## OAKLAND MARATHON AND 13.1 MILE Oakland, California (December 6)

### Now They Walk Tall in Oakland

Oakland—the butt of jokes for a century by San Franciscans across the bay—finally has something worth bragging about. This is a city with a perpetual inferiority complex. Its only claim to greatness has been its professional sports teams, and even they have been faltering of late. Well, along came the Oakland Marathon.

Three thousand in each race—the largest marathon/half marathon in the West. A winning time of 2:13:01. Every course record shattered. Numerous pending American or world age records. And all this in only its third year.

Mike Pinocci, a 27-year-old Lake Tahoe blackjack dealer, and Mike Layman, a 27-year-old Air Force doctor, were the only two sub-2:15 marathoners going into the race except for an out-of-shape Greg Leroy. The race quickly developed into a duel between the two Mikes and it seemed to go on forever. After nearly two hours of listening to each other's breathing, Layman decided it was time.

"He tried to pull away several times late in the race," Layman said, "but after 23 miles, I sensed that he had spent his last surge. That's where I moved." The flat course and cold weather enabled Layman to slice four seconds off the 2:13:05 he ran at the Nike Marathon in September, although he was disappointed by again coming so close to a sub-2:13. (Life's a bitch in the big city.)

"It was a great race," Pinocci nodded. He was fighting with mixed emotions—pleasure at knocking 30 seconds off his Boston time and frustration at coming so close (35 seconds) to the victory and a Fukuoka Marathon trip.

Pinocci, played up as the man to beat by the press for weeks, came even closer to victory than he knew. It was a twist of fate that Layman even heard about the race. Mike Cassaday, a Navy doctor who lives in Oakland, just happened to call Layman, an old medical school buddy, six days before the marathon. When Layman heard about the Fukuoka trip, that clinched it. Cassaday himself took fourth in 2:16:57 to win a trip to New Zealand as the first Oakland resident. In all, seven runners broke Don Paul's 2:18:41 course record.

Florianne Harp and Margo Elson both blasted through the 2:50 barrier for the first time. Harp chopped six minutes from her time with a 2:46:57 victory while Elson, a 30-year-old physical therapy student in neighboring Berkeley, cut 11 minutes off her time by clocking 2:48:40.

The big news, however, was in the masters categories. Ottawa's Diane Palmason ended Karen Scannell's 20-race masters winning streak, but both set age-43 records for their respective countries by running 2:49:19 and 2:49:57. Palmason passed Scannell at 22 miles. Sister Marion Irvine, meanwhile, broke her own 50-and-over national age-group record with a phenomenal 2:55:17.

The half-marathon was off to a scorching start with the large lead group passing the first three mile markers in 4:40, 9:35 and 14:38. Masters leader Sal Vasquez was just a stone's throw behind, keeping a seemingly suicidal pace. Soon a two-man race developed for first, between Dan Gruber and Colombian Joaquin Leano, while another race between an American and a Colombian shaped up behind them for third. The Americans won both contests, Gruber pulling away from Leano with a mile left and winning by 22 seconds in 1:04:46, while Peanut Harms outkicked Miguel Tibaduiza for third, 1:05:38 to 1:05:42.

Gruber was pleasantly surprised since his ham-

strings were still recovering from a 26th-place finish at the cross country nationals the week before. His first visit to sub-1:05 country came in spite of wrong turns that cost him "twenty to thirty seconds plus a good deal of concentration."

Vasquez slowed after tearing through 5 miles in 25:00 and 10 miles in 51:21, but not enough to prevent him from claiming Herb Lorenz's American masters record by four seconds. "This was the best race of my career," Vasquez grinned. The 41-year-old just keeps improving. He races almost every weekend and only lost two races in 1981, both times to Tom Laris.

In an exciting women's race, Greater San Francisco's Renee Hicks moved up from fifth place early in the race to second. Because of the clot of male runners between her and leader Marilyn Taylor-Allen, however, she didn't know how close she was to winning—just 150 yards at the finish.

"If I'd known where Marilyn was, I feel I could have caught her," Hicks said. "But close only counts in horseshoes. I just ran out of real estate." Taylor-Allen's 1:17:55 was the umpteenth course record of the day.

From New York City Marathon director Fred Lebow to U.S. Senate candidate Pete McCloskey to Joe Jogger, the Oakland Marathon and Half Marathon left an impression. Oaklanders will no longer have to pretend they are from somewhere else. For Oakland, it's been a long road to respectability. Indeed, it's been a marathon.
