Button 1949 Sullivan Award Winner



Richard T. Button of Englewood, N. J., 19 year old Olympic, World, North American and American figure skating champion, was selected as the nation's outstanding amateur athlete for 1949. This award is presented annually to the "amateur athlete who by performance, example and good influence, did most to advance the cause of good sportsmanship during the year."

Although only in competition since 1943, Button has won the national figure skating crown for the last five straight years: the North American title in 1947 and 1949; the European Championship in 1948 and the world title in 1948, 1949, and 1950.

He is an extremely modest youth and has never been known to question a decision of the judges. He is a true amateur sportsman who has refused to capitalize on his athletic skill and reputation although he has had

many opportunities to do so. He is a sophomore at Harvard University and is an accomplished musician. He is the first winter sport athlete to receive the award.

Button earned the Sullivan Award in a most decisive manner. He was first on 134 of the 426 ballots cast. Figured on the scoring basis of five for first, three for second and one for third he compiled a total of 947 points. Joseph T. Verdeur, Philadelphia's 1948 Olympic Breaststroke champion and world record holder, placed second with 745 points. In third place was James Fuchs, Yale's world record holding shot putter with 613 points. Fred Wilt of the New York A.C., the nation's outstanding distance runner, was fourth with 465 points while Miss Doris Hart of Miami, Florida, third ranking women's tennis star, was fifth with 426 points. In sixth place was Miss Barbara Jensen, champion swimmer from San Francisco with 335 points. Allen Stack, Yale graduate from Hingham, Mass., winner of the 1948 Olympic Backstroke title and world record holder, finished seventh with 278 votes.

The Pan American Games

Track and field athletes from this country are looking forward with considerable anticipation to the first Pan American Games scheduled for Buenos Aires, Argentina February 25 to March 8, 1951. These games originally scheduled for the fall of 1942, were postponed because of the war. The athletes to represent the United States will be selected based upon their performance in the 1950 National A.A.U. Outdoor Track and Field Championships to be held in Washington, D.C. June 23rd and 24th.

The following program of sports was approved for the Buenos Aires games:

For Women—track and field, fencing (individual and team), swimming and diving, and tennis (singles, doubles and mixed doubles).

For Men—track and field, basketball, baseball, boxing, cycling, equestrian sports, fencing, soccer football, gymnastics, wrestling, weightlifting, swimming, shooting and diving, polo, modern pentathlon, rowing, tennis and yachting.

For a sport to be included on the official program, at least five countries must agree to send teams in that sport to the games.

Organization of the games was entrusted to the Argentina Olympic Committee. In general the rules and regulations of the International Olympic Committee will apply to the competitions. The technical rules for all sports will be those of the respective international federations, as in the Olympic Games.

It was agreed that Pan American sports federations should be constituted as soon as possible for those sports where no such organization exists, and especially for all sports on the official program.

The delegates of the Western Hemisphere nations, meeting in London following the 1948 Olympic Games, voted unanimously against broken time payment in any sport and agreed to resist with all their power any commercial or political intrusion in amateur sport.

For convenience in administration, the American nations are divided into five groups. One representative from each of these geographical groups comprise the Pan American Sport Committee, which will be the official administering committee.

The current committee, elected at the Congress in London, includes:

Zone 1—Avery Brundage, U.S.A. (Canada, U.S.A. and Mexico.)

Zone 2—Miguel Angel Moenck, Cuba. (Cuba, Costa Rica, Republica Dominicana, El Salvador, Guatemala, Haiti, Honduras, Nicaragua and other Caribbean Countries.)

Zone 3—Ricardo Sanchez Bustamante, Argentina. (Argentina, Brazil, Paraguay and Uruguay.)

Zone 4—Manuel Angosta, Peru. (Bolivia, Chile, Ecuador and Peru.)

Zone 5—Cayetano Canizares, Colombia. (Colombia, Panama and Venezuela.)

Interest in amateur sport in the Americas has been growing and developing rapidly during the last two decades especially. There is a sound foundation for the Pan American idea. For many years there has been a most friendly amateur sport relationship between the United States and the countries to the South, marked by visits of skiing, tennis, swimming, basketball, boxing, track and field and other athletic teams.

Not only will the Pan American Games provide outstanding competition for the athletes involved, but also they will build new and closer bonds between the American democracies. There will be an increase in Western Hemisphere travelling, a better appreciation of the different American cultures and a greater understanding among the peoples of the three Americas.

