Such is I.C.A.A.A.A. record of late Al Blozis of Georgetown, World War II casualty, here seen putting shot for 1942 championship and new Intercollegiate mark of 55 ft. 4 7/8 in. I.C.A.A.A. CHAMPIONSHIP TROPHIES

Indoor Championship Cup

Twenty-six years of rivalry were required to determine possession of original trophy, New York University finally capturing its fifth leg in 1947 and taking the cup out of competition. Other winners during the quarter century were Pennsylvania, 3½ times; Army, 3; Cornell, 2½; Columbia, 2; Harvard, 2; Fordham, 1; Georgetown 1; Penn State, 1; Yale, 1. A new trophy will be the prize in 1948.

Cross-Country Cup

With Cornell taking possession of the first cup in 1913 by means of five victories in the first six years of competition, and with Michigan State retiring the second one by winning a fifth leg twenty-four years later in 1937, the present trophy has been the goal of the harriers for the past nine years. Rhode Island holds 3 legs; Manhattan 2; Army, Navy, Dartmouth and N.Y.U., 1 each.

Outdoor Championship Cup

Since it was placed in competition in 1933, Southern California (now withdrawn from the Association) has won 4 legs; Navy and N.Y.U., 3 each; Pittsburgh 2; Cornell, Penn State and Stanford (also resigned) 1 each. Of five previous cups, Harvard has retired 2, Cornell, Southern California and Yale 1 apiece. The I.C.A.A.A. trophies are held by the championship team for 12 months following its triumph, with five victories, exclusive of ties, required for permanent possession.





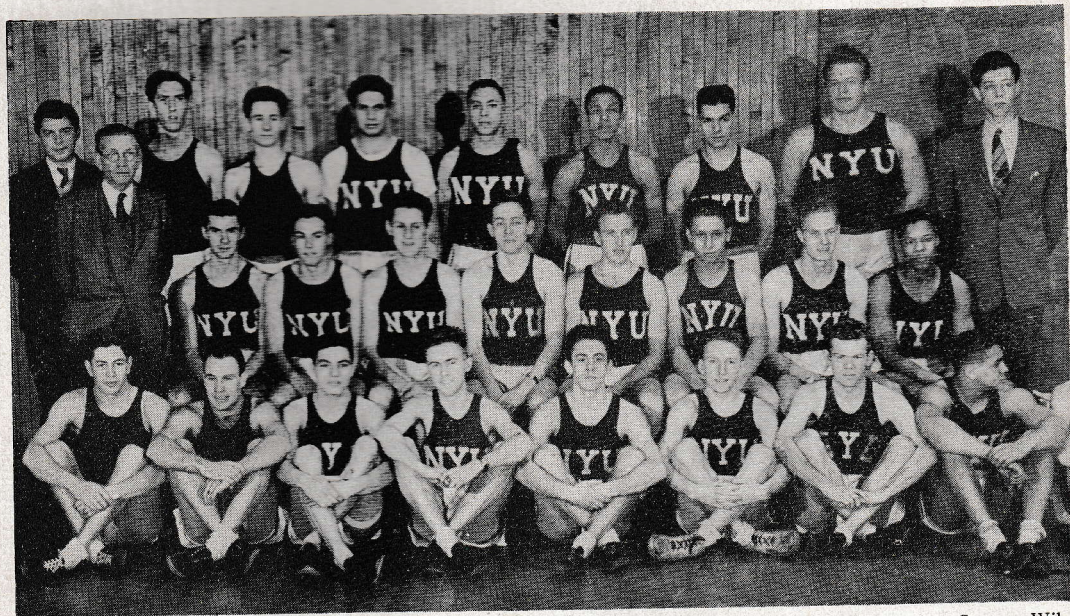
Sparking Penn State team to victory in 1942 outdoor meet, Norwood "Barney" Ewell becomes first athlete to win three individual championships in three successive years. His titles were in 100, 220, and broad jump; he was and still is record holder in furlong, co-holder in century. Ewell also took three Indoor Championships, setting record for broad jump under roof.

Intercollegiate Association of Amateur Athletes of America

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I . . . NAME

The name of this Association shall be the INTERCOLLEGIATE ASSOCIATION OF AMATEUR ATHLETES OF AMERICA.

ARTICLE II . . . PURPOSE

The purpose of this Association shall be to foster and maintain competition among its members in track and field athletics on a high plane of true amateurism, sportsmanship, and friendly relationship.

ARTICLE III . . . GOVERNMENT

This Association shall be an independent organization, governed by its own Constitution, By-Laws and Athletic Rules. It may, however, cooperate with other sports-governing bodies for the furtherance of amateur athletics, provided such cooperation does not impair or endanger the Association's essential autonomy.

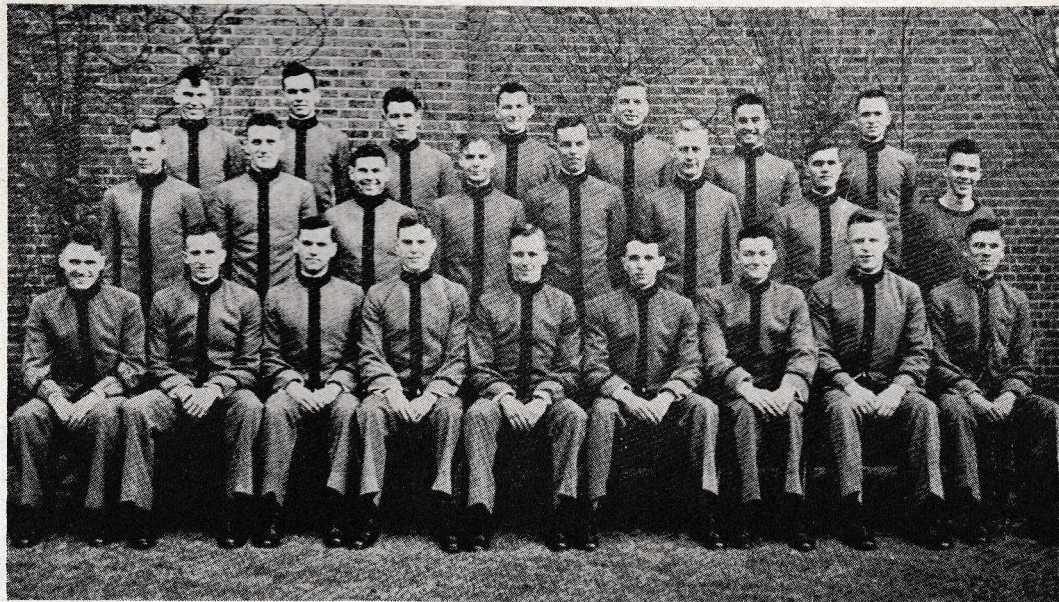
ARTICLE IV . . . MEMBERSHIP

(A) Membership in this Association shall be limited to those universities or colleges in the United States of America which, at the time of their application for membership, have and, for at least five years prior thereto, have had and maintained such high scholastic standing, covering entrance requirements, courses of study, and character of qualifications for degrees as would entitle it to membership in a recognized national or regional educational association.

(B) Any university or college in the United States of America may apply for membership in this Association.

(1) Applications for membership shall be acted upon only at the annual conventions of the Association, following consideration by the Membership Committee and by the Executive Committee. Applicants shall answer such questions, and furnish such information and data as may be required by the Association or its Executive Committee.

(2) Any application shall be accepted only by a two-thirds vote of all the members of the Association.

(1) The Annual Meeting of the Executive Committee shall be held as soon as possible after the Annual Convention of the Association. Thirty days' notice of the place, date and time thereof, as previously determined by the Executive Committee shall be given all members entitled to representation.

(2) Other meetings of the Executive Committee shall be called as the President shall deem advisable, or upon the written request of the representatives of any two members of the Association on the Executive Committee.

(3) A quorum at all meetings shall consist of representatives from four of the members of the Association on the Executive Committee.

(4) Each member of the Association serving upon the Executive Committee shall be represented thereon by its duly accredited representative to the Association, as provided for in Article V (D-1). There shall be no voting by proxy.

(5) A mail vote on any matter may be had by the Executive Committee at the order of the President or upon the written request of any two members of the Committee.

ARTICLE VII . . . MEETS AND RUNS; ELIGIBILITY

(A) The Association shall each year hold an Outdoor Track and Field Championship Meet, and Indoor Track and Field Championship Meet, a Varsity Cross-Country Championship Run, and a Freshman Cross-Country Championship Run.

(B) Only such students as are amateurs, and who are otherwise eligible for competition according to the letter and spirit of the By-Laws of the Association shall represent a member in competition at any of the aforementioned championship meets or runs. An amateur is one who engages in sport solely for the pleasure and the physical, mental or social benefits he derives thereby, and to whom sport is nothing more than an avocation.

ARTICLE VIII . . . OFFICERS AND COMMITTEES

(A) All officers of the Association shall be elected by the Executive Committee at its annual meeting.

(1) The officers of the Association shall be a President and Vice-President, chosen from the membership of the Executive Committee, and a Secretary-Treasurer. These officers should hold office for one year. Election to office shall not affect a representative's right to vote on any question.

(2) The Secretary-Treasurer, who need not be a representative, shall receive such salary as shall be determined by the Executive Committee.

(B) The Executive Committee shall appoint standing committees on membership, records, and athletic rules, and may appoint such special committees as it deems advisable.

ARTICLE III . . . COMMITTEES

(A) The Committee on Membership shall inquire into the qualifications of all applicants for membership, and shall report thereon to the Executive Committee and the Association.

(B) The Committee on Records shall keep and compile all records and performances returned in competition at the championship meets and runs of the Association. It shall investigate, certify, and record all I.C.A.A.A. records, both intercollegiate and collegiate.

(C) The Committee on Athletic Rules shall study the rules of this and similar associations governing track and field athletics and shall advise the Association and the Executive Committee of the need or advisability of changes in the rules of competition.

