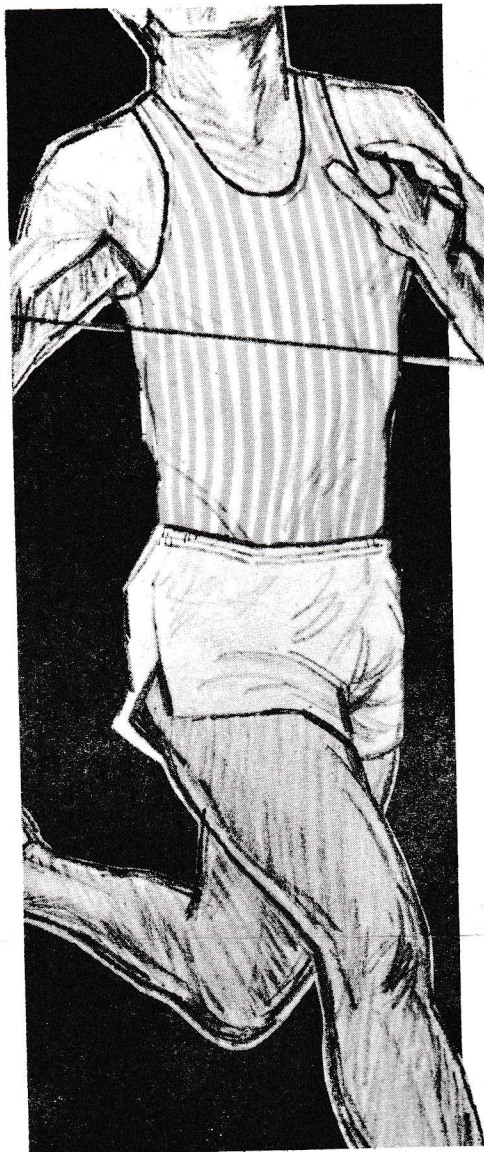

**LATE NEWS - 4/15...** Fabulous Mickey Collins, senior from Easton High School reeled off a fast 4.16.6 mile today further widening his lead in this event. His previous best was 4.21.4 which he had run two weeks ago. Enroute to his new personal record, Collins hit the quarter in 57.0, the half 2.01.0, 3/4 mile in 3.07.0, then kicked home all alone for this sensational performance.....Bradford's Jack Craven established the state's best at 100 earlier this season but Jerry Urich of Red Land High in Etters came on fast with a 9.9, then tied Craven's best with a 9.8 this week.....Rob Roup of Central Bucks East has the best outdoor effort reported in the pole vault this season. Central Bucks East, coached by Marty Stern, has a powerful track squad this season. This is only the schools second year of operation, and in fifteen dual meets, they have never lost any. Indoors at New York last March the East two-mile relay team comprised of Aram Attariam, Curt Snodgrass, Rev Rhodes, and Jack Reinhart ran a 8:09.6. They are bolstered outdoors by sprinter Ted Perkins, 10.1 and 21.8.....No news yet on pole vaulters McQuade of Wissahickon (14-6 1/4 last year), and Mondschein of Haverford (13-6 last year). Also High and Low hurdler Larry Lewis, Coatesville (14.4 last year.)