Finland Advanced In 1952 Olympic Plans

Except for the completion of its Olympic Village, Finland is so far advanced in its plans, that the 1952 Olympic Games, tentatively scheduled for July 16 to August 3, 1952 could be held in Helsinki as early as this summer. This is the opinion of the writer after having inspected all of the Olympic facilities in and around Helsinki during a visit there last summer under the expert guidance of Kallio Kotkas, Secretary of the Finnish Olympic Organizing Committee; Laurie Miettinen, President of the Finnish Amateur Athletic Federation; Colonel A. Valkama, Superintendent of the Cadet School, Finland's West Point; Arno Hohenthal, Director of Finland's largest company manufacturing sports articles; and Armas Valste, National Technical Director for track and field in Finland.

Most of the sports arenas needed for the Olympic Games were built when Helsinki was awarded the Olympic Games for 1940 after Tokyo found it impossible to hold them due to the war with China. Although the time was short, Finland worked hard and was fully prepared to stage the Games when the world conflagration started in September 1939, destroying all Olympic hopes.

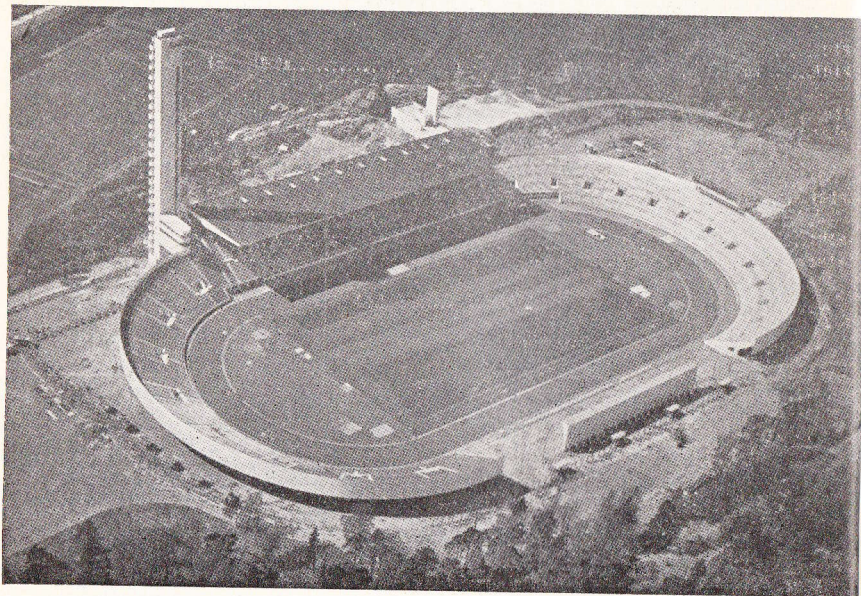
The new Olympic Village to accommodate over 4,000 will be built just across the street from the apartment site which was built to house the Olympic athletes for the 1940 Games. These apartment buildings are now fully occupied so a new Village will be erected using the same type of buildings which will have all modern conveniences. This location is about a half mile from the Olympic Stadium and approximately a twenty-minute bus ride to the center of the city. Just across the street is a first-class athletic field with a 400-Meter running track for training purposes. Just beyond this athletic field is a large football field which can be used for hammer, discus and javelin throwing. This Village will be limited to the male members of teams. Another Village will be built for 500 women athletes in a suburban section about twenty-five minutes by bus from the Olympic Stadium.

The Olympic Stadium with its 250 foot tower dominates the newer part of Helsinki in the midst of beautiful parks within a twenty-minute walk of the center of the city. It was built to seat approximately 60,000 people. The upper part of the stands was originally constructed of wood, but the removal of these temporary seats was completed last summer and the building of concrete stands. The stadium now seats 75,000 people. The cinder running track surrounds a grass-covered football field. At both ends of the football field the grass is replaced with the same composition as the track for the field events. The track is to be reconstructed this year to give it new life and they promise it will be faster than the present track on which many world's records have been made. A 100 yard warm-up track about ten or twelve feet wide has been built underneath the stands just in front of the dressing rooms. It is enclosed, but glass windows give the athletes a clear view of the running track outside.

Helsinki, situated on the north coast of the Gulf of Finland on a small peninsula surrounded by hundreds of islands, is a lively administrative, cultural, commercial and manufacturing city, with a population of 400,000. The center of the city has many continental hotels and restaurants, supplemented by those in the business section. It is expected that several new and up-to-date hotels will be built before the summer of 1952.

Summer in Finland lasts about three months and during this period the nights are short and light. It is unusually cool in Helsinki during the evening. At the time planned for the Games—late July and early August—there are sixteen hours of daylight.

