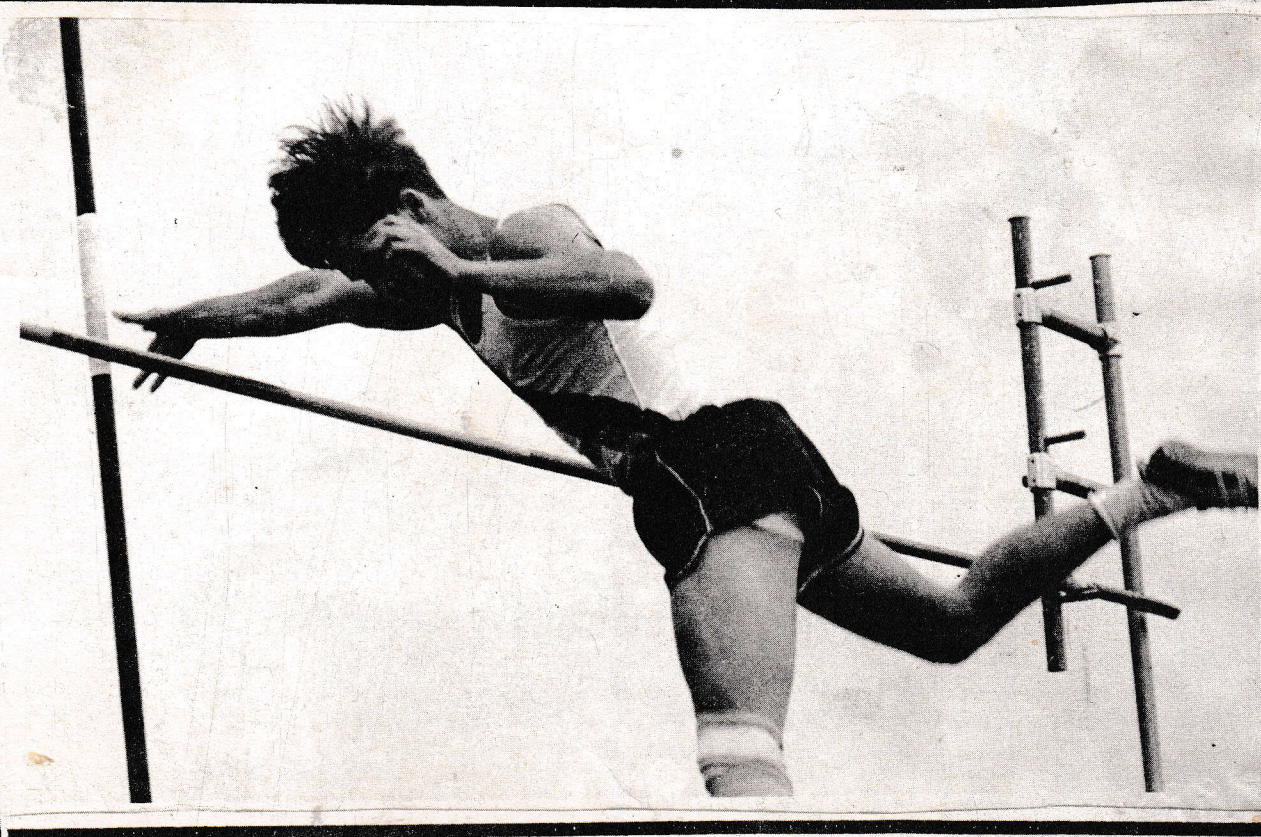

## ACROSS THE STATE

Notre Dame is going to get a champ in Gary Diminick. The football coaches were perhaps pleased to hear that he had gained some 14 lbs. pushing his weight up to 170 but since the winter Gary has trimmed back to 156 lbs. and his running has improved tremendously. Pushed by Mahanoy's Rich Lazar, Gary sped to a 9.8 clocking, his best of the year.

Along with Diminick in Mt. Carmel's backfield this past year was Henry Hynoski, a fullback who gained 888 yards rushing. Hynoski ran the 120 yard highs in 15 flat and finished in a dead heat with St. Clair's Mike Bulino (180 yard lows) with a time of 19.9.

Ron Tomcavage of Danville (Pa.) isn't doing a bad job either. Ron has high jumped 6-3, broad jumped 21-4, and pole vaulted 12-0. Commendable statistics for a three-event man.

