SEVEN WORLD RECORDS 1970

CHI GETS 5, LOSES 1

World records continue to fall - and where they will stop, nobody knows. So far in the 1970 outdoor season five new records have been set, two more equalled and two relay marks bettered. The new marks have been in the 100 yards, 220 yards, 200 meters, 400 meters, 100m hurdles, 4x800 and 4x440y relays. Records have been equalled in the 100 meters and the 200m hurdles. And performances have been only a tick away from new world marks in the 440y, the 1500m, the long jump and the discus throw - chances are these will fall before the spikes are tucked away for the winter. Nothing is safe as far as that goes with the high jump, once thought invincible, also tottering and the 800 not out of reach, and the 4x400 relay almost certain to go. It's been a great year!

A review of the new and equalled records:

100 yards - Chi Cheng lowered the mark from 10.3 to 10.0 flat at the Portland Invitational on 13 June. Chi also sped to clockings of 10.2 and had three 10.3s.

100 meters - Wyomia Tyus' record of 11.0 flat was tied first by Chi in Vienna and a couple weeks later by East Germany's Renate Meissner at her European Cup semi-final in East Berlin. The big talk in Europe these days is "10.9" - when will it come and who will be the first?

200 meters - Irene Szewinska's 22.5 set at the 1968 Olympic Games was finally broken by Chi Cheng at Munich in mid July with a scintillating 22.4 clocking.

220 yards - Again it was Chi Cheng who lowered the 22.9 clocking of Margaret Burvill to 22.7 at Portland and then to 22.6 at UCLA on July 3. Chi also had a 22.4 on July 4, but the race was wind-aided and another 22.7w at the California State Championships.

400 meters - Jamaica's Marilyn Neufville pulled out all the stops at the Commonwealth Games and cut the 400m record to 51.0 seconds flat. Old mark 51.7 by Besson and Duclos of France last year - plus a questionable 51.2 by Sin Kim-Dan of North Korea several years ago.

100m hurdles - Karin Balzer held the record at 12.9 when the season began, but first Tereza Sukniewicz, Poland, and

MDYF WINS NATIONAL TITLE

Los Angeles, California, July 3/4: Taking advantage of perfect weather, terrific facilities and top flight competition, the American Women's Track and Field Championships at the UCLA track turned out to be one of the finest championships ever held. Mayor Daley Youth Foundation, exhibiting an all-around power won the team title over the perennial "Bridesmaids", the Atoms 54-46. No doubt about the Atoms being the "track" champions, however, as they tallied all 46 of their points on the red tartan track while the Chicago crew was displaying a well-balanced team scoring 27 points on the track and 27 on the field.

Records fell like ten pins. Two new world marks were set as Chi Cheng sped to a 22.6 furlong in her heat and a 22.4 in the final which was wind-aided, and the Atoms took command of the mile relay with a 3:41.3 clocking, an average of 55.3s. Five American records went by the boards in the 220, 440 by Mavis Laing and the three relays. And eight Meet Records were obliterated - plus four very near misses as Pat Hawkins 200m hurdle mark and Willy White's long jump mark were both ruled out by excessive wind, and Cheryl Toussaint missed the 880 record by 0.1 and Francie Larrieu the 1500m mark by only 0.4s.

The two sprints were pegged as the feature events, but although the times were excellent in both races, the competition for first spot was not close. Chi Cheng won the 100 final in 10.2, the second-fastest 100 ever run by a woman, and the 220 by 1.2 seconds over runner-up Williamae Fergerson. Iris Davis looked good in the 100.

Mavis Laing, 16, scored a mild upset in winning the 440 over veterans Jarvis Scott, Gwen Norman and Kathy Hammond. Young Mavis, who has been beating these opponents in invitational meets, won the final with a new meet and American record at 52.9 with the rest of the field evenly spaced behind her.

Toussaint and Francie Johnson were close together in the 880 with Terry Hull only a tick behind. Doris Brown, who had not run a step for 18 days until her heat in the 1500 on Friday, found the going too tough in the final as young Francie Larrieu won with a fine 4:20.8s. Continued on Page 2

We are in the process of completing customs forms and shipping instructions for the San Francisco office and the books will be here when I return about mid-September. We will ship them out immediately to all who have ordered and we would like to give a bonus for your waiting - if you will write to us and state you have never had a copy of the 1969 Yearbook, we will send that along with your 1970 book free of charge. Also, for those who have not yet ordered the 1970 book, when you send in your order simply state you would like your free copy of the 1969 edition also and it will be yours. Incidentally, the 1970 Yearbook is well worth waiting for and the information contained will never be out of date!

In a recent discussion with a friendly Russian journalist it was learned that he can write about Chi Cheng's results, he can write she is a student, he can write she lives in California or the USA, but he can NOT write that she is Chinese. With such restrictions on the press, and from the stories told by the athletes who competed in Russia this past summer, can you just imagine what it would have been like in 1976 if the Soviet Union had won the bid to stage the Olympic Games? Such utter confusion would have set a new world record before the Games ever got under way, and the various ruses which they would be forced to use to keep some nations from competing would have been interesting to observe. Congratulations to the IOC for their choice of Montreal!

the Chi Cheng scooted to clockings of 12.8s. That set the stage for Balzer to get back in the act with a sparkling 12.7 where the matter now rests.

200m hurdles - East Germany's Annelise Jahns sped to a 25.8 clocking to tie Pam Kilborn's mark.

4x800 relay - Great Britain with a team of Lillian Board (2:07.0), Rosemary Stirling (2:06.0), Pat Lowe (2:09.8) and Sheila Carey (2:04.2) set the new record of 8:27.0s. Rumor has a race between Great Britain and East Germany this month in London will REALLY bring that mark down.

4x400 relay - The Atoms TC of USA ran 3:41.3 at the USA National Championships with McMillan (57.1), Marshall (56.2), Fitzgerald (54.3) and Toussaint (53.7) doing the honors. This record will probably stand until 1971 when the Atoms will lower it once again.

NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS (Continued)

Mamie Rallins took the meet record winning the 100m hurdles in 13.4 with Patty Johnson close behind in 13.5s. Cheryl Rogers ran afoul of the barriers in the final and had to drop out. Pat Hawkins, who seems to be just about the correct size for the 200m hurdle spacing, exhibited flawless steps to pull away from Patty Johnson down the back straight and win in a wind-aided 26.1, only 0.3 off the world mark.

