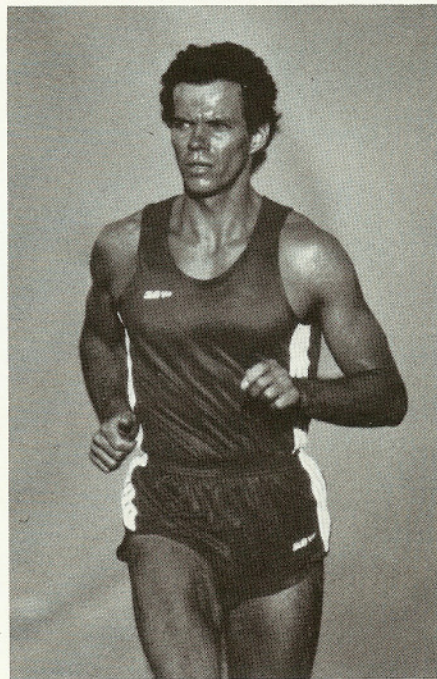

Dear Participants:



VAN CORTLANDT PARK

CROSS COUNTRY'S MECCA

The four Kinney Regional races are held on first-rate cross country courses -- the best in their respective areas. If a course had to be singled out, however, for its grand cross country tradition, the experts would point east to Van Cortlandt Park.

Situated in the northernmost corner of New York City, Van Cortlandt Park is America's cross country mecca. It is not paradise by any means. It is not the prettiest course nor the most difficult. It does not have the best facilities. It just happens to lie smack in the middle of the country's most populous megalopolis; a tri-state region rich in cross country tradition. Located as it is on the fringe of the Big Apple, Van Cortlandt is highly accessible. Public transportation funnels there from every neighborhood in the city. Subways are close by. Highways and turnpikes reach from the park to the distant locales of neighboring states.

In the fall, the park's schedule is filled with cross country races. Besides the Kinney Northeast Regional, high schools and colleges use Van Cortlandt for dual meets. Every October, the Manhattan College Meet attracts thousands of high school runners for feverish "dawn to dusk" race day action. Major races such as the 1987 TAC Nationals take place at the course. In addition, an "open" races schedule sponsored by the local TAC or Road Runners Club virtually guarantees that a fall weekend does not pass without a full schedule of cross country races.

But Van Cortlandt is not only for racing. Many teams practice there, and the turf is pounded year round by runners and joggers of every description.

THE RACE COURSE

The Kinney Northeast Regional is held on the 5000-meter course. At the start, runners string behind a chalked line and gaze at the clustered hills to the left concealed by tall trees. A starter stands 50 yards in front of them. When the pistol fires, runners race for about one-half mile across the opening flats, which consist of several makeshift fields used for baseball, football, soccer, rugby and even cricket.

After circling the flats, runners hit the cowpath, a sand-filled stretch made interesting by crevices and large boulders which peek through the ground like icebergs. Spectators frequent this spot, as it is also close to the finish line. They form narrow parallel lines, preventing the field from running more than five or six abreast. Coaches beseech their runners, "Get out there. You gotta go out fast!"

To the right is a fenced-off golf course. A few hundred yards later, the runners reach the base of the uphill section.

THE HILLS

The runners proceed to climb a short, steep hill before hitting the bridge, another spectator haunt. Cars roar by below on the Henry Hudson Parkway. By this time, over one mile out, the pack thins considerably, and onlookers can accurately identify runners by name or team. Over the bridge and into the hills. The tight paths are flanked by dense woods and coated with fallen leaves of many colors, which can make footing tricky. It's tough to make up ground in the hills; there's little room for runners to pass one another. In addition to hand-painted directional signs, the route is marked by the graffiti that has been painted on trees and boulders

over the years. This is known as the Back Hills.

After the ascent, the runners cross a thin paved strip, signifying the start of the downhills. A little more than one mile remains. At this point the terrain changes abruptly. Big stones are evident everywhere, and there are plenty of turns. One even has its own name -- "Roller Derby Turn." Not surprisingly, this turn is cornered at a 90-degree angle and braced by a protective fence overlooking a big drop.

A short downhill precedes the picnic grounds. About one half-mile remains. Runners hit pavement for 50 yards, and the clicking chorus of decelerating spikes alert the strategically-positioned fans and coaches to their presence. Runners cross back over the bridge and fly down a steep, turf-churned hill.

From here it's out of the hills and onto the final flats. Going from woods to flats is like coming out of the darkness and into the light. The sun hits you first, then the vastness of the flat

fields filled by tents, banners, spectators and runners.

From this point on, every runner pushes hard. The figures of partisan devotees appear larger. The red Kinney finish banner comes into view. The final 150 yards are a straight shot for the chute. Race marshalls stand just behind the finish line at the mouth of the chute, directing the exhausted runners. Passing under the finish banner and into the long, roped chutes signals the end of the 3.1 mile race.

