THE BEST STATE MEET EVER...

Prep Editor, Track and Field News

Avid followers of prep track and field expect performances in the 42nd annual California Interscholastic Federation championships in Stanford Stadium to surpass those of the 1956 meet at Chico. That one, of course, is still talked about as the best prep meet of all time.

Hubie Watson, sprinter from Jordan of Los Angeles, headlines the field for this 42nd state test as he is in search of his fourth and fifth sprint titles. He won the 100 as a soph by upsetting Muir's Mel Clipper, national record holder in the 220, then won both sprints last year at Bakersfield. He has bests of 9.5 and 20.7, but is capable of faster. His biggest triumph came last June when he topped a good field in the Compton Invitational with a 9.6 clocking.

There will be many other standouts in this meet often called the "Olympic Games of Prepdom." Included in the field will be at least four sophomores. This makes the future a rosy one.

You will see today six sprinters who have run 100-yards in 9.6 or better, three who have run 21.0 or better for the 220, eight under 48.7 in the 440, five under 1:55.0 in the 880, three under 4:20 in the mile, and many others who have come close, five under 14.4 in the high hurdles, and six under 19.0 in the lows. Field eventers are almost as impressive. Three preps have surpassed 60-0 in the shot, three are over 175 in the discus, two over 6-6 in the high jump and four others over 6-5, one broad jumper over 24-0 and three just an inch or less away, and eight pole vaulters who have scaled 13-3 or better. There were many others with outstanding marks who failed to qualify.

Meet records in the hurdles (14.1 and 18.9) and the discus (176-1) have been surpassed the past season by athletes competing today, and both sprints marks (9.5 and 20.7) have been tied. These and almost all the others are in jeopardy before the onslaught of these fine preps as they usually perform best in heated competition so typical of the CIF championships.

Jordan of Los Angeles with two sprinters and a relay team figuring to score, and Oakland's Castlemont are top bets for the team crown. However, don't overlook teams from Manual Arts of Los Angeles, San Francisco Poly, Berkeley, E. Bakersfield and Compton. Defending champion Long Beach Poly is not represented this year despite the fact it had a powerful team. When a 20.8 sprinter, a 14.0 and 18.8 hurdler, a 1:55.0 half-miler, and a 1:27.9 relay team fail to qualify, you may get a clearer picture of the class you'll see on the Stanford Stadium track today.

Following is a brief mention of the top athletes by events with best seasonal marks:

SPRINTS— Hubie Watson of Los Angeles Jordan is the defending champion in both dashes and a successful defense would give him five state titles in his career. Only the late Charley Paddock of Pasadena won five crowns, the 100 in the 1916 and 1918, and the 220 in '16, '17 and '18. Watson has done 9.5 and 20.7 this year. Chief opposition could come from his own teammate Johnny Peters. Peters has finished just a step back in most 100-yard dashes and has best times of 9.6 and 21.4. A high place for Peters would boost Jordan's chances for team crown. Other top entrants include Fowler's Bill Cowings (9.6 and 21.0), Menlo-Atherton's Dick Burns (9.7 and 21.2), McClymonds' (Oakland) Charles Patton (9.6), sophomore Forrest Beatty of Glendale Hoover (21.1), Bakersfield's Charles Mannings (9.6), Fontana's John Lacey (9.6 and 20.7) and Lakewood's Tim Russell (9.7).

440— Could be the best race of the day. Ullis Williams of Compton (47.3) boasts fastest clocking for a junior and is unbeaten. Other standouts are Leroy Hurte of Manual Arts (47.7), Ray Saddler of Oakland's Castlemont (48.0), James Tyrone of Los Angeles Jefferson (48.1), Hawaiian Holland of East Bakersfield (48.2) and Rich Shencoop of Los Angeles Fairfax (48.3).

880—Another great race with at least four boys figuring in battle for first place. Jan Underwood of Buena Park (1:52.4) has season's fastest time for nation, but was beaten by Ray Van Asten of Bonita (La Verne) in SCIF finals. Van Asten has done 1:52.9. Robin Ruble of Los Altos (1:53.1) is NCS champ with great promise and Ralph Lee of San Mateo (1:53.7n) is capable of running off with the gold medal. Many others in 1:55.0 range to give this event best class ever with Ron Whitney of Downey (Modesto) a good long shot bet with his 1:54.8.

