TRACK AND FIELD

In 1968 California will celebrate its centenni. The oldest of the nine University campuses Cal's growth from its founding days as Contra Costa Academy places it foremost among state Universities in the United States and one of the honored institutions of higher learning in the world.

There is little doubt but that California is the most stimulating and exciting campus in the U.S.

A University's greatness is nominally measured by what its graduates accomplish and Berkeley alumni have carved memorable achievements in virtually every area of human endeavor. Their contributions to society have been made in every field, the arts, the sciences, literature, politics and governmental service, business, law, etc.

The world is aware of what Berkeley graduates have achieved, and the excellence of the Cal faculty is known throughout. What is not as generally known is that which the present California student and recent graduate are contributing to the community nearby and to society.

Below is just a brief resume of some of the activities Cal students are participating in, voluntarily, under ASUC, University, in some cases Federal sponsorship, and just plain on their own.

Many California students assist local grade school, junior high school and high schools. This assistance comes in the form of tutoring, of forming extra curricular club activities such as "science clubs," etc. A tutorial system has been set up whereby Cal students, working through local schools, use Church facilities in the East Bay to help culturally deprived youngsters and to provide motivation and encourage interest.

More than 10,000 Berkeley students raise funds yearly to send underprivileged children to CAL CAMP, the ASUC-sponsored and student-staffed summer camp on the Gualala River. Funds totalling \$9500 were raised to send 200 youngsters to this camp just this past summer.

Berkeley has provided more volunteers for VISTA, the domestic peace corps, than any other school in the U.S., and has nearly double the number of people from any other school serving with the PEACE CORPS. 550 Californians are now in or have served with the Corps and an additional 550 Cal students took the organization's test this past year.

Over 400 Cal students volunteer yearly to work in the SCHOOL RESOURCE VOLUNTEERS project supplementing the work of Berkeley teachers with underprivileged youngsters.

For years Cal students have maintained a large role locally in the BIG BROTHER PROGRAM, working with the Juvenile Bureau of the Berkeley Police Dept. to reach needy youngsters in this area.

Last year \$5000 was raised by Cal students to aid students in foreign lands through the WORLD UNIVERSITY SERVICE by providing books, equipment and scholarships.

Last summer a number of students from Cal worked on project AMIGOS ANONYMOUS in Mexico to improve conditions in poverty stricken areas.

The incidents of contributions of time and money by Cal students are much more numerous than those listed above and could never be fully tabulated anywhere. This deserves to be the image of the student at the University of California, Berkeley.

THE STAFF

GEORGE WOLFMAN
HEAD COACH

Starting his 13th season as California's head baseball coach, Wolfman's Bear teams have won 64.4 per cent of their games—308-170. Under Wolfman, Cal has won or tied three CIBA championships (1966 last year for CIBA) and winning the NCAA District 8 title and NCAA national championship in 1957.

After the '57 season, a 35-10 year, Wolfman was named "Collegiate Coach of the Year." California won all five games in the collegiate World Series, scoring 30 runs and giving up just three. The Bears shut out three of their five opponents, including the 1-0 final over Penn State.

Now 55 years old, Wolfman captained the Bear varsity in 1933, his senior year, and led the team to the CIBA championship. George handled the catching duties as a player. Immediately after graduation in 1933 George signed a professional contract and caught for the Mission Reds of the Pacific Coast League in 1934 and 1935. In 1936 he quit the Missions to become baseball coach at Mission High School in San Francisco. He remained there until 1953, except for a four-year hitch in the Navy (1942-46) where he was discharged as a lieutenant commander. In 11 seasons at Mission High, Wolfman's teams never finished out of the first division and won five city titles.

In 1954, George came back home to Berkeley to serve one year as Clint Evans' assistant and succeeded him as head coach in 1955 when Clint was retired by the University. George has rolled up an impressive record ever since.

In Wolfman's 12-year stint at Cal the Bears have claimed seven All-Americans, the latest being Bill Frost, Cal's record-breaking pitcher last year.