Carol Frost highlighted the field events by nipping Olga Connolly's discus record by one inch while Sherry Calvert had her lifetime best effort in winning the javelin. Old pro Willye White had no trouble in the long jump and Lynn Graham outlasted Maren Seidler to win the shot.

Tennessee State (440), Mayor Daley (medley) and the Atoms (mile) took the relay marks home with them. Judy Vernon, Ozark TC, placed in three events plus anchoring her club's mile relay team for an outstanding performance and Ohio TC's Laurie Barr and Beth Hutson seemed to be running in every race on all four days of the program!

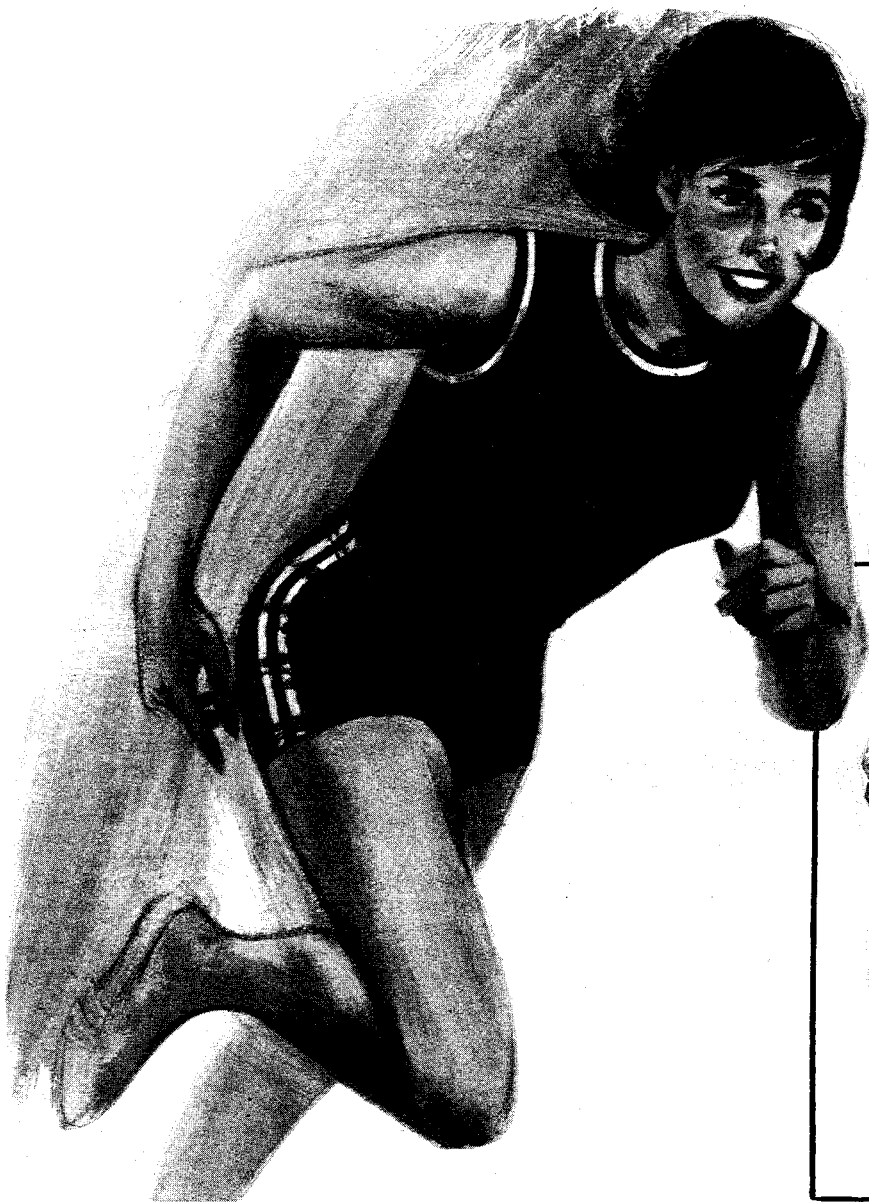

PHOENIX TC GIRL'S CHAMPS

Los Angeles, California, June 30/July 1:-Fred Moore's red clad Phoenix Track Club waltzed off with the team title in the Girl's Division of the USA National AAU Championships scoring 36 points to far outdistance runner-ups Lakewood and the Angels. The Phoenix lassies won three events for 30 of their points - enough to win the title - as Mavis Laing won the 220, Jan Glotzer the hurdles and the 440 yard relay team retained their title in that event.

Three of the 1970 champions also won titles in the women's division three days later, but none in the same event. Laing won the 220 here - the 440 in the women's division. Cheryl Toussaint annexed the 440 in the girl's competition and won the 880 against the women. Likewise Francie Larrieu won the 880 against the young set and the 1500 in the feature division.

Mayor Daley star performer Dianne Kummer was forced out of the finals with an injured ankle. Before her injury she was eliminated in the semi-final of the 220 - making an interesting note on the improvement of the species in the space of a year for Kummer was 5th in last years final in 24.9 yet at UCLA she ran 24.2 and was put out in the semis!

Ohio's Laurie Barr made the final in the 100, 220 and 440 which necessitated nine races in two days. She also romped the 220 in the women's division plus a relay or two. Small wonder she is so thin!

Event with the most depth turned out to be the new 80y hurdles. In the heats, 21 runners clocked 10.9 or better and only 18 made it to the semis. The final saw Glotzer get a break at the start and hold on to win in a very fast 10.1, but the race was wind-aided and therefore the meet record will be Jan's 10.3 made in the semi-final.

One of our favorite people in the competition was pint-sized, scrawney Robin Evans who ran the mile. Robin, aptly named evidently for her size, showed up in something akin to brown bermudas and a white "t" shirt which we are certain hid a pair of suspenders to hold up her trunks. Before the race she looked completely lost - but once the running got under way she was in her glory and galloped in for a 4:59.6 fourth place in the girl's mile then returned to nab a spot in the 1500m final. She didn't score against the veterans in the women's race, but she'll be back. Watch for her.

