Indians Win by 1 Point

A bunch of Stanford athletes met in the middle of their stadium yesterday, listened to coach Tom Jordan for a few minutes, and then scattered in all directions, cheering and whooping. A few minutes later, the public address announcer

for the Stanford Relays said: "If Stanford wins the final event, the mile relay, and San Jose finishes last; the Indians will win this meet by one point."

And that's exactly the way it turned out.

Jordan's men took command of the mile relay from the opening lap, Cali-

fornia's Dave Archibald shunted San Jose to last with a blistering 45.6 anchor, and Stanford wound up with 96 points to San Jose State's 95 and California's 61.

Jordan has been called one of the great track promoters of the world—and he is—but sometimes

he wakes in the middle of the night and wishes he were better known for his coaching.

"I'm glad to help out by promoting track," said Jordan after the meet, "but my love is coaching and I'm glad to get back to that."

"I called the boys to-

gether just before the mile relay and told them if they wanted to win, they could do it. They were running for the win."

Stanford mile relayists Bob McIntyre, Phil Lamoreaux, Rich Chesarek and Ken Emanuels clocked 3:12.8 for the crucial victory.

The fourth annual Relays were well contested most of the way, with six meet records being set and two equalled.

San Jose's Dwight Middleton, who was running in his second 440 and fourth gruelling race of the day, had no real chance to whip Archibald for the vital mile-relay points after losing five yards on the baton pass.

There are few men alive—if any—who could have caught the flying Archibald in this race, even when fresh.

Earlier, Middleton, who also ran a 110-yard leg, ran a brilliant anchor on the 880-relay team to just miss catching Stanford's Larry Questad.

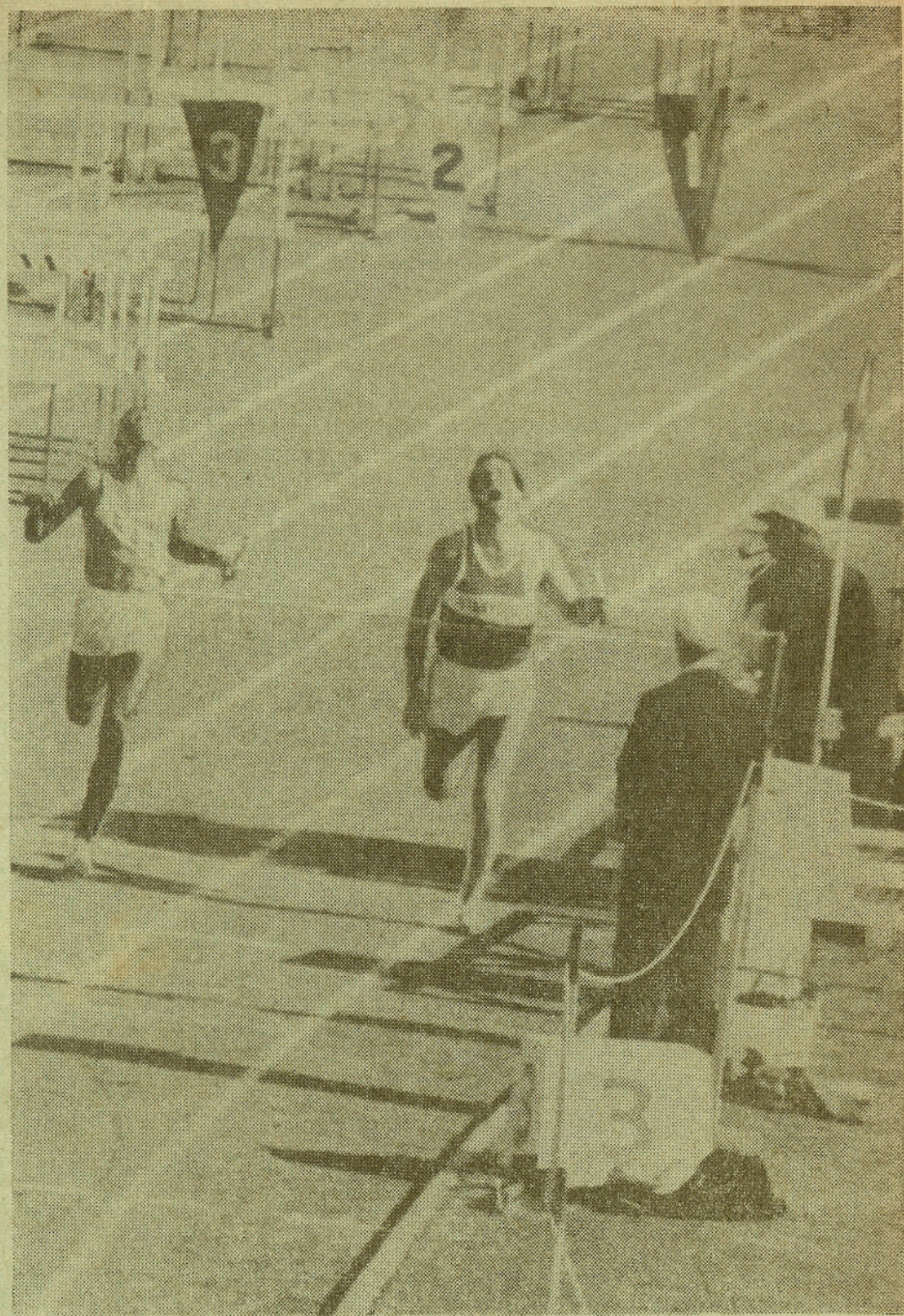