Jim Dutt, a student at C. E. Cole Junior High School is making quite a name for himself. Dutt set a record in the 100-yard dash, taking the morning trails in 10.1 and the afternoon finals in 10.2. (The record in the 100, 10.4, has stood since 1951.) Dutt also won the long jump with a leap of 19-7 1/2. Jim's teammate, Jeff Kauffman, won the 880 in 2:10.2. Not bad for a seventh grader!

Davis Salks, Muhlenberg's 120-yard high hurdle master sped his way to a blistering 14.5, fastest time in the state this year for that event.

Dave Kuhn, Central Dauphin (Hbg.) javelin thrower has thrown 207.11. This places him second to Warren's Ed O'Neil (210-0) who has the best throw in the state.

Coach John Delegram (Lebanon High School) has informed us that Martin Hauer has run a 22.5 (220) in a dual meet against William Penn this season.

William Penn of Harrisburg has lowered its two mile relay time to 8:14.7. The quartet was composed of George Crummel, John Brown, Fred Jones and George Williams.

Irv Shatto, Central Dauphin, has run the 180 yard low hurdles in 19.9. This mark ties Elizabethtown's Terry Wadsworth who has also run 19.9. The best time recorded in the state this year was turned in by Bob Frank (19.8) of Mt. Lebanon.

East Pennsboro's Ron Powley has put the shot 55-5.

Mechanicsburg's Dennis Red continues to climb in the pole vault. Pushed by Middletown's Cliff Brown (13-3) Dennis cleared 13-5 1/2. Haverford's gem, Mark Mondschein still leads the pack with a 14-7 1/2.

Congratulations to William Goodman, William Penn High School (York), Joe Allwine, Lebanon High School (Lebanon), and Tom Stackfield, Carlisle High School (Carlisle, Pa.) for one of the finest exhibitions of long jumping this reporter had ever seen. In the long jump finals (Central Penn League Meet) which was held at Cedar Cliff High School, New Cumberland, Pa., it was Goodman (22-11), Allwine (22-7), and Stackfield (22-6 1/2). Stackfield's last jump was a 23-2 dandy but as fate would have it, he fouled by 1/2". Goodman's mark of 22-11 gives him the best class A mark in the state this year. Leaders are: Gene White, Bristol High School (23-1 1/2), and Greg Gates, Scotland School (22-11 1/2). Both young men are class B participants.

Jimmy Scott, the Carlisle "wonder boy" sprinter, who is the defending PIAA 100-yard sprint champ, may not qualify for the State finals this year. He is presently nursing a pulled leg muscle, just below the hamstring sustained early in April. He has not run the 100 since, however, has managed a 22.6 furlong which is well off of his 21.2 clocking of last year. Many observers felt he possibly could go as low as 9.3 or 9.4 this season. In the past, he has covered the 100 in 9.7 on five different occasions, (four last season) and effortlessly 9.7 in his second try at the event this season. Pat Petre, Scott's 9.8 teammate suffered a leg injury also, but appears fully recovered off of his fine showing 5/12, also at 9.8.

## MY LOOK AT TRACK ... by Todd H. Jones

One of the state's premier pole vaulters, Glenn Hauze of Bethlehem Freedom has already done 13'8 1/2" with a near miss at 14-2. The 5-10, 140 pound senior had a best height of 13 feet last season. That vault came at the PIAA state meet where Hauze placed fourth.

The Freedom ace switched from a 15-foot Skypole to a 16-foot Catapole and is gripping 14-3. Hauze is quite confident that he can surpass the magic 15-foot mark before the scholastic season ends. He is quite aware that the man to beat at the state meet (Glenn was a strong favorite to win the District "A" vault at this writing) is Haverford's sensational Mark Mondschein who has done 14-7 1/2. Hauze's only clash with Mondschein came in last summer's Middle Atlantic Junior Olympic championships held at Exeter High in District Three. In that meet Hauze had to settle for second place with a 13-foot vault but the best Mondschein could do that day was also 13 feet (Hauze was second on the misses rule).

The Freedom standout possesses 10.9 speed but has never used weights. He does a lot of running in workouts and uses weights in addition to climbing ropes.