(D) There shall be a Games Committee which shall have entire and complete management and control of the outdoor track and field championship meet, the indoor track and field championship meet, and the cross country championship runs, subject only to the direction of the Executive Committee and the provisions of the Constitution, By-Laws and Athletic Rules of the Association. Unless otherwise directed by the Executive Committee, the Secretary-Treasurer shall be chairman of this committee, and shall appoint its members, subject to the approval of the Executive Committee. He shall also appoint all officials for the meets and runs. The Games Committee shall render to the Association and the Executive Committee a complete report and account of its activities, financial and otherwise.

ARTICLE IV . . . CHAMPIONSHIP MEETS AND RUNS

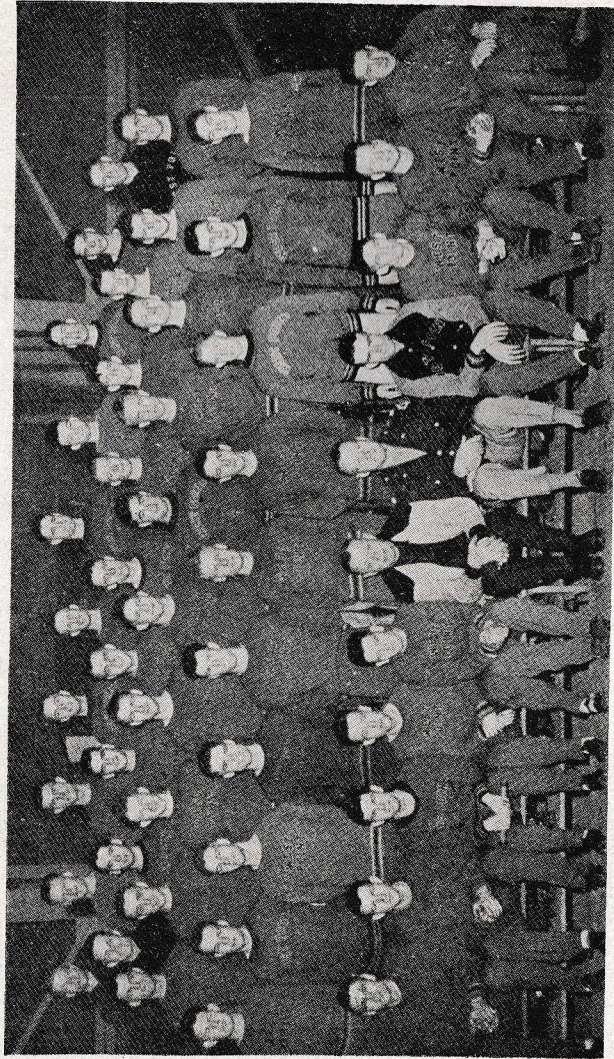
(A) It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to determine the place and date of each championship meet or run conducted by the Association at least one year before it shall be held.

(B) The following provisions shall apply to the Outdoor Track and Field Championship Meet:

(1) The events for the Outdoor Track and Field Championship Meet shall be:

100 yard dash	Running broad jump
220-yard dash	Pole vault
440-yard run	16-pound shot put
880-yard run	16-pound hammer throw
One-mile run	Javelin throw
Two-mile run	Discus throw
120-yard high hurdles	One-mile relay
220-yard low hurdles	(4 men, each to run
Running high jump	440 yards)

(2) No member may start more than two men in the one-mile run or two-mile run, or more than five men in any other event. Only one team representing any member may start in the one-mile relay.

accompany the entries. An additional fee of fifty cents shall be paid for each actual contestant, and no contestant will be permitted to compete unless and until such fees are paid.

(5) (a) Accompanying all entries shall be a statement from the proper faculty authority of the member represented, in form substantially as follows:

"I hereby certify that to the best of my knowledge, information and belief, the students whose names are set down upon the annexed entry blanks are amateurs, and will be eligible to compete at the time of the meet or run for which the entries are made. If on or before such date, any contestant so entered is or becomes ineligible for competition, I shall so immediately notify the Association."

(b) If at the time of entry a student is not eligible for competition, but there is good reason to believe he will be so eligible, his entry may be made conditionally, and the facts thereof included in the foregoing statement. If such student thereafter actually becomes eligible for competition, immediate notice thereof must be given to the Executive Committee by the proper faculty authority before the date of competition before the entrant will be permitted to compete.

(6) At or before six P.M. o'clock of the days preceding the Outdoor Track and Field Championship Meet and the Indoor Track and Field Championship Meet, the coach or manager of each team entered therein shall submit to the Referee, at a place previously designated, a list of the probable actual contestants in each track and field event, and a list of any contestants in the field events who are also probable starters in any track event.

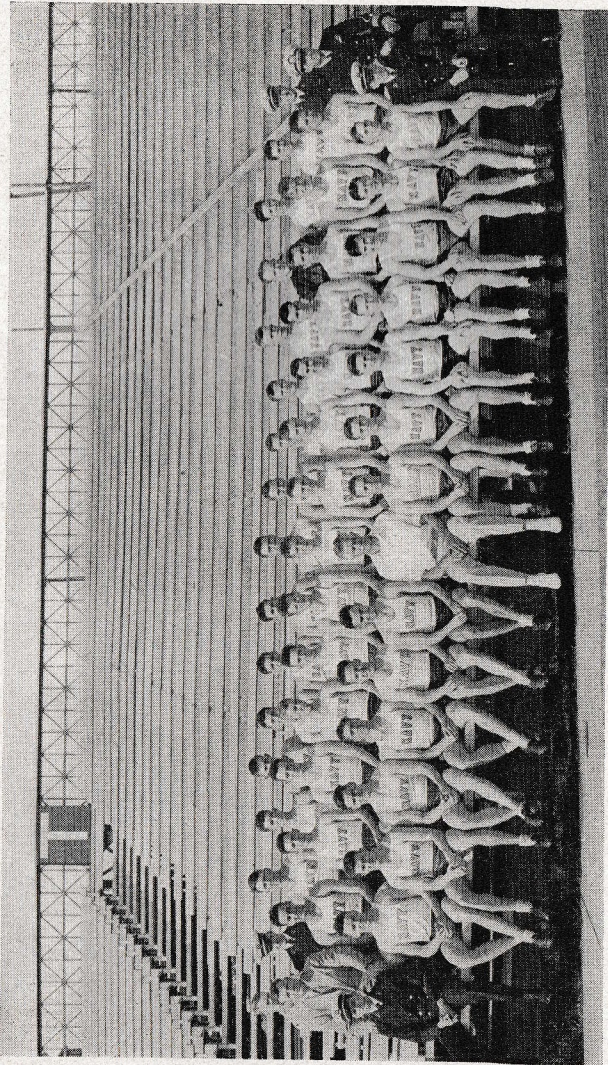
(7) The Executive Committee, by unanimous vote, may reject the entry of any contestant for any of the championship meets or runs of the Association.

(G) Protests affecting the right of any entrant to compete in any of the championship meets or runs of the Association may be made at or before the date thereof.

(1) All protests should be made in writing to the Executive Committee at the office of the Association, and shall state the grounds for the protest.

(2) The Executive Committee shall decide all protests as soon as possible after they are received. If a protest be made on such short notice that action thereon cannot be taken the date of competition, the protested entrant may compete under protest, and action thereon taken as soon as possible thereafter. The decision of the Executive Committee shall be final.

(3) If an oral protest be made to the Referee or the Chairman of the committee in charge at or immediately before any competition, the protested entrant may compete under protest, but written protest as above required must be given to the Executive Committee within three days after the end of the competition, else the protest will be deemed abandoned, and dismissed.

(b) Participation in public competition or exhibition in any sport as member of a team containing one or more members who receive, directly or indirectly, money or other remuneration for such participation, or who are otherwise not eligible to compete as amateurs in such sport;

(c) Participation in public competition or exhibition in any sport as member of team against another team containing one or more members who are not eligible to compete as amateurs in such sport, unless such team represents a well established organization, and the competition or exhibition is in a generally recognized sport, played either between groups of players at one time, or as a series of individual contests constituting a generally recognized series of standard events.

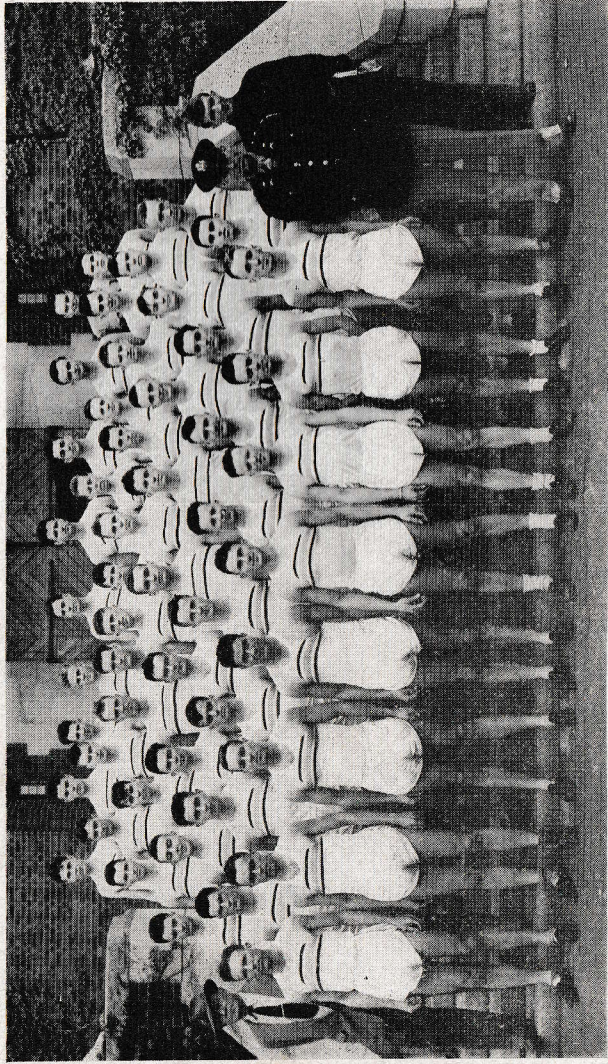
(D) The Executive Committee of this Association shall have the power to reinstate to amateur standing a student who has ceased to be an amateur by reason of the commission of an act set forth in (C) herein, if it be shown to the Committee's satisfaction that such act was committed through ignorance (of the nature—not the consequences—thereof), inadvertence, or excusable error, or was made obligatory by military authority. The following rules shall govern such action by the Committee:

(1) One who has been disqualified as an amateur pursuant to (C) - (1), (C) - (2) or (C) - (4) shall never be reinstated to amateur standing.

