TRACK

San Diego State College's track and field squad will use the five-year-old Aztec Oval for its home track this season. Located just west of the football stadium, the track surface is made of decomposed granite on crushed limestone. It is 30 feet wide at the turns and 40 feet wide in the straightaway. The track boasts two, nine-lane, 220-yard straightaways and an eight-lane, 440-yard oval running north and south. Dual high jump and pole vault pits, four broad jump pits, and dual shot and discus rings complete the layout. Bleachers on the west side accommodate 800 fans.

THE COACH

Now beginning his ninth season as head track coach at San Diego State, Charles "Choc" Sportsman is probably looking forward to a season of the kind of work he enjoys best, that of helping youth develop its potential.

Himself the father of two children, a boy and a girl, Choc finds pleasure in working with youngsters in a quiet, determined manner.

However, don't think of him just as a character builder. In his time at State, Sportsman has captured two California Collegiate titles, placed second twice, third three times and fourth twice. His 1952 squad placed second in the national small college championships.

Born in McKinney, Texas, Dec. 6, 1902, Sportsman himself was quite a sprinter while attending North Texas State and earning his BS degree. He obtained his MS at USC.

Sportsman took over as head track and cross country coach at North Texas at the age of 26 and remained there until 1942 before turning to duties in the navy. While at North Texas State for those 13 years, his teams captured eight conference titles, finished second three times and third once.

He has been a member of the NAIA track and field committee since its inception in 1953 and was a member of a 10 man committee selected by the U. S. State Department to set up an athletic program for the army of occupation in 1946.

Other sprinters Don Redlund, Tom Simpson and Bernie Sto-  
zoff have best times of 10.2 this season with Redlund credi-  
ted with a 10.0 in 1955. All will compete in the 100 and 200-  
yard dashes.

Dick Wolfe, Willie Kaufman and Mike Peterson all have  
been timed in under 53.0 for the 440 but may take a back seat  
to Mike Muirhead who has a 50.5 in a practice meet this season.  
Muirhead is regularly an 800-yard performer with a best of 1:57.8.  
His best time this season is 2:01.5, slightly better than Dar-  
rell Sager's 2:02.0.

## THE OUTLOOK

An inexperienced San Diego State track and field squad faces a season honeycombed with some of the nation's finest collegiate and service teams.

Coach Choc Sportsman looks to have a squad fairly strong in the running events but with next to nothing in the way of picking up points in field events.

Freshman Bill Gallaher turned a 4:28.1 mile in an early season workout and should be a threat for points. Gallaher is well ahead of the pace set by miler Jim Hunt who graduated last year after setting a school mark of 4:17.1 for the four-lapper. Hunt ran a 4:35 in his freshman year.

The two-mile run will be handled by Dave Sucec who has a 10:53.8 best so far. Sucec is also a freshman.

Aztec sprinters Don Hedlund, Tom Simpson and Bernie Stolzoff have best times of 10.2 this season with Hedlund credited with a 10.0 in 1955. All will compete in the 100 and 220-yard dashes.

Dick Woolfe, Willie Kaufman and Mike Patterson all have been timed in under 53.0 for the 440 but may take a back seat to Mike Muirhead who has a 50.6 in a practice meet this season. Muirhead is regularly an 880-yard performer with a best of 1:57.8. His best time this season is 2:01.5, slightly better than Darrell Sager's 2:01.8.

In the hurdle events, letterman Jim Weldon looks to be the best chance for points. He improved with every meet as a sophomore last season and could be a real surprise. Gary Smith, a newcomer, may also help out.

That group of runners could score well this season but Sportsman shudders when he looks at his field event entrants.

Pole vaulters Bill Howell and Kon Harrington can only get up to the 12 foot mark on a good day and newcomer John Hogarth hasn't reached 11'6" yet.

In the shot put, Dave Abbott, transfer from San Diego JC, has a 48 foot toss to his credit and might improve but the Staters don't have a discus man with any tosses worth measuring. The same is true of the javelin.

High jumping should see Bob Mitchell and Bob Ott, the latter with a top of 6'1", hold down the job, with Denny Hill trying for the 22 foot mark in the broad jump. Hill is only a freshman. Russ Himmer has gone over 21 feet and might help.

The schedule these men will have to face includes top-ranked USC, second-ranked UCLA, and also University of Arizona and Arizona State Tempe.

Service competition should be amply provided by Camp Pendleton's Marines and the San Diego Naval Training Center, the latter team being the navy's training team for the 1956 Olympic Games.

