Woodside Cats Take SPAL All-Sports Title

Woodside High has a long way to go to match Palo Alto's record, but the Wildcats seem on the way to establishing another "dynasty" in the SPAL all-sports tabulation.

Final results compiled by the Tribune showed Woodside won the all-sports perpetual trophy for the second year in a row without serious competition.

The Cats weren't the only winner, however, as Terman Junior High of Palo Alto was declared the first champion of the new freshman - junior high division exclusively for official frosh competition.

Woodside averaged 10.27 points per varsity and nonvarsity sports (except for frosh action) to Carlmont's 9.38 and San Carlos' 8.77 while Palo Alto, winner of the award its first six years, slipped to fourth with an 8.75 average.

Trailing the top four teams were Menlo-Atherton (8.32), Gunn (8.23), Sequoia (8.02), Cubberley (7.52) and Ravenswood (3.38).

Terman averaged 8.5 points (including three championships) in the five sports in which the Palo Alto junior highs - Terman, Wilbur and Jordan - compete against six Sequoia District schools. Carlmont followed at 7.5 with San Carlos thirds at 6.0.

The Tribune devised the allsports rating system to determine the biggest overall winner in the SPAL each school year. All sports officially recognized by the SPAL are included in the tabulation.

With the growth of freshman-only competition and the addition of the Palo Alto junior highs, it was decided a separate frosh division would be the fairest way to handle the resulting complications.

The regular all-sports tabulation, divided into varsity and nonvarsity categories, are given a point scale ranging from 21 for a first place finish to two for last place on the varsity level and from 10 to one on the nonvarsity level and in the separate frosh tabulation.

Standings are based on average points per sport entered, so schools are not penalized for not entering a sport or one of its divisions.

This year, Woodside grabbed four varsity championships, most of anybody, and three nonvarsity crowns, while second place Carlmont took two varsity titles and four nonvarsity championships.

Wildcats All-Sports Leaders

Woodside High still has a long way to go, but the Wildcats have a fine start as a possible second sports dynasty in regards to the SPAL all-sports championship perpetual trophy.

Palo Alto claimed the first six crowns since the ratings were first created in 1964, but Woodside has been a convincing winner the past two years.

The Tribune devised the allsports system to determine the biggest overall winner in the SPAL each school year. All sports officially recognized by

the SPAL are included

In addition, sports in which only freshman teams from the six Sequoia District schools and Palo Alto junior highs Terman, Wilbur and Jordan compete are rated separately and a special freshman all-sports trophy is awarded. Terman claimed the first such award last year.

The sports, divided into varsity and non-varsity categories, are given a point scale ranging from 21 for a first place finish to two for last place on the varsity level, and from 10 to one in the non-varsity category.

Woodside's 10.27 ranking was well ahead of Carlmont's 9.38

second place mark, followed closely by San Carlos' 8.77 figure and Palo Alto's 8.75.

Rounding out the finish were Menlo-Atherton (8.32), Gunn (8.23), Sequoia (8.02), Cubberley (7.52) and Ravenswood (3.38).

Terman's 8.5 figure won the freshman title, followed by Carlmont (7.5), San Carlos (6.0), Menlo-Atherton (5.6), Woodside (5.5), Wilbur (5.3), Jordan (3.8), Sequoia (2.6) and Ravenswood (1.2).

Woodside, Cubberley All-Sports Leaders

One-time winner and defending champion Woodside High, and Cubberley, which has never won the award, are the leading contenders for the SPAL all-sports championship perpetual trophy entering spring sports competition.

Palo Alto, which won the trophy in each of its first six years until the Wildcats broke the monopoly last year, trails Woodside (9.16) and Cubberley (8.88), plus Carlmont (8.53), with 8.29 average points per sport.

Trailing the top four are San Carlos (8.00), Menlo-Atherton (7.97), Sequoia (7.78), Gunn (5.69) and Ravenswood (4.05).

Carlmont Wins Initial 1972 All-Sports Trophy 6-72

It's said every dog has its day — and the former "dogs" in the SPAL All-Sports trophy comeptition had their year by biting the one-time dominant powers hard.

Carlmont High claimed its first All-Sports championship by a wider margin than expected, but runnersup Menlo-Atherton and Gunn also made their finest showings, final results compiled by the Tribune show.

The Scots, whose previous best since the award was initiated in 1964 was second place last year, averaged 10.31 points per sport.

M-A, which had never finished higher than third, was second with a 9.75 average and Gunn, never previously better than fourth, wound up third at 9.17.

Terman won the second annual junior high All-Sports competition, for the five sports in which the six Sequoia District high schools and three Palo Alto junior highs compete.

M-A could have made the regular All-Sports race much closer by winning the baseball playoffs, but the Bears wound up tied for third while Gunn beat Carlmont for the championship. Carlmont had the award clinched before the baseball playoffs.

Woodside, winner of the 1970 and 1971 trophies, slipped to fourth with a 9.04 average, followed by San Carlos (8.76), Palo Alto (7.54), Cubberley (7.26), Sequoia (6.65) and Ravenswood (3.29).

While the top three made their best showings, Sequoia and Palo Alto made their worst showings in the contest's nine-year history; Paly won the first six trophies.

Woodside and San Carlos tied their worst efforts, while Cubberley continued its pattern of eight straight seventh or eighth place finishes and Ravenswood wound up last the fourth year in a row.