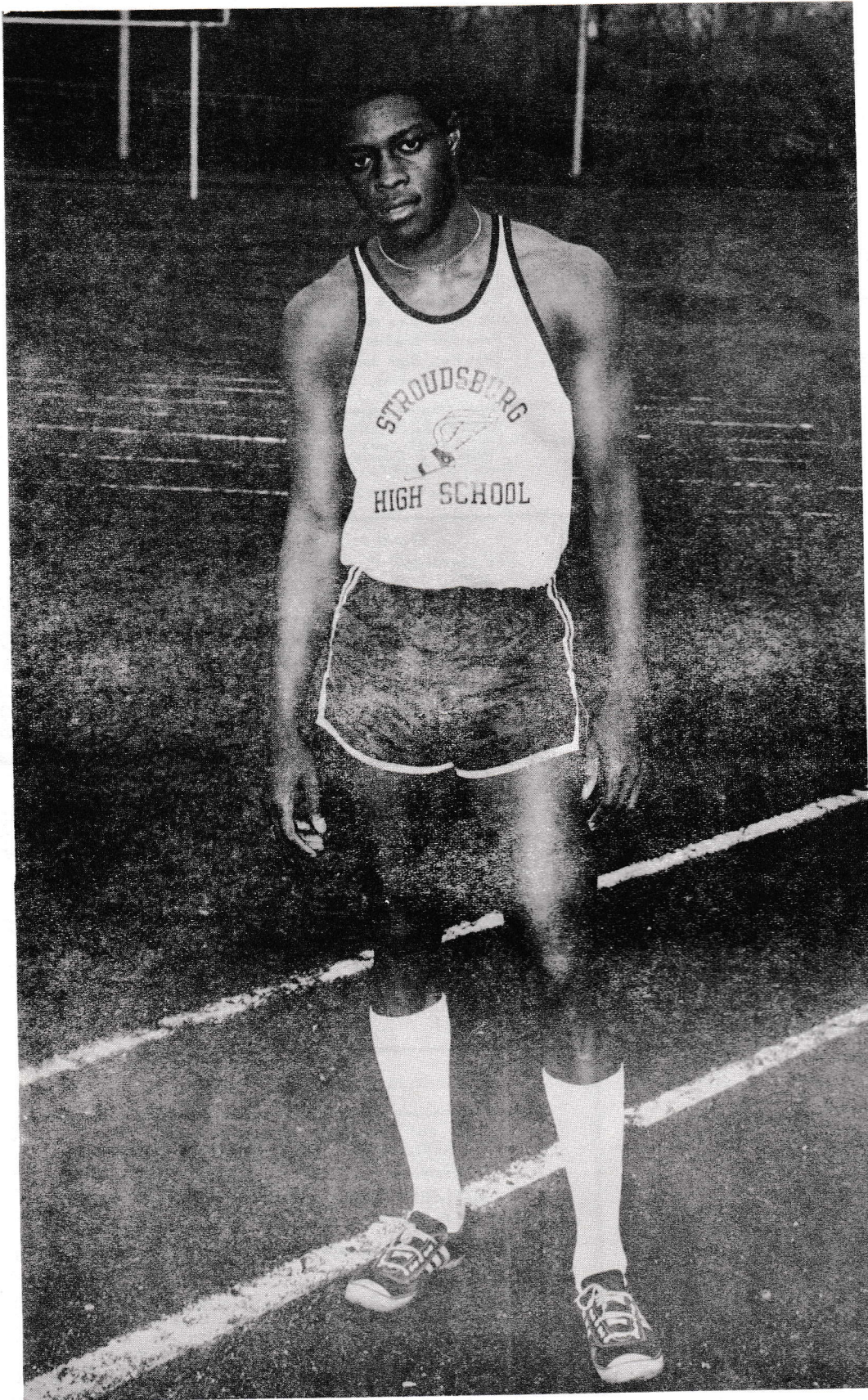

Powerful sprinter, Art Owens of Stroudsburg High School, if he stays healthy, many observers feel he is capable of possibly 9.6 in the 100 yard dash. In late March Owens grabbed the statewide lead in the event with a 9.9 at State College High School, then it was feared he injured a hamstring muscle, and was out of action for several days. Since that time, however, he has come back with another 9.9 in winning easily in dual meet competition. Last season he long jumped 22-1.

**A LOOK AT THE LEHIGH VALLEY TRACK & FIELD SCENE** by Todd H. Jones

Stroudsburg's great sprinter, Art Owens opened up the season with a sizzling 9.9 dash but then injured his leg and missed his team's first league meet. At this writing it is not known how serious the injury is and when Owens will return to competition. The Stroudsburg flash is at least the tenth District XI sprinter to break ten flat in the 100. The Stroudsburg record is 9.8 set by Bob Roberson in 1965. Roberson also ran a 21.3 furlong that same season. Owens' best is 22 flat last year as a soph (Jr. eligibility). Off his 6.2 indoor 60 this past winter Owens -- provided he can come back from his leg injury -- appears to have a chance at snapping both school records. The 6-0, 170 all-around athlete is a fine football prospect (more than 1,000 yards rushing last fall) and hopes to attend Grambling. Two bigtime football powers (Penn State & Nebraska) are interested in Owens.