Don Hedlund

5-10 160 Senior

A letterman sprinter who runs the 100-yard and 220-yard dashes. Has been timed in 09.9 and 21.5 in 1955, has 1956 bests of 10.2 and 23.7.

William Kemper

6-1 170 Freshman

Freshman from local Helix High School will run both 100 and 220. Has 1955 times of 10.0 and 22.5. Has 1956 times of 10.3 and 23.1

Jose Mendiola

5-11 150 Freshman

Newcomer who has shown much promise. Has a 10.3 time in early season run and should be valuable for points with more experience.

Tom Simpson

6-0 160 Freshman

A graduate of Proviso High School in Illinois, Simpson has a 22.5 220-yard time and has a best of 10.0 in the 100. Ran a 10.2 in early trial.

Bernard Stolzoff

5-10 171 Freshman

A June graduate of local Kearny High School, Bernie was a top hurdler but may spend most of his time in the sprints. Has a 10.2 time in the 100-yard dash and a 22.3 in the 220.

Middle Distances (440-880)

William Jennings.

5-10 155 Freshman

Another good freshman, Jennings is a graduate of local Hoover High School. In his first start at the half mile, he ran a creditable 2:04.5.

ATHLETES

William Kaufman

5-9 145 Freshman

Kaufman is a hard worker who graduated from Hoover High School last year. He has a best 440 time of 50.9 in 1955 and has been clocked in 51.9 in his first start this season.

Mike Muirhead

5-11 158 Sophomore

A consistent performer who had a 1:56.9 time last year in the half mile and has already been down to 1:59.9 this season. A good 50.3 440 time in his first time trial in 1956 may prompt Coach Sportsman to drop him to the quarter mile.

Mike Patterson

6-0 165 Sophomore

A quarter mile who has lowered his time considerably since last season. Has times of 51.6 and 51.9 this season.

Darrell Sager

6-3 175 Freshman

A Sweetwater High School graduate, Sager is a freshman who may be the find of the season along with miler Bill Gallaheer. In his first start against collegiate competition, Sager toured the half mile in 1:57.1

Richard Woolfe

6-2 155 Senior

A quarter miler who can also drop the the 220 on occasions. Has a 21.7 time for the 220, and a 50.2 best for the 440. Has 1956 best of 51.3 and 51.4.

Leroy Archibeque

5-11 135 Freshman

Freshman from La Jolla High, Archibeque needs experience, has two-mile best of 11:42.0.

Hollis Barber

5-6 132 Junior

Hard working junior Barber has hopes of entering longer marathons in prep for Olympic Games trials. Works best at two-mile where his best is 9:55.0.

Eddie Cheek

5-7 140 Sophomore

Will run relay and possibly 440. Has 440 best of 52.2 but hasn't had enough competition to be a serious threat yet.

Bill Gallaher

6-0 150 Freshman

Still another graduate of local Hoover High, Gallaher was a prize catch for Coach Sportsman. He was top cross country man and has already run top mile of 4:24.4. A freshman with potential.

Dick Parker

6-0 160 Junior

Cross country team captain and consistent performer on the track squad. Has bests of 2:05 in 880, 4:42 in mile, and 10:27 in two-mile.

Harry Spark

6-4 140 Freshman

Long, lanky miler who hasn't had much experience but is willing to learn. Has best time of 4:56 in high school days in 1951.

David Sucec

5-9 137 Freshman

Junior varsity basketball performer at State after coming from Helix High School, Sucec has top two-mile time of 10:31.5

#### Hurdles

Tom Noon

6-0 160 Senior

A sprinter last season who has switched to hurdles. A 220 low hurdle best of 23.8, has not tried high hurdles with too much success.

Gary Smith

6-3 180 Sophomore

Looks to be no.2 hurdler off early season performances. High hurdles best of 16.0, low hurdle top is 26.8.

Jim Weldon

6-3 165 Sophomore

Appears to be top hurdle man for the Aztecs. Improved with every meet last season. Best 1956 times are 25.9 and 15.3 for low and high hurdles respectively.

High Jump

Ken Holmes

6-0 150 Sophomore

6-1 high jumper, Holmes may also try his luck at pole vaulting where he has a high school best of 11-9.

Sammy Mankins

5-11 145 Sophomore

Has high jump best of 6-1 1/2 in 1955 and should improve as season progresses. His best early season mark is 5-10.