Hauze is an Honor student and President of both the Leo Club and the Glee Club at Freedom High. In addition to track, he also starred as a quarterback for two years on the school football team.

Hauze will attend the University of Maryland and is looking forward to working under coach George Butler, rated one of the top vault coaches in the nation.

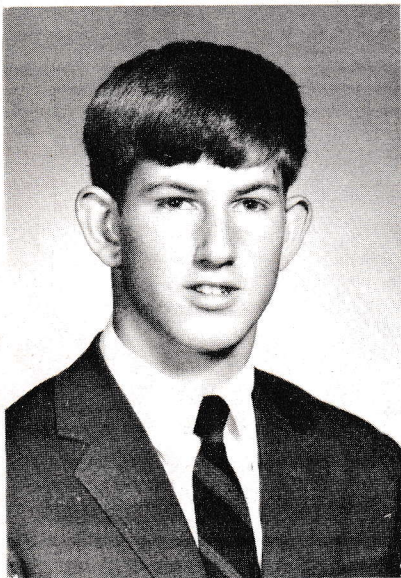
Few prep milers can break the 4:25 mark during their junior year but Mickey Collins of Easton High is the exception. The small, but mighty runner has ripped off times of 2:01.7, 4:23.0 and 9:43.8 this spring but hasn't been pushed too hard by the opposition. In his sparkling mile effort (second fastest in District history) Collins won by some 100 yards and nearly lapped a runner at the finish.

The 5-7, 137 pound runner transferred to Easton this past summer after a standout sophomore year at nearby Notre Dame High where he broke the school mile mark with a 4:31.6 clocking. Collins likes Easton High better because of the tougher competition and the chance to run in Class A competition in the District and state meets.

The Easton lad is actually a better 3 and 6-miler despite 10.9 speed. Collins lacks a great finishing sprint but shows an unusual ability to take the lead at the start of a race and try to kill off the competition. Last fall he captured the Middle Atlantic AAU Jr. cross country run (approx. 6 miles) in the fine time of 30:00.6. During the winter season he won two races at 2 miles and finished second in the third despite a sizzling 9:42.2 clocking.

Collins plans to attend college and has already received many letters from interested collegiate coaches.

Another fine Lehigh Valley vaulter is Nazareth's senior, Carlton Huff who leads all District "B" athletes with a 12'7 1/4" effort. The Blue Eagle star has shown remarkable progress since his frosh year when the best he could do was only 8-6. Going into the District meet Huff was aiming for 13-2 which would break the school and District marks.



Carlton Huff

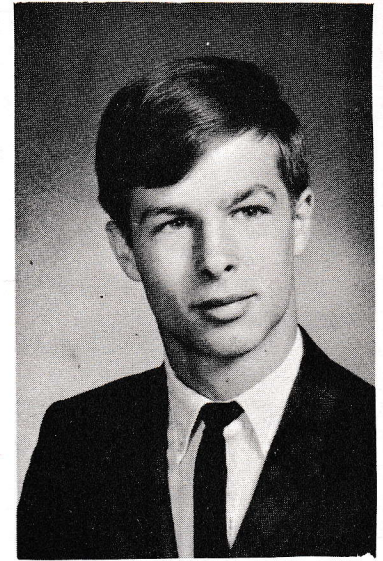

The Nazareth boy got his start in track in 1963 when he competed for the Nazareth Olympians in Jr. Olympic meets (mainly the 50-yard dash and long jump events). He competed again in 1964 but really didn't start serious vaulting until his frosh year three seasons ago. Huff plans to enroll at Rutgers University where he is looking forward to more pole vault competition.

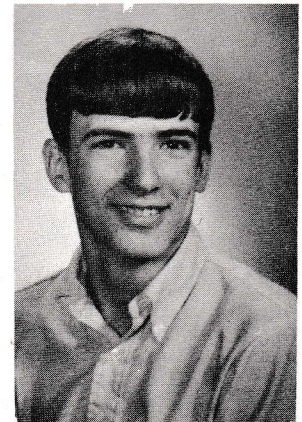
One of the greatest frosh athletes in District XI annals is Emmaus' Charlie Norelli (turns 15 on May 19). The 14-year old whiz - a PIAA state champ in swimming -- has done the 440 in a sizzling 52 flat and run an even more astonishing 1:59.2 half mile leg on the two mile relay team. If this weren't enough Norelli has also run the 220 in 23.4 and shown amazing versatility by also covering the mile in 4:55.1.

