class was not a matter of birth, but of conduct and dress and carriage and attitude.

When they left Villanova, these fortunate athletes were well prepared for life. For they took with them not only their records and their trophies, but also the lasting benefits of a true education, their characters having been formed with strength, skill and affection by the extraordinary man they called Jumbo. |Bob Hersh|

It was a good day for high jumping, as Cal Poly/SLO frosh Sue McNeal matched her PR with a 6-1 clearance.



Banks Proves His Point

Tokyo, March 21—Just when we thought we had the indoor season all wrapped up, a troupe of Americans travelled to Japan and competed in the Sunkist International. The man with the most at stake, Willie Banks (see p. 26) came through with a vengeance, adding the indoor American Record to the outdoor one he had set the previous weekend.

Banks, who had jumped 56-7% outdoors, came close to that with a 56-5% (17.20) bound that erased a 56-0 by Ron Livers from the record book.

Banks wasn't the only record-setter, as UCLA's Jeanette Bolden, setter of an AR at 50m earlier this year, added the 60m standard to her collection. Her 7.21 took 0.07 from the mark set by Brenda Morehead in 1980.

Larry Myricks continued to add to his collection of indoor 27-footers with a seasonal-best 27-3½, the No. 5 undercover performance ever.

Brian Oldfield came up with the No. 12 non-ITA performance in indoor history, 69-10½. (In another late-season indoor meet previously unreported, in Colorado, he had the No. 9 "amateur" mark ever, 69-11½.)