Carol Thomson was impressive in all of her events and showed fairly good technique in the jump and hurdles. Carol would benefit from more and tougher competition for she seems to have the mental attitude required to stick to the sport.

There were spills in the 880 trials which we hope will lead coaches and meet directors to agree runners should have their own personal lane around that first turn. Kathy Lieneke showed a great amount of determination as she ran in the final after requiring 13 stitches in her knee from being spiked during the fall in her heat.

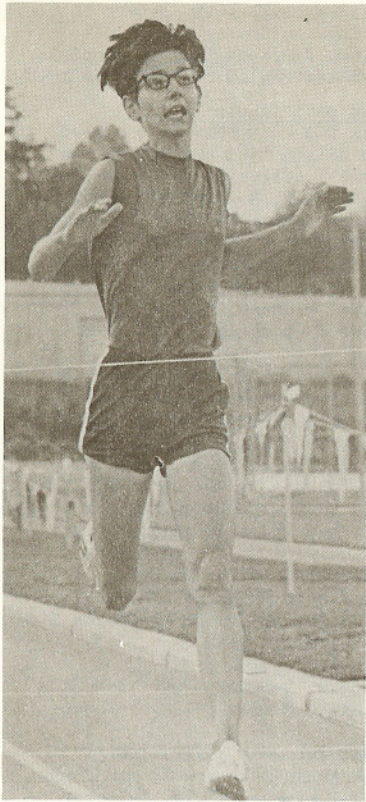

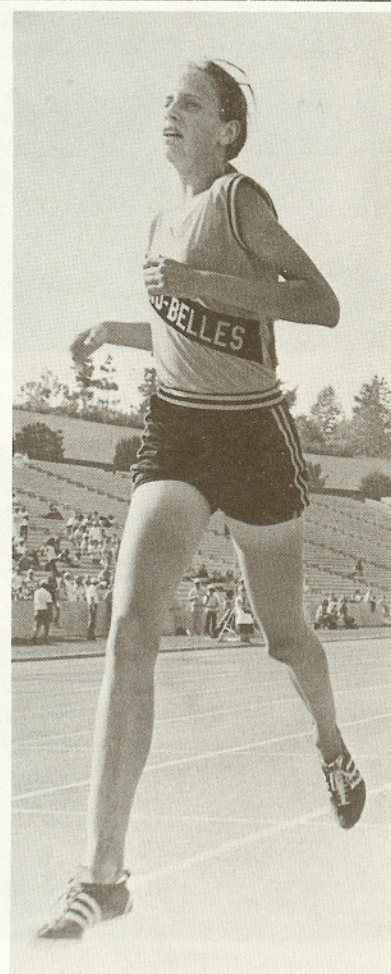

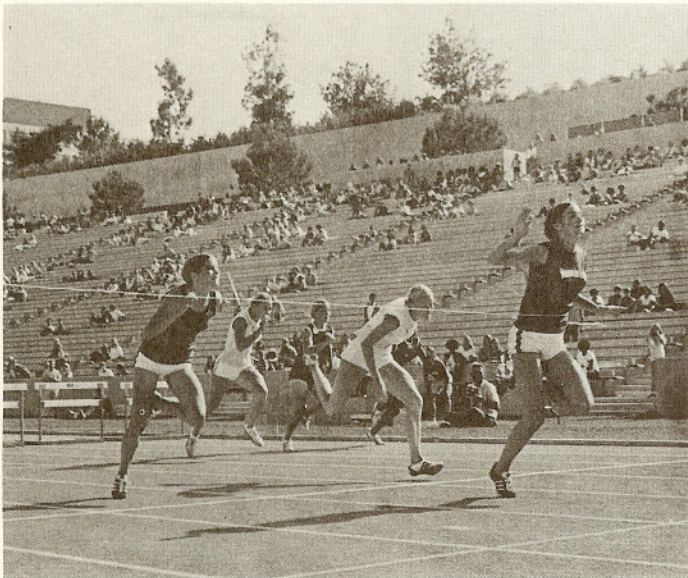

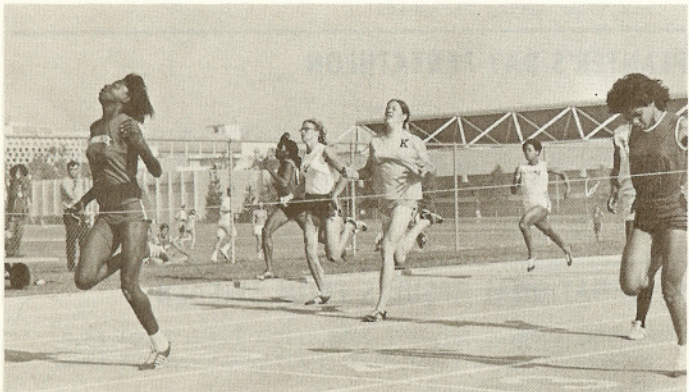

12/13 INVITATIONAL by Calvin Brown

Los Angeles, California, July 2: The Third Annual Track and Field Championships for 12 and 13 year old girls was held this year on July 2. The first two years, the meet was held in San Jose, but this year the National Invitational Meet was held at UCLA in conjunction with the girl's and women's nationals. The UCLA scene was a beautiful one with probably the best tartan track in the United States.

Along with the 12/13 championship event, there were also selected events for the 10/11 division and the 9/under division. Six new national records were established and three more were tied during the days competition. Eleven meet records were broken.

The team title went to the La Mirada Meteors with 44 points followed by the LaMott TC with 34 and the Denver All Stars with 29. A total of 33 teams scored points.

The idea is born to include the 12/13 championship meet along with the national championships for girls and women. If this develops and comes to pass, it will afford the 13 year old girl athletes a chance at competition on the national level and when the same athlete becomes 14, she is eligible for international competition. So, as you can imagine, this national experience will come in handy. Also, the younger athlete can watch and learn from the older, more experienced performers, many of whom are already internationalists.

The meet all but overshadowed the older girls meets. Brooks Johnson, Sports International coach, said that the women's championships would be anti-climactic after the great age group meet. In looking back, I'd have to agree.

As an afterthought, it was suggested a pentathlon should have been included. Perhaps the next meet director in 1971 will include it.