(2) One who has been disqualified as an amateur pursuant to (C) - (3) may be reinstated to amateur standing by the Executive Committee if it be shown to the Committee's satisfaction that (a) such act was not committed in connection with any sport under the jurisdiction of the Amateur Athletic Union of the United States, (b) that said student intends never again to resume such coaching, instruction, preparation or teaching or to commit any act which would again make him ineligible to compete as an amateur.

(3) One who has been disqualified as an amateur pursuant to (C)-(5) may be reinstated to amateur standing by the Executive Committee if it be shown to the Committee's satisfaction that said student has ceased to commit any of the acts or engage in any of the pursuits or practices for which he was disqualified, and that he intends never again to commit any act which would make him ineligible to compete as an amateur.

(4) One who has been disqualified as an amateur pursuant to (C)-(6) may be reinstated to amateur standing by the Executive Committee if it be shown to the Committee's satisfaction that (a) said student's participation was not in connection with any sport under the jurisdiction of the Amateur Athletic Union of the United States, or if it was, that one year has elapsed since its commission, and that (b) he intends never again to commit any act which would make him ineligible to compete as an amateur.

ARTICLE VI . . . ATHLETIC RULES

All rules and regulations of this Association governing its championship meets and runs as to Officials of Meets, Grounds and Tracks, Track Events, Field Events, Implements, Point Scores, Cups, Trophies, Medals, Records, etc., shall be known collectively as the Athletic Rules of the Association, and shall be listed and grouped under their respective headings as above.

These Athletic Rules shall be part of these By-Laws, with the same force and effect as if they were herein specifically set forth, and they shall be amended in like manner.

ARTICLE VII . . . MATTERS NOT OTHERWISE COVERED

The Executive Committee shall decide all matters involving the interpretation or application of any provision of the Constitution, By-Laws or Athletic Rules of the Association, as well as all matters not otherwise provided for therein.

ARTICLE VIII . . . LIABILITY OF ASSOCIATION FOR EXPENSES

The expenses of representatives to the annual convention or other meetings of the Association, or of members of the Executive Committee to the annual or other meetings of the Committee, or of competitors to any of the championship meets or runs of the Association shall not be an obligation of, nor shall they be met by the Association.

ARTICLE IX . . . DIVIDENDS

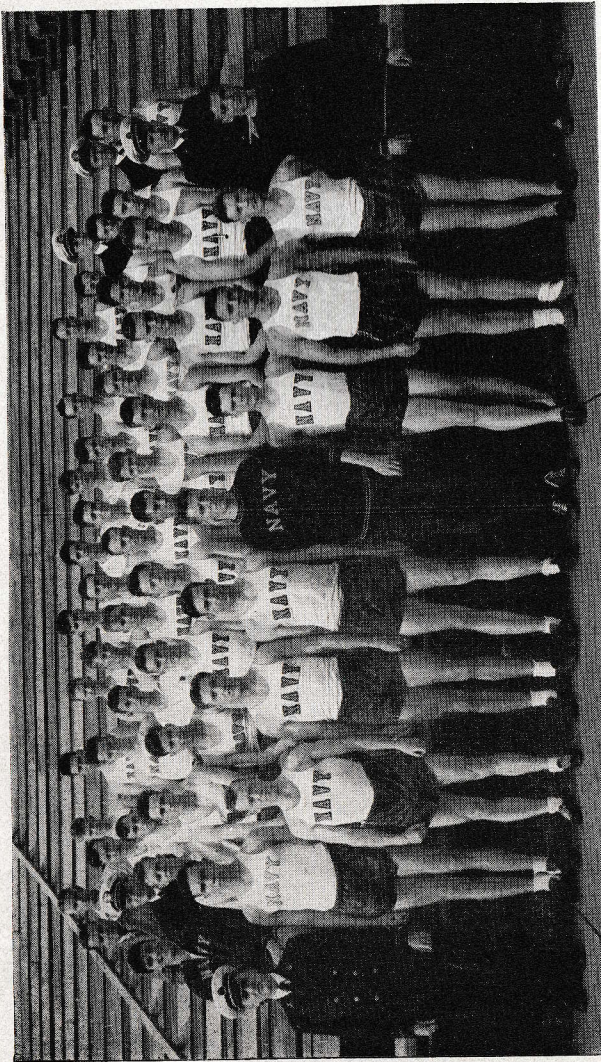
The Executive Committee may, in its discretion, and if the finances of the Association so permit, declare a dividend to be divided among the members of the Association who have been represented by competitors at the Outdoor Track and Field Championship Meet or the Indoor Track and Field Championship Meet of the year preceding such action.

Such dividend shall be apportioned among all members of the Association entitled to participate therein, in such manner as the Executive Committee shall deem equitable and just. However, any rule or formula which may be used to determine the proportionate share of members entitled to participate in such dividend shall be applied to all such members.

ARTICLE X . . . AMENDMENTS

(A) These By-Laws may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the Association's members present and voting at any meeting, provided at least thirty days' notice be given all members of the Association. No mail vote may be had on any amendment.

(B) An amendment directly affecting any of the Association's championship meets or runs shall not go into effect until one year after its adoption, unless otherwise determined by unanimous vote of the members present at the meeting at which the amendment is adopted, and such members constitute a majority of the Association's membership.

RULE 1 . . . OFFICIALS OF MEETS.

Unless the Referee, the Executive Committee, or the Games Committee shall otherwise determine, the Officials at the Outdoor and Indoor Track and Field Championship Meets of the Association shall be:

1. *General:*

- 1 Referee,
- 4 Inspectors,
- 1 Scorer,
- 1 Clerk of the Course,
- 1 Clerk of Contestants,
- 1 Press Steward,
- 1 Marshal,
- 1 Doctor,
- 1 Surveyor,
- 1 Announcer.

2. *For Track Events:*

- 1 Chief Judge at the Finish,
- 4 Judges at the Finish,
- 1 Chief Timekeeper,
- 2 Timekeepers,
- 1 Starter,
- 1 Assistant to the Starter.

3. *For Field Events:*

- 8 Field Judges or Measurers.

The Officials of a Cross-Country Run shall be

- 1 Referee,
- 4 Judges at the Finish,
- 3 Timekeepers,
- 1 Starter,
- 1 Clerk of the Course.

RULE 2 . . . REFEREE.

1. The Referee shall interpret the Athletic Rules of the Association, and enforce the same directly or through the other officials.
2. He shall have power to decide all questions relating to the actual conduct of the meet, whether or not there be other provisions in these Rules giving

line extended which adequately show the finish of each contestant in a given race, then the decision of such Judges at the Finish in such race shall be subject to review and reversal or affirmation by the Referee, who shall be guided by the evidence of such pictures.

RULE 12 . . . TIMING—TIMEKEEPERS.

1. Time in all races shall be taken from the flash of the pistol, and recorded by stopwatches or other approved mechanical or electrical devices, such as the "Kirby Timing Camera." Time shall be taken in units of 1/10th second, except that where a mechanical or electrical device as above is used, the time may be recorded in units of 1/100th second.

2. There shall be three Timers for each track event, one of whom shall be the Chief Timer. If two out of three watches agree, the time recorded by the two that agree shall be the official time; if all three watches disagree, the time recorded by the watch with the middle time shall be the official time. If for any reason only two watches record the time of an event, and they do not agree, the longer time of the two shall be the official time.

3. Should alternate Timers be provided, they shall perform like duties, but the time recorded by their watches shall be accepted only if one or more of the watches of the other Timers shall fail properly to record the time; in such case, they shall be called upon in such order as previously decided, so that three watches shall record the time of all races, wherever possible.

4. In order to be considered for a championship record, the time of any race must have been taken and recorded by three competent Timers approved by the Amateur Athletic Union, and with certified watches; or else by competent and approved operators with certified and approved mechanical or electrical timing devices.

RULE 13 . . . STARTER.

1. The Starter shall have control of the competitors at the start of a race, and shall be the judge of fact as to all matters pertaining to the start and to violation of the starting rules, subject only to the Referee.

2. All races shall be started by the firing of a pistol of not less than .32 calibre. The Starter's pistol shall at all times have at least two good cartridges containing powder giving a distinct flash; when fired, it shall be so held as to provide a background against which the flash will be clearly discernible.

3. When the Starter receives from the Referee or the Chief Judge at the Finish a signal that everything is ready, he shall direct the runners to get on their marks. He shall then order them to "Get set," and when all are set and motionless, he shall fire his pistol for the start of the race. He shall not fire his pistol while any competitor is in motion after the order to "Get set."

4. After the Starter has given the order to "Get set," if any runner touches the ground in front of the starting line with his hand, feet or any other part

of his body before the starting signal is given, it shall constitute a false start, and such runners shall be charged with a false start regardless of the reason for such action. The Starter shall strictly enforce this rule, and shall have no alternative but to penalize all such offenders as hereinafter set forth.

5. When a false start as above has been made, or when the Starter has occasion to warn the runners on any point, he shall order those still on their marks to stand up, and no false start shall be charged against any runner who there- after advances beyond the starting line.

6. If the pistol be fired after a false start by any competitor, the Starter shall recall the runners by a second pistol shot, and in such case, no competitor shall be charged with a false start.

7. No penalty shall be inflicted upon any competitor for his first false start, but he shall be disqualified for his second false start in any heat or final of a race.

RULE 14 . . . STARTING LINE.

1. The actual starting line shall be a theoretical hairline drawn across the track between the starting posts. To aid in maintaining a straight and even starting line, a worsted thread or tape of material which will not interfere with the runners may be laid along such starting line, flush with the ground.