Finland is a sporting country and their Olympic Athletes have always had the admiration of the whole nation. The Finnish Government, the city of Helsinki, the Finnish Olympic Committee and all the national sport federations are preparing for the Games in a great united effort and I am sure Helsinki will prove itself to be worthy of the Olympic Ideal.

U. S. Trackmen Win at Oslo

No meet other than an Olympics or a National championship carried more of the color than did the first of the United States-Scandinavian track and field meets, held before capacity crowds of 30,000 over a three-day period at Oslo, Norway, July 27-29.

The meet was close all the way, with the U. S. athletes staging a final-day rally to beat the combined forces of the Scandinavian countries by a 238½ to 224½ score. A sterling silver cup, emblematic of the team victory, was presented to Daniel J. Ferris, A.A.U. secretary-treasurer and manager of the U.S. team. A return meet will be held in the U.S. in 1951.

Along with victory in the "Little Olympics," the U.S. also won the decathlon competition. Bob Mathias, the 18-year-old schoolboy who put Tulare, Calif., on the map, came through with his usual second-day surge to triumph. He scored 7,346 points, taking the lead at the end of eight events. Second was Oren Claussen, of Iceland, who was a surprise leader at the halfway mark. Claussen scored 7,197 points.

Two World Records

The "Little Olympics" was truly Olympian in the quality of its competition. Two world records were broken. Jim Fuchs, of Yale, threw the 16-lb. shot put 58 feet 4 27/64 inches, to better the listed world mark of 57 feet 1 inch, set by Jack Torrance in Oslo, 1934. It also bettered the 58 feet ¾ inch record made by Charles Fonville, of Michigan, at the Kansas relays last year. Fonville's record, already accepted as an American mark, has been submitted to the International Amateur Athletic Federation for approval.

Fortune Gordien, of Minnesota, made the second record when he threw the discus 182 feet 3 53/64 inches. The old mark is 181 feet 6¾ inches, made by Adolfo Consolini at Milan, Italy, on October 10. Gordien, however, had already thrown the discus 185 feet 2 47/192 inches, at Lisbon, Portugal, July 9.

Australians Triumph In Empire Games

Winning nine of the twenty men's track and field events, Australia scored her greatest international athletic success in the British Empire Games at Auckland, N. Z., in February, 1950.

The boys from the Island Continent scored heavily in the sprints, relays, high hurdles and two jumping events; while they accounted for five of the eight new Games records established in the four-day carnival which is shaded only by the Olympics.

Puerto Rico Wins Track and Field Championship At VI Central American Games

Ideal conditions prevailed for the participants in the Sixth Central American and Caribbean Games held at Guatemala City, February 25 to March 12. On the opening day when the athletes of fourteen nations marched into the main stadium, they were greeted by 50,000 spectators seated in the stands and another 25,000 occupying every vantage point on the hillside surrounding the stadium. The parade of nations was patterned after the Olympic Games and presented a very impressive spectacle when all of the athletes were assembled on the infield behind their respective standard bearers and national flags.

The competitive program got under way the following day with track and field events for men and women and swimming and diving events for men and women in the swimming stadium about 100 yards away. Basketball and fencing for both men and women, bowling, gymnastics, weightlifting, and wrestling were held at the Palace of Sports, while football was held at the main stadium in the evening. Cycling was held at the Velodrome, golf at the Guatemalan Country Club, lawn tennis on the Olympic courts, and volleyball in the Olympic Gymnasium. The main stadium, the swimming stadium, the Olympic tennis courts, the Olympic gymnasium, and the Palace of Sports were all located within a stone's throw of each other.

The athletes were housed in the newly built Roosevelt Hospital in the outskirts of the city, while the majority of the officials were quartered at the Nurses' Home, a short distance from the hospital. Some 35 qualified A.A.U. officials assisted in the conduct of the various events on the program while other American officials functioned in baseball, fencing, golf, and equestrian sports.

The work of all of the American officials met with generous approval on the part of the Guatemalan Olympic and Organizing Committees and the official representatives of the competing nations. The Argentine Ambassador was so well pleased with the officiating by the Americans that he expressed the hope that they would be available to officiate at the Pan American Games in Buenos Aires, Argentine, February 25 to March 8, 1951.

The participants in the majority of events showed marked improvement over those who participated in the games when they were last held in Baranquilla. Many records were broken in track and field and swimming.

