SAN FRANCISCO -The SPAL cross country finals were touched with both the expected and the unexpected Thursday afternoon at Golden Gate Park here.

After the meet, Ockerman said the sixth place finish "was nothing but luck. I'd like to say it was the coaching, but it wasn't."

Carlmont's surprises includwinning the sophomore race, having three runners tie for first place in the varsity race, and perhaps most surprising, being tied for frosh title by San Carlos. Scot Carl Cattarin burned

the cinders in the sophomore race to beat heralded Gordan MacMitchell of Gunn and lead the Scots to a 28-35 win. Cattarin had the best time of the day for anyone over the 2.6 mile flat course, 12:20.

Hans Templeman, Steve Miller and Scott Carvey tied for first in the varsity race, with a time of 12:23. "After a while, they saw they were all alone, so they didn't push it all the way," said Scot skipper Loren Lansberry.

Lansberry, and everyone else for that matter, thought the Scots had completed a clean sweep of all the races when they left for home, but when he was checking the final stats he saw that San Carlos frosh had tied the Scots.

San Carlos coach Jim Lutrell wasn't aware of the tie until later in the evening, and said he "was very happy about it, and the whole meet also."

Next Friday the top SPAL teams from each class go to the Region II runoffs against the top six from the SCVAL.