Only one runner finishes first. Just the top eight boys and girls earn a trip to the Kinney National Finals. But just as their counterparts challenge the best their region has to offer, every runner in the Kinney Northeast Regional gets the chance to challenge old Van Cortlandt, and leaves with the knowledge that they played a small part in its grand history.

PAT PORTER

Cross Country's Perennial Champ

Do you have a picture of Pat Porter on your wall? All serious cross country runners should consider tearing this photo out and pasting it in their locker, because Pat Porter may be the greatest American cross country runner of all time. And he hasn't even hit his peak yet.

Porter has been The Athletics Congress cross country champion every year since 1982. In addition, he earned a spot on the past two U.S. Olympic teams in his "other" event, the 10,000 meters. He won a 1985 World Cup silver medal, a 1987 World University Games bronze, and is the reigning TAC outdoor champion at 10K. He boasts personal bests of 27:31 (road) and 27:47 (track).

LATE BLOOMER

Success did not come instantly to Porter. In high school, he wanted to be an athlete so he could hang out with the "cool" group. At 6 feet and 135 pounds, there weren't many other sports for him besides track. He didn't take up cross country until his senior year, and then only because his coach forced him. He didn't enjoy the work, and he had no early success. The only thing he liked was being a member of a team.

Since no college recruited him, Porter went to a local school for convenience, but transferred the following year to Adams State College in Alamosa, Colorado, where he still lives. Adams was a Colorado track power and the

young Porter received the motivation he needed to see how good he could become.

Pat earned National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (N.A.I.A.) all-American honors his sophomore season at Adams, and won the N.A.I.A. title outright the following year. In his senior year he tried out for the track and cross country national teams and made both, joining a super lineup of distance runners headed by Craig Virgin, Alberto Salazar, Jon Sinclair, and Herb Lindsey. Following graduation he signed with the Athletics West running club and his career was off and running.

While the Kinney Cross Country Championships celebrate the nation's best high school athletes, young runners can learn a great deal from the experience of Pat Porter, a classic "late bloomer."

ADVICE FROM THE CHAMP

"Some of the kids who are state champs in high school may have already satiated their desires to be good," he says, warning that achieving all their sport's goals so soon may leave nothing to accomplish at later levels of competition. "So I would say to them, don't be satisfied at all. I mean, be happy with your success, but remember that you may be at the top rung of your ladder, but there's a whole other ladder to climb after you leave high school."

He also worries that high school hot shots are not enjoying themselves. "You've got to figure out a way to avoid making workouts drudgery. You've got to have fun. I know this can be tough," he relates.

"After training for Seoul and competing in the Olympics in September, 1988, I got off the plane and immediately went into cross country training. By April or May of this year I was really starting to falter. Then TAC Outdoors came around -- I won -- but I was mentally fried. I took the rest of the summer off and just relaxed."

For high school cross country runners he advises, "After school's out, you've probably just come off track season, so relax the first part of the summer, just goof off, go play. To stay fit, do something physical -- play basketball or bike -- rather than just lounging around the house. But keep running away from your mind. Then start the training for cross country after your head is cleared. Run every day but enjoy it, run with a friend, start easy. That way the sport is fresh and you're looking forward to it."

"In the back of every athlete's mind is that long term goal. If they're into football, it may be the Super Bowl. For track, it may be getting to the Olympics. But the shorter term goals are just as important. The state championships in high school. The nationals in college, whatever. Keep both goals in mind, and take it step by step as you keep on enjoying the sport, that's my advice."

Does he still enjoy the sport of cross country? "Oh yes, absolutely. It's my love, for a bunch of reasons. The actual team aspect, the close-knit bunch of guys that you work with every day."

It's done in the fall. I love the fall, the leaves on the ground, I love that time of year. There's the hills -- the whole non-circularness -- of cross country. You're going places, not just running around an oval. It builds tremendous strength for track. It's an equalizer for kids who might not have the marks on the track. In cross country other things come into play where they can score and get recognition, and times don't mean anything.

Porter concludes his advice to young runners, "Don't get discouraged, keep in a program and be consistent in your training. In school, cross country is sometimes looked down on as the minor sport. That's the way kids see it in the United States. But over in Europe, cross country runners are superstars. You may have to run without much motivation from your peers, but keep at it."

He adds, "Maybe you'll turn out to be a late-bloomer like me. I imagine I would have finished back in the hundreds somewhere if I'd run Kinney. One thing about distance running: You get better the longer you do it."

And at the age of 30, Pat Porter speaks admiringly of Portugal's Carlos Lopes, who at the age of 39 won the gold medal in the 1984 Olympic Marathon. "Hey," he says, "I've got ten more years at least!"
