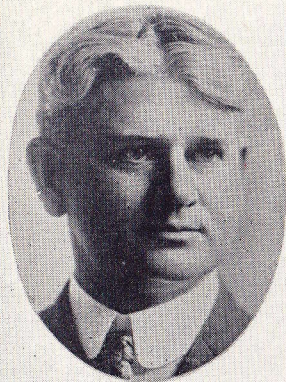

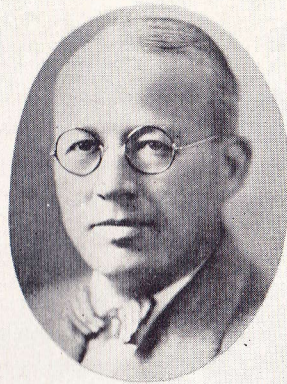

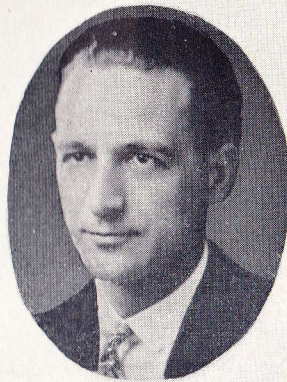

IN DEFENSE OF THE AMATEUR CODE

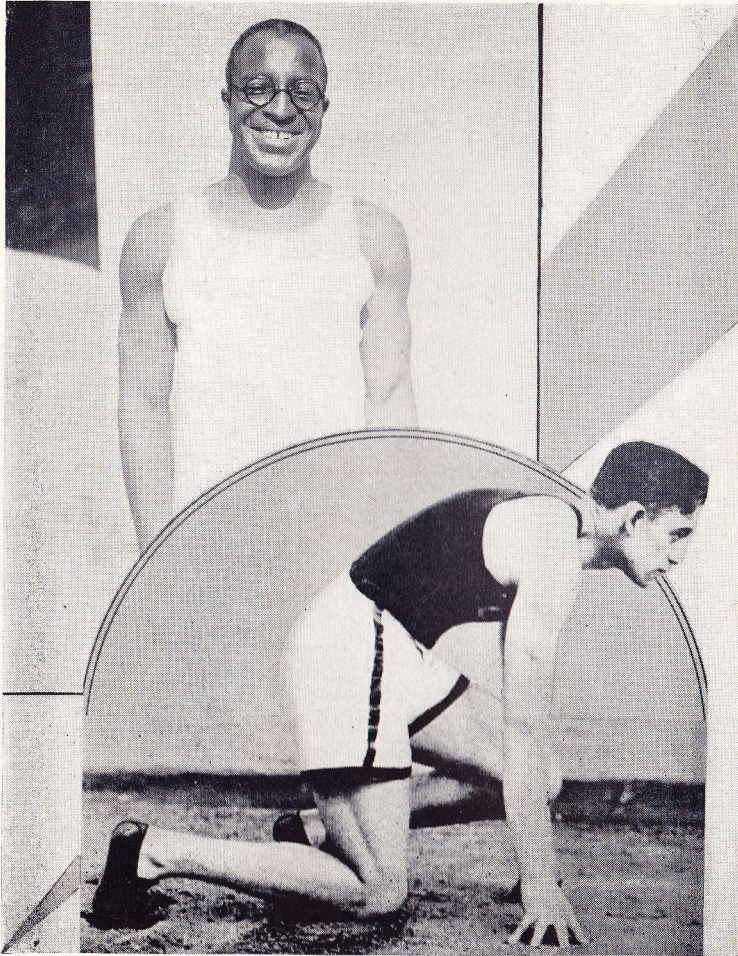
Address delivered by President Avery Brundage of the Amateur Athletic Union of the United States, at its Banquet in conjunction with the Forty-first Annual Convention, held at St. Louis, Mo., November, 1929.

Mr. Toastmaster, Ladies and Gentlemen:

During the last few years it has become increasingly popular to attack the amateur code. Beset on one side by the professional promoter seeking to commercialize its popularity for personal gain; harassed from the other direction by prominent athletes seeking by evasion and chicanery to obtain the material awards of professionalism while maintaining their amateur standing, amateur sport finds its burdens increased instead of relieved by the press, and it will suffer a mortal wound if these assaults upon amateurism, by those who have it within their power to educate the public, do not cease. Some newspaper writers have advocated the abolition of the amateur code and the elimination of the distinction between professionals and amateurs so far as the public is concerned. Editorials have been written referring to the amateur code as a joke and stating that there are no longer any amateurs. It is asserted that our amateur rules are producing a race of cheats and liars and that they should therefore be abolished. The amateur code has been coupled with the Volstead Act as an agent tending to break down the respect for law, and the Amateur Athletic Union has been denounced for attempting to uphold so archaic a system. The following quotations are taken from the editorial page of one of the largest daily newspapers in this country: "The present rules defining the amateur are based upon the British notion that it is degrading to work for a living . . . the effect of the amateur rules is to break down a wholesome American tradition and to place a premium on dishonesty and subterfuge" . . . "The amateur classification in most sports is a protection of the inferior man from the better . . . if amateurs were good enough the chances are that there would not be any essential distinction made in American sports." Another writer advocates the plan that clubs pay the living expenses of bright and promising youngsters so that they may be developed into amateur champions. Thousands of people in this country think that an amateur athlete is one who is not skilled enough to be a professional. When the A.A.U. or any other sport governing body disciplines a prominent athlete for violating amateur rules, it is hailed as a merciless tyrant and a betrayer of the public interest. There is an astounding lack of clear thinking on this subject, and after reading a few articles of the kind referred to above, one ceases to wonder that the public is bewildered and confused. We need to be brought back to fundamental principles.

