The Super Chief Was On Time!

The Super Chief was on time.

George Alfaro of Pittsburg High, dubbed "Super Chief" by his teammates, roared out of the pack to beat favored Greg Jones of Long Beach Poly in the 380 yesterday and highlight the 50th annual California Interscholastic Federation High School track and field meet.

A cheering crowd of 12,000 at Cal's Edwards Stadium watched intently as Jones set a blistering pace (52.8 for the first 440) only to fall a foot short to the determined Pirate junior in 1:52.3.

"I never knew he was there," said Jones after the race, "and when I finally saw him he was past me and we hit the tape."

Jones, who came into the meet with the top season mark of 1:50.6, appeared to be trying for the national record when he broke away from the pack early to lead by as much as 30 yards.

Later he said that he was only trying for a good time and that when the crowd began cheering he thought it was for him rather than the fast-closing Alfaro.

"He was so quiet I didn't even hear him," said the disbelieving Polyrunner. "I thought the closest guy to me was 10 yards back and then all of a sudden everything was lost"

"It was a perfect pace," an elated Alfaro said, "and I ran it like I wanted to. I think that I caught him (Jones) by surprise but I really expected more of a kick from him."

Alfaro said he wanted to run

1:51.0 this season but that the state 880 crown was even better.

"Next year I would like to better the national record (1:48.8 by Richard Joyce of Sierra, Whittier, 1965). That's my goal, 1:48.7."

Ygnacio Valley shotputter

Rolin Luka twice raised his all-time Eastbay leading mark in that event only to lose out to Pete Schmock of San Dieguito in Encinitas on Schmock's final throw.

Luka, who led qualifiers on Friday with a 62-71/4 toss, threw 62-101/4 on his second attempt and raised it to 63-1/2 on his fourth toss after Schmock upped his best to 62-101/2.

Schmock, a 6-2, 240-pounder, pumped the 12-pound ball out 63-11 on his last toss while Luka's final throw sailed 62-1½.

"I finally relaxed," said

Schmock of his winning effort.
"I had been too nervous. Luka
is a great competitor and I
was lucky to come back and
win."

"It was the mark of a champion," Luka said of Schmock's come-from-behind effort, "I knew he would do it.

The pressure was on him and it was a real fine put.

"I won't gripe about second place, though," said Luka smiling. "I'm happy to hit 63 feet."

Edesel Garrison, who led Centennial of Compton to the team title, was named the meet's outstanding track athlete.

After finishing second in the 100-yard dash, Garrison came back with a vengeance to capture the 440 in a state meet record-tying 46.7.

Actually Garrison's clocking rates petter than the same 46.7 time posted by Jerry White of Concoran in 1956 since White's time was around one turn, while Garrison's was around two.


The powerful Garrison returned to anchor the Centennial mile relay team to a 3:14.3 clocking with a sizzling 46.6 leg. The mark was an automatic CIF and stadium prep record since the mile relay is a new event.

"I was mad after losing the 100," Garrison said after completing his busy day. "I felt real strong in the open 440 and I was determined to run until I couldn't go any more."

He almost had to as Andy Young of Long Beach Jordan clocked 47.0 and third place Larance Jones of Lemoore 47.4.

Coach William Gill, who guided Centennial to its third state title in 15 years, was exuberant over his team's victory.

"We said he (Garrison) was an iron man and he proved it, didn't he? What can I say? Edesel did it all."



Closing in on a national record

Little Arvid Kretz of Mills High School gutted his way to a sixth place finish in the two mile at the 50th annual California State track and field championships held yesterday at University of California's Edward's Field.

Kretz was the sole member of the North County contingent to place in scoring events and South San Francisco's Russ Cottrell and Ashland Whitfield and San Mateo's Jim Lydon failed to qualify in Friday night's trials.

Centennial of Compton won the team title of the meet, staged before 10,000 sun-

drenched spectators.

CENTENNIAL totaled 26 points, well in front of second place Compton with 13, followed by Dorsey, Roosevelt, and Whittier, each with nine.

Compton high jumper Renaldo Brown, state meet victor at 6-9½ last year as a sophomore, soared 7-0 to exceed the established national interscholastic high jump record held by Clarence Johnson at 6-11½.

For his performance Brown was honored as the outstanding field performer in the 1968 State

meet.

KRETZ RACED to a lifetime best 9:10.9 after keeping with the leaders for the entire race. Halfway through the final lap, the game distance ace, running in third position, gave way to two southern California runners Ruben Chappin of Excelsior, Norwalk, won in 9:05.7.

Steve Sofos of Burlingame, who had the ninth best qualifying mark in the two mile, placed 20th in a slow 9:48.4, well off his

best of 9:14.4.

