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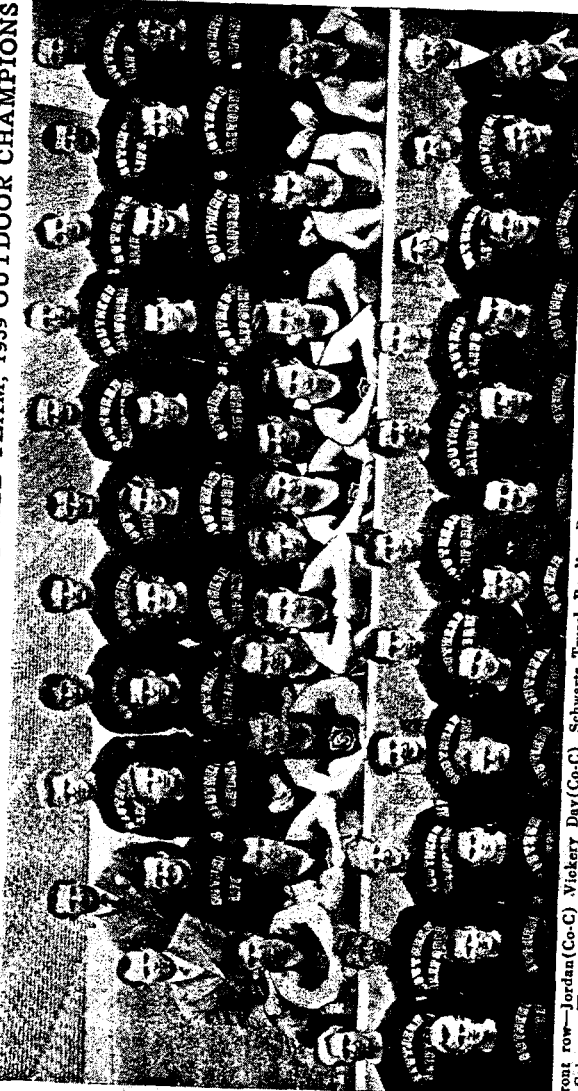

CAMERA'S DECISION OVERRULES THAT OF JUDGES



This is photo-finish of 100-yard dash at 1938 Outdoor Track and Field Championships at Randalls Island. Decision of Judges gave victory to Adrian Talley of University of Southern California (fifth lane from pole), but study of motion pictures showed winner to be E. Wilbur Greer of Michigan State (third lane). In third place was Glickman of Syracuse (fourth lane); fourth, Johnson of Columbia (sixth lane); fifth, Nutting of California (second lane); sixth, Anderson of University of Southern California (first lane).

SCORING TRIANGULAR CROSS-COUNTRY MEETS.

SCORING QUADRANGULAR CROSS-COUNTRY MEETS.

Place the twenty-eight men designated to score in order of finish.

To determine dual score of Team A vs. Team B select the lowest scoring man of either team in the master score and designate him as No. 1, the second lowest scoring man of either team will be No. 2 and so on through all fourteen men of the two teams.

Add the numbers of the five lowest scoring men of Team A and of Team B thus obtained, and the result will be the score of this dual meet.