Best early-season performer in the District is Easton's talented distance runner, Mickey Collins who has run 1:56.8 in the half and 4:21.4 in the mile (both school records). Collins will run both races plus a leg on the 2-mile relay team in dual meets but is undecided as to what to enter in the District meet. His best chance for a state title appears to be in the longer two-mile run since he copped the PIAA Class A cross-country title last fall. If he would decide to shoot for the mile run he'd no doubt clash with Bethel Park's 4:15.2 miler, Bob Schurko. Collins can claim a rather unique record. He holds a school mark for the mile run at two different schools (ran 4:31.6 at Notre Dame, Easton as a soph).

Other outstanding District XI performances include: a 4:37 mile by Parkland's Dave Cope, A Jr.; a 15 flat high hurdles race by Easton's Shawn Tice, another Jr.; triple jump marks of 43-9/16 and 43-5/16 by Stroudsburg's Mark Adams (a Jr.) and Wilson Boro's Dim Alestas (did 45-3/4" last season); a 21-8/16 long jump by Easton's Tom Riley; a 185-6 effort in the javelin by Parkland's Bill Younger, a Jr. (first meet of year), and a 50-2 1/2 shot put by Saucon Valley's (Hellertown) Jr. find Dick Miller.

When Palmerton's great high jumper, Bruce Kocher leaped 6-t in last year's PIAA state meet it was thought he established an alltime District XI record. Not so. In 1962 Bethlehem Liberty's Walt Moore did 6-t 1/2 in a dual versus Reading.

