

CROSS COUNTRY REPORT

Collegiate cross country is always a season-long saga of upsets, injuries and surprises, and 1980 has been no exception. But the favorites in both college team championships—UTEP in the NCAA and North Carolina State in the AIAW—have remained steady on course so far, and are still favored to retain their '79 titles.

The UTEP Miners have maintained their usual low profile, running in small, local meets and keeping their eyes firmly fixed on the NCAA race in Wichita (November 24). Frosh sensation Matthews Motshwarateu proved in winning the Diet Pepsi 10k road race that he will be a major factor at Wichita. Teammates Suleiman Nyambui, James Rotich and Mike Musyoki are likewise running well, if yet under wraps.

Penn State, considered a major challenger to the Miners, suffered defeat at the hands of Arkansas at the Wisconsin Invitational, 40-45. The Lions will have to be sharper if they intend to challenge UTEP, but a more recent victory at the Central Collegiates indicates that coach Harry Groves will have his runners at their seasonal best on the 24th.

Auburn was rated highly before the season began, but injuries have taken Tom Graves and Bob Hicks out for the season, so the SEC winners are not likely to be in contention for top NCAA honors.

In the West, UCLA has emerged as the strongest team of the Pac-10, replacing perennial powerhouses Oregon and Washington State, both of whom are lying low with young and inexperienced teams this year. The Bruins are paced by senior Steve Ortiz, untouchable this fall. They won the conference's Southern section from Arizona by a wide margin.

The AIAW race in Seattle (November 15) will determine if Julie Shea is fully recovered from a mid-season knee injury. Her North Carolina State teammates lost to Tennessee while Julie was recuperating, but she has returned to lead the Wolfpack to a solid ACC win.

There have been fireworks in the West, as California dropped its opener to tough Arizona, then won the Sportswest Invitational from Washington and Oregon by narrow margins. Arizona beat the Bears again at the Western AIAW, as did UCLA and surprising Cal Poly/SLO.

Highly-rated Penn State has lost to Michigan State and then to Virginia (even without Margaret Groos), and seems unlikely to threaten at Seattle.

In noncollegiate action, Henry Rono won a small 10km race in Albuquerque, his new home, on Oct. 6 in 30:36, beating Ibrahim Juma. Colorado's Mark Scrutton defeated road ace Herb Lindsay at the Colorado Invitational, 31:04 to 31:21.