MILE— North Coast Section champ Harry McCalla of Berkeley is the favorite here, but don't overlook La Habra's Bruce Bess. McCalla did 4:16.1 last week and figures to do better. Bess is only a soph, but has twice run 4:20.5 including last week when he won SCIF crown. His 4:20.5 is best ever by a 10th grader, and he holds the same distinction in the 880 where he's done 1:53.8. Other top runners include two sub 4:20 runners, Palo Alto's Mike Lehner (4:19.2) and Dave Boore of Los Altos (4:17.0). Additional runners, all with good chance to win, are Ben Tucker of San Francisco Poly (4:24.0 and 4:21.0r), junior Mike Thornton of Torrance (4:20.7), Gene Gurule of Artesia (4:21.1n), Robert Johnson of Bakersfield (4:23.5), Dennis Davidson of Sacramento's McClatchy (4:22.6 in state meet last year), and David Doherty of San Pedro (4:23.0) and Danny Howard of Los Angeles Franklin (4:23.2).

HIGH HURDLES— Another tough field with Riverside's Robert Bond (14.0w and 14.1) perhaps the most consistent. Other first place hopefuls include Vallejo's Sid Nickolas (14.2), Fontana's Tony Metoyer (14.0w and 14.3), Pasadena's Walter Butler (14.2), Castlemont's Benny Whitfield (14.4), and Dave Bailey of Los Angeles Cleveland (14.3).

LOW HURDLES—Robert Bond of Riverside won SCIF crown in 18.7, but this event could go to any of a number of competitors. Many observers are high on East Bakersfield's consistent Bill Mackey (18.9), Sid Nickolas of Vallejo (18.8w and 19.1) has many backers. Among the other good runners are Berkeley's MacArthur Lyons (18.9), Leuzinger's James Valmore (18.8), California's (Whittier) Jerry Neathery (18.9), Castlemont's Benny Whitfield (19.1).

POLE VAULT— Unpredictable event but Bob Ely of S.F. Poly (13-6½) is said to have oodles of great potential. Ganessa's (Pomona) Mike Flanagan goes into competition with the season's best (13-8¼) and California's

(Whittier) Jerry Mulkins is next (13-7). Numerous others have cleared 13 ft. Among these are Pittsburg's Don Brockett (13-4½), San Lorenzo's Ken Bowen (13-5½), Los Angeles Hamilton's Terry Cox (13-4), Anaheim's Gary Dow (13-4), and Burlingame's Lee Thompson (13-3).

HIGH JUMP— Late season improvement by many gives this event considerable class though field has no Stubers, Fausts or Nickelberrys. Modesto's Ted Watkins has twice cleared 6-6 and Guy Baumann of Notre Dame (Sherman Oaks) has best of 6-6¼. Other tough competitors include Los Angeles Fremont's Joe Caldwell (6-5½), Lowell's (San Francisco) Bill Carter (6-5), soph Richard Jones of Bakersfield (6-4¾), Dinuba's David Sinner (6-4¾), San Mateo's Terry Llewellyn (6-5 and 6-6 last summer), Oakland's Archie Green (6-5¾) and Willow Glen's improving Roger Olsen (6-4¼).

BROAD JUMP— Compton's Walter Roberts (24-6¼) has been over 24 ft. in three meets and California's only other 24-footer (Glendale's Steve Pirie) failed to qualify. Other top boys in event are Harry Ellis' (Richmond) Tom Cousey (23-11¼), Wasco's Harold Gaston (23-11½) and Chaffey's Max Johnson (23-11).

DISCUS— San Francisco Poly's Alex Darnes (179-7) has best mark in nation but he'll have stiff competition from 1959 state meet runnerup Doug Schoenwetter of Fremont (Sunnyvale) who has done 175-5 and King City junior Don Schmidt (175-2).

SHOT PUT—Three of state's 60-footers will be in field today. Berkeley's Matt Baggett has exceeded 60 ft. on 3 occasions and has been most consistent in late season. He's done 60-11½, but Bellflower's Pat Kelso has best seasonal mark (61-4). Gene Nettleton, representing tiny Atascadero High School, did 60-8¾ to win SCIF crown last week. Longshots include San Mateo's Bob Merlo (59-6), Santa Maria's Dennis Twitchell (59-2) and Cumberley's Don Castle (58-9½). Castle improved his best previous mark by 26" last week, Nettleton by 21¼".

880-RELAY—Team crown could be settled right here as Castlemont of Oakland (1:27.1) and Jordan of Los Angeles figure to battle for first place. Both have potential to crack National and Meet standard set by a quartet from Los Angeles Jefferson in 1956 at 1:25.9. Menlo-Atherton (1:27.4) and Compton (1:27.4) among other threats though latter is missing one of better runners with a leg injury.