2. To aid the runners and officials, a strip of easily discernible width (preferably not more than 2 inches wide on outdoor tracks, or three-quarters of an inch wide on indoor tracks) shall be painted or laid upon the track. That part of such line furthest away from the starters shall be even with the theoretical starting line, and all of its width shall be outside the distance to be run, so that the competitors may place their hands upon such line at the start.

RULE 15 . . . STARTING BLOCKS.

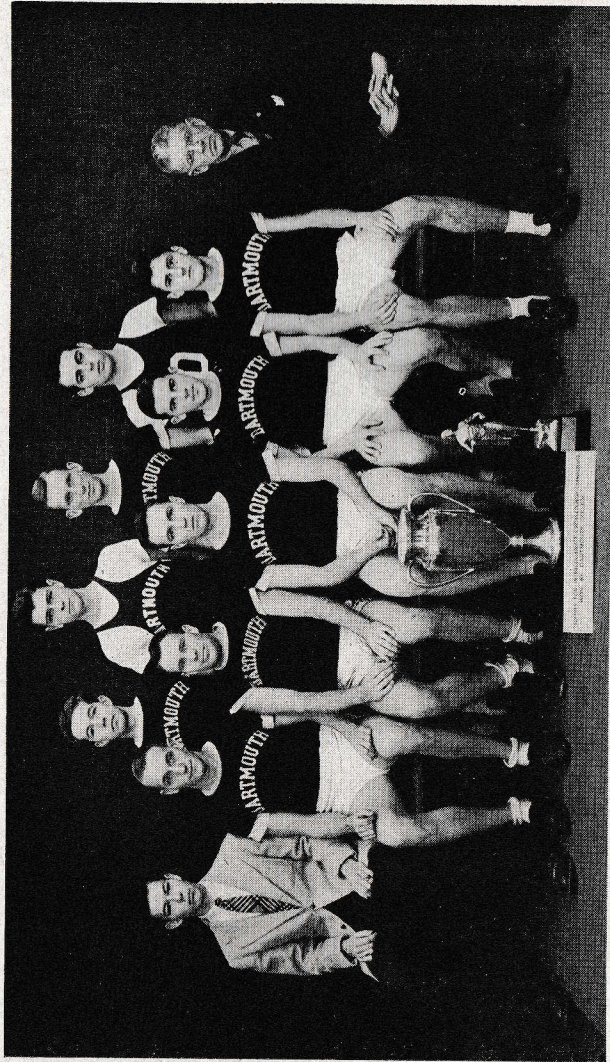
A competitor in any track event may use starting blocks, but shall use only such starting blocks as are provided by the Association.

RULE 16 . . . THE FINISH.

1. The actual finish line shall be a theoretical hairline drawn across the track between the finish posts. A finish line of easily discernible width (preferably not more than 2 inches wide on outdoor tracks, or three-quarters of an inch wide on indoor tracks) shall be painted or laid upon the track, with all its width outside the distance to be run. There shall be but one finish line for any race.

2. The finish posts shall be of rigid construction, about 4 feet 6 inches in height 3 inches in width (i.e., in direction at right angles to the track), and three-quarters of an inch in thickness.

3. For the purpose of aiding the Judges, but not as the finish line, there shall be stretched across the track at the finish, approximately 4 feet above

the ground and directly over the finish line, a worsted thread or tape of material which will not tend to injure the runners when broken by them. This worsted string or tape shall not be held by the Judges but shall be fastened to the finish posts on either side of the track, so as always to be at right angles to the curb of the track, and parallel with the ground.

4. The competitors in any race shall be placed in the order in which any part of their bodies (i.e., the torso, as distinguished from the head, arms, legs, feet or hands) reaches the finish line; but a runner falling at the finish line shall not be considered to have finished unless his entire body shall have crossed the finish line.

RULE 17 . . . THE COURSE.

1. All tracks shall have an inner border of board, rope, cement or other material, 2 inches in height.

2. All races run on a straightaway course should be run in lanes about 3 feet wide, plainly marked upon the track in whitewashed lines at least 2 inches wide. The distance of such races shall be measured on a direct line from starting line to finish line.

3. Races run around one or more turns may be run in lanes for the entire distance, and should be run in lanes at least around the first turn, if the number of Starters permits. The distance of all races run around one or more turns (except those run in lanes) shall be measured on a line 12 inches outward from the inner border of the track. In races run in lanes around one or more turns, the distance of each lane shall be measured on a line 8 inches outward from its inner line. The inside lane shall have its inner line laid 4 inches outward from the inner border of the track.

4. All races shall be run so that the left hand of the runner is toward the inside border of the track.

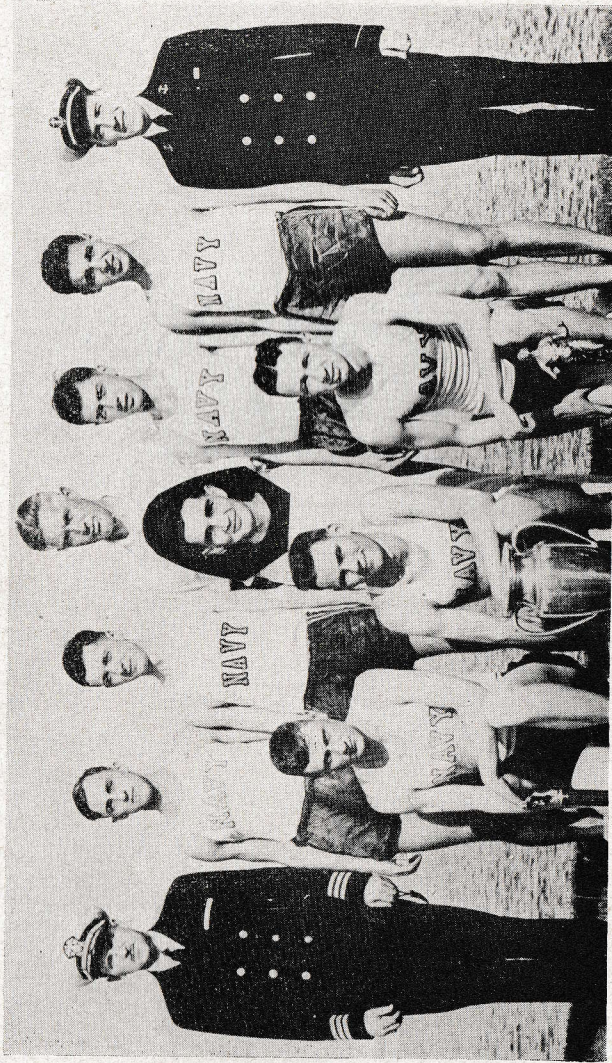
RULE 18 . . . FOULING AND CONDUCT IN RACE.

1. Each competitor shall keep his respective position from start to finish in all races on straightaway tracks. Where the race is run in lanes, he shall keep his respective position for so much of the distance as is run in lanes.

2. In races run around one or more turns, and not in lanes, no runner shall cross in front of another unless and until he is 2 yards in front of his nearest competitor. Such crossing, or running or swerving diagonally across the track so as to interfere with or hinder another competitor shall subject the offender to disqualification.

3. After entering upon the final straightaway in all races run around one or more turns, each competitor shall run in a direct line to the finish, unless there be another runner in his path.

4. In any race, if any competitor jostles, or runs across, or obstructs another competitor so as to impede his progress, or if he evidently is competing

to lose, to coach or aid another competitor, he may be disqualified by the Referee, and shall not be awarded any place or prize to which he would otherwise have been entitled. The Referee, in his discretion, may disqualify any or all such disqualified runner's team mates competing in the same trial heat or final race.

5. Any competitor who during a race steps off the track, or out of his lane, or on the inner border thereof, may be disqualified.

6. No competitor, after once leaving the track, shall be allowed to rejoin a race, either for the purpose of gaining a place, or to pace or assist another competitor.

7. When a claim of foul or interference is made in any race, the Referee shall have power to disqualify the competitor or competitors at fault, if he considers the foul intentional or due to culpable carelessness. If such foul be called in any but the final heat of a race, the Referee shall have power to permit a hindered competitor or competitors to start in the next round of heats as if duly qualified therefor. If the foul be called in the final heat of a race, the Referee shall have power to order a new race run by all competitors except those disqualified, or by such competitors whom he thinks are entitled to such privilege.

RULE 19 . . . RELAY RACING.

1. Relay races shall be run by teams of four competitors representing the same member of the Association. No competitor may run more than one relay leg on any team. The composition and running order of a team may not be changed after a trial heat has been run.

2. Each team must carry a baton throughout the entire distance of the race. This baton must be carried in the hand, and must be actually passed from the hand of each runner into the hand of his succeeding team mate. If the baton be thrown or dropped by any runner, it must be picked up by him, and not by his succeeding team mate or anyone else. If, however, the baton is dropped within the passing zone in an attempt to pass it, either runner may retrieve it. If the baton should break during the running of a race, the runner need not pick up and carry all its pieces; if he picks up and carries any material portion thereof, it shall be considered the baton for the remainder of the race. After passing the baton, the runner should stand still or jog straight ahead; if he is on the inside or outside of the track, he shall step off the track as quickly as possible, to avoid interfering with the other runners.

3. The baton must be passed from one team mate to another within a 20-yard passing zone marked by lines drawn upon the track 10 yards on either side of the starting or exchange line of each relay. No member of a relay team may run outside such zone before receiving the baton.

4. The baton shall be a hollow tube of wood, fibre or similar suitable and durable composition. It shall be not more than 11.81 inches (300 millimeters)

in length, and its circumference shall be 4.724 inches (120 millimeters); its weight shall not be less than 1.764 ounces (50 grammes).

5. The position of the teams at the start of a race shall be drawn for. In relay races with seven or fewer starters, where the Referee and the Championship Committee deem it advisable, the positions of the runners on each team may be alternately reversed from inside to outside at each change of the baton; e.g. (letters represent teams):

Position on track from pole.....	1	2	3	4	5	6	7
Position of first runner.....	A	B	C	D	E	F	G
Position of second runner.....	G	F	E	D	C	B	A
Position of third runner.....	A	B	C	D	E	F	G
Position of fourth runner.....	G	F	E	D	C	B	A

6. The incoming runner may not aid his team mate by pushing him.

7. The same rules pertaining to fouling, coaching or impeding a runner shall apply to relay races as to all other races. Disqualification of any member of a relay team for violation of these Rules shall disqualify his team.

