CAPTAIN FLINT HANNER of Stanford, who has developed into a phenomenal javelin thrower during the present season. Following the California - Missouri meet last week on California Oval he threw the javelin four times in succession for a distance of more than 205 feet. The present American Intercollegiate record is 194 feet 11 inches, held by Higgins of Chicago. Hanner is expected to break four records today: the American, the American Intercollegiate, the Pacific Coast, and the Stanford-California.



BOB HUTCHISON, Blue and Gold pilot, will compete against the Cardinal for the last time today. After three years on the California Varsity, during which time he has been credited with :9:4 in the hundred and :21:2 in the 220-yard dash, he will be seen in action for the last time on the California Oval today pitted against his old rival, Morris Kirksey, in both dashes.



TRACK

TANFORD and California meet on the cinderpath in Varsity competition today for the twenty-ninth time in the history of the sport at the two colleges, in what is expected to be one of the closest and hardest-fought meets since the 62-60 meet of 1915.

Both teams are composed of a large number of stars who have already made a name for themselves on the cinderpath, and in addition there are a number of others who will have made names for themselves before the day is over.

Coaches Templeton of Stanford, and Christie of California have concentrated their entire efforts on turning out a winning squad this

year, and from present indications, both teams are going into the contest determined to win, or at least let their opponents know they have been in one grand fight.

Completing a successful season without a single defeat, California is going into today's contest in the best of condition. With the exception of Van Sant, Varsity low hurdler, the Bears are free from injuries. Coach "Walt" Christie and Trainer "Cap" Bryan are confident that the Bruin squad will acquit itself creditably in opposition to the Cards and that today's meet will prove to be a successful climax to a victorious season.



"Walt" Christie has handled California track men for 20 years and needs no introduction. Without "Walt" it would be hard to conceive of a California squad. He is a true and loyal Californian.

"Cap" Bryan came to California a little more than a year ago, and promptly won the esteem of every athlete. To his diligent care, Blue and Gold athletes are indebted for their fine physical condition.



TRACK--Continued

Stanford is bringing to California oval today the strongest team that has represented the Cardinals in at least four years, and Coach "Dink" Templeton is expecting his men to give the Bears a drubbing in this meet. To support his expectations, he offers for evidence the number of record-breaking performers that are included in the Stanford squad.

The last two weeks before this meet have been anxious ones for the coaches, track men, and adherents of the rival institutions, and sickness and injuries have almost demoralized the two cinderpath combinations. Two of the most relied upon Stanford stars, Hartranft and Howell, were taken sick with influenza last week and for a time it appeared as though they would be kept out of competition. At the same time, Morris Kirksey, speedy Cardinal sprinter, and Flint Hanner, Cardinal captain and star javelin-thrower, were being bothered by former injuries. The entire quartet, however, are now in the best of condition and are expected to be the backbone of the Cardinal team today.

California was not so fortunate in this respect. While Captain "Bob" Hutchison, who has been ill, has entirely recovered and will compete today, "Mugs" Van Sant again injured the pulled muscle in his leg and it is extremely doubtful whether he will compete today.



GLENN HARTRANFT, know as "Tiny", is Stanford's brightest luminary in the weight events and a fast stepper in the sprints as well. He is entered in the shot put, the discus, and the 100-yard dash. He is expected to break the California Stanford records in both the shot-put and the discus, adding two feet to the shot-put and fifteen feet to the discus records.

TRACK--Continued

Several California-Stanford track and field records are being figured to fall by the wayside in the course of today's events. The first of these which is expected to be smashed is the shot put. "Tiny" Hartranft, the marvel of the 1922 Stanford team, is a firm believer in putting the iron ball out around fifty feet and is confident in his ability to stretch the present mark several feet. In the same way, he is doped to add at least fifteen feet to "Brick" Muller's record made last year in the discus.

Flint Hanner, who has been consistently heaving the javelin over 200 feet, will probably set a new record in this event. If he is able to repeat his performances of practice and throw the spear around 205 feet, he will break four records, the American, the National Intercollegiate, the Pacific Coast, and the Stanford-California marks.

California oval has been put into the best of condition for the clash of the two squads, and the weather is promising for a good day for the meet.

Both coaches have expressed full confidence in their teams, but they feel that it should be fully understood that whichever team wins, there will be no alibis offered.

"May the best team win!"

MILE RUN

The pick of the Stanford and California distance men will oppose each other today in the opening race of the program. Coach "Walt" Christie is sending in three Bruin milers who are able to better 4 minutes 30 seconds in this distance. Denton, Fisk, and Kitts are as good a trio of milers California has had in several years, while Stanford is not so fortunate in this event. The Cards have no man who could be considered the equal of the California entrants, with the possible exception of Elliot, who in previous years ran a fast four laps. He has been out of condition and it is doubtful whether he will be in best form for today's race.




BASEBALL

S A CLIMAX and conclusion of the 1922 baseball season, the California and Stanford Varsities will fight out the last game of their series this afternoon at 3:30 o'clock, on California field.

Interest in the contest is unusually strong, and has been sustained to the very end, due to the fact that each team has taken one game, and because the last one was decided only after a most stubborn resistance. As it now stands, Stanford has beaten California 5-3, and California in turn has defeated Stanford 3-2.

All comparisons, information and indications point toward a good game this afternoon. Prophets are unwilling to say which side will emerge victorious, which is not to be discovered until after the last clouds of battle have blown away.

Leading roles in today's cast of characters will be taken by Guy Draper and George Green, Stanfordites, and Mike Morrow and Dutch Thompson, Californians. These men are respectively, the Cardinal and Bruin batteries, who fought practically an even battle a week ago.

Draper has long held the reputation of being one of the best college hurlers ever turned out on the Coast, and deservedly so. Morrow, until the last few weeks, was considered good, but not exceptional. Working against each other, as they have during the two previous games, the best in each has been brought out, and Morrow has risen to a plane certainly equal to the star Redshirt moundsman.

Green and Thompson have gained fame for their prowess with the bat as the chief consideration, but in addition both are very good all-around men and heady catchers. Some of Thompson's eminence rests upon the fact that he connected for five successive hits, two of which were two-baggers, out of five times at bat in the last Stanford tussle.

Both the Bears and Cardinals will each be in full strength, and prepared to give the most strenuous competition. Stanford's lineup will be absolutely intact; California will be minus one man, George Makin, first-string shortstop and captain-elect of the 1923 Varsity.