This ends the report of a very fine meet that a lot of people will remember for a long time.

FIGHTING GERMANS OUTCLASS BRITISH by Pozzoli

London, England, July 10/11:—Despite visa difficulties which limited their team to one accredited high jumper, one javelinist and no long jumpers, the magnificent esprit-de-corps of the East Germans gave them the biggest winning margin registered against a British team since 1961.

First Day: 400m: Maximum points to the Germans in an event where the British had expected to hold their own was an ominous start for the home team. Fischer, running with a smooth, relaxed movement beautiful to watch, won easily as the British pair, completely outclassed by the more experienced Germans, fought their own private battle to avoid last place. 1-Helga Fischer (GDR) 53.5, 2-Monika Zehrt (GDR) 54.1, 3-Janette Champion (GB) 54.5, 4-Linda Peck (GB) 54.8. Score, GDR 8, GB 3.

Discus: This proved to be the outstanding event of the meet. Karin Illgen, the statuesque German, shattered Tamara Press' UK record of 193'6 set way back in 1961, (it was a world record then), with her very first throw - 194'7. Gabriele Hinzmann opened with 193'6. Illgen fouled her second throw and Hinzmann landed the plate at 188'11. The third round was a decisive one. Firstly Karin, tuning with apparently little effort but tremendous speed and slickness in the delivery, improved her record to 195'3 and seemed set to win. Gaby thought otherwise and immediately hurled the disk to a fantastic 201'0 to become the third woman in history to surpass the magical 200 feet. The German pair were content to coast through the final three throws. 800m: One of the decisive breakthroughs of the match as the Germans downed the British in one of their specialty events. Pohland led off at the bell in 61.2 from Wieck and although first Lowe and then Carey off the final bend made spirited assaults the issue was never really in doubt. Wieck is a real world class star. 1500m: Here again Germany could not get a visa for their record-holder Karin Burneleit, but still won the event. Clausnitzer led to 300m when Braithwaite took over, passing 400m at 57.6, followed by Hoffmeister. Braithwaite still headed the field at 800m in 2:20.4 with Hoffmeister, Clausnitzer and Page trailing in that order. Page passed Clausnitzer at 1100m, and Hoffmeister, running outside round the 3rd home bend passed Braithwaite to clock 3:29.8 at the 1200m stage. The rest was a procession, with Gunhild pulling steadily away. Page held third and would probably have made second if she had not allowed such a large gap to develop in the early stages. 1-Gunhild Hoffmeister (GDR) 4:18.0, 2-Norine Braithwaite (GB) 4:21.2, 3-Joan Page (GB) 4:22.7, 4-Katja Clausnitzer (GDR) 4:23.6. 4x100m Relay: A tremendous fillip for the British team facing the finest relay squad in Europe. All four ran with verve and determination. Neil closed slightly on Schrickel in the first stage, but it was Critchley who really saved the day for the British when she held the mighty Meissner all along the back straight. Hyman's protege, Val Peat, running with all the fighting spirit of her famous tutor, pulled away by four yards from Podeswa, and Golden was only called upon to hold it against a sluggish Balzer, which she did. 1-Great Britain 44.6, 2-GDR 45.1. High Jump: Rita Schmidt took over the UK record from Yolanda Balas whose 6'0 mark had dated from 1962. And Barbara Inkpen, inexplicably omitted from the English team for the Commonwealth Games, equalled the British record. So much for the red-faced selectors! Their omission of the only British-based jumper capable of world class performances from the Games team had been criticised from the outset. Barbara said, "I just wanted to show them how wrong they were". 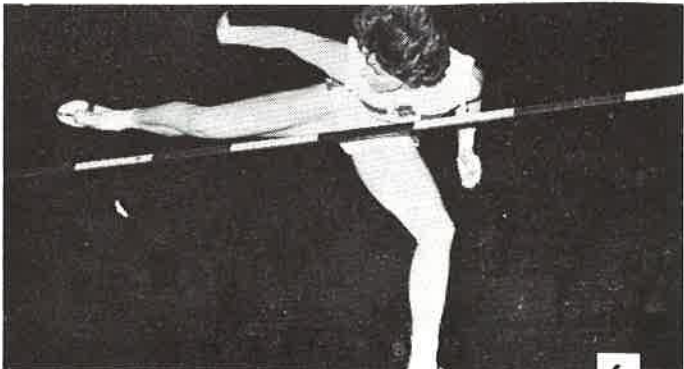

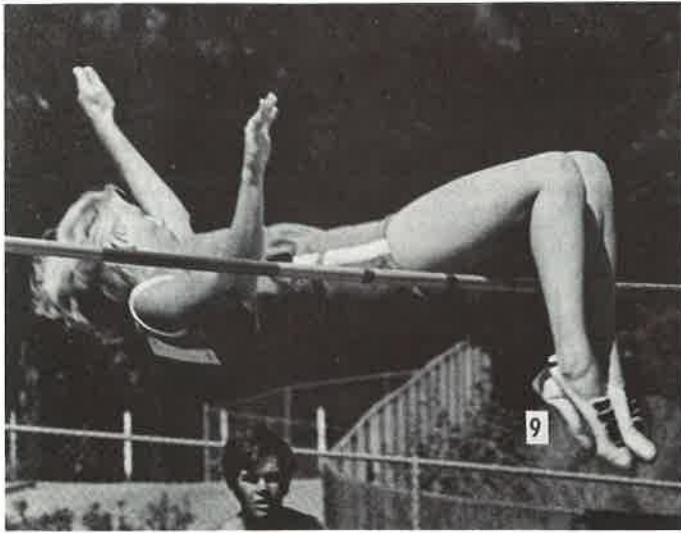

On the first leg Dietsch had cut the stagger by the 200m mark and proceeded to hand over 8 yards up in 53.5. Lohse increased it to 12 yards by the 600m mark and piled on the pressure to pass the baton 15 yards clear in 1:48.2. Tranter held German rival all through and handed over with the 20m gap still unchanged - 2:41.3 for the Germans. WEST GERMANY 82 - USA 53

Stuttgart, West Germany, July 15/16:-In spite of some fine performances on the track, the usual USA weakness in the field events led to an easy 82-53 victory for the West German team here today. The traveling Yankees lagged behind by only four points on the track in spite of the 1-2 sweep by the Germans in the 1500, but on the field the home team scored 1-2 in EVERY event for a maximum score of 40 to 15 for the US.