RULE 20 . . . COMPETITORS.

1. Upon arriving at the track, each competitor shall immediately report to the Clerk of Contestants and obtain his proper competitor's number as recorded in the program. He shall inform himself of the starting time of each event in which he is entered, and he shall report to the Clerk of the Course and be ready to start promptly at such times without further notice.

2. No competitor shall be permitted to start or compete in any event unless he be conspicuously wearing his proper number. This Rule shall apply to all Field events (including Running High Jump and Pole Vault) as well as to Track events. Competitors in the Running High Jump and Pole Vault shall be provided with linen or other cloth numbers that may be sewn upon their shirts. Wherever possible, all other competitors shall also be provided with numbers of durable material.

3. No competitor shall be permitted to start or compete in any event unless he be wearing clean shirt and trunks, so designed and worn as not to make an indecent display of his person.

4. No attendant, or competitor not actually taking part in the event, shall accompany any competitor on the starting line, or during a race, or during any field event.

5. Except when actually competing, competitors shall be allowed upon the track and infield only immediately before their events, or at such other times as may be specifically provided for such purpose.

3. The shot shall be put from the shoulder with one hand, and during the attempt it must never be brought behind or below the shoulder.

4. A fair put shall be one made as above, and in which no part of the clothing or person of the competitor touches the top of the stopboard, the top of the circle, or the ground outside the circle. In making his puts, the competitor may bring his feet against the side, but not on top of the stopboard.

5. If a competitor lets go of the shot while making an attempt to put, or after he steps into the circle and starts his put, he touches the top or end of the stopboard or the top of the circle or the ground outside the circle with any portion of his person or clothing, he shall be held to have made a foul put, which shall not be marked or measured. In making his puts, a competitor may touch the inner surface, but not the top or ends of the stopboard. It shall also be a foul if the competitor steps upon the circle or leaves the circle before his put has been declared fair by the Field Judge.

6. The distance of each put shall be measured from the nearest edge of the first mark made by the fall of the shot to the inside of the circumference of the circle, on a line from such mark to the center of the circle.

7. No competitor may use any harness for his hand, or any other device of any kind which is or can be used as an aid in putting the shot, except that a cotton or elastic bandage and one layer of adhesive tape around the wrist may be used.

RULE 27 . . . HAMMER; SPECIFICATIONS.

1. *Head.* The head of the hammer shall be a cast grey-iron sphere or a spherical brass shell filled with lead.

2. *Handle.* The handle shall be a single unbroken and straight length of spring steel wire not less than $\frac{1}{8}$ -inch in diameter, or No. 36 piano wire, 102/1000ths of an inch in diameter. The handle may be looped at one or both ends as a means of attachment.

3. *Grip.* The grip may be either of single or double loop construction, but must be rigid and without hanging joints of any kind.

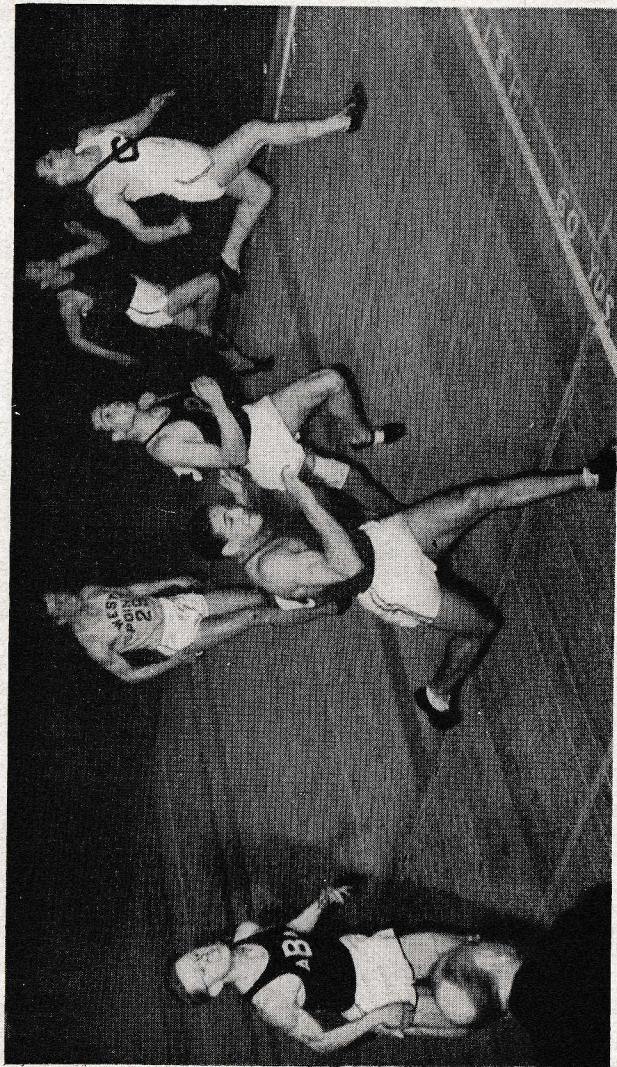
4. *Connections.* The handle shall be connected to the head by means of a swivel which may be either plain or ball-bearing. The grip shall be connected to the handle by means of a loop; a swivel may not be used.

5. *Weight.* The weight shall be not less than 16 pounds, complete as thrown.

6. *Length.* The length shall be not more than 4 feet, complete as thrown.

RULE 28 . . . THROWING THE HAMMER.

1. The hammer shall be thrown from within a circle 7 feet in diameter, measured from the inside. The surface within the circle shall be level, and even with the surface upon which the hammer is to be thrown. The circumference of the circle shall be defined by a metal or other ring sunk almost

flush with the ground, and the surface within the circle should be composed of earth or clay, firmly packed. Where the surface is of wood or similar material, the circle may be painted or otherwise marked thereon.

2. A fair throw shall be one wherein no part of the person or clothing of a competitor touches the top of the circle or the ground outside the circle. It is not a foul throw if the head of the hammer touches the ground outside the circle during the preliminary swings, unless, after it has so touched the ground, the thrower stops so as to begin his trial again, in which event such trial shall be considered a foul throw.

3. If a competitor lets go of the hammer during an attempt to throw, or if after he steps into the circle and starts his throw he touches the top of the circle or the ground outside the circle with any portion of his person or clothing, he shall be held to have made a foul throw. It shall also be a foul if the competitor steps upon the circumference of the circle, or leaves the circle or touches the ground outside the circle with any portion of his person or clothing before his throw has been declared fair by the Field Judge.

4. All throws, to be valid, must fall within a 90-degree sector in front of the circle, marked on the ground by two lines drawn at right angles to each other, both starting from the center of the throwing circle.

5. The distance of each throw shall be measured from the nearest edge of the first mark made by the head of the hammer to the inside of the circumference of the circle, on a line from such mark to the center of the circle.

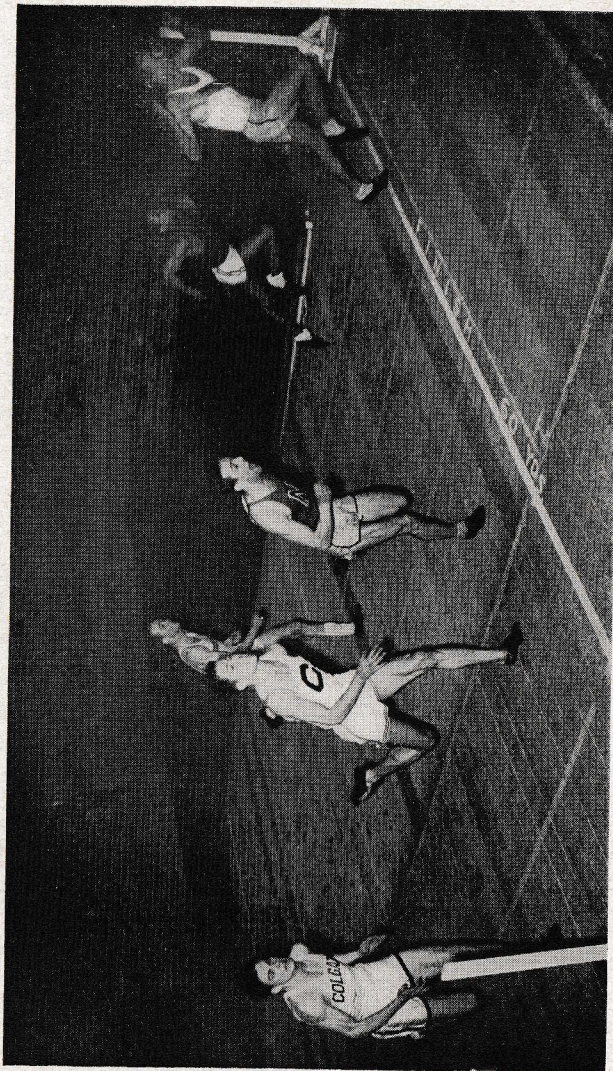
6. If the hammer or the wire breaks during a trial or while in the air, it shall not be considered a throw.

7. It is recommended that a substantial wire cage or fence be erected around that part of the circle through which the hammer is not thrown, and at least 10 feet behind such circle, for the adequate protection of spectators, officials and competitors.

RULE 29 . . . DISCUS; SPECIFICATIONS.

1. *Construction.* The discus shall be composed of a smooth metal rim, permanently attached to a wood body, brass plates set flush into the sides of the wood body, and, in the exact center of the discus, a means for securing the correct weight. The brass plates shall be circular in form, having a diameter of not less than 2 inches nor more than $2\frac{1}{4}$ inches. Each side of the discus shall be a counterpart of the other side, and shall have no indentations, projecting points, or sharp edges. The sides shall taper in a straight line from the beginning of the curve of the rim to a line a distance of not less than one inch from the center of the discus.

