STANFORD CROSS COUNTRY 1975

THE OUTLOOK

Three of the most talented distance runners in Stanford history will form the nucleus of the 1975 Cardinal cross country team. Seniors Jack Bellah and Tony Sandoval, the top two all-time Stanford six-milers, will be joined by Roy Kissin, one of the best junior distance runners in the world. Coach Marshall Clark also welcomes five returning lettermen and several incoming freshmen, while suffering just one major loss in graduating senior Mark McConnell.

"This season we could have one of our better teams," Clark says. "We have good depth and are extremely strong at the top. Our first three runners—Bellah, Sandoval, and Kissin—could make any team in the country.

"A lot of our success will depend upon how well our freshmen respond and how much improvement is shown by our returnees," Clark continues. "We'll need the fourth through seventh men to be closer to the first three in order for us to place high in the Pac-8 and qualify for the NCAA."

Leading the way for the Cards will be Bellah and Sandoval, who finished the 1974 season first and second on Stanford's all-time six-mile list. Bellah took over the number one spot with a 28:53 performance in the Pac-8 run at Washington State. Earlier in the season, Sandoval had claimed the school record with a 28:56.6 first-place finish in the Stanford Invitational.

"Bellah and Sandoval, when healthy, provide us with an extremely formidable pair," Clark says. "Their consistency is a real plus for the team."

Although heading into his first season of collegiate competition, Kissin has a wealth of running experience, including an eighth-place finish in the International Junior Cross Country Championships last March. His best six-mile time of 29:21.1 would place him sixth on the Stanford all-time list.

"From his high school record and the aspect of international competition, Kissin could be a top American collegiate runner," Clark predicts. "But it will take some adjustment for him. Meeting collegiate competition year-in and year-out will be a lot different from high school."

With experienced veterans and promising newcomers vying for positions, Clark feels Stanford will field a deeper team than last year's fourth place Plac-8 finisher.

Sophomore Stacy Geiken could play a prominent role with the '75 Cards if he is able to complete the season without injury. Last year Geiken was hampered by injuries throughout most of the campaign.

"We feel Geiken's potential is almost unlimited," Clark says. "He has everything that it takes—speed, endurance, size, and attitude. Only the injuries have held him back."

Seniors Art Brown and Doug McLean, and juniors Jeff Parietti and Frank Boutin could help close the Cards' gap between third and fourth places with continued time drops.

Freshman Jerry Emory is another whom Clark figures to be in the picture this fall. "Emory and Kissin are the two best incoming freshmen we've had at one time," the Card coach says. "Jerry is a very coachable runner who should fit into our program quite well."

Incoming freshmen Harold Celms, David Warren, Dirk Feenstra, and Robert Wulff also will add strength to the Stanford squad, Clark says.

This season, the Cards hope to make a strong showing in the Pac-8 Championships and qualify for the NCAA. Clark figures defending NCAA champ Oregon and '74 Pac-8 titlist Washington State will pace the conference run, which will again be held at Stanford on November 15.



MARSHALL CLARK Head Coach

Considered one of the nation's outstanding coaches of distance runners, Marshall Clark is in his eighth season at Stanford. In addition to coaching cross country, Clark serves as an assistant to Track Coach Payton Jordan and instructs physical education classes.

Clark enjoyed instant success upon joining the Stanford staff in 1968. His cross country team that year completed the season undefeated and placed second in the NCAA Championships. The past six seasons, his squads have finished in the upper division of the Pac-8 four times.

A 1957 graduate of USC, Clark was a member of the Trojans' 1955 NCAA Championship track team. He lettered in both track and cross country at USC in 1955-56-57.

Upon receiving his Masters' Degree from USC in 1958, Clark began his coaching career as head of the cross country team at Los Altos High School in La Puente. After nine years at Los Altos, he moved to Monterey's Seaside High for one year. During 10 years of prep coaching, Clark directed his teams to six conference championships and one CIF Southern Section title.

Clark remains active in competition himself, having participated in Masters' events the past three years. Prior to that, he ran the 440 and 880 for the Southern California Striders in 1960.

The 42-year-old Clark and his wife Beverly are the parents of three children—Richard, 10, and six-year old twins Stacy and Shannon. They reside in San Jose.