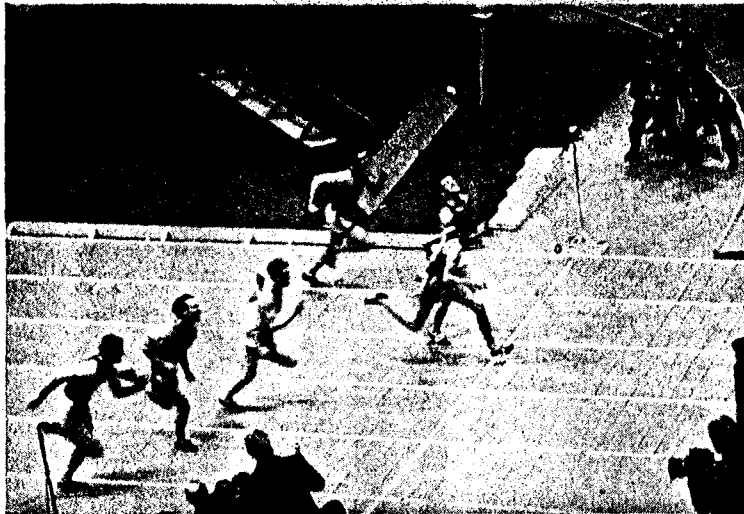

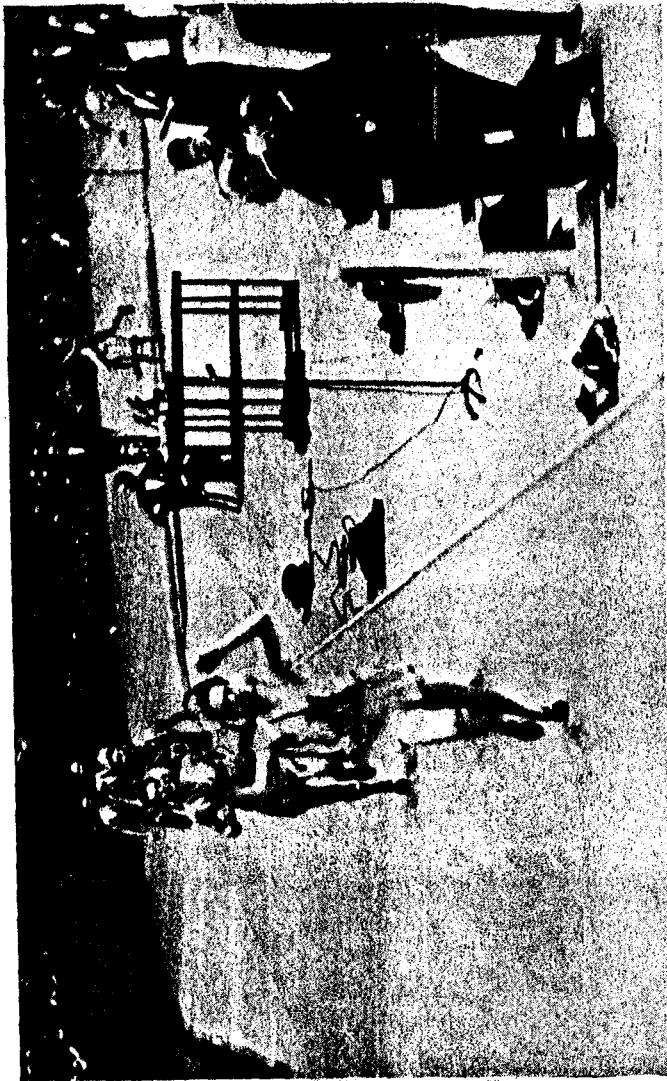

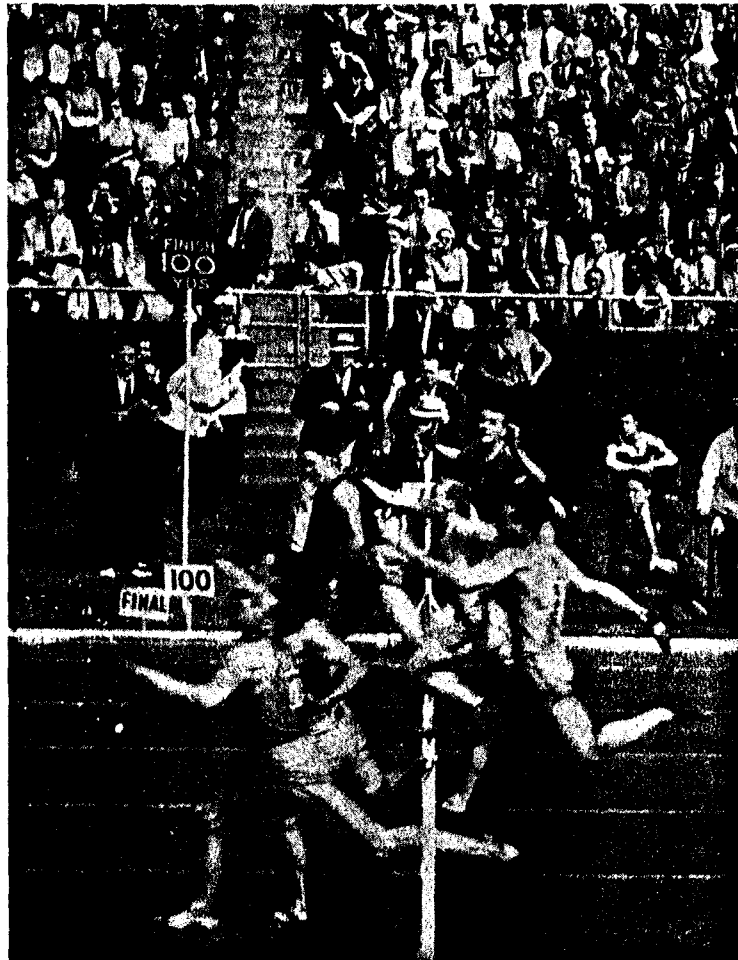

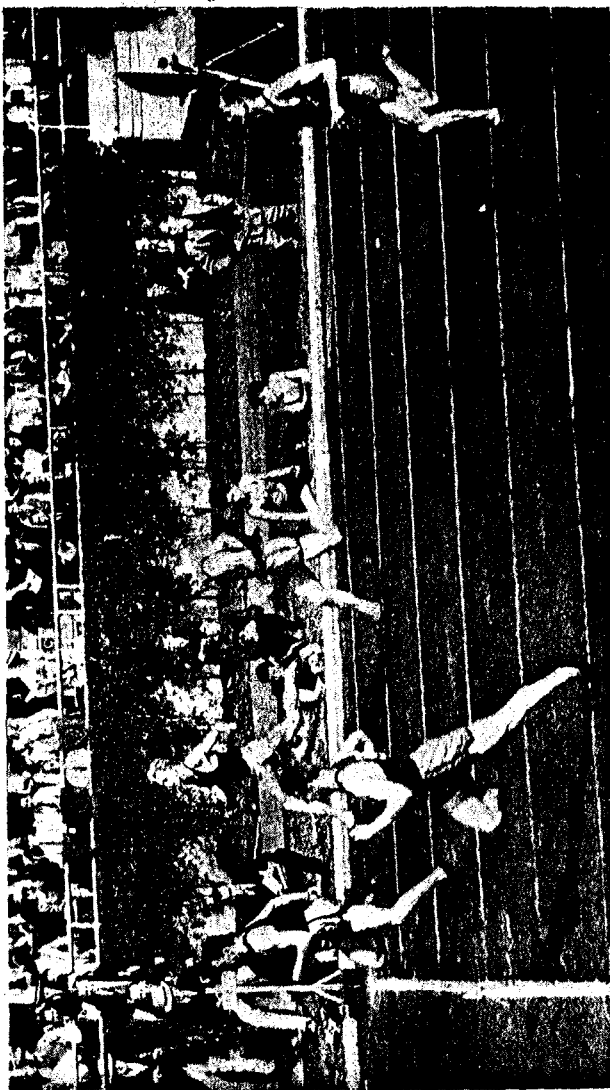

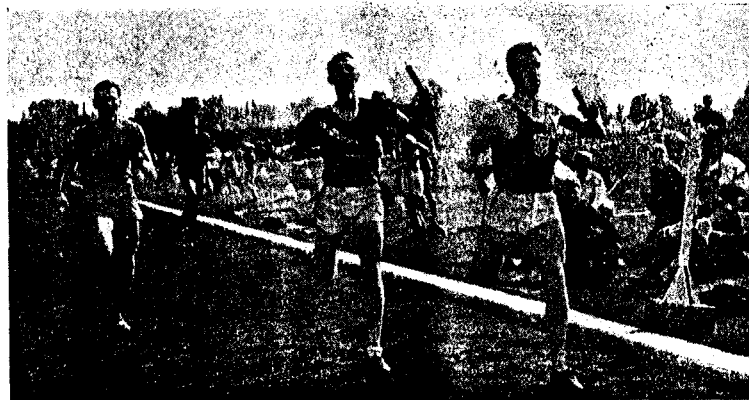

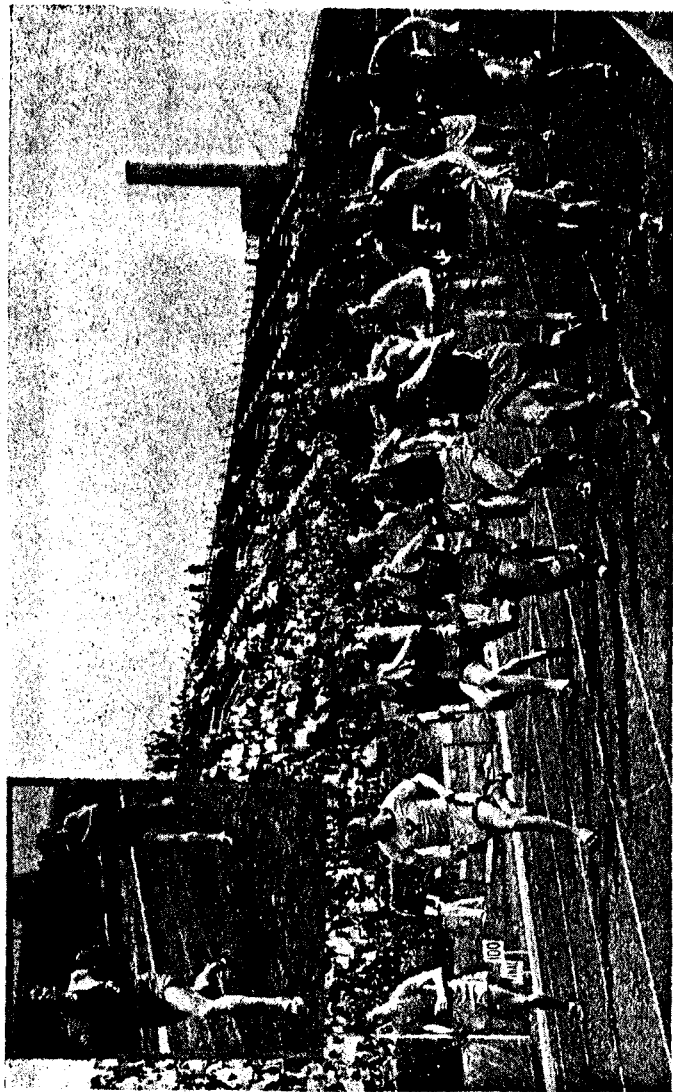

Articles of Alliance between the Intercollegiate A.A.A.A.
and the Amateur Athletic Union.

I. At all meetings of the Amateur Athletic Union the I. C. A. A. A. shall be entitled to representation by not more than four delegates, having collectively one vote.

II. From among these delegates one shall be chosen to be a member of the Board of Governors of the A. A. U., who shall have voice, vote and privilege equal to the other members of said Board upon matters coming before it.

III. All members of the A. A. U. clubs entering Intercollegiate games shall be governed by the rules of the I. C. A. A. A.; but members of associate colleges entering the A. A. U. games shall be governed by the rules of the A. A. U.