George and his wife Jean have three sons, Ronald, Tommy and Richard.

**DOUG WEISS
ASSISTANT COACH**

Still the winningest pitcher in California baseball history, Doug is in his first year as assistant coach at his alma mater. Weiss, 31, also holds the dual role of being an Administrative Assistant to Athletic Director Pete Newell.

In pitching for California from 1955 to 1957, Weiss won 31 games and lost 12. He was co-captain of the 1957 national championship team, the last NCAA baseball title team at Cal and recorded a 14-4 record that season. Doug earned All-American acclaim following the '57 campaign. His 31 career wins and 14 season victories are still Cal records and he holds several other Bear marks, including most career strikeouts, 275.

Following his graduation from Cal, Doug signed a professional contract with the New York Yankees and spent four years in the Yankee farm system. He played in the Cal-State League, Texas League, Eastern League and International League during his four-year pro stint.

In 1961 he returned to California and acted as a student assistant in baseball while completing his masters degree.

Since 1962 he has been baseball coach at San Jose City College. In his five years at SJCC his teams won 104 games, lost 39 and won three conference championships.

Doug and his wife, Janet, have two children—Dana, 5, and Kurt, 3.

**JERRY McCARN
FROSH COACH**

This will be Jerry's first season with the Cal frosh as he spent the past two campaigns working as JV coach and George Wolfman's varsity assistant.

Jerry, 24, played two years at Santa Rosa JC before moving to Cal. Jerry started at shortstop in 1963 as a junior and moved to second base for his senior year. A 1965 graduate, he majored in Physical Education and was an honor student and member of Phi Beta Kappa. He received his M.A. degree last year and is presently working toward a doctorate in education.

This past summer Jerry coached the Mendocino Braves semi-pro team to a second-place State finish.

1967 OUTLOOK

With a roster loaded with experience, indications are California will be going through a rebuilding year in 1967. After posting an outstanding 32-14 season last year, graduation and professional signings cut deep into the '67 roster. All told, five members of the '66 club inked professional baseball contracts, four of which still had eligibility left at Cal.

The signings cost the Bears probably the best one-two pitching punch in the nation as Bill Frost and Andy Messersmith, two junior righthanders, signed. Frost, All-American last year, had a 12-3 record and set school records with 169 strikeouts and a 1.12 ERA and also hurling a no-hitter over UOP, including 18 strikeouts in the no-hit contest. Messersmith, an All-American the year before, had an 8-5 mark last season.

Also, Cal will be minus the services of heavy hitting outfielders Ted Parks (.283) and Roger Stevens (.259 and .400 in CIBA), both sophomores, who inked pro pacts. The fifth member of the Bears who signed was senior Rich Nye, the third member of the big three pitching staff. Nye later hurled for the Chicago Cubs toward the end of the National League season.

Although the Bears return 10 lettermen, only three were starters in '66. Outfielder **Rick Brown**, Cal's leading hitter at .323 last year, returns as does smooth second sacker **Bob Leatherwood**, an All-CIBA pick as a sophomore last year, and light-hitting catcher **Tony Fattarsi**.

Cal should be adequate defensively this season, however, pitching and hitting will be question marks.

CATCHING—Two lettermen return at this spot with last year's starter **Tony Fattarsi** (.128) back along with his backup man **Frank Smith** (.278). Fattarsi is rated an outstanding receiver but so far appears to be a weak hitter. Smith or non-letterman senior **Ben Traverso** would undoubtedly supply more hitting, however, the defense would fall off. Overall: the catching should be adequate.

PITCHING—Only one letterman returns to the staff, senior righthander **Hollon Bridges** (3-1, 2.04 ERA). Only two other hurlers on the staff saw action at all last season. **Jerry Luzar**, senior righthander, had a 3-1 record but only pitched 17½ innings, while **Steve Lewis**, junior righthander, appeared in five innings. Pitching definitely is the question mark of the current Bear club. JC transfer **Harry Morse**, junior righthander, is being counted on to pick up the slack. **Dave Aldrich**, **Bob Fancher** and **Tom McAlone**, righthanders, up from the frosh club could help. Also, sophomore **Bruce Roberts** (7-3 on '65 frosh club) is a possibility. Overall: inexperienced and big question mark on club.

