Milan Stewart Wins the Start, Campbell the Race

SAN DIEGO—In the 110-meter high hurdles a good start is often the difference between winning and losing. But Milan Stewart, who had a fantastic start Saturday at the Aztec Invitational track meet at San Diego State, has good reason to disagree.

Stewart couldn't hold off Tonie Campbell, who pulled away from an all-star field to win the race in 13.61 seconds, an outstanding time for March and a Sportsman Track record.

"I'm not going to say Milan jumped," Campbell said, "but he probably got the best start of his life. I think he heard the gun click before it went off."

Still, Campbell overcame Stewart on the last two hurdles to score the highlight of the invitational.

"I expected 13.7 or 13.8 with the conditions being what they were," said the bespectacled Campbell, who along with Stewart and Sam Turner was

ranked among the top 10 1982 high hurdlers in the world. Turner was second in 13.77 and Stewart third in 13.79.

"We had no favorable conditions whatsoever," Campbell continued. "I mean, the wind (in the runners' faces), the rain (that had fallen the day before) and plus I stayed up last night."

"I was partying with some of my friends and I just came down here as a favor to the coach (San Diego State's Dixon Farmer). I kind of geared myself up the last hour before running and I was surprised I managed to win it."

Campbell said the quality of the field was unusually high for an early-season race.

"Normally we (top quality runners) try to avoid each other but because we (he, Turner and Stewart) are good friends we enjoy competing against each other," Campbell said.

The meet, which showcased a highly

competitive field, had five other track records broken.

The first to fall was in the women's high jump where Coleen Sommer, who holds the American outdoor record of 6-6, breezed to a 6-5 height against weak competition and stood fast with a meet record. It was her first outdoor competition of the season, she said.

"I chose this meet," Sommer said, "because I thought it would be easy to get back into it. I think my jumping well has to do with a slight technique change. I'm lowering my center of gravity at take off so that means I have more force."

A sprinter who runs with plenty of force is Ron Brown, who is noted for beating football running back Herschel Walker in all six sprint encounters the two have had.

Brown broke the 100-meter track record, leaving the field behind with a time of 10.23.

"I was relaxed while I was running," he said. "This is a good way to open up the

outdoor season."

Rod Ewaliko of Nike Track Club broke the stadium record in the javelin throw with a toss of 274-1. Dave Kenworthy of USC set a stadium record in the pole vault, clearing 17-9. Dave Porath of the University of California also set a track mark in the discus with a distance of 194-6.

American record holder Dwight Stones was disappointed in high jumping only 7-2, winning on less misses than Reynaldo Brown.

"Anytime I get a win I'll take it," Stones said, "but 7-2 is nothing to write home to mom about."

San Diego State got a couple of its best performances in the 4 by 400 meter relays, winning in both the men's and women's divisions. The men's team, of Willie Atterberry, Mike Adkins, Keith James and Chris Blaylock, clocked 3:09.17. The women's team, of Donna Charles, Reene Chambers, Pam Hatley and Latanya Sheffield, finished in 3:39.12.