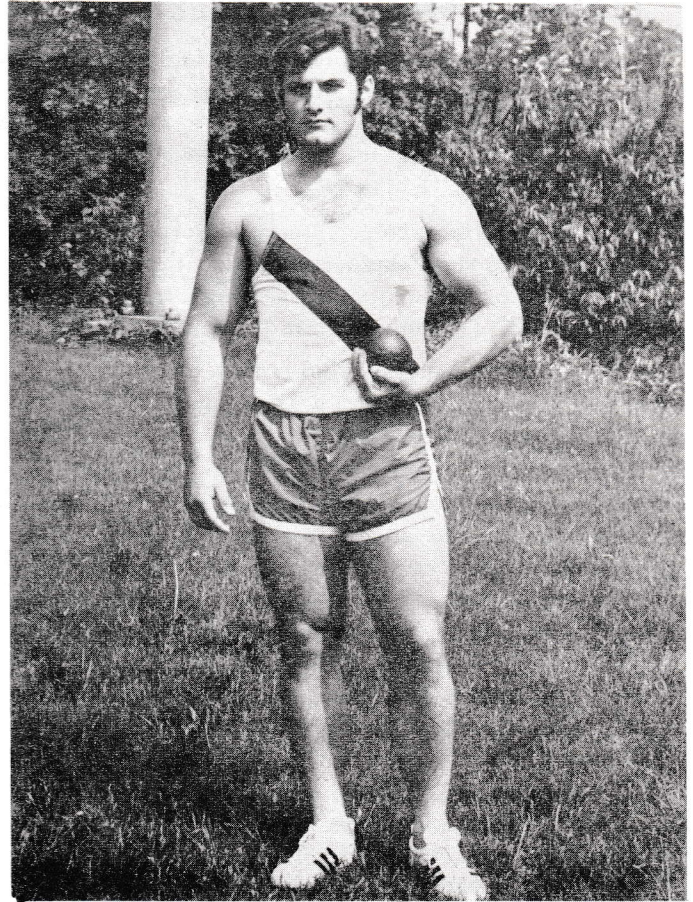

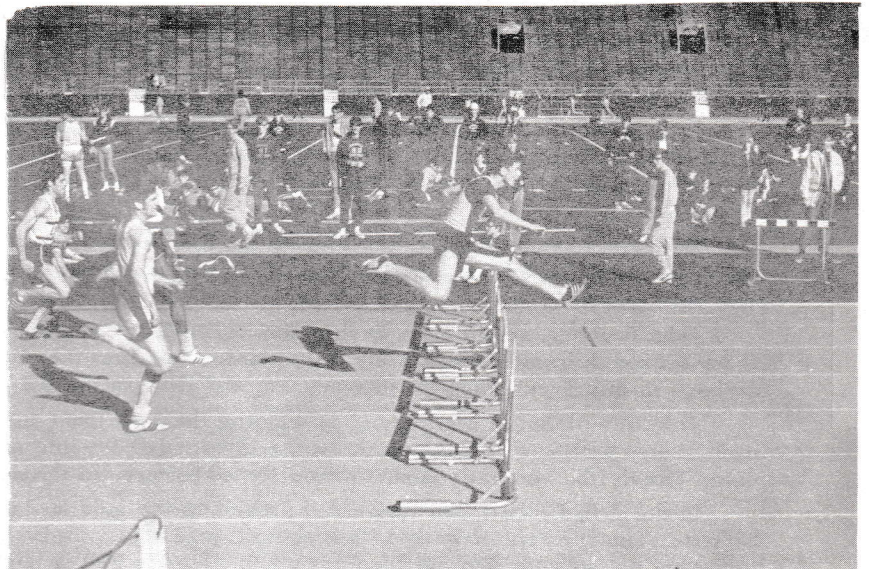

## CENTRAL PENNSYLVANIA REPORT...

Craig Anderson, senior from Central Dauphin, Harrisburg grabbed the statewide lead in the 220 yard dash when he clocked a 22 flat on April 5th, then lowered his time to a 21.7 three days later. Last season, Anderson was a mediocre distance runner, with a best clocking in the two-mile event of slightly under 10:00.0. He switched to the 220 just prior to the close of the season, and did a commendable 22.5. He's strictly a sprinter this season (100/220/440) with personal bests of 10.1, 21.7, and 52.1.

Another Harrisburger, Leroy Galloway of William Penn had led the state in the high hurdles with 14.8 but will have to continue to show improvement to continue to claim this distinction. Two tuffies in this event have no clockings reported as of this writing, they being Larry Lewis of Coatesville - 14.4 last season, and Bruce McCutcheon, Penn Crest who showed 14.3 and was State P.I.A.A. Class A Champ as a junior last year.

At present, eight sprinters from Central Penn have gone 10.1 or faster in the century, the fastest being Jerry Urich of Red Land in Etters with a 9.9 followed by Greg Jones, York 10.0, Hubie Simpson, John Harris 10.0, Mel Washington, a junior from William Penn 10.0, Steve Musser, Central Dauphin 10.0, Tom Gaffney, Milton Hershey 10.0, Craig Anderson, 10.1, and Smith of Wilkes-Barre Coughlin, 10.1.

Tim Cook, crack two lapper and miler from Chambersburg High School, who is headed to William & Mary next fall leads the mid-state area in three events. He has a 1.58.4 in the half, 4.22.5 and a 9.25.4 in the mile and two-mile respectively. His two-mile time leads the state at the moment.

Pierre Ritter, York High junior, who has speed to burn, is down to 19.3 in the lows which gives him a clear cut lead in this event - also has a pair of 15.0 races in the high hurdle event. Ritter led the state last season with 19.2 as a soph, and will be shooting for Jan White's record of 18.7.

John Harris, Harrisburg has another crack 880 relay unit which clocked an early 1:32.9 for the overall Penna. lead and will be hard to beat in this event as the season progresses providing they stay healthy. They are anchored by Central Penn 220 Champ Hubie Simpson, an All-State football halfback.

Steve Tanner, a Carlisle senior has put the shot over 52 feet in his past four meets and has a personal best this season of 55-1½. His other winning tosses were 52-5, 52-4¼ and 52-6½. He's the best in the area right now followed by last season's mid-state champ, Ron Powley of East Pennsboro, Enola who has 51-4¼ but hit a personal best of 55-10 as a junior. Other top marks include Bill Hogg, Lancaster 52-5½, Charles Palmer, John Harris 51-11½, and John Huzvar, Hershey 51-10.