INFIELD—The right side of the infield should be the Bears' strongest area this year. Junior **Bob Leatherwood** (.285) returns at second base where he was an All-CIBA pick as a soph. At first base transfer **Sandy Ingersoll** or reserve **Steve Smith**, two-year vet, who hit .357 last year should be adequate. Shortstop and third base are question marks. **Gary Coburn** (.200) lettered last year at third. However, a bad back may force him to quit. Either reserve **Don Bunch** or sophomore **Dennis Dalton** (.310 on frosh) will likely handle the shortstop duties. Overall: defense should be adequate and outside of Leatherwood hitting is questionable.

OUTFIELD—Club's leading hitter in **Rick Brown** (.323) returns to center field and he should anchor a strong middle defense for Cal. Senior **George Cate** hit .326 in part-time duty. The only other outfielder with experience is **Gale Newman**, a senior who lettered as a sophomore but failed to letter last season and hit .211 as a reserve. Sophomore transfer **Jim Magnuson** (Diablo Valley) and sophomore **Eric French** (broken leg as frosh) could earn starting berths. Overall: average as Brown only established player.

RODGER GRAY—6-0, 185, 19, Sophomore

Played left field for the frosh last year and hit .264 . . . Will likely have tough time breaking into lineup this year . . . Bats and throws right.

FRANK SMITH—5-10, 178, 20, Junior

One-year letterman . . . Hit .278 as reserve catcher last year . . . Nickname "Owl" . . . With improved defensive work could crack starting lineup . . . Architecture major . . . Bats and throws right.

BEN TRAVERSO—6-0, 205, 19, Junior

HEAD COACH SAM BELL

Just California's third track and field coach in the 73-year history of this sport on the Berkeley campus.

Bell follows two head Olympic coaches into this post, Walter Christie, who held the position from 1900 and Brutus Hamilton, who succeeded him in 1932. Bell succeeded Hamilton in 1966.

Christie was the head field coach for the 1928 United States Olympic team while Hamilton was America's head coach for the 1952 games in Helsinki. Not yet an Olympic coach Bell did guide the American team in the 1964 dual meet against Russia, posting the largest victory for the U.S. in the history of this rivalry, 136-97.

Bell came to Berkeley from Oregon State University where in seven years his teams posted a 32-15 dual meet record including four wins in the last five meets with arch rival Oregon.

While at OSU his men broke every varsity and frosh school record, had 13 collegiate All-Americans and established a world record in the two-mile relay and a collegiate record in the sprint medley relay, in addition to placing men like Morgan Groth and Darrell Horn on U.S. National teams.

The 37-year-old Bell is a graduate of Doane College (Nebraska) and coached track and football at Wymore High School in Nebraska and at Cottage Grove High School in Oregon, where he helped develop Dyrol Burleson, who made the first big prep breakthrough in distance running.

Bell was born in Centerview, Missouri, but attended high school in Aurora, Nebraska. He competed in football and track at Doane College after a two-year tour with the U.S. Navy in 1945 and 1946.

He and his wife Fran have three girls and one boy.

ASSISTANT COACH AL RAGAN has served under all three Cal head coaches, and himself was a Bear head coach when Brutus Hamilton went into the Air Force during World War II.

Ragan started under Walter Christie upon graduation from Cal in 1927. He had come to Berkeley from Modesto Junior College and enjoyed a distinguished hurdle career for the Bears.

Highly personable, a careful and meticulous coach, Ragan has enjoyed the respect of countless California trackmen through his 40-year career in Berkeley.

Under Ragan, in 1943, California won its last meet against perennially powerful Southern Cal, beating Dean Cromwell 89½ to 40½.

The Ragan family includes wife Fern and two grown sons and a daughter.

EDWARDS STADIUM

Finished in 1932, and at the time the only purely "Track" Stadium in the World, Edwards Stadium has been the site of seven National Collegiate Championship Meets, one National AAU Championship Meet, last summer's All-American Invitational, and the 1932 IC4A Meet, the only time this meet had been held away from the East.

This Stadium is named after Col. George C. Edwards, as is the field adjoining it to the East.

In 1957 the oval itself was dedicated in the name of Walter Christie, California's first track coach, 1900-32, and in the early sixties "the friends of California track," raised funds to build the Walter Christie bench which stands just outside the running track on the West side of the infield.

With funds that remained after the bench was built the electric clock that stands atop the scoreboard to the North was purchased.

The track in the 22,000 seat Stadium was completely redone in 1965 and is a composite of Fresno clay and cinders and is reddish in color.

Thirteen world records have been set in this Stadium, including Cornelius Warmerdam's historic first 15-foot vault, April 13, 1940.

The last world record set in this Stadium was Jim Ryun's fabulous 3:51.3 mile, last August.

Came to Cal as a transfer from a HS that had no organized track team. Set Cal frosh 2-mile record at 9:27.5 (broken last year). Ran 4:11.7 and 9:07.4 as a sophomore. Last year he set Cal 2-mile, 3-mile, 6-mile and 3000-meter steeplechase records, clocking 8:54.1 (on a double after a 4:08.3 mile), 14:09.8, 29:26.7 and 8:53.9, in addition to a 4:04.0 mile, making him the second fastest miler in Bear history. He placed fourth in the National AAU steeplechase.

Price is majoring in Electrical Engineering and is a leader in the Campus Crusade for Christ. He has earned four cross-country letters as well as two track awards.

JOHN REAGAN (PADDY) McCRARY—6-2, Junior (born August 2, 1946) Manhasset, N.Y.

An outstanding all-around high school trackman. Ran 52.6 for 400m IH, the 880 in 1:54 and triple jumped 47-11, all as a prep. Spent most of his frosh year injured, although in a time trial did clock 37.8 for 330 IH and 48.7 for the 440. Last year as a soph he set UC record in 440 IH at 51.3 and suffered just one dual meet loss (to Vance Peterson of Occidental); finished second in the PAC-8 meet in the 440 IH, but was disqualified, and second in this same meet in the triple jump. He finished third in the NCAA IH, but again was disqualified, this time being one of 14 men to suffer this fate, and was a finalist in the NAAU meet in the IH. He also has a 14.6 high hurdle clocking to his credit. He will run 440's and 880's in relay duties this year as well.

McCrary is a Speech major who plans on a career in Law after graduation.

LARRY HENGL—6-1, Junior (born May 29, 1945) from China Lake.

His improvement from high school and as a freshman to his sophomore year is phenomenal. A 51 second quartermiler at Burroughs HS, he ran 50.5 as a frosh. He sat out the 1965 season with mono and last year, as a soph, came back to ultimately run 46.7. He had never broken 47 seconds until the NCAA championship meet, when in three open quarters he clocked 46.7, 46.7 and 46.9 to finish 6th in the final, as it took a photo to determine the places from 3rd to 6th. He also had 48.0 and 46.2 mile relay legs in this meet as the Bears finished second in this event. Ultimately, his best event may be the 880, but this year he will undoubtedly concentrate on the 440.

Hengl's parents now live in Fremont, California, and Larry is majoring in Engineering.

TWO-YEAR ALL-AMERICAN CHUCK GLENN.

Not one of Cal's major point getters in dual meets, senior Glenn, from Garden Grove, has nonetheless been a collegiate All-American for two years. In 1965 he led off for the California mile relay team, clocking 48.9 in the prelim and 48.4 in the final. This past year he led off for the Bears again, and ran 47.9 in the prelim and 48.1 in the final. The Bear relay team was NCAA champ in '65 and runner-up in '66.