Amateurism—Sportsmanship

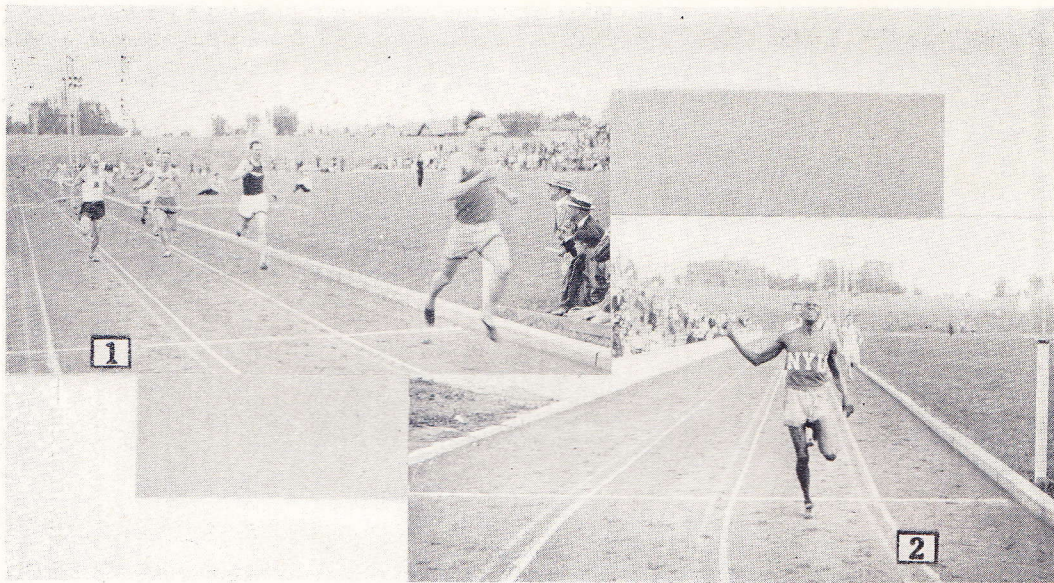
Doubtless a great deal of this perplexity is due to the confusion of amateurism with sportsmanship. If professional athletes had the same standing in the public eye as amateur athletes, there would be no particular advantage

Tolan won both the 100 and 220 at the A.A.U. national championships. In the Western Conference meet at Evanston, Ill., Tolán won the hundred in 9.5s., equaling the record made by Charlie Paddock in 1926, although the time never was accepted as a world record by the International Federation. Simpson won both sprint races in the National Collegiate Athletic Association championships and bettered the world record by running the hundred in 9.2-5s., with starting blocks. He entered the A.A.U. championships, but strained a tendon in his leg while practising starts at the Denver University Stadium, two days before the meet, and was unable to compete. The records made by Tolán and Simpson will be submitted to the International Federation for acceptance at its next meeting.

to any individual to attempt to hold his amateur standing while obtaining the financial rewards of the professional. But the connotation of "amateur athlete," doubtless from the old English definition, is "sportsman and gentleman," while professional athletes still bear the stigma of earlier generations, when the only professionals were low brow pugilists and wrestlers hanging around the grog shops and practicing all sorts of skullduggery, and foot racers who victimized the public by running under assumed names and fixing races. But times have changed; professional athletics has discovered that it is good business to have a code, and today it is easily conceivable that a professional athlete may have just as high a rating in sportsmanship as an amateur. When the public realizes this and does not look down on a professional athlete as such, then will an athlete who has professionalized himself have no object in seeking to maintain his amateur standing. He will accept professionalism and be done with it, without loss of self-respect, and many of the problems of the organizations regulating amateur sport will automatically vanish.

Into the amateur code have been incorporated, through the years, all of the laws of good sportsmanship; and if amateur sport is not marked by fair play and courtesy, by an honest observance of the rules without resort to technicalities, and if it is not conducted on a lofty plane with a chivalrous regard for friend and foe, it falls short of its object. It may be argued that if professional athletics is raised to as high a level, and if professionals become as good sportsmen as amateurs, that the distinction between the two might as well be abandoned, letting the issue rest on a matter of sportsmanship alone. But such an argument could only be raised by one ignorant of the subject. Even in ancient times, in the very earliest days of sport, the difference between amateurs and professionals had developed, and those who competed for material gain had a different classification from those who competed solely for fun or glory, without hope of material reward.

