The Fifth European Track and Field Championships passed to athletic history as one of the greatest spiked-shoe festivals of all time. In terms of great performances these Games were probably second only to the Helsinki Olympies. Three world records were broken and one European record equalled. 31 national records were broken, 7 equalled, and 16 meet and 15 track records shattered."

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

August 9 (Saturday) DEPART NEW YORK Tour assembles in New York, departs in evening via Scandinavian Airlines System economy flight for Bergen, Norway, via Glasgow, Scotland.

August 10 (Sunday) BERGEN Arrive in morning and transfer to hotel in one of Norway's oldest cities (founded in 1070). Afternoon sightseeing drive, noting charming contrasts between colorful medieval houses and modern buildings, spreading up the pine-clad encircling mountains. Featuring St. Mary's Church, the "German Quay" with relics of the Hanseatic League, the Hanseatic Museum, Fish Market, Town Park and Bergen Museum. Ride the funicular railroad to Mount Floien for a fine view of the city and harbor.

JOIN THE EXPERTS

at the European Athletic Championships. Many tour members and guests, as well as the tour sponsors, are recognized authorities in track and field. They, and their many contacts with the Games, will make the meet more enjoyable to you.

August 11 (Monday) FJORDS After leaving Bergen, drive along the Oster Fjord, across the Kvamskogen Mountain Plateau and through the breath-taking Tokagjel Canyon, one of the wildest in Norway. Lunch at Norheimsund, a charming village with an excellent view of the Folgefonn Glacier. Travel the enchanting Hardanger Fjord by steamer to Ulvik, for overnight.

Then through the province of Smaaland, Sweden's central highlands with wide stretches of forests, puddled with twinkling lakes, sweeping clear to the horizon and circling technicolor splotches of small red cottages and farms. Cross the famed Gota Canal twice, and on to Stockholm.

August 19 (Tuesday) to 24 (Sunday) STOCKHOLM and

EUROPEAN ATHLETIC CHAMPIONSHIPS.

Highlight of the Stockholm stay, of course, is the European Athletic Championships. This track and field meet, held every four years with all the ceremony and significance of the Olympic Games, brings together all the great athletes of Europe, both men and women. Held in the historic 1912 Olympic Stadium, the championship finals will be held every afternoon, with trials on five of the six mornings.

Two of the famed and traditional Track & Field News Celebrity Banquets will put you in the company of some of the athletes, coaches and other Games' personalities. By eating and talking with them you get some of the real flavor of this great international sporting event.

Another special opportunity awaits you in Stockholm, for arrangements have been made for tour members to live with private families. You will get to know the Swedes and see how they live, learning more about their country in a week than you could during a month or more in a hotel. However, for those preferring hotel accommodations they can be arranged for a supplementary fee.

EXTENDED TRAVEL

TWO OTHER TRACK TOURS

will go to Europe in 1958 under the sponsorship of Track & Field News. One will take in the quadrennial British Empire Games in Wales, July 18 to 26, and can be combined with this tour. The other is for young men only, preferably track athletes. It will be a 50 day tour of most of Western Europe, will include both big track meets, and will be led by a noted American track coach. August 28 to 30 (Thursday to Saturday) PARIS By air to Paris, glamour and fun capital of the world. The ideal place to conclude a memorable tour, to say au revoir to your newly found friends. ECONOMY CLASS AIR

transportation was to become effective April 1, 1958, subject to government approval. This new class offers a reduced rate (\$113.40 less than Tourist Class on a New York to Europe round trip) and somewhat reduced services.