Bob Mitchell

5-11 145 Sophomore

San Diego High graduate, Mitchell has cleared 5-10, is expected to top 6-0.

Robert Ott

5-10 160 Sophomore

Appears to be team's top high jumper. Has gone 6-2 in earlier days but has 1956 best of 6-0. San Diego Junior College transfer.

Denny Hill

5-8 140 Freshman

top notch high school jumper at Hoover, Hill was City Prep League champion. His early season jumps have measured 21-5 1/2 and 21-11 1/2.

6-1 170 Sophomore

A letterman from last season, Himmer will have to extend himself to fullest to pass freshman Hill's efforts. His best try is 21-5 in 1954, has '56 top of 21-3.

Shot Put

Dave Abbott

5-9 175 Sephomore

Big and strong transfer from San Diego JC, Abbott has pushed iron ball past 50-foot mark in JC competition, has it up to 47-6 this season.

Pole Vault

Ron Harrington

5-10 150 Sophomore

May be top vaulter although he has gone only 11-9. Point Loma High grad, he has raised bar up to 11-0 this season.

John Hogarth

5-9 130 Freshman

Helix High graduate who has gone 11-0 but nothing higher. Needs dual meet competition to develop.

Javelin

Don King

6-5 190 Sophomore

Tall and willing to learn, but needs much practice. Has thrown spear to 140 foot mark.

Don White

6-1 180 Sophomore

Probably the top javelin man this season, White will probably reach 150 feet with more work.

SDSC's Aztecs will use Aztec Field, located on the college campus, as the site for their home games this season. Lying aside of the physical education building, the field has been used as the home diamond of the Staters since the 1951 season, when the football stadium was deserted in favor of only the grid sport.

Aztec Field can be classed as a good collegiate baseball field. Measuring 307 feet down the right field line, it provides a good target for left handed batters. Left field extends close to the 400 foot mark while center field is approximately 440 feet from home plate. A wire fence in right field stands 10 feet high, dropping off to about six feet in dead center.

Bleachers behind home plato and along the first base line hold about 200 fans.

There is no admission charge for SDSC home games.

If it looks like his many duties have kept him off the baseball diamond, a look at his record of 333 games won and 171 lost should silence all doubters as to his ability to produce top teams.

Smith is married and spends time relaxing at his home in Coronado, just across the bay from San Diego. He's a man who has to keep on the move, which is one reason why he is a scout for the Brooklyn Dodgers professional baseball organization. Last season he signed Aztec catcher Bill Lachemann to a pro contract.

## THE OUTLOOK

A young but enthusiastic San Diego State baseball team faces a long 40-game schedule this season with less depth and power than the 1955 team in almost every position. However, should a few of the 17 sophomores and four freshmen on the 28-man roster come through as hoped, San Diego stands a good chance to challenge the 22-6 record posted by last season's CCAA runnerup.

Eight lettermen, three of them outfielders, are returning to give the Aztecs a nucleus from which to work. Coach Charlie Smith has letters earners in his pitchers (3), infielders (2), and outfielders.

Top prospect to help the winning ways is 6-6 righthanded pitcher Noel Mickelsen. Mickelsen had an 8-1 record last season and was the mainstay of the pitching corps for the third successive year. Also back to help the mound crew are righthander Ken Bailey and the only lefthander on the squad, Dave Cavallin. Bailey was 2-0 last year while Cavallin was 2-1 and had a brilliant 1.23 earned run average.

Bob Warner returns to the team after a two-year absence and will probably be the front line relief pitcher. Six other candidates for pitching spots will battle for berths until Smith makes his final cut prior to the CCAA opener April 6.

To handle his pitchers, Smith had to convert infielder Doug Harvey to a catching position. Harvey, a .362 hitter last year, will be ahead of backstops Jim Bryant and Art Satorus.

With Harvey behind the plate, only shortstop Dick Warren remains as a letterman infielder. Warren, however, may switch to third base to let Lorenzo Roberts and Jim Pyles battle for the shortstop berth. Both are sophomores, while Warren is a senior who had a .284 batting mark last year.

The outfield is the only spot where Smith can rest a bit. Lettermen Clyde Thomas (.403), Dick Pomeroy (.295), and Jim Beasley (.294), all return to give both speed and power to San Diego's attack. George Cunningham, Tony Roe and George Meulmester are behind this trio.

The schedule will be tougher than last season's and will include more road games. The big problem looks to be finding some capable pitchers to back Mickelsen, Bailey and Cavallin. Also, San Diego has enough righthanded batting strength but the left side swingers are untried.