Amateur and Professional

There is one vital difference between an amateur and a professional athlete which makes a gap between them one that can never be bridged. We have admitted a possible equality in sportsmanship. From a physical point of view we can find no distinction, and perhaps from a mental and social viewpoint the differences will not be great; but when we investigate the spiritual side, we find the two classes separated by a vast gulf. There is an uplift that comes from doing something for its own sake without thought of material reward. The amateur gets an exhilarating joy from a game well played that the professional who engages in sport as a means of livelihood never experiences. Bear in mind that I am discussing pure amateurism, that precious something that exists in the heart and not in the rule book.

Sport occupies an important place in our modern life, and this is a most wholesome sign of the times. Our forefathers founded here, in the United States of America, a government of the people, by the people, and for the people, where all might have equal opportunities and equal rights. Originally established on a basis of political and legal equality, with the passage of time, and under changed conditions, in many fields we have strayed far from the aims of the founders of the Republic. But on the field of sport, now as when games were first invented, and by the very nature of things, as long as games are played cleanly and honestly, the athlete who can run the fastest or who

can jump the highest will win the prize regardless of social standing, political creed, wealth, or religion. There is a high level of democracy found on the playing field that is attained in few other lines of endeavor.

Important Lessons of Life

Many of the most important lessons of life can be learned as well, nowhere else. Never will I forget the first time I competed in the all-around championship, which I had entered almost on the spur of the moment. Of the ten events on the program, one was the pole vault, in which I had never competed. In the few days of practice I had before the meet, the best I could do was eight feet, which hardly scored at all, and I was fearful of losing out completely. However, I cleared eight feet somehow, got over eight feet six inches, and finally squirmed over nine feet on my last trial. I then realized I had about one chance in one hundred of making a greater height, and figured out if I were lucky enough to get a good vault, I might clear ten feet as easily as nine feet six inches, the next height. I therefore passed nine feet six inches, rested while the other competitors vaulted, and when the bar was raised to ten feet, on my third and last trial, to my utmost surprise, somehow threw myself over with an awkward swing, landing on my head and nearly breaking my neck. Buried way down deep in us is something brought out only under the stress of competition that enables one to excel himself. Everyone can recall scores of similar instances illustrating this capacity of outdoing oneself under the stress of competitive effort. The ability to marshal all one's energies and functions as a superhuman, comes from the depths of character that is built in the weary weeks of training and preliminary work that precedes a championship contest. Will power, self-confidence, poise and self-control, patience and perseverance, self-denial, teamwork and loyalty, alertness, courage, all must be acquired and developed by the successful athlete. He must learn how to win; he must learn how to lose. These qualities acquired and lessons learned on the athletic field are what make good sportsmen, and the vast possibilities of sport in character-building is what makes it so important in our life.

History has a record of over 300 Olympiads—1200 years—when the greatest honor to be attained by any Greek was the winning of the simple crown of wild olive given the victor in the Olympic Games; and during these 1200 years ancient Greece became the center of civilization. Its culture led the world and there resulted that glorious and enlightened age of Hellenic supremacy in literature, civics, art, and athletics, that has never been surpassed. When these games finally became commercialized, and when the participants began to prostitute their athletic skill for material gain, there followed the decline and fall of the Greek Empire.

Purposes of the Amateur Athletic Union

The Amateur Athletic Union of the United States was founded forty-one years ago by the prominent sportsmen of that time to prevent the commercialization of amateur sport, either by promoter or by athlete. It is nothing more or less than a voluntary association of those organizations and individuals interested in preserving intact the ideals of amateur sport. Its primary purposes which should not be forgotten are:

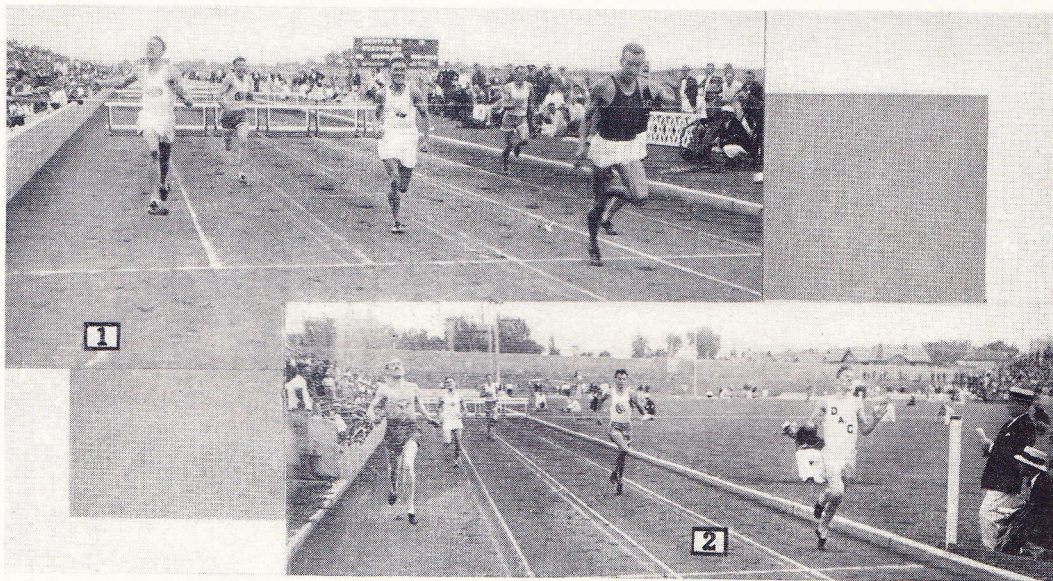

1. To interest the people of our country in amateur sport.
2. To see that facilities are provided so that every boy and girl will have an opportunity to participate in amateur sports and games.
3. To promulgate a code of rules and regulations so that all may compete on an equal basis.
4. To teach that victory itself is less important than the more or less intangible mental, moral, and social benefits that accrue from participation in wholesome amateur sports, and to bring about a general realization that the physical benefits from sports and games are as nothing compared to the character-building that follows if good sportsmanship prevails.

The Amateur Athletic Union has made mistakes. It has been taken advantage of by individuals and by organizations, but through all the years it has held tenaciously and unwaveringly to the ideas and ideals of its founders. It will be a sad and sorry day for this great land of ours when we reach the stage where we can not even play without thinking of the ever present dollar. Our professions and even our arts today are largely commercialized. The pride of workmanship that was the heritage of ancient and medieval artisans and craftsmen has well nigh disappeared. The sole interest of the workman today seems to be his pay check. The love of the work he is engaged in that was inherent in the worker of olden days, whether he was piecing together an intricate mosaic, weaving a many colored fabric or building a stately and imposing cathedral, has seemingly gone from us. Art, music, architecture, literature, all seem to have been prostituted in this commercial age to the extent for money. This lack of devotion to the occupation shows itself in the resulting work, and, as a result, lovers of beauty today must seek it generally in the work of by-gone ages. There must be some regeneration if we are to reap the full benefits of this wonderful age in which we live. Instead of denouncing the commercialization of amateur sport as merely mirroring our attitude toward the other enterprises of life in this mercenary age, we who know the great and lasting benefit of amateur sport must stand fast and repel the leeches. If we give way and amateur sport is swamped in the modern tide of commercialism, our civilization is indeed headed for the same decline that overtook the Greek Empire coincident with the decay of the high standards it developed through the Olympic Games.

Keep Flag of Idealism Flying

Let me read you a passage from that prominent novelist, John Galsworthy :

"Sport, which still keeps the flag of idealism flying, is perhaps the most saving grace in the world at the moment, with its spirit of rules kept, and regard for the adversary, whether the fight is going for or against. When, if ever, the spirit of sport, which is the spirit of fair play, reigns over international affairs, the cat force, which rules there now, will slink away, and human life emerge for the first time from the jungle."

It is our duty, ladies and gentlemen, to keep this flag of idealism flying, to keep the escutcheon of amateur sport untarnished, and to sow far and wide the tenets of amateurism, and make converts to the code of sportsmanship, until we spread the heaven of amateur sport to all the enterprises of life.

Instead of yielding to the opposing forces of greed and commercialism, let us after consolidating our own position, proceed to overcome the materialistic forces of greed wherever found. Let us cultivate the sporting spirit of Lindbergh, that sterling citizen of St. Louis who refused to capitalize his exploit and endeared himself to the world.

Coming to us from antiquity, contributed to and strengthened by the noblest aspirations of the greatest men of each generation, this amateur code embraces the highest moral laws. Its observance will uplift anyone who comes under its influence. No philosophy, no religion, preaches loftier sentiments. It stands unwaveringly for what is right and unalterably against what is wrong. This is why we instinctively look up to and admire a sportsman. It is, however, a matter of conscience and not a matter of rules. Were the rule book ten times its present size, it would not prevent evasion and trickery, which can be stopped only by public opinion; and that is why I decry the prevalent attitude of sports writers who have the opportunity to educate and mould public opinion and who scoff at and belittle amateurism. The report of the Carnegie Foundation on American college athletics, an earnest study pointing out certain demoralizing tendencies that exist in connection with college sport today, and calling attention to the evils which all students of athletic affairs realize may follow in the train of football games attracting receipts of a quarter of a million dollars or over, has been almost universally the butt of flippant sarcasms and jibes. The public has taken to football because they feel that it is on the square. If the tendencies pointed out in the Carnegie report are allowed to prevail, it will not be long before our enormous college stadia are forlorn and empty as the Roman Coliseum.