The Emmaus lad is, without a doubt, one of the nation's finest (and most unusual) athletes. This is Norelli's first year of track competition but he has been competing in swimming since the age of 8. The Emmaus sensation has Olympic goals but will it be swimming or track or both!!

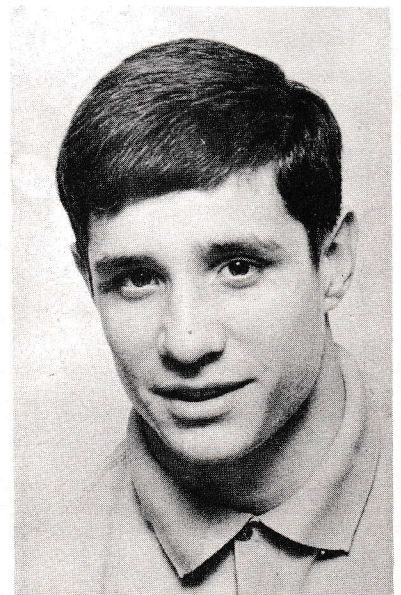

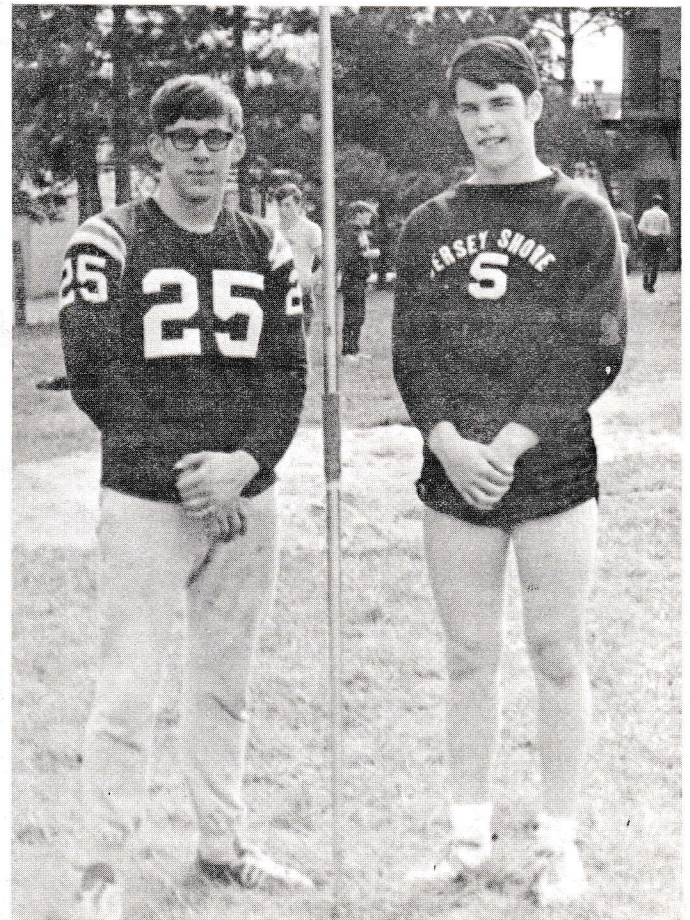
Fred George of Thomas Jefferson captured the 120 yard High Hurdles in :14.8 and took second in the Low Hurdles with a :19.9. Mike McKenzie of Baldwin won the Low's in :19.7.

The Mile was a classic with Bob Hillman of North Allegheny winning in 4:16.6, Gary Gittings of Baldwin was second in 4:17.0 And Tom Synnott of Mt. Lebanon was third in 4:19.0.

North Allegheny, with a team of Ken Smith, Art Becker, Dave Thomas and Bob Hillman won the Two-Mile Relay with a fast 7:56.0.

There was no official point total given.