Carlisle has another leader in Barry Loudin who has hit 188-4½ already in the javelin which gives him a slight lead for 3rd over Larry Williams of Baldwin in this event. Williams has 187-9½ to his credit.

In the horizontal jumping events a great early season effort has been turned in by Chambersburg's Ed Wingerd in the triple jump. He leaped 46-7½ and came back with a 21-7 1/8 in the long jump in the same meet 4/13/71. Bill Goodman of York is another good one with 22-1¾ and 44-3¼. Virgil Johnson of Harrisburg William Penn has 44-8¼ while another All-State football halfback Leroy Hughes of Central Dauphin, Harrisburg has gone 44-3½.

## WESTERN PENNSYLVANIA REPORT - Tri-State Coaches Meet at Pitt Stadium 4/11

Fans on hand at the Tri-State Meet saw highly touted Bob Schurko of Bethel Park go down in defeat in the mile run at the hands of Nick Martin of Pittsburgh Carrick. Schurko, who posted a 4.15.2 last season as a junior, was clearly outdistanced by Martin, 4.23.1 to 4.26.4. It is believed Schurko may be ailing.

In other action, Chuck Mozingo of Thomas Jefferson High School, Pittsburgh ran a brilliant 49.1 to capture the 440 yard dash ahead of Danny Rothermal, Mt. Lebanon 49.5, and Rich Jackson of Pittsburgh Westinghouse, 49.6. Going into the race, Rothermal had the previous top clocking for 1971 in the event, 49.4. Mozingo's previous best was 49.9 as a junior last season.

Baldwin's sensational junior Shot Putter Ron Semkiw upper his personal best for the second week in a row...62-2½ two weeks ago, and 62-5 at the Tri-State Meet. Semkiw has not relinquished his statewide lead in this event during the past two seasons.

John Reihner, senior from Washington High School won the discus easily at Pitt with a throw of 170-2, but earlier in the season delivered one 175-4½. This moves him into the number six slot on the unofficial all-time list. The top six boys in this event, thus far this season, are all from the W.P.I.A.L. Area.

Jim Gray of Butler cleared 6-3 in winning the high jump and Terry Jackson of Wilkinsburg leaped 22-5¼ in the long jump. Larry Williams of Baldwin threw the javelin 187-9½ into an extremely strong wind in winning this event, and junior Tim Keith, who hails from a school noted for javelin throwers...Ambridge, placed second with 180-2½.

In the 220, fireball Dan Rothermal picked up the gold medal that he missed in the quarter with a good 22.4 around the turn. Tim O'Keefe of Bethel Park showed a 22.2 in a preliminary heat, but had to settle for fourth in the finals. Rothermal's teammate Dan Sullivan ran a 1.58.7 in the 880 in winning over Tom Freed, Riverside 1.59.9; and Rick Kissman of Erie McDowell, 2:00.9.

Sprinter John DeLeonardis of Wilkinsburg whom many western track buffs picked as the man to watch in the 100, pulled a hamstring in the semi-finals...forcing him out of the finals. Bethel Park's Tim O'Keefe gained a narrow win over Jerome Turner of Peabody, both being clocked in 10.2. DeLeonardis has a wind-aided 9.9 to his credit this year.

## TOPICS OF INTEREST FROM OUR READERS, COLLEAGUES, CORRESPONDENTS...

### RON SHERRATT, TRACK COACH - BRISTOL HIGH SCHOOL

It's high time we attempt to update our track program. Specifically speaking, our high school hurdlers are being held back to a considerable degree since our various track organizations and associations do not sponsor or carry the intermediate hurdle event as an official event in Pennsylvania. In fact, many high school hurdlers in Penna. know nothing of this event, when in many progressive areas of the country, such as California, Texas, and New York the 330 yard intermediate hurdle race is a regular part of the track & field format. Furthermore, for the past decade, the low hurdle event has not been sanctioned by The NCAA, AAU, or any International track & field body, whereas, the intermediate hurdle event is a regular part of the program. I personally would like to see this event included in regular competition in Pennsylvania

### TONY TEZIK, TRACK COACH - LEWISBURG HIGH SCHOOL

It is unfortunate that our immediate area, especially our league (West Branch) does not get adequate coverage in track & field. I have a boy who is a senior this year, whom I feel is worthy of mention. Last season, as a junior, he was an outstanding performer in our district in the long jump, triple jump, and high jump. His most noteworthy accomplishment was a long jump of 22-1 1/2". The boy in mention is John Miller. He won the District title in this event, and placed second to Gene White at the Class B P.I.A.A. Meet. This boy also deserves recognition.

