Mathias 1948 Sullivan Award Winner

Robert Bruce Mathias, a Tulare, Calif., high school student who won the Olympic decathlon championship, was elected to receive the James E. Sullivan Memorial Trophy for 1948. This award is presented annually to the "amateur athlete who, by performance, example and good influence, did most to advance the cause of good sportsmanship during the year."

Selection of Mathias followed the precedents of 1932 and 1936. Jim Bausch and Glenn Morris, Olympic decathlon winners of those years, also were named for the Sullivan Trophy, considered the highest honor that can be attained by an amateur athlete in this country. Barney Berlinger, another great all-around performer in track and field, was the choice in 1931.

However, never in the nineteen-year history of the trophy has it gone to an athlete so young as the strapping Mathias, who rocketed from obscurity to capture the Pacific Coast and National A.A.U. decathlon titles enroute to his smashing success at London last August.

On last November 17th Mathias celebrated his 18th birthday. He is 6 feet 2 inches in height and weighs 195 pounds. He started competing in sprints and high jump at the age of 12, setting a school record of 5 feet 2 inches in the high jump. In his freshman year in high school he added the shot-put and running broad jump to his list of events and continued to show improvement in each of these events.

In a nationwide poll of sports leaders, Mathias received 1,491 points. This gave him a substantial edge over three other Olympic champions—Harrison Dillard, Baldwin-Wallace College's world record hurdler and 100 meter flat victor at London; Joseph Verdeur, Philadelphia's peerless exponent of butterfly breaststroke swimming, and Henry Wittenberg, New York's invincible wrestling police sergeant.

On the 5-3-1 tally of first, second and third place votes, Dillard also runner-up last year to Jack Kelly, the sculler, collected 1087 points; Verdeur 749 and Wittenberg 629. Mathias was first choice on 201 ballots, Dillard being favored by 119 selectors, Verdeur by 77 and Wittenberg by 64. All six final contestants were honored by first-place mention.

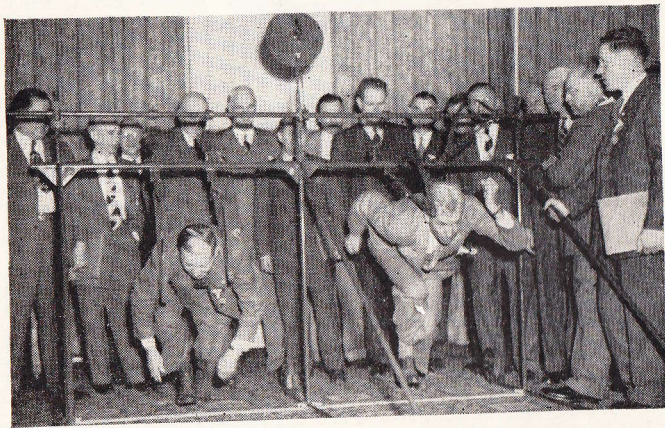
Candidates for the award were submitted by the forty-three A.A.U. district associations, which, in making their choices, considered sportsmanship, quali-

ties of leadership, excellence of performance, strength of character, force of personality and high ideals of amateurism.

The Sullivan Memorial Committee studied the original list carefully, then pared it down to the six athletes considered most worthy. The names of these six, together with a summary of reasons for each nomination, were submitted to a tribunal of 600 sports leaders for a final vote.

1948 Olympic Games Track and Field Championships

The United States continued its fifty-two year dominance of the Olympic Track and Field Championships at London by winning twelve of the thirty-three track and field championships for men and women. The competition was of the highest order with 815 athletes from 53 countries participating.

In retaining its proud record as the foremost nation in track and field athletics—always the outstanding feature of the Games—the United States team of 65 and 12 women scored a total of 179 points. The final standings of the first ten nations would be as follows if points had been awarded on the basis of 7 points for a first place, 5 for a second, 4 for a third, 3 for a fourth, 2 for a fifth and 1 for a sixth.

