

KENTUCKY LAD ROMPS IN 440 BY AL WOLF

San Diego State won team honors, while Jim Kemp of Kentucky State turned in the most impressive individual performance as NCAA college divis NCAA college division track and field champion-ships closed Saturday at Ve-terans Mémorial Stadium in Long Beach. the

The Aztecs scored 67 points, with Luther College of Decorah, Ia., second at 46 and Cal Poly of San Luis Obispo third at 45½.

Kemp, a 20-year-old sophomore at the Frankfort, Ky., school winned off a 46.1 quar-

school, ripped off a 46.1 quar-ter to erase the meet ter to erase the meet record of 46.6 he set in the trials Friday and equal the year's fastest clocking anywhere. Ulis Williams of Arizona State and Theron Lewis of Southern attained that clocking earlier in the season.

proceeded to shatter the national interscholastic 4-mile relay mark of 17:42. The combine of Don Bowler, Jim Romaine, Mike Kearns and Dave Saylcally did 17:41.2.

Joining Kemp in the meet mark category were Lee Johnson of Redlands, who

put the shot 57 feet 4 inches to erase his 57-3 of last year, and Ben Laville of Cal Poly SLO, who upped the javelin standard from 223-9 to 235-9.

Tate Keeps Busy

Norm Tate of North Carolina College won two events and scored in two others Saturday. He took the long jump with 24-10, the triple jump with 51-7 1/4, finished fourth in the 220 and fifth in

the 100.

Darel Newman of Fresno State repeated in the 100, leading all the way to edge Ed Roberts of North Carolina College by a foot in 9.5. Roberts boomeranged to cap-ture the 220 in 20.6 (New-man wasn't in it) though bucking a headwind down the stretch.

All athletes who finished in the first six became eligi-ble for the NCAA University championships at Berkeley next weekend — providing next weekend — providing they have met minimum qua-lifying requirements some-time during the season.