Mavis Laing, 16 year old Fred Moore coached phenom...and Iris Davis turned in excellent efforts in the 200 and 100 meter sprints scoring the only victories by the US in 23.2 (a new American record) and 11.2s. Laing also was a tick behind the winner in the 400, leading through 399 meters and forcing Germany's Christel Frese, who once lived and competed in the southern California area, to a new West German record of 52.7s. Pat Johnson chased versatile Heide Rosendahl across the line in the 100m hurdles and got a new American record for her efforts at 13.3 as Mamie Rallins lost both the record and the second place medal to the bride from Washington. Cheryl Toussaint and Francie Johnson made a good show in the 800 and the sprint relay team won a narrow victory in 44.4 as the Germans also clocked the same time.

Unfortunately, the meet was telecast live in Germany, and with live coverage much time is available for showing of the field events and with rare exceptions, the American girls simply do not know or have not yet attained correct technique. The field athletes from West Germany are as young a group as can be found in Europe, BUT their ages are 26, 28, 26, 35, 23, 28 and 28 - plus the two high jumpers who come in at 18 and 20. The USA? Well, there's one veteran, and a good one, at 31 years - the others sign the age paper at 20, 18, 20, 16, 19, 21, 17 and 19. As it was once said to Job, "Patience, Man, Patience".

CHI GETS TWO WORLD RECORDS AT MUNICH

Munich, West Germany, July 12: A fine field of athletes were gathered for the Annual Hanns-Braun-Sportfest on a brand new Recortan track - the same surface as will be used for the 1972 Olympic Games - in Munich including world record holders and Olympic champions, but at meet's end it was Chi Cheng who had stolen the plaudits and rightly so as she sped to two world record performances in the 200m dash and 100m hurdles.

Chi opened her days work with a fast hurdle heat winning in a wind-aided 12.9s. One hour later she faced the starter for the 200m sprint pitted against Rita Jahn, the German champion, Esther Shakhmorov, Israel's rising star and other top flight German speedsters - but those who have watched Chi run the turn in a 200 know exactly what happened. Jahn said after the race, "I was shocked! Here I am the champion of my country and I was made to look like I was standing still". Chi's time of 22.4 broke the mark set in the 1968 Olympics by Irena Szewinska of 22.5s. All three watches clocked the same time.

With the 200 performance to buoy her spirits, Chi came back after a 30 minute rest to win the hurdles in 12.8 by a full hurdle spacing as the watches read 12.8-12.8-12.7s.

Other good performances were turned in by Heide Rosendahl who leaped 21'7 $\frac{3}{4}$ to win over Olympic champion and world record holder Viorica Viscopoleanu of Rumania and Liesel Westermann who won the discus with a throw of 193'10 over Lia Manoliu, the 1968 Olympic champion.

An interesting side note of this competition was the use of starting blocks which electrically notified the starter and the crowd - of a false start. The blocks are "plugged in" and if a foot leaves the block before the gun is fired, a loud buzz sounds over the stadium. It is planned to use these blocks at the 1972 Olympics which will ease the minds of all sprinters and hurdlers for they will KNOW no one will get started early.

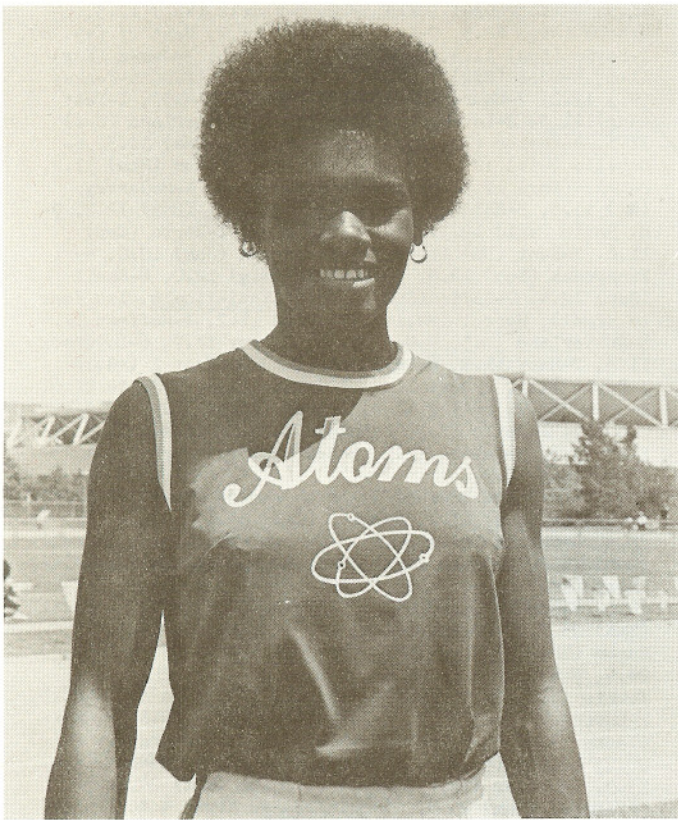

·PORTRAIT OF A CHAMPION - PAT HAWKINS By Luther Blake



PAT HAWKINS

After four years of dedication and hard work, Pat Hawkins began to emerge as a world class athlete at the 1969 National Championships in Dayton where she set an American record in the 200m hurdles. She has been a member of the relay team which established a new world indoor record for the 440 yard relay and was a member of the US International team last year as well as this.

After two years of sprinting with little success, Pat decided to become a hurdler. She went to work with the help of her coaches Bob Wheeler and Fred Thompson. During the indoor season they would train together every night, sometimes until 10 or 11 o'clock. But all the hard work paid off. Near the end of the 1969 indoor season Pat entered her first hurdle race - and won. She was sold on the hurdles from that time on.

Again this winter Pat spent long hours working on the hurdles. And her speed improved - those of you who were at the indoor nationals in Madison Square Garden will remember Pat's brilliant anchor leg of the medley relay when she came from 20 yards behind to win the race for the Atoms.