Leaders Firm for Amateur Code Enforcement

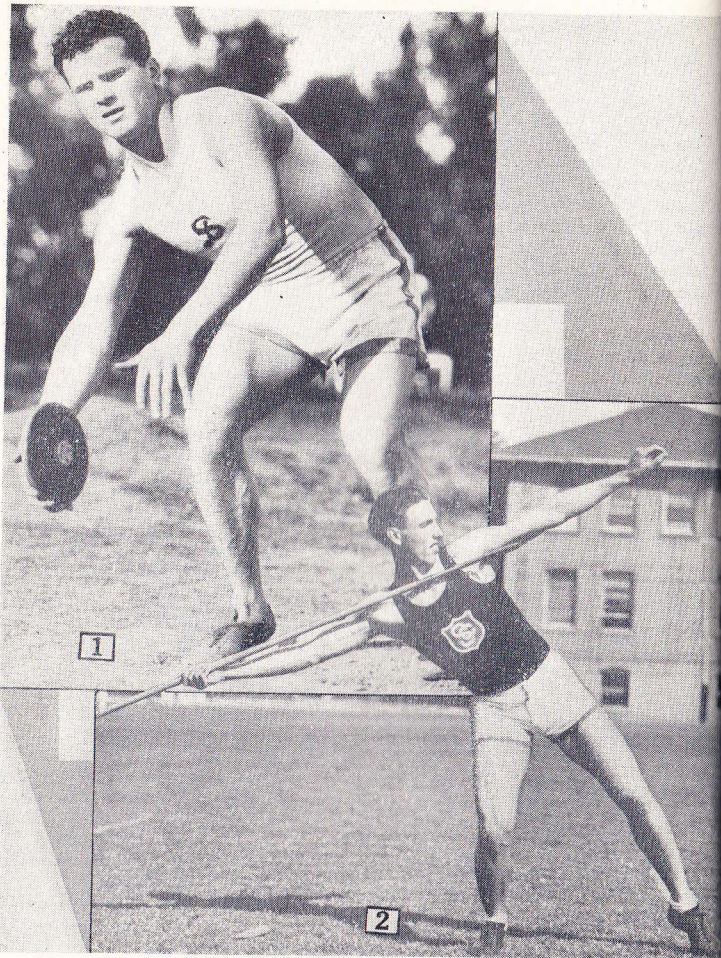
Although I have not yet had an opportunity to study thoroughly the answers to the questionnaire I sent out recently, pursuant to the instructions of our Executive Committee, even a cursory examination of these answers discloses the fact that the leaders in amateur sport the country over stand firm for a strict enforcement of the amateur code. From East, from West, from North, from South, from athletic directors, from playground directors, from athletic officials, from ex-athletes, from coaches and from lay sportsmen come a unanimous demand that the principles of amateurism be maintained. Progress can not be made, however, without the sincere and active co-operation of the press, and I want to take this occasion to point out to sports editors and to special writers on athletic subjects, the outstanding opportunity they have to do an important service for mankind, and especially for the growing generation, in curbing this corroding tendency to deride amateurism. The competitor who is penalized for attempting to capitalize his athletic fame should not be hailed as a victim of petty and malicious tyranny; he should be denounced as a cheat and a fraud. Violations of the rules of organizations that have spent years studying the complicated problems confronting those interested in amateur sport, should not be treated flippantly and the officials who attempt to enforce those rules derided as misguided bureaucrats. Clever but unscrupulous promoters who seek to commercialize amateur sport for personal gain should not be classified as "smart business men." The corrupting effects of such insidious sophistries can not be over-emphasized.

Protection of Amateur, A.A.U. Duty

Criticism has been aimed at amateur sport governing bodies because of the thought that truly amateur sport needs no control. It can not be denied that this is the truth—the feeling that amateurs need regulation is assuredly abnormal. What amateurs need is protection, and that is what the A.A.U. is here to protect amateurs from the inroads of commercialism and from association with those who do not care for one reason or another to follow the recognized rules.

The colleges and universities of our land have almost unanimously decided that, for their best interests, the amateur code must rule in college sport; that it is unfair to match amateurs with professionals; and that the right kind of lessons can not be learned on athletic fields where the professional idea that you must win at any cost prevails. It becomes a matter of common decency and honesty to obey not only the letter but the spirit of the rules, and those who treat this subject jokingly, or sneeringly, lower and weaken the moral fiber of our youth.

You may say that this is all very well, but it is of no very great moment one way or the other. In the serious business of life we are concerned with more weighty matters. English writers have asserted that the British Empire has been saved on more than one occasion by the character developed on the playing fields of their country. Let us of the great United States of America take heed that the strength and glory of our country is not undermined by lowered ethical standards acquired on the playing fields of America.