2. *Measurements.* The largest dimension shall be a circle not less than $8\frac{5}{8}$ inches in diameter. The thickness through the exact center, on a line perpendicular to the diameter, shall be not less than $1\frac{3}{4}$ inches. The thickness at one inch from the center shall be exactly the same as at the center. The

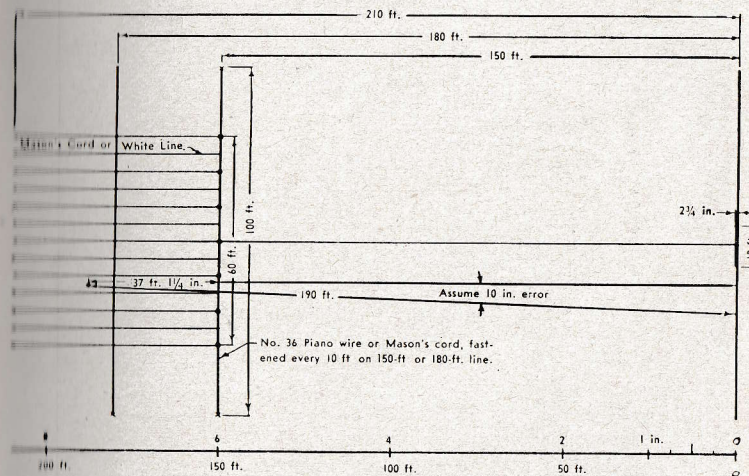
RULE 34 . . . THROWING THE JAVELIN.

1. The javelin shall be thrown from behind a scratch line properly marked, which shall be a board $2\frac{3}{4}$ inches wide and 12 feet long, sunk flush with the ground.

2. The javelin must be held by the grip, and no other method of holding is permissible.

3. A fair throw shall be one made as above, and wherein no part of the person or clothing of a competitor touches the board or the ground beyond the scratch line or the scratch line extended.

4. If a competitor, after he starts his throw, touches the board or the ground beyond the scratch line or the scratch line extended with any part of his person or clothing, he shall be held to have made a foul throw, which shall not be

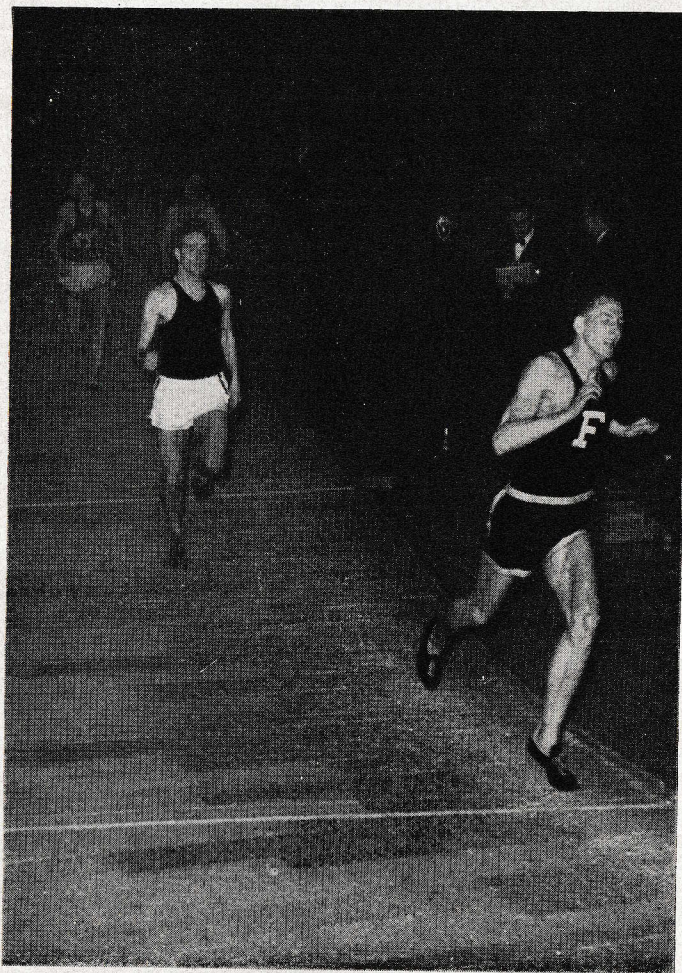


JAVELIN LAYOUT.

marked or measured. It shall also be a foul if a competitor steps upon or touches the board or the ground beyond the scratch line or the scratch line extended with any portion of his person or clothing before his throw has been declared fair by the Field Judge.

5. No throw shall be counted as fair unless the point of the javelin strikes the ground before any part of the shaft.

6. The distance of each throw shall be measured from the nearest mark made by the point of the javelin where it first strikes the ground, on a line at right angles from such mark to the scratch line or the scratch line extended. The "Bangs" method of laying out the field may be used wherever practicable. (See accompanying diagram.)

7. In throwing the javelin, if it breaks while in the air, it shall not count as a throw.

RULE 35 . . . RUNNING BROAD JUMP.

1. The take-off area and runway shall be level, and even with the surface on which the jumper is to land.

2. When the jump is made from an earth runway, the take-off shall be from a board or joist 8 inches wide and 4 feet long, sunk flush with the ground, and painted white. When the jump is made from a board or similar runway, the take-off shall be indicated by a stripe 8 inches wide, painted on a contrasting background extending across the runway.

3. The scratch line shall be that edge of the joist or painted stripe which is nearer the landing pit or surface, so that the competitor may step upon such joist or stripe in making his jump.

4. On earth runways, the ground for a distance of about four inches in front of the scratch line shall be sprinkled with soft earth or sand to make it slightly higher than the take-off joist, or packed with plastic clay, to aid in determining whether a jumper has stepped beyond the scratch line.

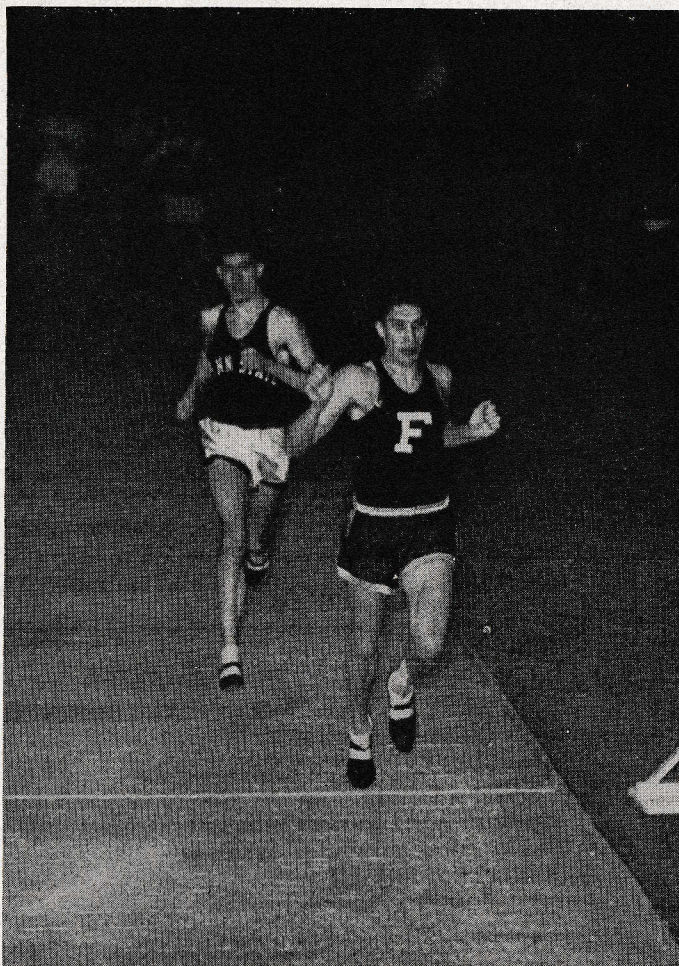
5. The length of the run before the jump shall be unlimited.

6. If, after he starts his run and before he actually jumps, a competitor touches the ground beyond the scratch line or the scratch line extended with any portion of his person or clothing, he shall be held to have made a foul jump, which shall not be marked or measured.

7. The distance of each jump shall be measured from the nearest mark or break in the ground, either in the jumping pit or outside it, made by any portion of the person or clothing of the competitor, on a line at right angles from such mark or break to the scratch line or the scratch line extended.

RULE 36 . . . TRIALS IN RUNNING HIGH JUMP AND POLE VAULT.

1. In the Running High Jump and Pole Vault, each competitor shall have three trials at each height, and a failure at the third trial shall disqualify. At

the cross-bar extended, with any portion of his person or clothing, he shall be held to have made an unsuccessful jump, whether or not in so doing the cross-bar be touched or dislodged.

6. The Judges shall have exclusive power to determine the conditions and result of a jump. If there be such wind as will of itself dislodge the cross-bar, they may support the bar with the fingers or otherwise to keep it on the supports, but in such manner that it may be dislodged if touched by a competitor during his attempt.

7. The height of each jump shall be measured perpendicularly from the ground to the upper portion of the cross-bar where it is lowest.

RULE 39 . . . POLE VAULT; SPECIFICATIONS.

1. *Uprights.* Any style or kind of uprights or posts may be used, provided they are rigid.

2. *Cross-bar.* The cross-bar shall be of wood, triangular in section, each side of which shall measure $1\frac{3}{16}$ inches. The ends of the cross-bar shall project not more than 6 inches beyond the supports or pegs on which it rests.

3. *Supports.* The supports for the cross-bar shall be round pegs not more than $\frac{1}{2}$ inch in diameter throughout, projecting horizontally from the face of the uprights for a distance of not more than 3 inches, parallel with each other, and in the direction of the landing pit. They shall be without notches or indentations of any kind.

4. *Pole.* The pole may be of any material, and of any length and diameter. It shall have no assisting devices, except that it may be wound or wrapped with adhesive tape, the wrapping to be of uniform thickness. The lower end of the pole may terminate in a single metal spike or wooden plug.