Outdoors this past season Pat ran 10.5 in the 100 at the Quantico Relays finishing second behind the USA's best 100 sprinter Iris Davis. At the Second Annual National Intercollegiate Championships on May 30, Pat had the greatest day of her career. She had her best-ever 200m hurdles time in 26.7, finished in virtually a dead heat in the 100y in 10.4 and was fourth in the 100m hurdles in 14.2 - three lifetime bests. She scored 22 points alone in this meet.

Pat was born August 24, 1950. She weighs 115 pounds and stands only 5'3. She is a sophomore at Long Island University. Pat Hawkins should be an inspiration to all female athletes showing what dedication and hard work can do.

NEUFVILLE 51.0 HIGHLITES COMMONWEALTH GAMES

Edinburgh, Scotland, hosted the Ninth British Commonwealth Games. Track and field athletics took place in the newly constructed Meadowbank Sports Centre which covers more than 25 acres. The track stadium boasts a Tartan track and a seating capacity for 30000 - and the stadium was filled most days.

Bad weather plagued the athletes with heavy rain and strong winds making it impossible for the athletes to receive credit for their fine performances as the wind was as strong as 8.8 meters per second - equal to nearly 20 miles per hour.

A total of 42 nations was represented in the Games, but only 19 entered competitors in the women's track and field events. Although no scoring was kept officially, England won the women's track title on a 10-8-6-4-2-1 scoring basis with 112 points, nosing out Australia who had 105. Third was Canada with 55 and fourth Scotland with 48. These four countries tallied 320 of the possible 403 - leaving the other 15 nations fighting for the remaining paltry 83 digits.

Feature event of the Games was Marilyn Neufville's fantastic 51 flat 400 meters which set a new world record and stamps her, at age 17, as the athlete of the next decade. Neufville is having problems in connection with her "nationality" - she represented Jamaica, where she was born, in these Games, but will probably run for England, (or is it Great Britain?) in the future. Regardless of her representation, she sped the first 200 in 23.8 and the final 200 in 27.2 to clip seven-tenths of a second off the mark established last year by the two French Mamselles - Duclos and Besson. This also bettered the legendary mark of 51.2 run by the North Korean Kim Sin Dan.

Raelene Boyle won both sprint finals over young 98 pound Alice Annum from Ghana. The times are meaningless for the 100 final was aided by a 12 mile an hour wind and the 200 by a 9 mph breeze.

The 800 and 1500 saw casualties via the fall route. In the two lap final favorite Sheila Carey of England hit the deck after covering about 125 meters and finished last while Sylvia Potts of New Zealand was even more frustrated in the 1500m when she fell at the finish with her head less than a meter from the line - she was leading as she fell but ended up ninth.

Pam Kilborn, Australia, who announced her retirement following the Games, went out in top style as she won the 100m hurdles by five yards over Olympic champion Maureen Caird. Kilborn's time was a fine 13.2 and was run into a 0.3mps headwind. The time was a new British all comers record.

Mary Peters of Northern Ireland annexed two gold medals as she won the shot with a fine toss of 52'3 and the pentathlon with a good score of 5148 - a score bettered only by world record holder Liese Prokop and Heide Rosendahl.

Best mark of the field events was turned in by England's Sheila Sherwood won the long jump with a fine 22'0 1/2 - and she AVERAGED 21'10 1/4, the greatest series of jumps ever recorded. Her series: 21'4 1/2, 22'0 1/2, 21'7, 22'0 1/4, 21'11 and 22'0.

Games Kaleidoscope: Biggest surprise of the 100 trials and semis were the eliminations of Irene Piotrowski, Canada, and Jennifer Lamy....Rosemary Payne, Scotland, won the discus in her third Commonwealth Games - she is now 37. Her husband, Howard Payne, won the hammer throw at these Games. ...She plans to compete through the 1974 Commonwealth Games in New Zealand....Raelene Boyle had one false start charged to her in the 100 final....Another husband-wife double gold medal team was Sheila and John Sherwood in the long jump and 400m hurdles....Boyle, silver medalist at Mexico City, is still only 19.....This is the first medal ever won by Mary Peters in a pentathlon! Four years ago she won the silver medal in the shot put at the Kingston Commonwealth Games, but now at age 31 she weighs in at 161 pounds - 25 pounds less than at Kingston!....

Maeve Kyle, Northern Ireland, qualified for the 400m final with a time of 55.3, her 1970 best - Maeve is in her 42nd year....And her 55.3 is her best since 'way back in 1964....Debbie Brill, Canada, the high jump winner, predicted she will be over 6'6 in a few years....England's Madeline Cobb picked up a silver medal in the 4x100m relay:- it was her first international medal since 1958. (From "Athletics Weekly").

LETTERS From Art Speer, Suffolk AC

"We are hoping you will have a little space for an article (a little publicity) for a young and new team that has made a dent in the world of women's long distance running.

In November 1969, the Suffolk AC "Cinderbellees" a team of less than one year, placed second in the Junior National Cross Country Championships at Toledo, Ohio. This achievement was done without the services of our number three runner, Mrs. Nina Kuscsik who was unable to make the trip. Debbie Trudel, 14, placed 7th in the meet having fallen twice in the mud; and Anita Scandurra, having fallen 4-5 times, lingered at the chute ropes too long feeling exhausted, lost valuable places as she was passed by other athletes in the chute. A hard-earned lesson! Considering the above deficits this rookie team only lost by a single point - a fine performance as most of the girls had never participated in any competition other than a "field day meet" at school's end.

The team, (age range 6-31) has done well and will challenge the best in our St. Louis, Missouri, area this fall. It's too costly to try and win the Junior National out on the west coast.

Anita, Aldo Scandurra's daughter, is a real comer at 880 and 1500. Nina Kuscsik, 31, only turned to running two years ago - formerly a speed skater (ice). Kathy McIntyre, formerly Long Island Mercuresses, and top distance runner a few years ago doing nicely in comeback. Team captain, Nina Fulgencio, 17, placed 2nd on last years squad at the Junior Nationals. Debbie Trudel, 15, the team's top cross country and 3000m runner, who has been bothered by undetermined stomach-associated ailments this month, followed by a sprained ankle, will miss remainder of track this season. These "5" are further backed up by Anne McRae, 14, and Diane Cramer, 14, who both run full 2 miles under 13 minutes. Promising age groupers: Katie Smith, 10, one mile in 5:48; Elyse Egagener, 11, 440 in 66.9 and mile in 5:44; Cathy McCreesh, 12, mile in 5:35. Some mention of the team, especially Debbie Trudel who could use a "psychological" lift would be appreciated."

