The scholastic track season in Pa. got off the ground in late March, with major indoor and outdoor meets held in the Greater Philadelphia Area, Pittsburgh and at State College Pa.

Impressive performances were turned in at each of the four major March meets held across the state: The Spiked Shoe at Philadelphia; The Tri-State Coaches Indoor at The Pitt Fieldhouse; The West Chester Scholastic Invitational at The West Chester State College Fieldhouse; and The State College High School Invitational, at State College High School's Resilite all weather track.

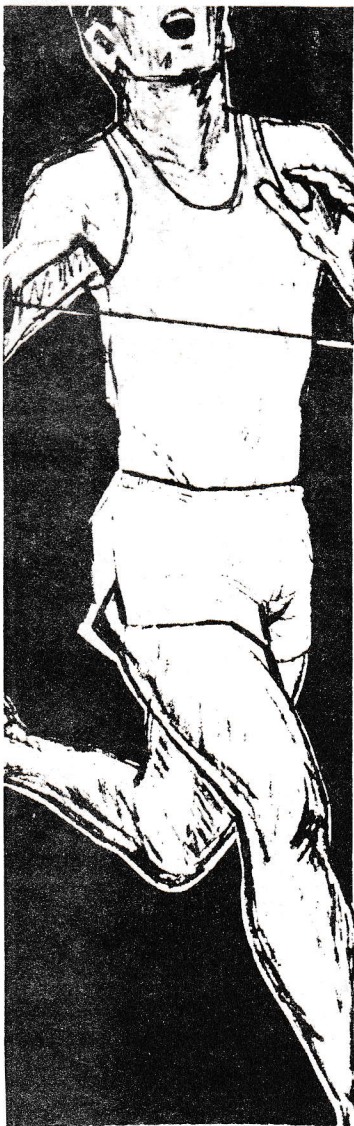
At State College, despite the cold weather, (40 degrees), Dan Smith of Penn Hills High School of Pittsburgh, exploded out of the blocks and recorded a good early season clocking in the 100 of 9.8 secs. In the same race, Walker of Mt. Lebanon picked up the 2nd spot with a time of 9.9, and the next three men, Smith of Wilkes-Barre Coughlin, Crowley of Milton, and Chuck Vennie of John Harris, all going 10.0 secs.

At West Chester, three of the best performances came in the 45 yard high hurdles, the open quarter, and the 880 run. T. Boggs of Coatesville, a team noted for a long line of fine hurdlers, skimmed over the high hurdles in championship form, to the tune of 5.6 beating D. Ewing of Norristown by 1½ yards for a record. Don Curry of Hershey captured the 880 in 2.02.8, good time around the tight (176 yards to the lap) track. In his first race of the season, Van Barbour of Chambersburg ran an easy 51.5 quarter, then came back a week later and lowered his time to 50.4 at State College in finishing second to Dan Rothermal of Mt. Lebanon who traveled the distance in 50.3.

In the high jump at Philadelphia, Mike Sperger of Bishop McDevitt High of Wyncote, Pa., cleared a height of 6.6 defeating State Class B champion Gene White of Bristol. Earlier this year, White also cleared 6.6 indoors.

The second greatest prep pole vaulter in Pennsylvania history Mark Mondschein of Haverford, already has cleared 13'7 this year. His best mark being over a foot better, (14'7½ in 1969) Mark well could be the first Pa. high schooler over the 15 foot barrier. His father is coach of field events at The Univ. of Pennsylvania.

The time of 3.28.4 by the Cardinal Dougherty Mile Relay quartet of Benny Jackson, Bob Woodward, Bill Derer, and Wayne Wright must be considered good time in respect to cold Mid-March temperatures. Come Penn Relay time, they should be in great form and shooting for a crack at the Championship of America One Mile Relay title.