Both first base candidates, Jerry Smith and Butch Marliani, and second base hopefuls, Gary Andruos and Tom Rink, are underclassmen with no previous varsity experience and constitute the only left handed batters who figure to help the team.

The first month of the season will be mostly experimental, with Smith trying different combinations in an attempt to give the Aztecs another CCAA title.

Broadbent was born in Sulphur, Okla., Feb. 26, 1913, and won his NCAA title while attending the University of Oklahoma while earning his AB degree in physical education. He received an MS degree at the University of Pennsylvania.

Although Frank Scott instructs only the golf team at San Diego State, he is probably seen at more sporting events than any other Aztec coach.

However, Scott is first of all a golf coach. His teams have been among the top links squads in Southern California for the last four years and this season's team should be no exception.

A graduate of Grinnell College where he received his AB degree, Scott was awarded his MA at the University of Michigan and did further studying there.

He is still an active golfer and can be seen showing his boys the finer points of the game almost every afternoon. Long known as a person with a radiant smile, Scott can give you a perfect example when he talks about his Aztec golf team for 1956.

## THE ROSTER

### Marvin Braddock

A senior and the no.1 man on the team. A two-year letterman, Braddock played varsity golf at Point Loma and San Diego High School before coming to State. Best score in a 63 fired on a par 72 course while in the navy. Braddock took individual honors with a 74-73-76--223, in the 1955 California Collegiate Athletic Association tournament.

### Jerry Davee

A former golfer at San Diego High, Davee is giving the game his second try after having to bow out last season because of other interests. A high scoring guard on the junior varsity basketball squad, Jerry could develop if he concentrates on his game.

### Larry Krause

A returnee from last season's squad, Krause will have to be at his best to retian a position on the squad. A graduate of Kearney High, where he learned to golf six years ago, Krause has a best score of 72 on the local Municipal course.

### Fred Mahavier

Another returnee from last season, Mahavier will be used primarily as a topflight reserve. He was a varsity performer last season and could move into a starting berth again this year.

### Walter Matranga

A newcomer, Matranga transferred here from San Diego Junior College. While at JC, he did not participate in meet competition because the school did not field a golf team but he kept active with weekend golfing on local courses.

### Richard Meyer

A senior, Meyer was the sixth man on the team last season and Coach Scott is counting on him for more yoeman duty as a top reserve. A willing worker who has taken strokes off his game because of constant practice.

Don Neal

A three-year letterman, Neal probably ranks with Braddock as the team's outstanding player. At present rated no. 2, Neal was third in individual scores in the CCAA meet last season. Neal started golfing when he was 12 years old, played on the team at his high school in Iowa, and then came to SDSC as a freshman four years ago.

Bob Ott

Currently listed as the no. 3 man on the team, Ott consistently fires in the 70's and can be counted upon for good performances this season.

Richard Posladek

A returnee from last season's team, Posladek has a good chance to nab a starting berth off his experience from tournament and meet play. Another consistent scorer.

Ron Redman

A member of the 3rd place CCAA San Diego State team in 1955, Redman is now the 4th man on the team behind Braddock, Neal and Ott. He fired a 253 for the 54-hole CCAA tournament last year.

Don Rowcliffe

A newcomer, Rowcliffe has shown a willingness to gain the experience he needs before he can make a serious threat to gain a berth on the starting team.

Martin Schroeder

Schroeder scored a 278 in the CCAA tourney last year and may have a first team position if he can cut a few more strokes off his scores.

## GYMNASTICS

Coach Fred Kasch and his gymnasts have dipped into the 1956 season with the largest squad in many years at San Diego State. Twenty-eight men, including ten lettermen, turned out for practices and Kasch didn't hide his pleasure, commenting, "This is about 20 more than we usually get so there must be plenty of interest in gymnastics."

Most of the load in early meets has been handled by Charlie McIntire, three year letterman who can compete in almost any event and score well while doing it.

Other returnees who look good are Forbes Anderson, Gary Albright, Gil Hatter, Dale Muchmore and Mike Rosenberger. Newcomer Bud Mahanay also appears able to pick up points.

In early season competition, three of five Aztecs placed in the UCLA Invitational. McIntire placed third in the parallel bars, fourth in the trampoline and fourth in free exercise. Hatter scored a fourth in the side horse and Mahanay placed sixth in the flying rings.

Highlight of the season looks to be a dual meet with powerful UCLA.
