California was a stunning winner of the muddled race, but the officials then ruled that New Mexico and Fresno State should have a two team runoff with the final placing being decided on basis of times from both races.

That turned out to be New Mexico in 40.4 seconds with Fresno second in 40.7.

5—The junior collegians went absolutely berserk.

Travis Williams of Contra Costa roared a 100 qualifying race in 9.3 to crack Willie White's 1957 national jaycee record when Willie, later of California, was at L.A. Harbor.

Then, in rapid fire fashion, American River, in the distance medley relay (9:53.4), Mike Lovera of Citrus in the pole vault (15 3/4) and Santa Ana in the 2 mile relay (7:32.7) also rewrote U.S. standards.

Bob Greenwood of San Bernardino Valley tied one when he did 14 seconds flat in a high hurdle qualifying flight.

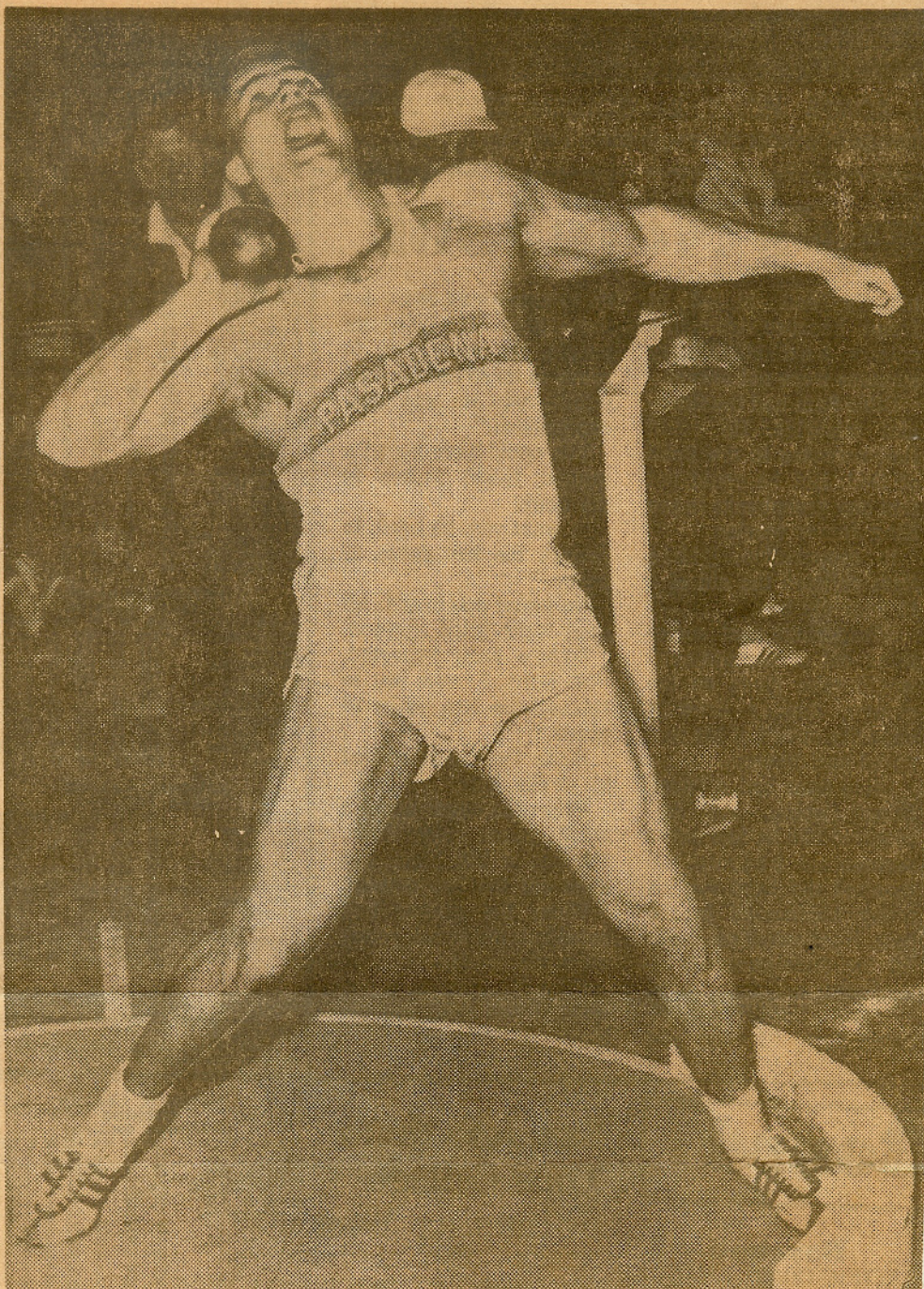

fault of their own. referee Bill Russell ordered the race to be re-run later in the evening.

The re-run involved only New Mexico and Fresno. Although Newman made up a lot of ground on his second leg, New Mexico clocked a relays record of 40.4 to win.

Oregon State's Morgan Groth, from Alhambra High of Martinez, and Stanford's Paul Schlicke staged a tremendous battle on the mile anchor of the distance medley. Groth, a great runner with a world-class kick, busted loose in the middle of the backstretch, but the game Schlicke stayed with him, leg and leg, until the turn. Groth jumped ahead on the turn and hit the tape first in 9:42.1.

Just after the finish, Schlicke turned to Groth, did not shake his hand, and according to bystanders at the finish line, said "You unmentionable."

Shortly after that, Groth, who had been disqualified in the dual meet with Oregon a week ago, was called again for cutting in on the Stanford man with a mere foot of clearance instead of the required two strides.