5. *Box.* Pole vaulting shall be done from a wooden or metal box, sunk in the ground, and in which the end of the pole is placed when the vault is made. Such box shall be 3 feet 4 inches long, and 2 feet wide at the front, tapering to a width of 6 inches at the stopboard, which shall be 8 inches deep. The box shall be so placed or sunk in the ground that the front and tops of the sides and stopboard shall be flush with the ground, and the stopboard at right angles to the ground. Such box shall be centered between the uprights. (See accompanying diagram.)

6. The take-off area and the runway shall be level and even.

RULE 40 . . . POLE VAULT.

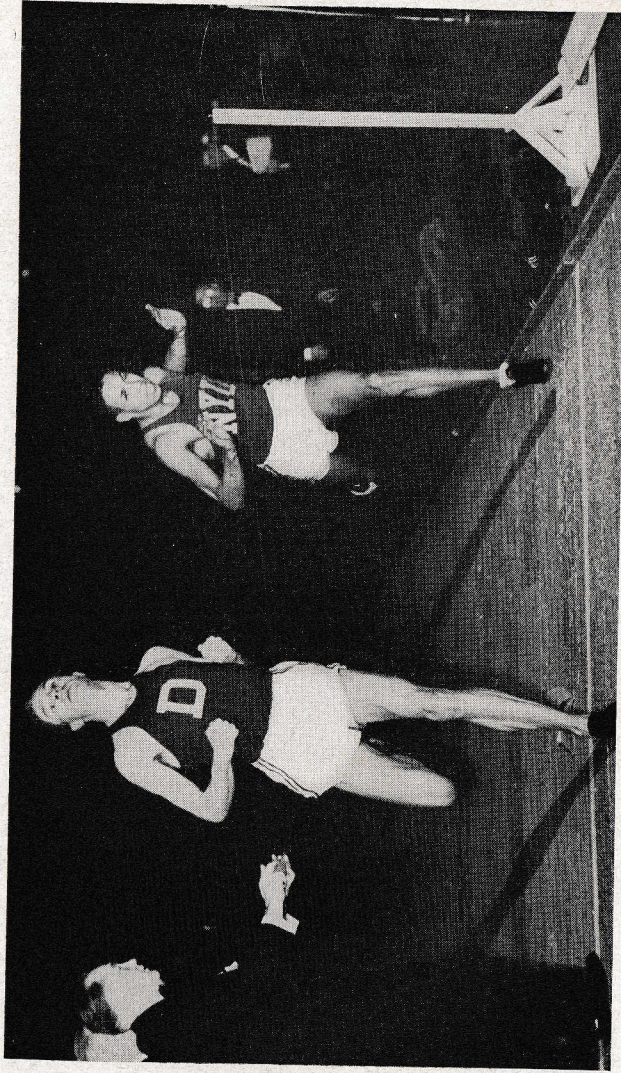
1. The uprights shall be placed at least 12 feet apart. At the request of any competitor, the Judges should have the uprights moved forward or back from the landing pit, if the height of the cross-bar will not be changed thereby.

2. No tape or other material may be wrapped around the cross-bar. A com-

petitor may, however, place a handkerchief or other distinguishing mark upon the cross-bar for sighting purposes.

3. The distance of the run before the vault shall be unlimited.

4. The vault shall be made over a cross-bar resting on supports as specified in Rule 39. A fair vault is one wherein the bar has not been dislodged from its supports by the vaulter or his pole.

5. As soon as a competitor has left the ground for the purpose of making a vault, it shall be counted as a trial. If, after he starts his run, the vaulter dislodges the bar, or touches the ground beyond the perpendicular plane through the cross-bar with his pole, or any portion of his person or clothing, he shall be held to have made an unsuccessful vault, whether or not, in so doing, the cross-bar be touched or dislodged. If, during a vault, the pole be caught or stopped by the competitor or any other person before it falls away from the cross-bar, it shall be counted as an unsuccessful vault, whether or not the bar be dislodged. If the vaulter clears the bar, but the bar is dislodged by the pole, it shall be an unsuccessful vault.

6. If, during a vault, the vaulting pole should break, it shall not count as a trial against the vaulter.

7. From the moment he begins his vault, if a competitor places his lower hand above the upper one, or moves his upper hand higher up the pole, he shall be held to have made an unsuccessful vault, whether he clear the bar or not.

8. The judges shall have exclusive power to determine the conditions and result of a vault. If there be such wind as will of itself dislodge the cross-bar, they may support it with the fingers or otherwise to keep it on the supports, but in such manner that it may be dislodged if touched by a competitor during his vault.

9. The height of each vault shall be measured perpendicularly from the ground to the upper side of the cross-bar where it is lowest.

RULE 41 . . . HURDLES; SPECIFICATIONS.

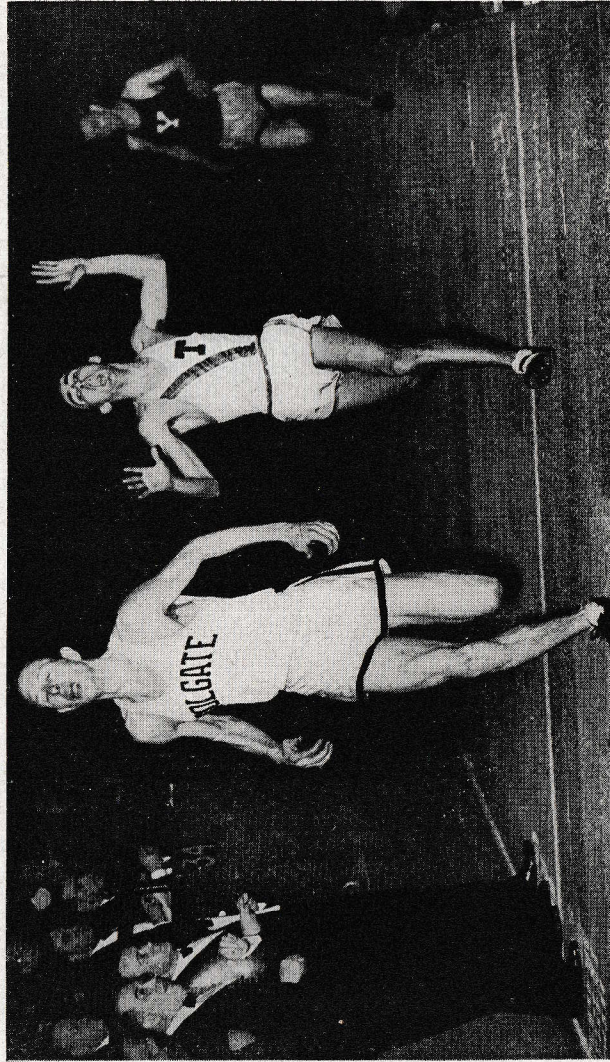
1. All hurdles shall be of wood or metal. They shall consist of two bases on the ground, each not over 4 inches wide and not over $27\frac{1}{2}$ inches long. At one extreme end of each base there shall be an upright supporting a rectangular frame reinforced by two or more horizontal cross-bars. The extreme width of the hurdle shall be not less than 3 feet 11 inches. The total weight of each hurdle shall be not less than 22.22 pounds.

2. The hurdle may be adjustable in height, but shall be of such strength and stability as not to be easily broken by a competitor hitting it, and it shall be rigidly fastened at the required height for each event. It shall be of such design that, regardless of its height, it shall require a force of at least 8 pounds, applied to the top of the middle of the top cross-bar, to knock it over.

9. Each individual contestant or member of a relay team winning or tying for first, second, third, fourth or fifth place in any event at the Outdoor or Indoor Track and Field Championship meets; each individual contestant winning or tying for first, second, third, fourth or fifth place at either of the Cross-Country Championship Runs, and each of the five individual members of a team winning or tying for first, second, third, fourth or fifth place at such Cross-Country Runs, shall receive a medal as follows:

(a) Each individual contestant or member of a relay or cross-country team winning a first place as above shall receive a gold medal. If two contestants, or two teams, tie for first place, each such contestant or member of such team shall receive a medal made half of gold and half of silver. If three or more contestants or teams tie for first place, each such contestant or member of such teams shall receive a medal made one-third of gold, one-third of silver, and one-third of bronze.

(b) Each individual contestant or member of a relay or cross-country team winning a second place shall receive a silver medal. If two or more contestants or teams tie for second place, each such contestant or member of such teams shall receive a medal made one-half of silver and one-half of bronze.

(c) Each individual contestant or member of a relay or cross-country team winning or tying for a third, fourth or fifth place, shall receive a bronze medal.

3. All medals shall be inscribed to show the place won or tied for, the event, and the date thereof. They shall be attached to ribbons of the following colors: for first place, Blue; for second place, Red; for third place, Yellow; for fourth place, White; for fifth place, Green. A medal awarded for a tie shall have the ribbon of the highest place involved in the tie. A record medal, as hereinafter provided, shall have a ribbon combining all the above colors.

4. All medals for Freshman events shall be two-thirds the size of the corresponding Varsity medal, and shall indicate on their face that they are for Freshman events.

5. Any individual contestant, and all members of a relay team bettering or equalling a Championship record (except in the Cross-Country Run or in Freshman events) shall receive a special record medal made of gold, in addition to any other medal or medals to which he is entitled. If in any event a record is successively bettered more than once during the competition, only the best such performance shall merit this award.

RULE 47 . . . CHAMPIONSHIP CUPS.

