

Hurdling S.F. EXAM Pair Star 6/8/58 In NAIA

SAN DIEGO, June 7.—(UPI)—Elias Gilbert and Francis Washington, hurdle specialists from Winston-Salem, N. C., State Teachers, won three events between them and Washington set a new intercollegiate record to highlight the annual NAIA track and field championships tonight.

Occidental of Los Angeles managed to retain the team championship with 93 points. The Washington-Gilbert combination produced 62 points for a second place Winston-Salem finish.

Courtney Wins, S.F. EXAM Sets Meet Mark 6/8/58 In Comeback

PELHAM MANOR (N. Y.), June 7.—(AP)—Olympic 800-meter champion Tom Courtney returned to track after almost a year of inactivity and won the 880-yard handicap run at the New York AC games today in 1:50.7. This lowered his own meet mark set three years ago by a full second.

The former Fordham ace, now a student at Harvard graduate school, showed that he has lost none of the explosive power that carried him to the Olympic title and also the 880-yard world record standard.

The race served as a tune-up for Courtney who will defend his National AAU 880 title in Bakersfield, Calif., June 20-21.

Berkeley Artist S.F. EXAM Wins Walkathon 6/8/58

PETALUMA, June 6.—(AP)—John Dick, 46, a Berkeley artist, won the 16 mile Sonoma to Petaluma walkathon today in 2 hours and 32 minutes.

Dick, a door to door salesman, won the event in 1947 and in 10 tries never failed to finish. Bill Bessa, 23, Petaluma, was second in 2 hours and 36 minutes. Stanley Anderson, 48, Petaluma, finished third.