Both teams ran fine races. The Stanford clockings were Ken Fraser, 48.6 440; Bill Pratt, 1:50.7 880; Harlan Andrews, 2:57.3 1320; and Schlicke, who let down some after being fouled, 4:06.5 for the mile.

Grother, one of America's finest young prospects but injured much of the year, clocked a 4:04.9 and his last lap was 56.4.

But back to the shot put. Long, who has a world mark of 65-11 1/4 pending, suffered an injury to just two weeks ago when 200 pounds of plates dropped on his foot and did not take his last three throws last night. His sequence was 65-3, 66-7 1/4, 64-11 and three passes.

Sprinter Newman has been a hard-luck athlete for most of his life. As a junior in high school he was stricken with the serious valley fever, his temperature soaring to 105, thus causing much of his hair to fall out.

He was a victim of sore legs all through high school and junior college — never competing in a State prep meet and placing third as a freshman in JC in the only championship meet of his career.

Fresno State coach Cornelius Warmerdam put Darel on a weight program for his legs. His legs are now of abnormal size for his 5-9 and 151 pounds, and he has had no trouble this season.

After winning the 100 fi-

nal and before the first relay leg, Newman went to the turf with his behind high and his head down, the victim of nerves and stomach cramps.

"I was keyed up for these races more than at any time in my life," he said. "Yes, my stomach was tight and I felt sick."

He said he was looking forward to meeting Robert Hayes, who has run 9.1 several times but whose application for a world record was not allowed at the last meeting.

Newman has tremendous respect for Hayes and called him the world's fastest human, but said he was misunderstood earlier when quoted as having got an unfair start in Los Angeles indoor race in which he beat Hayes.

"My start was fair but some others may have gotten a jump."

California's crack mile relay team scooted to a 3:08.9, well under the Relays record of 3:10, as Forrest Beaty opened with a 47.2, followed by Al Courchesne 48.0, Dave Fishback 47.6 and Dave Archibald 46.1. The California fliers opened such a tremendous lead it appeared they were alone in the race.

San Jose's two-mile team, despite the illness of Jim Grothoff, won the race in 7:22, cracking the relays mark of 7:23.4. The Spartan splits were Mike Gibeau 1:53.8, Ben Tucker 1:48.8 and John Garrison 1:48.4.

The meet had a Bay Area tinge at all levels. McClymonds' James Hines, who tied the national interscholastic record of 9.4 Friday, was voted the outstanding prep, Contra Costa's Travis Williams, who ran 9.3 in a trial for a national JC record, was outstanding junior college competitor, and Oakland City College scored 29 points to take the team title.

San Jose State survived a rugged team battle to edge Stanford, 34-33, and USC's winning streak at 18 in a row. The Trojans, who had won 30 out of 37 West Coast Relays titles, were victimized by injuries in this meet and also held back some stars in anticipation of championship meets to come.

Fresno State, which had a good chance, withdrew from the 880 relay because Newman had already competed in three and a half races and the other Bulldog sprinters were also tired from the night's work.

In all, a total of 33 Relays records were set or tied in the three divisions of one

of the best meets in the 38-year history of this event.

# Compton Outshines All Relays

Claim to the title as "Home of the Greatest Relays" in '64 has gone south once more.

After a three-year reign, the California Relays at Modesto have yielded to the Compton Invitational as producer of the most superior clockings, distances and heights on The Examiner's comparison chart.

Compton, the last of nine major track and field carnivals included in the mythical competition, provided top figures in six of 17 common events.

That was two more than accumulated by the West Coast Relays at Fresno. Modesto followed with the lead in three events and a tie for a fourth.

Oddly, it was Compton which last interrupted Modesto's supremacy. That was in 1960.

The chart left no doubt that California fans were privileged to watch the best track classics anywhere in the United States.

Compton, Fresno, Modesto, Mt. San Antonio and the L. A. Coliseum Invitational didn't leave so much as a morsel for such out-of-state

# Long Explodes Shot Put 66ft. 7¼in.

FRESNO — Dallas Long celebrated the recent birth of a second daughter by smashing his world shot-put record into little pieces at the West Coast Relays here Saturday night. And with a sore foot yet.

Making his first competitive appearance since a 200-pound gym weight fell on his left foot, April 28, the 23-year-old USC dental student did 66 ft. 7¼ in. on his second effort, thereby adding 7¾ in. to his pending world mark.

## Felt in Mood

Earlier this year, Dallas got off a put of 65-11½, bettering his 65-10½ of 1962, which is the listed world record.

On the way here, the 250-pound strongman, who now represents the Pasadena Athletic Assn., said his foot still ached, but that he felt in a mood "to

throw some, anyhow."

He proceeded to go 65-3, 66-7¼ and 64-11, then passed up his last three chances because of the Coliseum Relays coming up Friday evening.

Meet referee Cap Haralson reported that Long's shot actually weighed a fraction of an ounce more than the 16-pound minimum and that the landing area was higher than

the ring level. The ring does not have the raised rim required by international rules, but Haralson said records made from this type of ring have been accepted in the past.

This was by no means, though, completely a Dallas Long show.

Darel Newman of Fresno State tied the listed world record of 9.2 in the 100-yd. dash (Bob Hayes

of Florida A. & M. however, has several 9.1s, performances pending for recognition).

Charley Craig, also representing Fresno State, shattered the national intercollegiate triple jump record with a multiple hop of 52 ft. 4 in., yet finished only second when Darrell Horn of the Air Force went 52-4¼.

## Perfect Weather

New national junior college marks materialized when American River ran the distance medley relay in 9:53.4, Santa Ana the two-mile relay in 7:32.7 and Travis Williams of Contra Costa did 9.3 in a heat of the 100 and George Greenwood of San Bernardino equalled the 120 hurdles standard of 14 flat in capturing a preliminary race.
