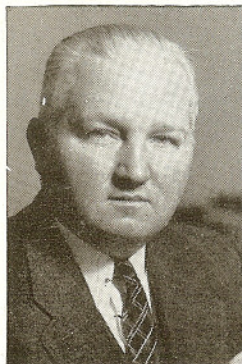

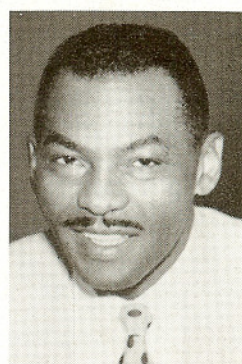

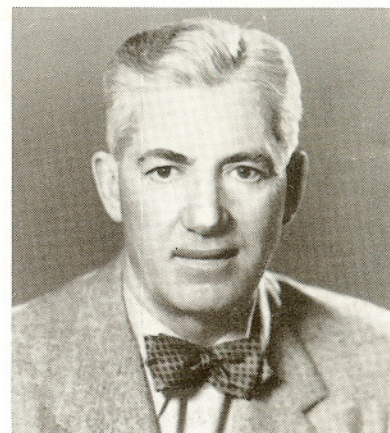

To "*Larry Snyder*" — this program is dedicated . . .

BECAUSE during his lengthy career as track coach, Snyder has acquired national recognition in track. He has been a member of the rules committee and has twice been named on the U.S. Olympic track coaching staff.

BECAUSE since 1925 he has been a member of the coaching staff of Ohio State University. During his career he was an outstanding track performer and set university records in both high and low hurdles, the high jump and the broad jump. He won the Big Ten scholarship medal for combined excellence in scholastic achievement and athletics.



BECAUSE under his guidance seven men have held world records at one time or another. These include Jesse Owens, who held records in the 100- and 220-yard dashes, the 220-yard low hurdles and the broad jump; George Simpson, who at one time held the 100-yard dash mark; Dick Rockaway and Jack Keller, both low hurdle champions; Mel Walker and Dave Albritton, high jump champions, and Mal Whitfield, the 800-meter titlist.

BECAUSE he has contributed many articles for the advancement of track and his name is permanently written on the Helms Foundation Hall of Fame Scroll for his outstanding contribution to track and field.

BECAUSE he coached a team of U.S. track stars which met 5 North European nations in Oslo, Norway in 1949 and because he has been a member of the A.A.U. Track and Field Committee for the past 15 years.

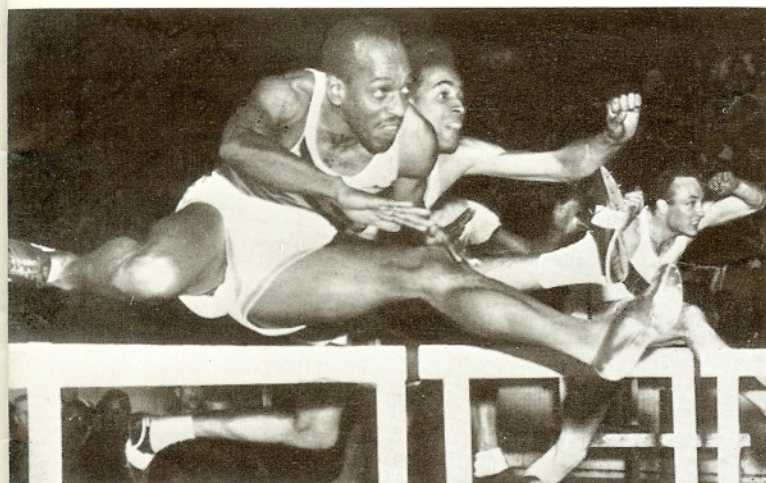

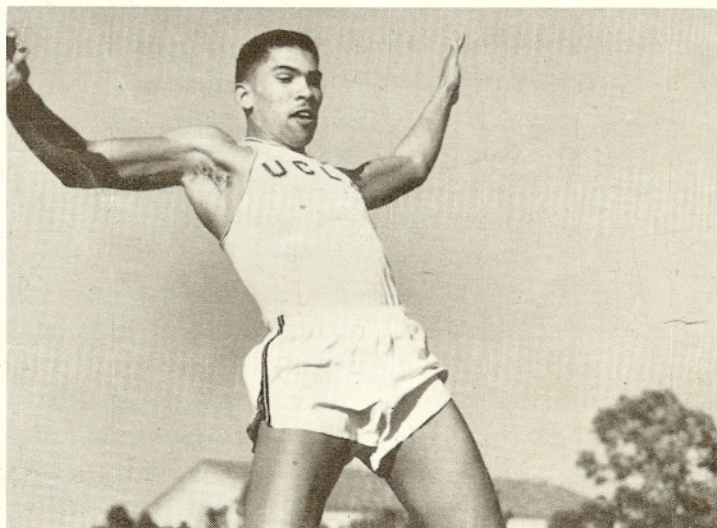
WALTER DAVIS, San Antonio A.C., A.A.U. high jump champion and 1952 Olympic winner.



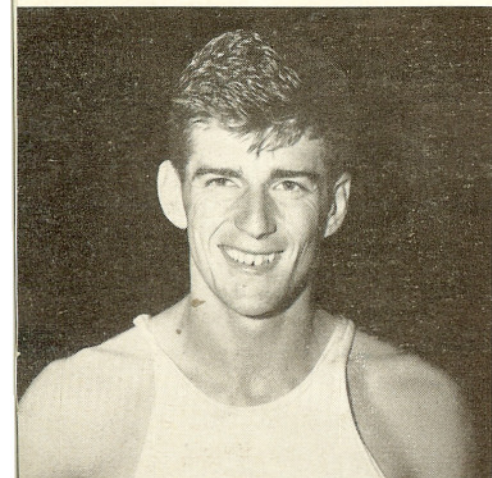
CURTIS STONE, New York A.C., 1952 A.A.U. winner for the 5,000 meter and the 10,000 meter runs.

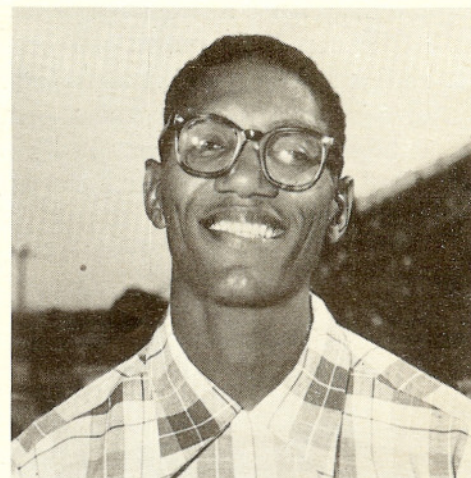