Terman took the freshman trophy with an 8.8 average, followed by rival Wilbur (6.8) and Carlmont (6.0). Trailing were Woodside (5.5), San Carlos (5.4), M-A (5.3), Sequoia (3.7), Jordan (3.4) and Ravenswood (1.13).

M-A, Carlmont Battle for 1st

Menlo-Atherton High is enjoying its finest sports year in more than a decade, the combined fall-winter SPAL all-sports tabulation reveals.

Points compiled by the Tribune show M-A making its first serious bid to win the allsports trophy in the history of the competition, now in its

ninth year.

Bear teams are averaging 10.12 points to runnerup Carlmont's 9.37 figure. One of those two schools should win the award for the first time, since San Carlos and Woodside are probably too far back to catch up at 8.62 and 8.14, respectively.

Ironically, Palo Alto ranks eighth at 5.36; the Vikings won the first six awards but are suffering through one of the worst sports years in their

long history.

Trailing Woodside, which won the last two awards, are Cubberley, 7.9; Gunn, 7.13;






The Tribune's Dennis Anderson originally devised the all-sports system in 1964 to determine the biggest overall winner in each SPAL school year. All sports officially recognized by the SPAL are included in the tabulation.

The regular all-sports tabulations, divided into varsity and nonvarsity categories, are made on a point scale ranging from 21 for first place to two for last

place on the varsity level, and from 10 to one on the nonvarsity level.

Standings are based on average per sports entered, so schools are not penalized for not entering a sport or one of its divisions.

Although Carlmont won the most first places — three in varsity and three more on nonvarsity levels — Woodside picked up five seconds and one first in varsity while Carlmont managed no seconds in varsity.





Will Cats lose All-Sports title

Are Carlmont or San Carlos high schools ready to wrest control of the overall SPAL athletic picture fromperennial leader Woodside? Or will the Wildcats once again prove to be kings of the local sports hill?

This year's SPAL All-Sports competition will tell the tale.

Woodside captured its fourth All-Sports Trophy in the past five years last June. Carlmont, the lone school to interrupt Woodside's skein by winning in 1972, was runnerup.
The Scots were also

third in 1973, while San Carlos has been third in '71, '72 and '74 and second in '73. Those three schools have dominated the overall league picture recently, along with Gunn

in varsity sports.

The Tribune devised the All-Sports system to determine the biggest overall winner in the SPAL each school year. All sports officially recognized by the SPAL are included.

Palo Alto won the first six awards before Woodside took over for the first time in 1970.

In addition, sports in which freshmen only teams from the six Sequoia District schools and Palo Alto junior highs Terman, Wilbur and Jordan compete are rated separately. A special freshman award, which has been won by Terman all three years, is also announced.

Standings are based on average points per sport entered, so schools aren't penalized for not entering a sport or one of its divisions.

All sports, divided into varsity and non-varsity categories, are given a point scale ranging from 21 for a first place finish to two for last on the varsity level, and 10 to one in the non-varsity and freshman levels.

Woodside averaged 10.34 points last year, followed by Carlmont (9.60), San Carlos (9.39), Gunn (8.81), Menlo-Atherton (8.31), Palo Alto (8.09), Cubberley (7.02), Sequoia (6.33) and Ravenswood (4.02).

Terman's winning freshman average was 7.50.

Woodside runs away with All-Sports trophy

With the highest-ever point total, Woodside High easily captured its sixth South Peninsula Athletic League All-Sports trophy in seven years.

The Cats ran up an average of 11.00 per sport to easily out-distance runnerup Gunn, which finished at 8.91, thanks mainly to three varsity championships and one second place finish in the spring.

Finishing third was Menlo-Atherton with 8.85, followed by Palo Alto's 8.37 and Carlmont's 7.78.

Carlmont is the only team of the 70's beside Woodside to win the All-Sports award, which originated in 1964.

Trailing the top five were Cubberley (7.50), Sequoia (7.08), San Carlos (6.89), first time entrant Menlo School (4.44) and Rayenswood (4.00).

Ravenswood, which closes next year, and the three Palo Alto schools, which move to the SC-VAL next year, all made their last appearances in the listing.

Gunn won the most varsity titles with four, while Woodside trailed closely with three and Carlmont with two.

Woodside, however, scored tremendously high in the non varsity category, winning five titles, while the best any other school could do was two.

Woodside's poorest varsity finish was sixth, while its poorest non varsity finish was fourth.

Woodside's spring rush nabs SPAL all-sports title

Woodside High won three of the five varsity spring titles to overcome Carlmont's lead and capture the Wildcats' seventh SPAL All-Sports championship in the past eight years.

Woodside trailed Carlmont after the fall and winter seasons, 6.69 to 5.97. But the Wildcats won the varsity baseball, tennis and swim titles, while Carlmont took no varsity spring honors.

Carlmont is the only school to beat Woodside in the 1970s, having won in 1972. Palo Alto, which has completed its first year in the Santa Clara Valley Athletic League, won the first six all-sports titles over 1964-69.

Woodside finished with a 6.91 average to Carlmont's 6.53 and Menlo-Atherton's 6.32. San Carlos was a distant fourth at 5.00, Sequoia fifth at 4.85 and Menlo School sixth at 3.36.

The averages are lower than in the past, because the scoring system had to be revised with a smaller SPAL, following the departure of the three Palo Alto schools.

Varsity titles ranged from 15 for first to two for sixth. Nonvarsity points were awarded on a sevenfor-first to one-for-sixth basis.

The girls have their own all-sports award. to be announced soon.