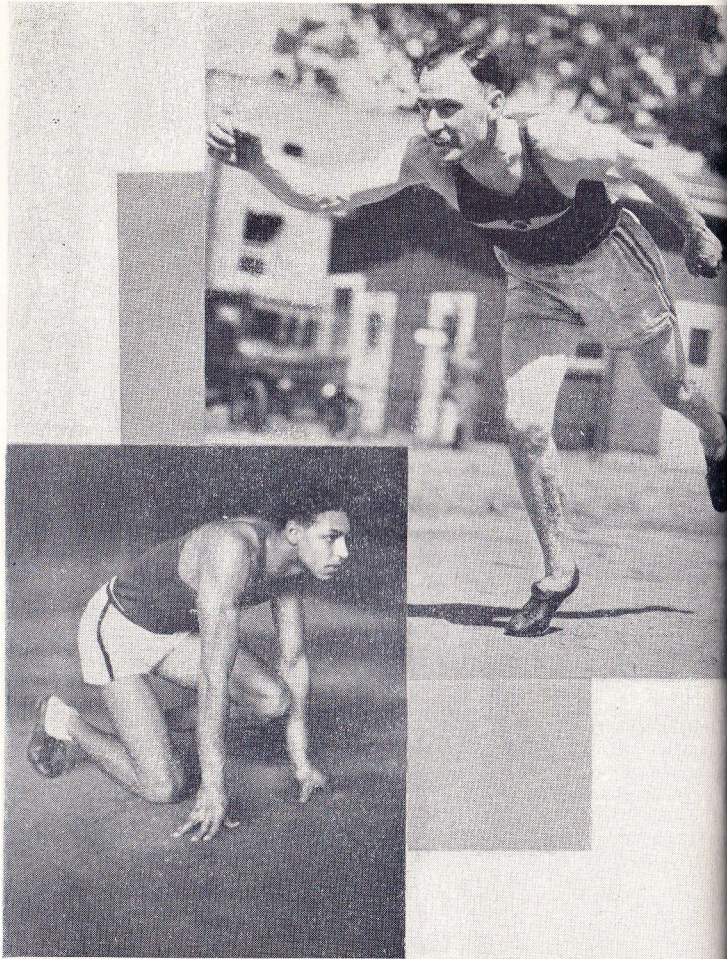

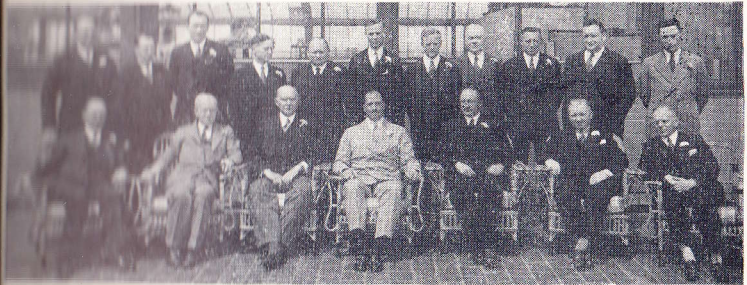
GERMAN ATHLETIC OFFICIALS TOUR UNITED STATES

Germany's two leading athletic officials and exponents of physical education, Dr. Theodore Lewald and Dr. Carl Diem, sailed for home on June 10 1930, after spending five weeks in the United States inspecting the newest playgrounds, stadiums and athletic fields, and to study the American system of physical education in the schools and universities.

Dr. Lewald is President of the Deutschen Reichsausschuss fuer Leibesuebungen and the German Olympic Committee. He formerly was Secretary of State for Germany. Dr. Diem is the Secretary-General of the Deutschen Reichsausschuss fuer Leibesuebungen. He was Chairman of the German Olympic Commission which visited the United States in 1913, and is an author of many books on athletics and physical training.

Before coming to the United States these German officials conferred with Murray Hulbert, then President of the Amateur Athletic Union, and an itinerary was prepared which included visits to Detroit, Indianapolis, St. Louis, Chicago, University of Wisconsin at Madison, Wis.; Boston, Springfield, Lake Placid, New Haven, Philadelphia, Washington, Annapolis and West Point as well as New York.

Representatives of the Amateur Athletic Union met them in each of the cities which they visited and arranged for their trips to the various points of interest. That their sojourn in the United States was not only a pleasant but an instructive one was manifested by Drs. Lewald and Diem in the addresses which they made at the farewell banquet tendered them by the Amateur Athletic Union at the Hotel Astor, New York, before their departure and attended by two hundred leaders in athletics in the East.