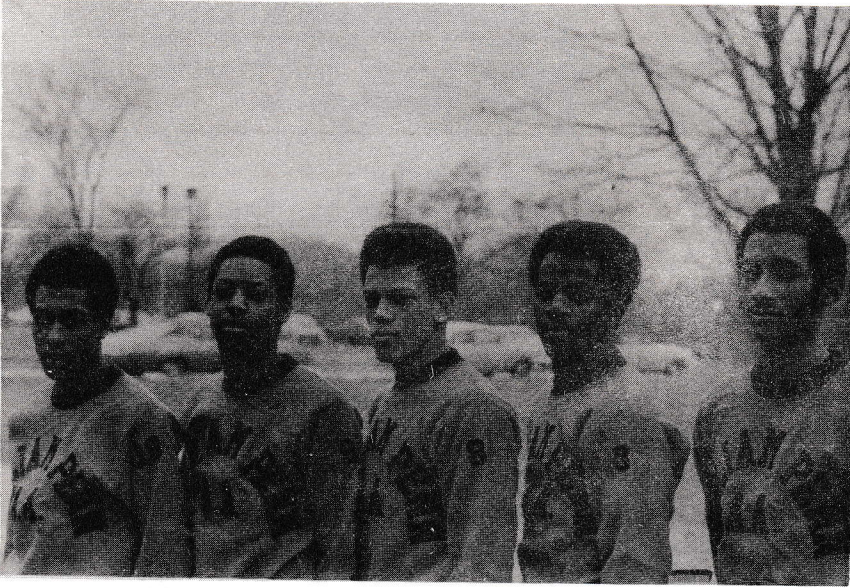

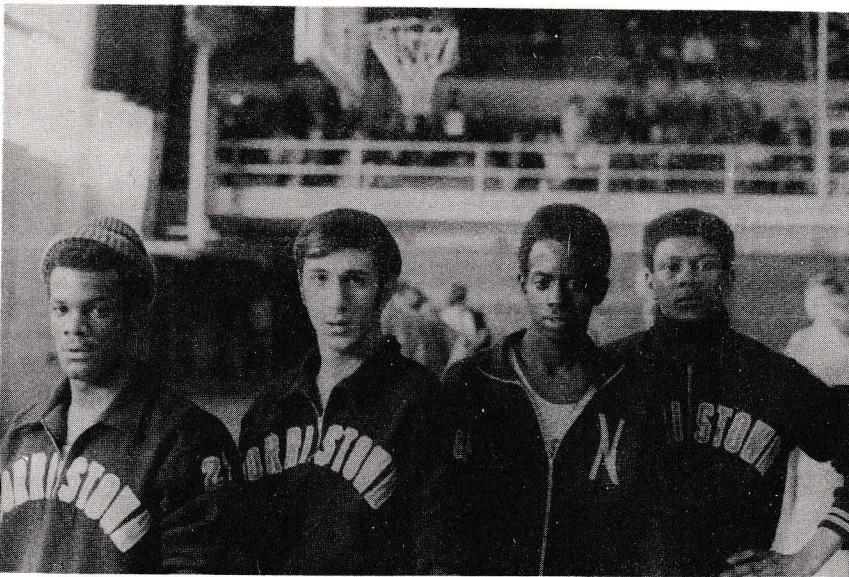

An early season eye opener, a sizzling 1.56.9 880 by Don Creechan of South Hills Catholic highlighted the Tri State Meet at The Pitt Fieldhouse on March 21. In running one of the fastest indoor half miles ever in Pennsylvania by a prep, he clipped 3.4 secs. off his own mark set last year.

Don Smith of Penn Hills High School of Pittsburgh covered 50 yards in 5.5, breaking the old record of 5.6 secs. Penn Hills piled up a total of 40 pts. in the 13 event meet to grab the team title.

Wayne Wright of Cardinal Daugherty defeated the 1969 Pa. State PIAA 440 yard dash champ, Bill Neely of Abington with a sound clocking of 49.8, a time which could be considered excellent, during the prevailing cold, bone chilling month of March. Neely should pick up momentum as the season progresses --- he's fresh out of the basketball season, competing with Abington's hardwood quintet just prior to this meet.