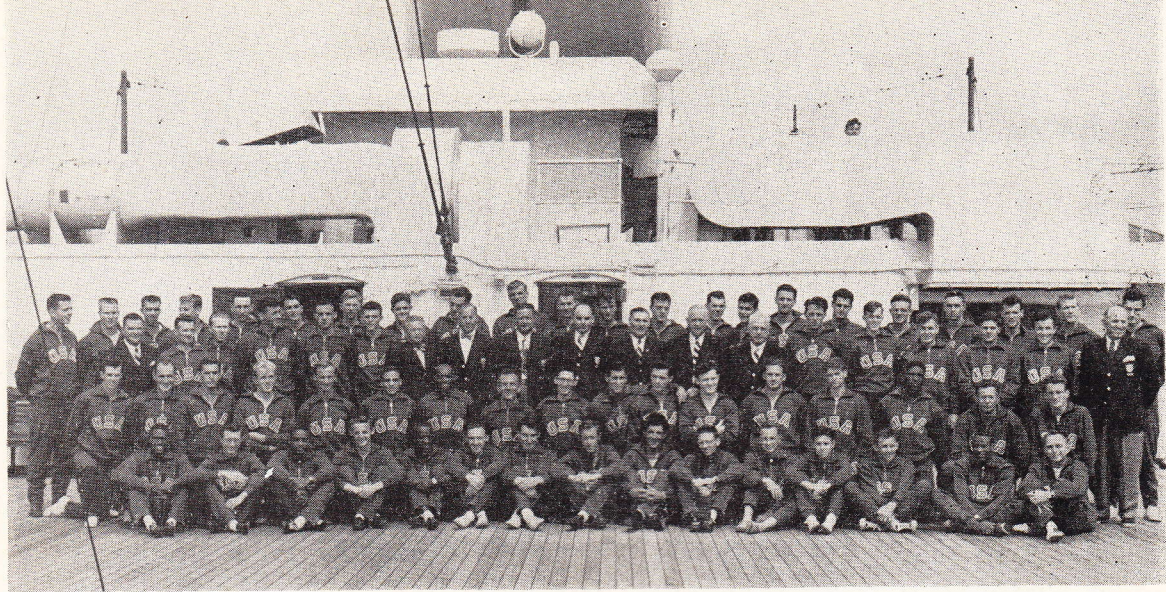

Over the eight days of competitions, which were daily witnessed by 83,000 persons, Olympic records were established in the 800, 5,000 and 10,000 meters run, 10,000 meters walk, 110 and 400 meter hurdles and the shot and discus. Olympic records were equaled in the 100 and 400 meters. In the women events a world and Olympic record was set in the 80 meters hurdles and new Olympic records were established in the javelin and high jump, which event was won by Alice Coachman. These performances were remarkable when one considers that many of the races were run on the water soaked temporarily laid Wembley track.

In nine of the 22 individual men's events all three U.S.A. representatives were placed in the first six, and we won both relays. However, in seven of the events, U.S.A. athletes went unplaced. Sweden did better than ever before, reaching the finals in 14 events and one relay. Finland, always previously prominent, fared badly probably as a result of the war with only one winner in the javelin event.

VISIT OF FOREIGN STARS HIGHLIGHTS '49 INDOOR SEASON

The 1949 indoor season was distinguished by the performances of five European stars who won 13 of the 28 starts they made during the campaign.

Willy Slykhuis of the Netherlands, Gaston Reiff of Belgium, Erik Ahlden and Ingvar Bengtsson of Sweden, and Marcel Hansenne of France comprised the foreign delegation which met with great success.

Slykhuis turned in the fastest mile of the season when he won the Baxter Mile at the N.Y.A.C. Games in 4 minutes, 9.2 seconds. Reiff's 8:53.8s. two mile was also a top performance of the winter.

The touring Europeans captured two national titles during their stay here as Slykhuis and Reiff won the mile and 3 mile at the AAU indoor championships. The other three captured seconds as Hansenne trailed Bob Mealey in the 1,000 yard run, Bengtsson finished behind Slykhuis and Ahlden lost to Reiff.

When Slykhuis garnered mile honors at the nationals it marked the first time that title had been won by an overseas runner.

Each of the visitors had earned honors in the 1948 Olympic Games. Reiff won the 5,000 meter run in the Olympic record time of 14:17.6s. with Slykhuis third and Ahlden fourth. Slykhuis also finished third in the 1500 meters. Hansenne in third and Bengtsson with a fifth trailed Mal Whitfield in his record-breaking 800 meters.