1. There shall be a championship cup for the Outdoor Track and Field Championship Meet, one for the Indoor Track and Field Championship Meet, and another for the Varsity Cross-Country Championship Run. Each member

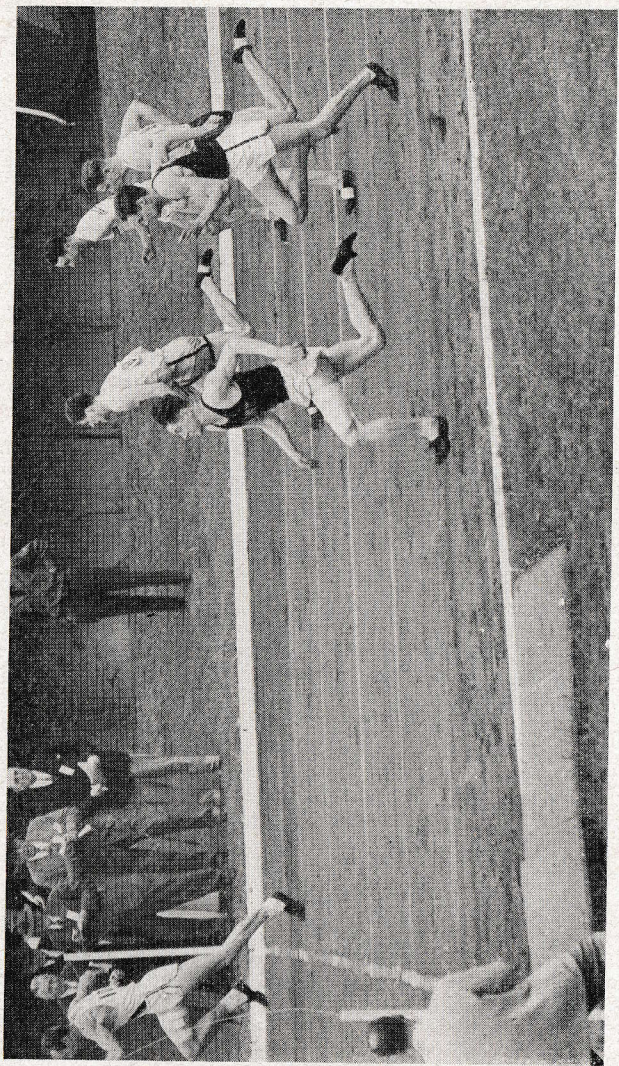

(c) Any performance in a field event may be considered for an I.C.A.A.A.A. record regardless of the final position of the competitor making it.

(d) A result obtained in deciding a tie where an extra trial is necessary shall not be accepted as a record.

5. No track event record shall be allowed unless the time has been recorded by three competent and approved Timers with stopwatches certified as correct by an approved, reputable jeweler or watchmaker within thirty days before the competition. Such record may also be allowed if the time has been recorded by a mechanical or other device officially approved by the Association, and certified by its manufacturers and operators to be correct as of the time of the claimed record performance.

6. No record shall be allowed in the Running Broad Jump or in any straight away race if, at the time of the performance, there be a following wind of a velocity of 4½ miles per hour or more, blowing at the back of the competitor, either directly or at an angle.

7. (a) No time recorded in units of less than 1/10th second, as allowed by these Rules, shall displace any existing record which was established in units of 1/5 or 1/10th second, unless it betters such existing record by at least 1/10th second.

(b) Once a record has been established in units of 1/100th second, it may thereafter be displaced by a new record measured in units of 1/100th second, and bettering the old record by 1/100th second or more.

8. No record shall be accepted unless it was made in an event open to more than one club, school, college or other organization.

9. No record shall be allowed in any field event unless made with an implement certified as complying with the specifications as set forth in these Rules.

10. No record shall be allowed in any hurdle race to any contestant who has knocked over one or more hurdles during the race.

RULE 50 . . . SUGGESTIONS FOR MEETS OTHER THAN I.C.A.A.A.A. CHAMPIONSHIPS.

While this Association has jurisdiction only over its Championship Meets and Runs, it is recommended that its members adopt the following suggestions wherever possible, for the sake of uniformity.

TRACK AND FIELD MEETS.

1. The order of events in Dual, Triangular and other meets other than in the I.C.A.A.A.A. Championships, should be as follows:

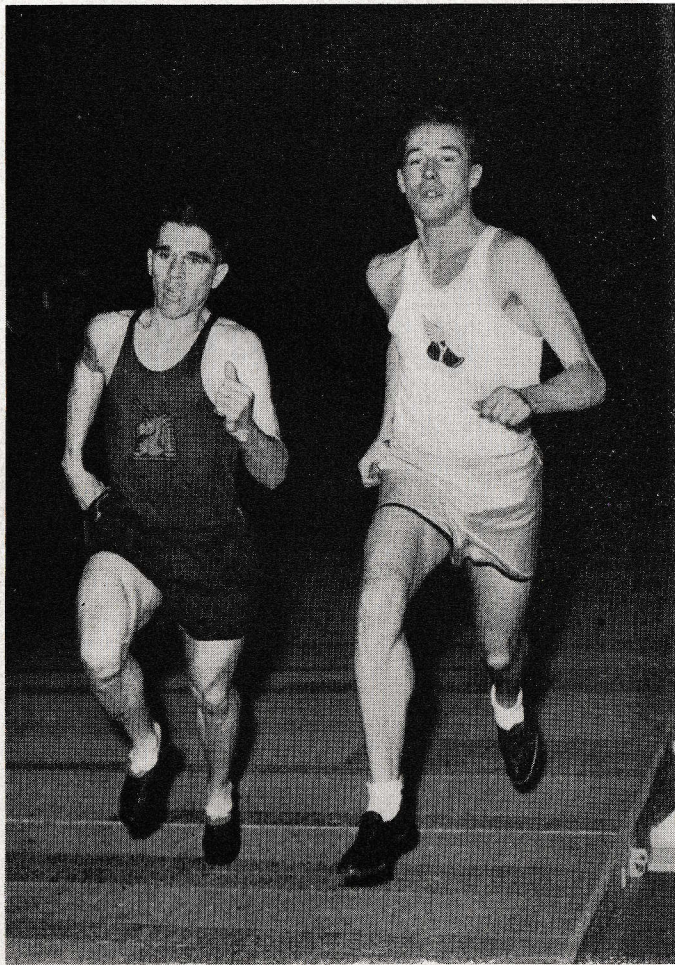

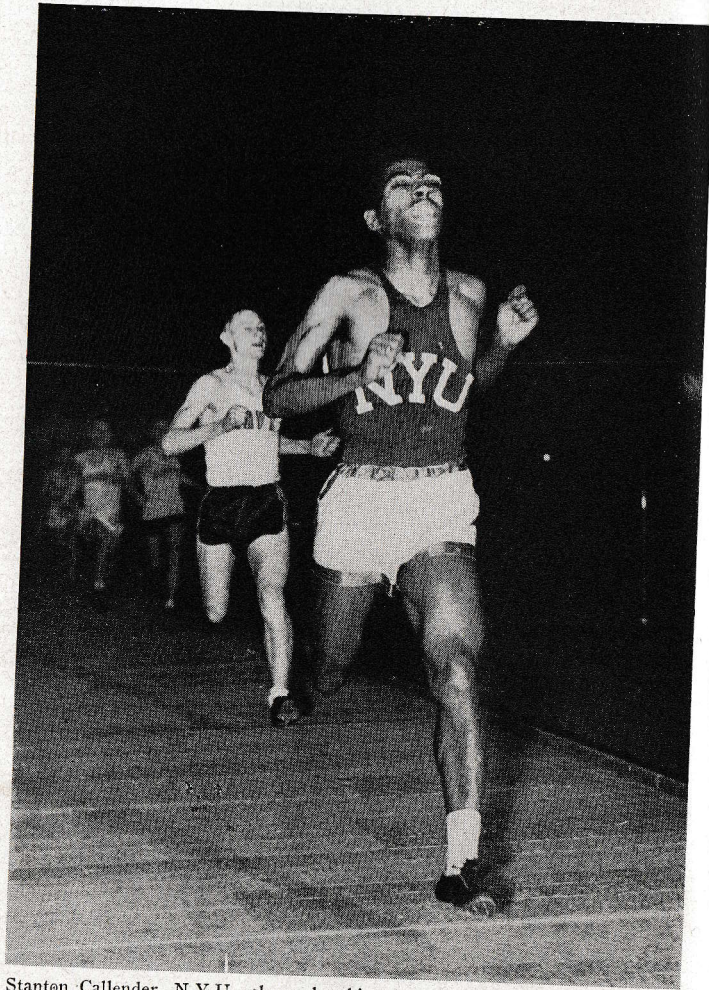

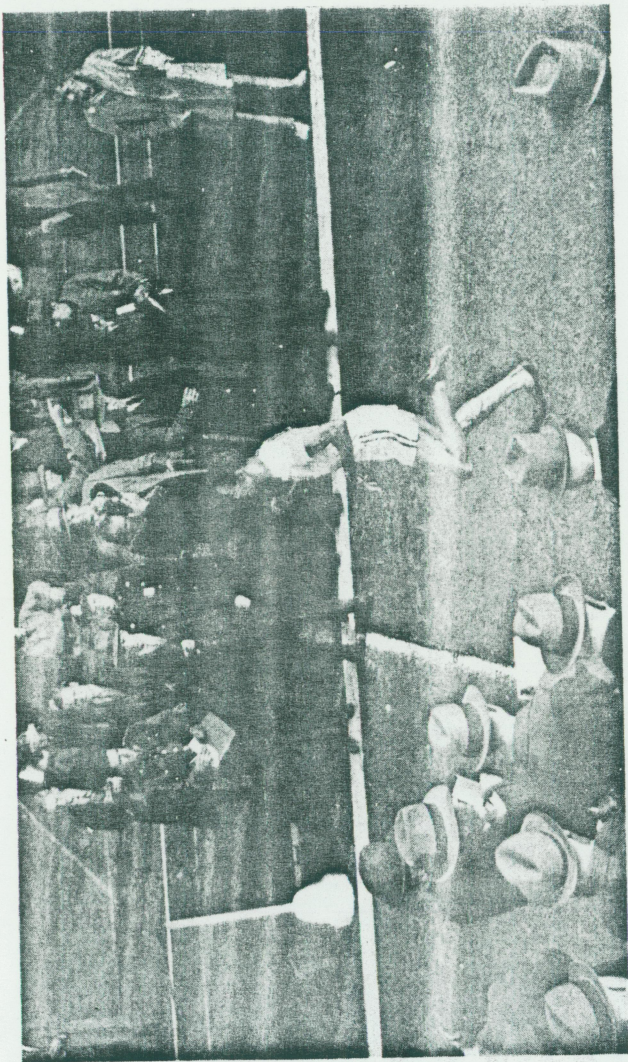