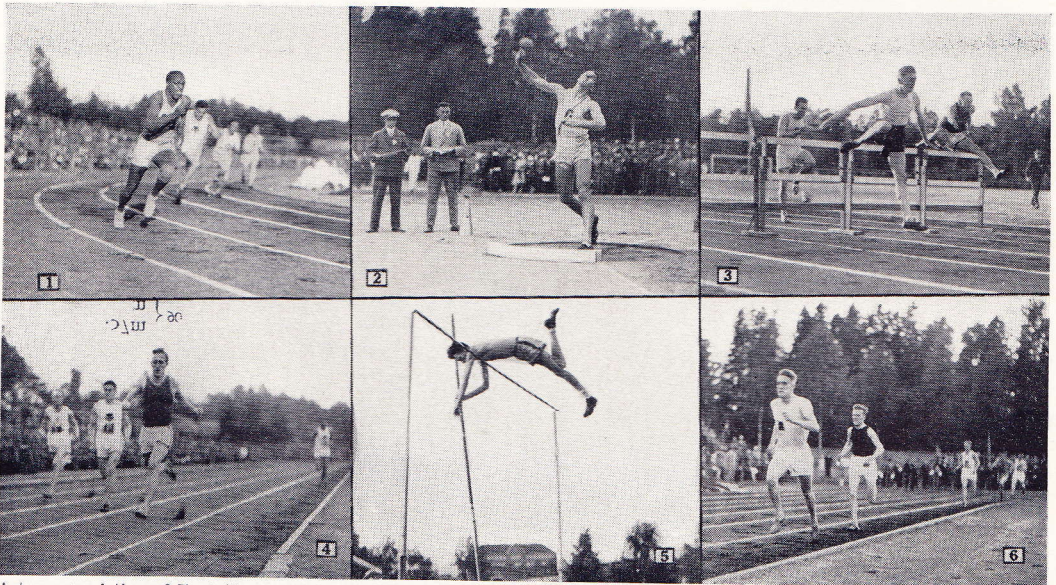

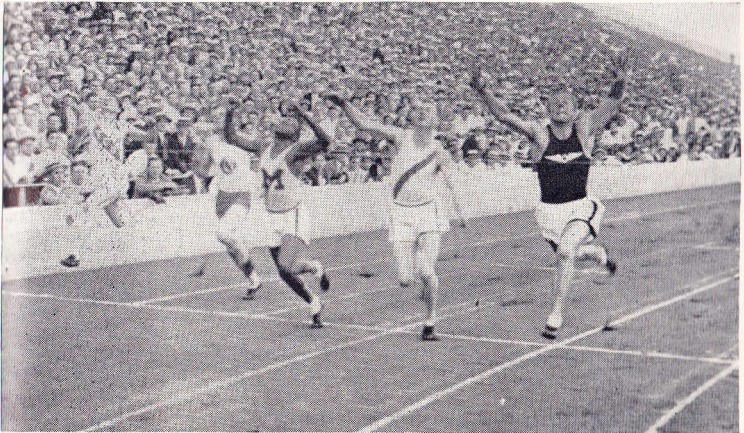
REVIEW OF AMATEUR SPORTS

The efforts of thousands of A.A.U. volunteer workers throughout the United States to keep amateur athletics clean, to see that facilities are provided so that every boy and girl will have an opportunity to participate in amateur sports and games, and to bring about a general realization of the mental, moral and social benefits to be derived from participation in wholesome, amateur sports, have met with good results during the past year. A recent survey shows that during the year more than eight million persons participated in the sports over which the Amateur Athletic Union has jurisdiction.

TRACK AND FIELD

In track and field the acceptance of seventy-six new records testifies to the improvement in this branch of sport. In spite of this progress the Amateur Athletic Union is not satisfied with the interest being shown in the sport insofar as outdoor competition is concerned. The championships, both indoor and outdoor, were splendid successes as usual, but the number of outdoor meets held throughout the season are not as numerous as A.A.U. leaders would like, and during the current year efforts will be made to provide more athletic competition throughout the summer months.

The outdoor senior and junior track and field, all-around and relay championship meet, the forty-first annual, was held at the Denver University Stadium, and was one of the most successful in the history of the Amateur Athletic