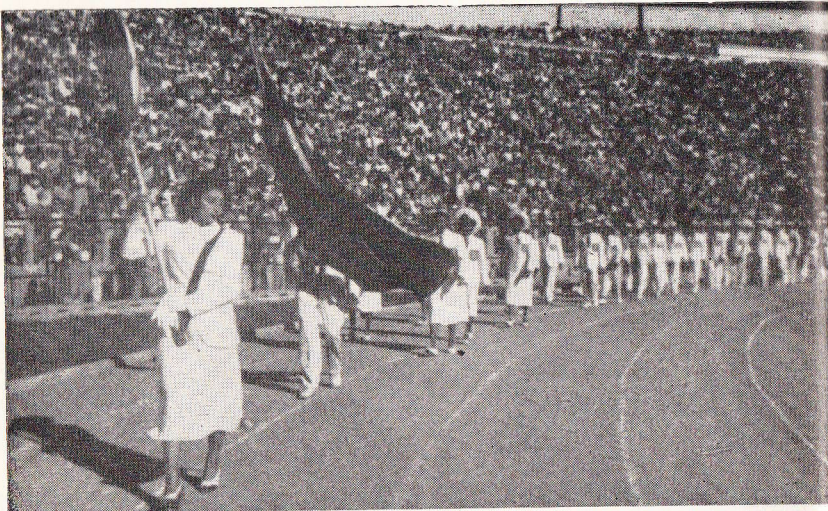
In track, the Puerto Ricans were unbeatable. They took nineteen first, second and third place medals and established new Central American records in the hammer throw, hop, step and jump, high jump, shot-put, broad jump and pole vault.

The Mexican athletes amassed 163½ points in the two weeks of competition under a scoring system giving points for the first six places in each of the twenty-three events on a 10-7-5-3-2-1 basis.

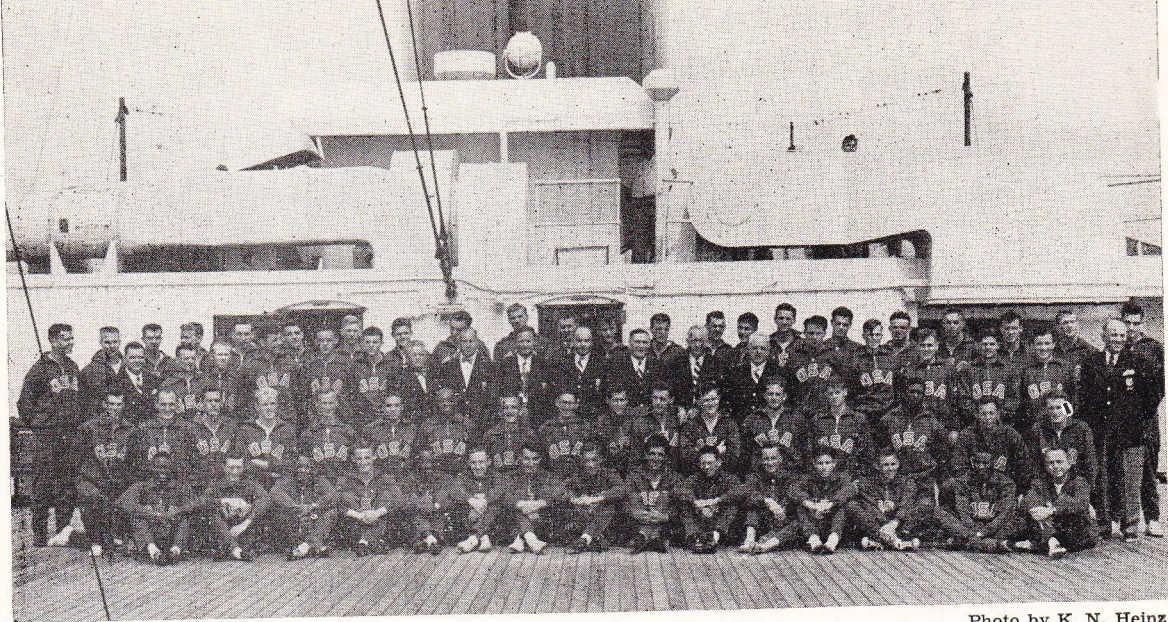

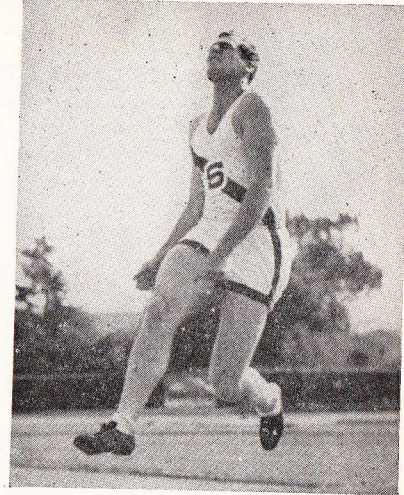