"Just a few thoughts regarding the Nationals: Track and field facilities - after slogging around in three inches of slag each night here in Dayton, the tartan track at UCLA seemed like something out of a dream. The long jump pit was great and the port-a-pits plentiful. I watched the maintenance men prepare the javlin runway and realized they spent more time in that one job than is spent on our local high school track during the whole season....Living quarters and food - All the gals and chaperones were quite happy and yours truly gained 5 pounds in the week I was there!.... Meet Management - The girl's meet was one of the most exciting meets I've attended, but the women's meet lagged at times and generally wasn't as exciting as the girls meet. The meets ran very smoothly....Attendance - Poor for a national championship....Publicity and coverage - Poor, (at least in the IA Times).....Announcing - Calvin again was quite informative although a bit irritating at times especially about cracks concerning last year's meet at Dayton which had its faults but wasn't all that bad - still he's the best."

"I decided to write this letter so that you and your readers might have a few laughs.

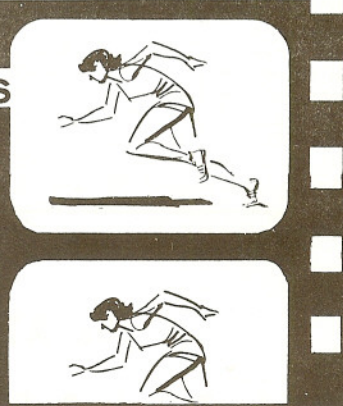
On May 30th I competed in the LaJolla Youth Meet in San Diego/ I was supposed to run the Girl's 880 at 10 o'clock in the morning - but the race didn't go off until 2:00 o'clock in the afternoon! So, after a four hour warm up, we lined up on the starting line. Then the timers realized they didn't have enough watches - which brought about a 10 minute delay while people scurried about finding watches and timers to use the watches. Now we were ready to go - but as we lined up one of the runners, (who shall remain nameless), asked the starter if she could go to the restroom. Well, the starter said "OK, but make it snappy". My competitors and I looked at each other in total disbelief! As long as I live I will never forget THAT race!!!

LETTER from Dick Pollitt, Brooklyn, Iowa

"I have now received 6-8 issues of your magazine and my strongest impression regarding the publication is that the title should include the phrase "Written by and for Californians". Is there no track and field from some of the states which have an interscholastic program? Perhaps I misunderstood the purpose of the magazine; is your primary purpose to cover international T&F news and AAU sponsored activities and to pass over lightly or to ignore other T&F activity within the United States?

I did not realize you were so unfamiliar with T&F activity that you did not know the weight of the shot used (4 kilo) or the hurdle distance run indoors (50y). The hurdle height remains the same - 30".

Girl's track in Iowa has progressed very well from its beginning 9 years ago. While times or distances will very rarely compare with times in sunny California, it must be remembered that 95% of the Iowa girls participate only during the months of March, April and May. Most of the T&F girls come from small high schools and virtually all of them play competitive girls' basketball with a good share of them playing interscholastic softball during the summer.

I have included results of our recent South Iowa Cedar Conference girl's meet. The performances make it probably the most outstanding meet in Iowa outside the State competition.

In the future I sincerely hope that performances in Iowa by Iowans will force you to give us some coverage in WTFW."

Dear Dick: This comes as a blow to ye olde editor who has been the booster not only of interscholastic and inter-collegiate track and field - and especially Iowa - for these past years. There can be no doubt that Iowa - and Texas and Oregon and others - have some fine track and field performers. However, you evidently do not have reporters or postage stamps for most of the results are kept secret. If we receive them, we'll print them. I'm pretty familiar with track and field - competed for 18 years and have coached now for 35 years - but shots come in all sizes from 6# and 8# to 4 kilo - and the weight should be included in the report. As for the hurdle distance some girls can run 50y hurdles in 6.4 while others may take 8-9 seconds - without the distance being included in the report, how can we tell? And the hurdle height should not be necessary since all hurdles should be 33" - but, of course, yours happen to be 30". The fact that Iowa marks seldom compare with the marks in California might very well be due to the fact that your girls compete only in March-April-May. To achieve greatness, this is a year-around sport.

Please forgive me for giving you the needle. We want your reports for all interscholastic meets, all college meets and anything and everything else. But we can't print what we don't receive. You cut to the quick when you intimate WTFW does not boost these high school and college athletes. If you had read those 6-8 issues thoroughly and properly, you'd know one of the projects we are always harping about is more competition for our high school and college tracksters. Let's hear from Iowa and the other 49 States next season. SFVR.

'WTFW YEARBOOK 1970' -

In dealing with women's track and field athletics throughout the world in 1969, this publication is so all-embracing that what is left out can't be worth knowing anyway. Apart from repeated intrusions of Mr. Pozzoli's political views, which have no place in such a publication, I have nothing but admiration for this 320 page work. WEST GERMAN CHAMPIONSHIPS

Berlin, West Germany, August 7/8:-Things went almost according to predictions at the West German Championships - only two real upsets during the two days of competition. Biggest surprise was the win by Margit Bach over Heide Rosendahl in the 100m hurdles to equal the National record at 13.1s. Bach has been the "bridesmaid" all year chasing Rosendahl to the German record and Chi Cheng to the world record and her best performance, timewise, prior to this competition was 13.6s. But she was a clear winner with Rosendahl clocking a good 13.2s. Bach is only 19, runs with good technique and with more speed and experience in the years ahead looms as a real threat for the world mark.

Second upset came in the 200 meters as Elfgard Schittenheim edged defending champion Rita Jahn in 23.6 to 23.7s. Schittenheim also was second in the 100 behind Ingrid Mickler.