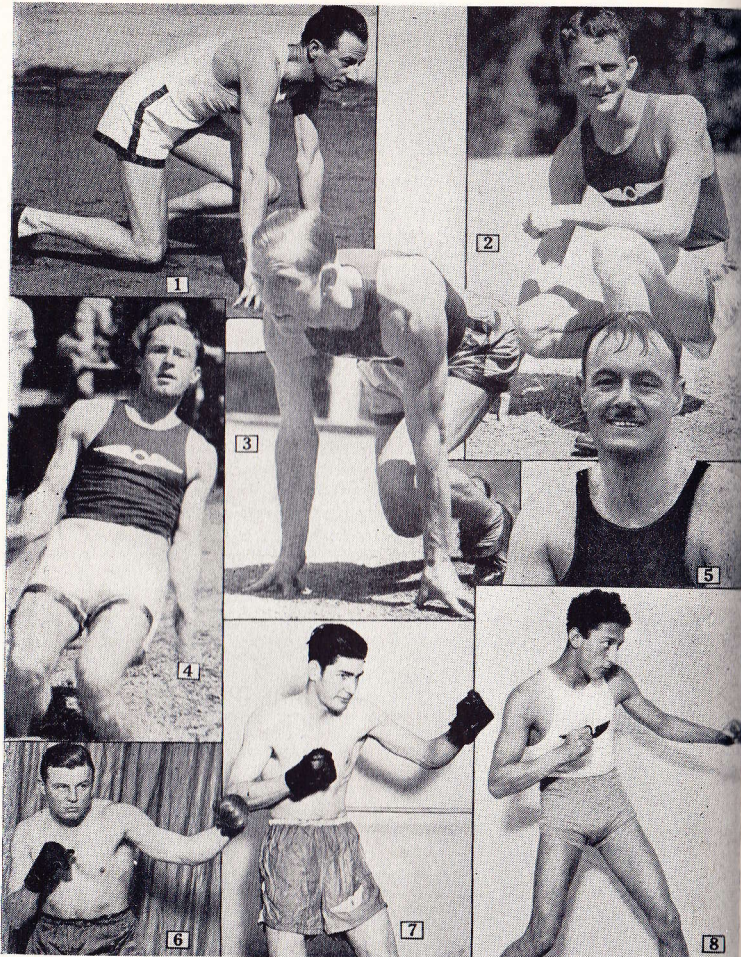

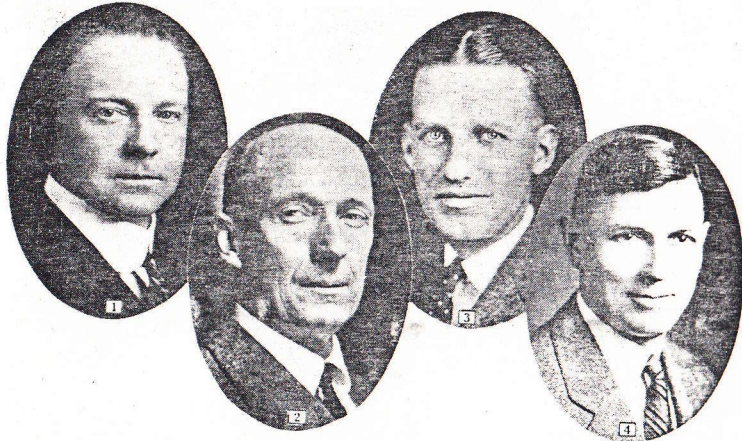

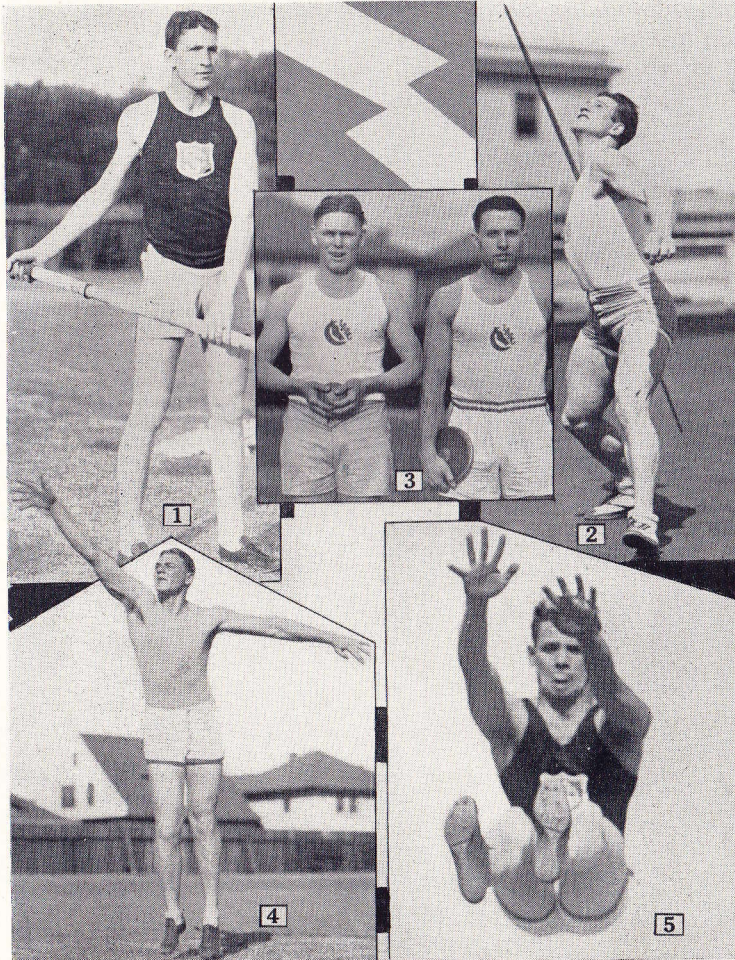

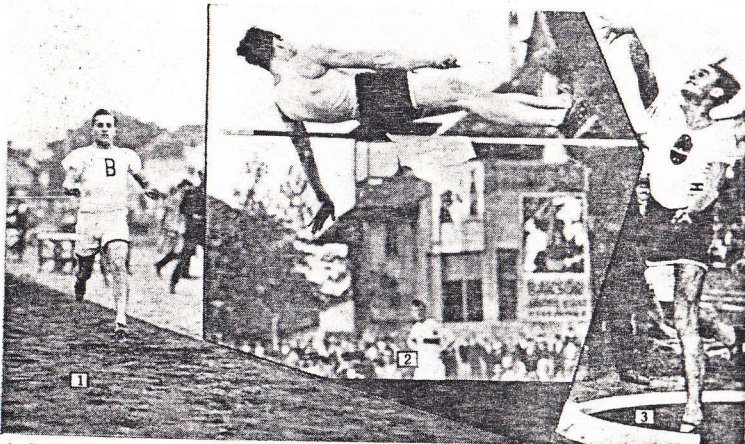