## DISTRICT ELEVEN REPORT

The 1970 track season in the Lehigh Valley area may lack the depth of previous years but there should be excellent performances from the likes of Easton's Mickey Collins (4:31.6 mile as a soph.), Liberty's Tommy Donchez (19.2 lows as a Junior), Freedom's Gleen Hauze (13'0" pole vault as a Junior). Other athletes to watch are Nazareth's George Mucha (10.3/22.9 in the sprints), Bangor's Jeff Swope in the discus, Pen Argyl's Dave Vough (10.4 as a soph.) and William Allen's Glenn Pryor (2:11.3 half-mile as a summer frosh).

Collins, a small but mighty runner who resembles the great Gerry Lindgren, is potentially the finest distance prospect to ever appear on the District XI scene. He has done the indoor two mile in a very good 9:48 which is more than 15 seconds faster than the District XI Class A meet record. Last year he competed at nearby Notre Dame High which has no regulation track. He should do much better at Easton this spring simply because of better competition.

Donchez, a powerful 6-2, 195 pound runner who received BIG 33 football honors, is an excellent sprinter with a best 100 time of 10 flat. His 180 low hurdles time is easily the best ever run by a District XI athlete and he will be a strong entry in this event at the PIAA state meet.

Hauze is a fabulous competitor who really came around in summer meets. He possesses excellent vaulting form despite his relatively small size. The Freedom ace has done 13-6 unofficially and appears a cinch to break the alltime District best of 14-1 set by Northampton's Joe Steffie in 1968.

Kocher won last year's District B high jump competition and is a threat to surpass the alltime District best of 6-4½ shared by three other athletes. This past winter he starred on the Palmerton basketball team.

Nazareth's George Mucha could be a top sprint prospect if he ever reaches the potential displayed when he ran 10.3 as a frosh three seasons ago. Injuries have cut down the Blue Eagle star's progress but he nevertheless won the District B 220 last spring with a personal best of 22.9. The new Nazareth coach this spring happens to be George's brother-in-law (Ray Nunamaker). George may respond by breaking the school standards of 10 flat and 22 flat.

Jeff Swope of Bangor is big (about 6-1, 205) but sometimes erratic in his favorite event, the discus throw. He has several throws over 150 feet despite not using the conventional spin. If Jeff decides to use the regular method this year, watch out! He could topple the 170' mark.

Pen Argyl is better known for its football teams but it has a legitimate sprint prospect in Dave Vough, only a junior. He is the school's best track prospect since 1968 state hurdles champ, Steve Lobb.

The most amazing track and field performance in the District last season actually occurred after the scholastic school year. Allentown's Glenn Pryor clicked off an astonishing 2:11.3 half mile in winning the boys' 12-13 event in the Stanley Memorial held at Nazareth. There is only one other known USA schoolboy who has run faster at the same age. Pryor should be tough this spring despite his tender age of only 14.

We will try to use as much as possible in the upcoming issues of Pennsylvania Track and Field Review --- Bill Pilconis, a 14.4 hurdler at Panther Valley in 1967, was a member of the football team at Pittsburgh this past fall --- Frank Scagliotta, Bangor's great 23-1 long jumper in 1967, was a key performer on Muhlenberg's basketball team this past season --- only five Pennsy sprinters have ever run 9.6 but the District can claim two of them (Gary Wagner of Parkland in 1965 and John Neyer of Pottsville in 1939) --- only District athlete to surpass magic 200-foot mark in javelin was Nazareth's Run Musselman in 1968.

Bill Butler, meet director of the high school invitational meet at The West Chester State College Fieldhouse, and assistant coach at WCSC, conducted an excellent indoor meet for schoolboys, which ran right on schedule throughout.

On the 10 lap to the mile grasstex track at The West Chester Fieldhouse, junior, Mickey Collins of Easton shattered a record in the two mile and lived up to pre-season predictions of being one of eastern Pennsylvania's better distance runners. He captured the event by a narrow margin of 1 yard over a strong Scott Mellinger of Governor Mifflin High School, 9.48.8 to 9.49.0.