The rest of the competition went as planned with Mickler winning the 100, Frese the 400, Janze the 800 in a fine 2:02.8, Tittel the 1500, Rosendahl the long jump, Karen Mack with a mild upset over Renate Gartner in the high jump with her lifetime best at 5'11½ (Karen is now a flopper), and Fuchs, Westermann and Koloska the throws. Brigitte Berendonk was close to Westermann in the discus.

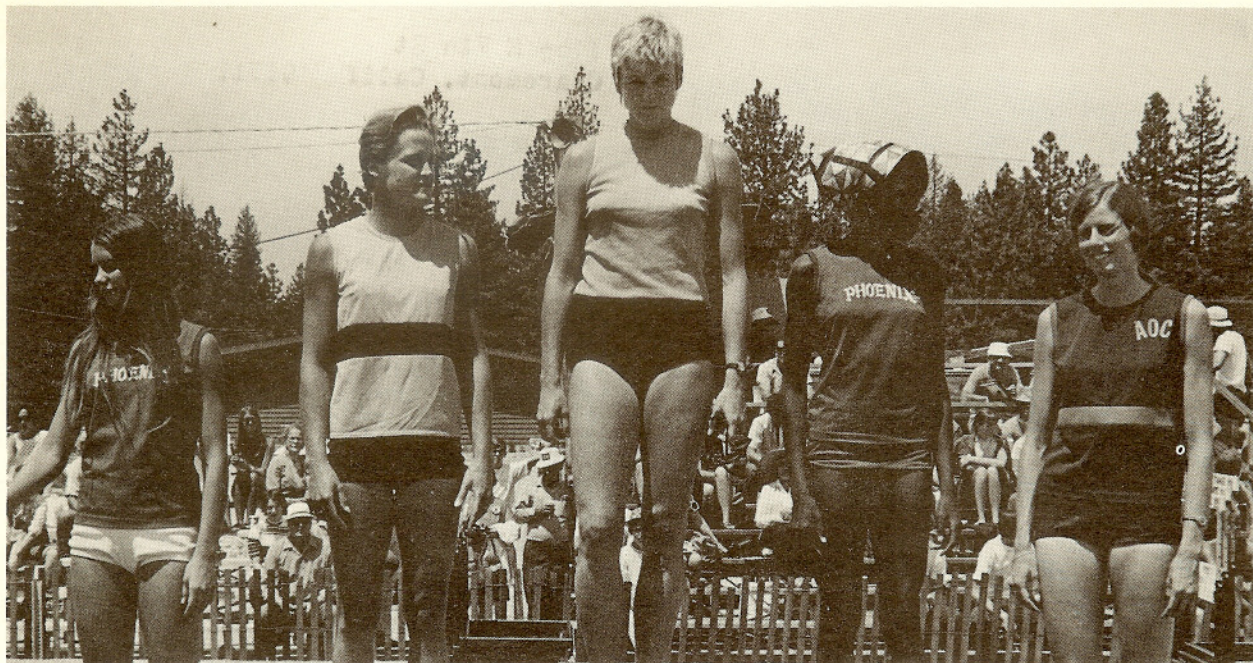

She will be back running next season....Natalie Rocha had an article published in the RUNNER'S WORLD - it was all about the perils of being a spectator....Pam Bagian, best known as a distancer, scooted to clockings of 25.2 and 56.4 on 18 July in the Junior State Championships....The Wolverines set some kind of record in that same meet when they had six high jumpers over five feet....Twelve year old Taanya Irantham of the Ft. Worth Cinderettes ran 11.5 for 100y at an all comers meet in Texas recently....Judy Vernon will spend the next year (again) in jolly old England....

Sue Haden, New Zealand, is a real fighter. After suffering a bad injury, she fought back and placed third in her national championships with a 2:08.4 in the 800m. Shortly after that, she fell through a plate glass door which necessitated several operations and skin grafts on her leg. After all that, she narrowly missed winning a place on the team for the Pan-Pacific Games last year in Tokyo. Watch for her in Munich - if determination and will power mean anything, Sue Haden will be there representing her country....Kaisa and Kirsti Launela are from Finland, not Norway as listed in WTFW.....

Girl with good future appears to be the Seattle Dynamics Mitzi McMillan....this long legged 14 year old performed quite well at the recent National Championships for one so young and the following week travelled to Canada where she proceeded to set three new British Columbia records for Bantam girls with 5'4 in the high jump, 8.7 in the 60y hurdles and 17'4½ in the long jump - plus placing fourth in the 100m in 12.7s....Poland's Irena Szewinska, the 1968 Olympic 200m champion, will run her first competitive races in mid-August after giving birth to her first child.....

One of the most interesting pentathlon competitions in many a year will take place this month when the West German Championships will pit Heide Rosendahl against Olympic champ Ingrid Becker-Mickler. The two have not met since 1968 and interest is quite high in Germany over their duel with both women having their boosters. Rosendahl has the hurdles and probably the long jump, (she has 22'0½ to Mickler's 21'7 this year), while Mickler has the best 200 at 23.7 (she has run three 11.3 100m) although Rosendahl can't be classed as being slow with a 13.1 hurdles time. Mickler should win the shot - which leaves the high jump as the probable deciding factor. American champion Pat Bank will also probably compete as a guest.

Sylvia Potts, the New Zealander who had the misfortune to fall at the 1497 meter mark in the Commonwealth Games 1500m, is another athlete married to her coach, Allan Potts....The Pan American Games will be held in Cali, Colombia next year from July 25 through August 8....Wha' hopen Department: the 100y dash at the Ozark Invitational on April 25 listed the results as Buford 10.6, Daniels 10.7, Thomas 10.7 and Vernon 10.7 - but now comes the official result sheet reading Buford 11.0, Daniels 11.1, Thomas 11.2 and Vernon 11.3????

Scoring the top six places in each event at the usual rate of 10-8-6-4-2-1. it's no contest as the East Germans have nearly three times as many points as their closest competitor, the Soviet Union. Intersting to note, the Russians scored a zero in the track events. Note the monopoly of the East Germans and the Russians in the shot - and Gummel, the Olympic champion from East Germany, is not even listed! East Germany also has a goodly crop of hurdlers - as does Poland. Six of the USA points are tallied by 16 year old Kathy Schmidt in the javelin - and Kathy has not been able to throw since March. Chi Cheng scores 34 points alone to put her country in third place.