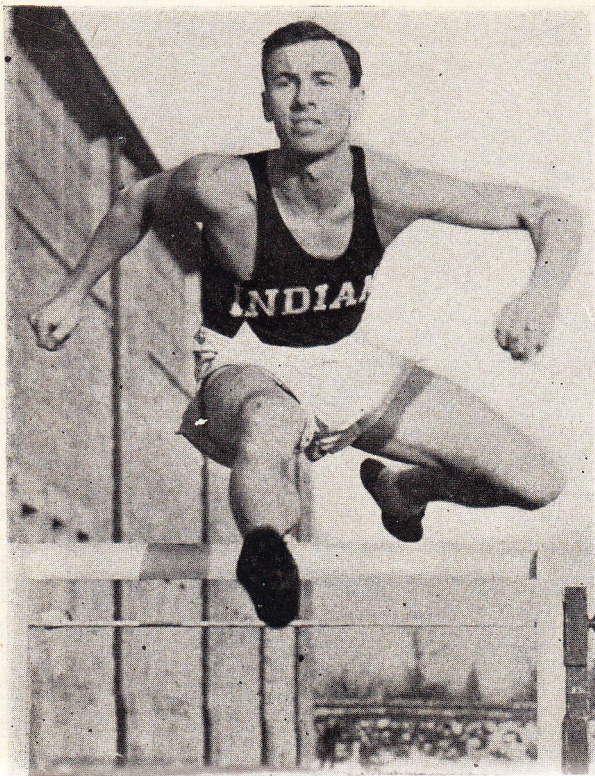

Army Track in the 1948 Olympic Year

The Olympics keynoted the Army-wide track performances in the fall of 1947 and the spring of 1948. The big story in Army track was datelined "London, England", where the greatest sports squad ever to wear the colors of the United States swept to an overwhelming victory in the first post war running of the great international athletic event.

Represented on the United States Olympic Squad were nineteen members of the United States Army and Air Force. Two first places were won by the militarymen. This marked the first time that the Army had ever participated in the Olympics on a national scale.

Led by S/Sgt. Mal Whitfield, of Lockbourne Air Force Base, Ohio, who set a new Olympic mark in the 800 meter run and was a member of the United States winning 1600 meter relay race team, Army and Air Force athletes churned their way to top billing in all of the events they entered—with the two first places in the Games capping the showing.

Whitfield's record time of 1:49.2 in the 800 meter run and the time of the Relay Team which won its victory after a reversed official ruling based on motion pictures of the event—a non-record time of 3:10.4—created a stir in the press and all eyes were fixed on the 400 meter run with the hope he would be a double winner. Whitfield placed in this event.

Although only two members of the All-Army and Air Force Track Team made the Olympic team, the Olympics proved an incentive all the way down the line and track received an unusual stimulus in 1948 that netted some worthwhile performances in the military ranks. Receiving the green light throughout the commands, track was participated in as a major sport in nearly all of the areas of the Army in the world. Service stars and near-stars, all candidates for the Olympics and preliminaries to the Olympics were carefully tested, checked and groomed by the Army Special Services officers.

Answering the call of the Office of the Chief of Special Services, Department of the Army, for qualified track men, outstanding cinder performers of the Army and Air Force were assembled at Lackland Air Force Base, Texas, March 1, 1948, where a well-rounded squad of forty was picked to represent the two services in the Olympic preliminaries and trials.

Whitfield's amazing record in the Olympics and his equally brilliant double win in the Olympic Trials at Evanston, Illinois, where he copped the 400 and 800 meter runs climaxed months of hard training for not only himself but the Army and Air Force's entire track team.

Although only forty-four men were trained at Lackland and competed in regional and sectional meets, hundreds more were trained and competed in service and civilian matches in the area-wide and command-wide track meets around the globe.

With the Army and Air Force Track Team making a good showing in the collegiate, amateur and Olympics trials, the respective commands went ahead with their own track contest. Three of the Armies staged Army-wide track meets of their own—First, Third, and Sixth—while the others held their competition in the lower echelons.

Both in the European Command and the Far East Command, Army track was participated in as a major sport with both the commands having their own championships finals.

Record of 1948 U. S. Army and U. S. Air Force Track Team

In March, 1948, a track and field squad was assembled at Lackland Air Force Base to represent the United States Army and Air Force in the coming Olympic trials. Picked on past performances, generally collegiate or scholastic, only a handful of the men could be termed Olympic possibilities from their records.

This squad developed into one which gained more points at the Penn Relays than any college team entered. This team made an impressive record in the performances turned in during spring and summer competition through AAU and intercollegiate meets. Of this squad two men, S/Sgt. Mal Whitfield and M/Sgt. William E. Burton made the Olympic Squad of the United States.

Major Robert Simpson, former Missouri University track coach, who had just returned from the European Command, was named to coach the candidates. Major Simpson had coached the winning United States Army teams in Inter-

Allied track and field meets, and is a well-known member of the collegiate coaching profession.

The formation of this Army and Air Force Track Squad had been considered a must by the military establishment in order to give the best opportunity to Army and Air Force personnel aspiring for Olympic recognition. The team served well as a goal for track candidates.

Their aims the acme of amateur athletic achievement—a place on their country's Olympic team—these men worked hard through the spring months preparing for the meets and tests that marked the pathway to the Olympic trials.

The team participated in eleven meets or relays. In all forty-four tried trackmen reported to Major Simpson for training. Members of team are as follows:
