INTRODUCTION

Sports Capital of the World.

That's Los Angeles, City of the Angels (Dodgers, too) ... and the Shrine's annual North-South Football Game and Pageant.

Sponsored by Al Malaikah Shrine Temple, largest in the world, the North-South contest brings together the finest pre-college football players from both ends of California.

The event is held for the benefit of the Los Angeles unit of Shriners Hospitals for Crippled Children and, as a result, its theme is: "Strong Legs Run That Weak Legs May Walk."


The North-South Game and Pageant was originated by Past Potentate Elmer P. Bromley in 1952. He has been its managing director ever since.

The North-South showdown has become a fixture in the date book of sports fans from all over the state and for coaches throughout the country. No other all-star series has furnished such a supply of outstanding performers to the nation's colleges and universities. It has produced seven bonafide All-Americans. In order, they were Hardiman Cureton (UCLA), Paul Wiggin (Stanford), Dick Bass (Pacific), Ted Bates (Oregon State), Chris Buford (Stanford), Ron Hull (UCLA) and Damon Bame (USC.) More than a score of former North-South players have made good in professional football.

Attendance has topped the half-million mark --- 587,385 fans having turned out during the past 12 years for an average of 48,949 per game.

On a few occasions the North-South gridfest has played to larger crowds than San Francisco's college East-West classic, which annually draws about 60,000 fans. In 1957, for example, 85,931 turned out. The following year the crowd count was 65,094.

With benefit contests being staged at regular intervals, this series takes on an even more important aspect in that it has continually shown a higher percentage of net proceeds than any similar event in the area. The margin between costs of presentation and the amount turned over to the hospital is beyond match.

NORTH COACHES' BIOGRAPHIES

(Mort Kaer, Weed)

Mort Kaer, 60, is one of the best known coaches in California thanks to his deeds as an athlete at USC and for his winning ways at Weed during the past 20 years.

A product of Omaha, Neb., Kaer was USC's leading ball carrier in his junior and senior years, 1925 and 1926. Careerwise, he romped and tossed for 41 touchdowns during his three year varsity tenure, thus ranking No. 1 on the Trojans' all-time list for "most touchdowns rushing and passing" and "most touchdowns (36) scored by rushing." All told, he scored 216 points as a USC halfback --- a school record.

Kaer competed in two East-West football games --- for both USC and the San Francisco Olympic Club --- and was a member of the track and field team that represented the United States at Paris, France, in the 1924 Olympic Games.

He started coaching at Weed in 1944 and since that time his teams have compiled a 130-27-7 record. Kaer has never sustained a losing season and his Cougars have won or tied for league championships 17 times.

Kaer and his wife, Vera, have two children (a son and daughter) and four grandchildren (all girls.)

(Vince Tringali, St. Ignatius)


Vince Tringali is a volatile young (35) man who played guard on the great Ollie Matson teams at USF in 1950 and 1951.

He has been St. Ignatius' head coach for only two years, during which time he has posted a 19-0 mark. One poll ranked his club as the best prep team in the country last fall.

Tringali was raised in San Francisco and attended that city's Galileo High. From there he went to College of Marin and USF.

The Wildcats' pilot contributed more than his part to USF's unbeaten and untied 1951 eleven, which produced professional stars like Bob St. Clair, Ed Brown, Gino Marchetti, Dick Stanfel, Joe Scudero, Red Stevens and the late Roy Barni.

Tringali, who resides with his wife, Jean, in San Francisco, will be easy to spot in Memorial Coliseum on July 30 as he "suits up" for all games with a red Alpine hat that has become a combination good-luck charm and trademark.



RESUME OF PAST GAMES

(1964)

A defense which set up the most explosive offense in Shrine game history--- five touchdowns and a safety---was hailed as the main reason behind the South's 41-0 thrashing of the North, before a crowd of 45,527 on July 30, 1964.

The Southerners, individually and collectively, broke 10 game records and tied three others in scoring the most one-sided victory in the 13 year history of the series.

A devastating aerial attack by the South's Carlton Kelley of Manual Arts and Toby Page of Mater Dei, Santa Ana, combined with the hard-nosed, heads-up defensive skills of San Diego Lincoln's Art Smith paved the way for the South.

Earl McCullouch of Long Beach Poly scored a pair of touchdowns, one an 18-yard romp, while Kelley passed for two (10 yards to Ted Parks of Santa Ana and 42 yards to Mike Curtis of Loyola) and ran for another. The final TD came on a 28 yarder from Page to Ron Drake of El Rancho High, Pico Rivera.

Jim Pendleton of Los Angeles and Dick Coury of Mater Dei were the South coaches while the North duties were handled by Vince Tringali (St. Ignatius, San Francisco) and Mort Kaer (Weed High).

Smith, who blocked a punt out of the end zone for a safety, was also instrumental in holding the North to an average of 13.25 yards per punt for eight kicks. The South defensive unit allowed just 26 total net yards.

In completing 20 of 29 passes the South was able to total 407 yards on offense