In the Bux-Mont League Championships (Suburban Phila.) Ken Warner, Wissahickon grabbed a triple winning the 100/220/440 with times of 9.9/22.2/50.1, respectively. At the Norristown Interscholastics, Randy Barnes tied the State's fastest clocking this year with 9.7 in the century. PIAA defending champ, Bill Neely of Abington won the quarter in 50.8. In the field events, Abington's Tom Lacey captured the title in the Shotput with a toss of 56.5 3/4 while teammate Bob Murphy won the javelin with a 194.7. Sophomore Doug Ewing of Norristown clocked a swift 14.6 in the high hurdles in winning this event.

Quite a battle could develop at the State Championships On May 23, between two of the finest scholastic pole vaulters. Mark Mondschein, Haverford senior vs. Glenn Hauze, of Bethlehem Freedom. Both will be shooting for 15 feet.

Pierre Ritter of York, who comes from a family noted for its sprinting prowess, showed his hurdling capabilities in the 180 lows clocking 19.2 in this event. This puts him in the number one spot, statewide, and was .9 faster than his previous best clocking.

At the powerful WPIAL qualifying meet held May 8 at Mt. Lebanon, phenomenal times were reported in the finals of the 220 yard dash (turn). Joel Walker, Mt. Lebanon, 21.1; Dan Smith, Penn Hills, 21.2. However, the times were erroneous. The official timers were not able to see the start of the race, and caught the sound rather than the smoke which was quite an advantage for the sprinters.

Dan Swanson of Warren High School and Rick Weaver of Oil City continue to astonish fans out in Northwestern Pennsylvania. Swanson glided to a 21.8 220, in winning the event at The Section II qualifying meet at Oil City on May 9. Warren's Ed O'Neil, better known as a javelin thrower, (leads state) battled on even terms with Rick Weaver for better than half the race in the open quarter. Weaver captured the event by ten yards over O'Neil in the fine time of 48.7, which gives him the state's fastest clocking this season.

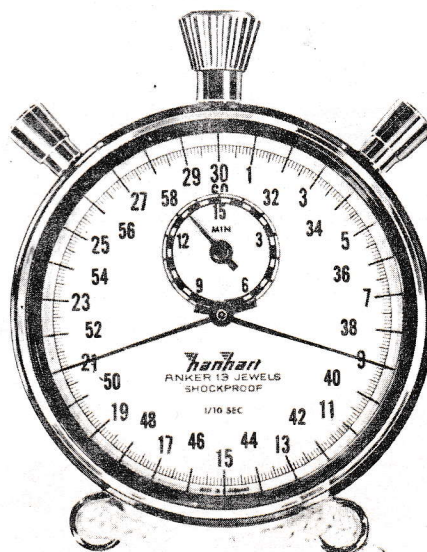
Ty Higgins of Lower Moreland became the best ever Penna. scholastic discus thrower in history off of his fine throw of 187-3 3/4 throw. He followed up with two more sensational tosses in the same meet -- 186-3' and 179'. He is massive in stature at 6'3" and 235 lbs., but has the speed and coordination to extend his best even further this season at the State Meet. Presently, he is ranked 3rd nationally.

John Harris' Chuck Venie, and Wilson's Wayne Hassler continue to pick up momentum in the sprints and appear to be two of the strongest Central Penn sprinters. Venie, a senior, has journeyed the century in 9.9 on three occasions, and owns a best clocking of 9.8. He has 22.0 and 22.2 on the turn in the 220 yard dash. Hassler and Venie will clash in the District 3 Championships along with Pat Petre and maybe Jim Scott of Carlisle.

Baldwin's sophomore sensation, Ron Semkiw still holds the statewide lead in the Shot. He has upped his personal best to 61'9 1/4. In one of the biggest dissappointments of the year, Herb Gibson of McKeesport, who was at one point in the season, State wide leader in both the 880 and the mile, has been eliminated from all future track participation in his scholastic career. Running the WPIAL qualifying meet at Mt. Lebanon last week, a meet in which District 7 athletes participate, in order to gain admittance to the District 7 Track Championships, Herb finished out of the money in both events, even though he managed a swift 1.57.0 time in the half. Just prior to the meet, he injured his leg and was not able to run his normal race.

Bob Abraham of Upper St. Clair is the new leader in the half mile with a sensational 1.55.7 at the WPIAL. Another to watch for at University Park are Bill Louv, Upper Merion senior who was injured earlier in the season but is making steady progress in both the mile and two mile events. His best effort ever came indoor this past season, a 9.20.3 two mile.