### MR. CHARLES HEMPHILL - PENN HILLS HIGH SCHOOL, PITTSBURGH

In reference to the article published in the September 1970 issue of the Pa'thlete entitled "Comparative Times in PIAA Track Meets - Class A", pages 14-15, the following comments:

1. If you are going to publish the final results for some events, why not for all of them? For example, the winning time in the 100 yard dash was 9.8; the winning time in the 200 was 21.7 in 1970. The times listed look like the times of the trial heats. In the field events, why list them to the nearest foot? There sure is a big difference between the winning height of 6'6 1/2" in the high jump, than the 6'0" that is listed for 1970.
2. This has to be one of the few times that the Pa'thlete has published the marks of places other than first place. It also looks like Districts 1, 3, and 7 have the most men in the top five places.
3. To make the statement that "in an overwhelming majority of the cases, 3rd place winners in the District level would not have displaced medal winners in the State meet," certain things should be taken into consideration.
  - a. Certain years district meets have had to be run in the worst of conditions. Times and distances are very poor.
  - b. There are some districts with only one school as a representative of this district, and if they cannot score with their No. 1 man they sure are not going to score with their 3rd place man.
  - c. If Mr. Ream was going to make an honest appraisal of these statistics, why did he not say how many 3rd place finishers from Districts 1, 3, and 7 would have placed. It is a known fact that in 1970, District 7 had qualifying times and distances in some events as low as 8th place that were as good as or better than the 5th place time in the PIAA meet. (Examples: 880 yard relay - 8th place district 1:32.5, 5th place state 1:32.6; Long Jump - 8th place district 21'5", 5th place state 21'1"; 880 yard run - 7th place district 1:56.4, 5th place state 1:57.0) If this was true for District 7, it is probably true for Districts 1 and 3, for in some events they have had better individuals or relay teams than District 7.
4. If one is to assume that each district is equal (since the PIAA allots two representatives from each district to participate in each event of their state meet), then the laws of probability state that each district should then accumulate approximately the same number of points over a period of time. In this case, each district should expect to get 8-1/3% of the points. In the last six years (1965-70), Districts 1, 3, and 7 have taken 74.5% of the points (Districts 1 and 7 have 59.1% of these points). This averages out to a little less than 25% each for Districts 1, 3, and 7, which is way over their allotment of 8-1/3% of the points. Since 1935 either District 1 or District 7 has won the PIAA State Meet. Since 1939 either District 1 or District 7 has finished 2nd with the exception of 1951.

Something is out of kilter. Could it be that Districts 1, 3, and 7 have more schools and are more competitive? They talk about the equality of mankind. It is a shame that a District with only one Class A school is just as equal as a District with fifty-eight Class A schools. This would imply that the District with only one school is fifty-eight times as good as the District with fifty-eight schools. If the PIAA is only interested in getting the most number of schools in their meet, why have a District Qualifying meet. (Districts 12 and 5 do not have one, with only one Class A school in each district.) Why not have each district assign a school an event so that they could send a boy to the State Meet. This would mean that some districts could then be represented by thirty-six schools which should surely please the PIAA.

5. Some changes have to be made. Rules that were made in the 1930's and were good for that time are not necessarily the best rules for the 1970's. Track and Field has come a long way since the 1930's. Some possible changes for the state meet:
  - a. Regional Meets (Eastern Regional - Western Regional).
  - b. Let every district still have their two representatives, but let the third place district finishers compete if they meet a reasonable qualifying standard (even 4th, 5th, 6th, etc., placers).
  - c. Re-districting or combining of Districts.
  - d. Hold the Class A and Class B meet at two different sites.
  - e. Forget the whole thing, because the way things are run now it is NOT a "State Championship Meet."