IV. These Articles of Alliance shall be terminable by either party upon thirty days' written notice to the other.

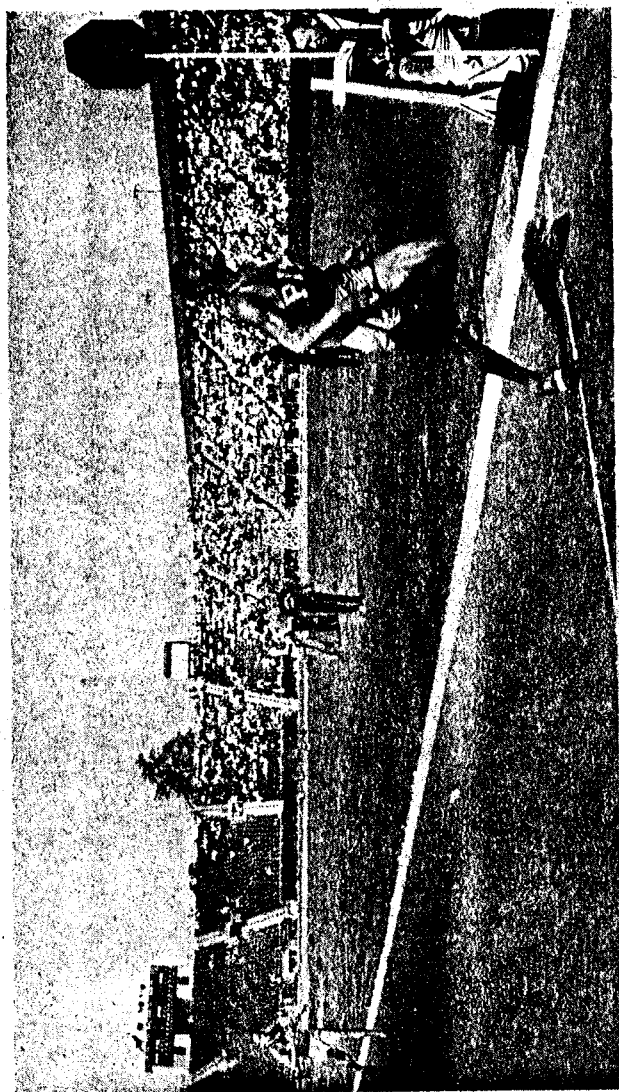

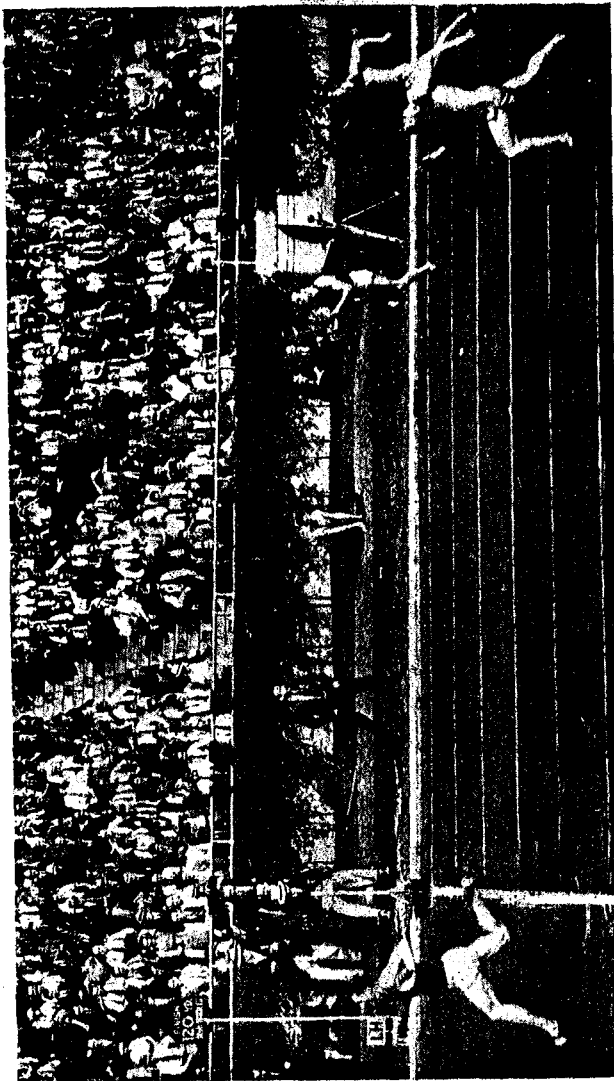
