1977 CARDINAL OUTLOOK

After two years as a club sport the Stanford women's cross country team attains varsity status for the 1977 season. As a result, says coach Marshall Clark, the Cardinals will enter this year better prepared.

"We're much more organized this season and as a team we should be much more competitive in the big meets," says Clark. "We have three outstanding runners in Ann Thrupp, Sandy Briscoe and Audrey Kemp."

Much of Stanford's success depends on the performance of Thrupp, a junior who finished 15th in the 1976 AIAW National Championships to earn All-America honors. In six outings prior to the national meet she won first-place medals five times and finished second once. She also took third place in the 1977 AAU 10,000-meter run with a time of 34:40.5.

Clark also looks to seniors Kemp and Briscoe to be among the Cardinals' top runners. Both have run well this summer and, according to Clark, "have good cross country experience."

Other returnees to watch are identical twins Kristine and Kathleen Herrera and senior Audrey Fucilla.

Clark says Stanford for the first time will benefit from freshman women with extensive high school running experience. Best among the newcomers should be Johnna Hansen (Cupertino), Joanne Ernst (Boulder, Colo.) and Annette Mungai (Santa Cruz).

Stanford will compete in four major invitationals in 1977, including the Stanford Invitational at 9 a.m. Oct. 15 on the Stanford Golf Course. The Stanford women also will run at the Shasta Invitational on Oct. 22 in a field that includes national powers Oregon and Oregon State.

MARSHALL CLARK Head Coach



In his 10th season as men's cross country coach at Stanford University, Marshall Clark heads up the women's program in the team's first year as a varsity sport. In addition to coaching cross country, Clark serves as an assistant to track coach Payton Jordan and instructs physical education classes.

Clark enjoyed instant success upon joining the Stanford staff in 1968. That fall his men's cross country team completed the season undefeated and placed second in the NCAA Championships. The past eight seasons, his teams have finished in the upper division of the Pacific-8 four times.

A 1957 graduate of USC, Clark was a member of the Trojans' 1955 NCAA Championship track team. He lettered in both track and cross country at USC in 1955, '56 and '57.

After receiving his master's degree from USC in 1958, Clark began his coaching career as head of the cross country team at Los Altos High School in La Puente. In 1967 he moved to Monterey's Seaside High before coming to Stanford. During his ten years of prep coaching, Clark directed his teams to six conference championships and one CIF Southern Section title.

The 43-year-old Clark and his wife Beverly are the parents of three children—Richard, 12, and eight-year-old twins Stacy and Shannon. The family lives in Mountain View.