Two El Camino runners, Ernie Dawson and Ric Cano, placed second and fourth respectively in the exhibition 2,000 meter steeplechase reserved for runners of the host Central Coast Section.

CENTENNIAL of Compton, avored to win the team title, jumped out toward that goal with a sizzling 41.5 victory in the 440 relay, followed by Castlemont of Oakland.

Moments later, Jim Penrose of Carlmont, picked to win the discus, hit "only" 183-3, good for third place behind Rory Kenward of San Marcos of Santa Barbara at 183-11. Penrose fouled on four of his six attempts.

Ironically, Kenward thrown the discus in competition

only once before.

IN THE 330 intermediate hurdles and sprint medley, both exhibition events, Bob Cook of Aragon and the Burlingame medley team placed third and

second respectively.
Cook strode to a 40.8 mark in the hurdles while the Panther team of Eugenia Amaya, Carl Dancoff, Dan Scott and Tom

Whitehead raced to 3:35.8.

In the 100, Bob Ballard of Bellflower upset Centennial's Edesel Garrison in the fine time of 9.6.

Pittsburgh junior George Al-faro stormed through the final quarter of the 880 to win in 1:52.3.

OTHER FINE performances included a sensational two-turn 440 in 46.7 by Garrison and a 4:09.1 mile by Clifton West of Kennedy, Sacramento.

Garrison's quarter-mile equaled the best mark ever recorded in the 50 year history of the California Interscholastic Federation.

West came from ten yards out with 30 yards to go to dramati-cally edge Tom Davidson of El

Cajon.

Garrison returned to anchor a 3:14.2 mile relay victory Centennial with a leg of 46.6.

THE REST of the North County contingent, Ashland Whitfield and Russ Cottrell of South San Francisco and Jim Lydon of San Mateo, fell by the wayside in Friday's trials.

set by a trio of 1966 performers. Garrison equaled the 440 standard set 12 years ago by Jerry White of Corcoran, who benefitted by having to run only one turn.

Centennial shattered its day-old mile relay mark with a 3:14.3, which is the best high school time in the country this year. Nipping Castlemont in the stretch, the Apaches also equaled their 41.5 440-relay record set in Friday's trials.

Three Eastbay records also fell by the wayside. Ygnacio Valley's strong-armed Rolin Luka, beaten on the final throw, put the shot 63 feet one-half inch; Buck Black of Pittsburg clocked 4:13.3 in the mile, and Castlemont's baton quartet finished a tick behind Centennial.

Busy Merced junior Heulon Hewitt long jumped 24-7, Kerry Hampton of San Francisco Poly took the high hurdles in 14-flat and Clifton West from Kennedy of Sacramento was an upset 4:09 mile winner for the other north-state firsts.

Compton, getting nine of its points in the high jump, finished second with 13. Dorsey of Los Angeles, led by 220 champ Willie Deckard, and Lowell of Whittier, paced by low hurdle winner Ron Hamley, tied Fresno Roosevelt for third with nine points.

Even the discus throw, long a north stronghold, went to a southerner. Rory Kenward of Santa Barbara's San Marcos, throwing in competition for only the second time this year, won at 183-11 when favored Jim Penrose of Carlmont fouled on four of his tosses.

Robert Richards from Bonita of Laverne, son of the 1952-56 Olympic pole vault champion, went three inches higher than his father's winning '56 Games height but lost on misses at 15-2½ to junior Steve Smith of South Torrance.

The first four finishers in the two-mile, all of them under 9:10, were juniors.

Alfaro completed his junior year undefeated in 28 races ranging in distance from 220 yards through the mile.

He stayed well off the pace, letting Jones clock a 52.8 first lap and 1:21.8 for 660 yards, before beginning to cut down the latter's 25-yard lead.

Alfaro then caught Jones 25 yards from the tape, passed him with 10 yards to go and lunged across the line for a thrilling victory. Both runners were given the same time, Alfaro's mark being just a 10th of a second slower than his best ever.

Luka deserved better than the runnerup spot, but Pete Schmock from San Dieguito of Encirl s bombed out to 63-11 on his anal put.

Luka's fair throws were

62-10¼, 61-3, 63-0½, 60-8½, 60-11 and 62-1½. Schmock, who says he will attend Oregon University next year, had only two other puts over 60 feet.

Castlemont, passing beautifully, nearly beat Centennial in the 440 relay but anchor man Tom White was too much for the Knights.

Moving up from seventh place after the first lap, Black took over the mile lead at 660 yards and held it almost through the third lap before West and Davidson took over.

Bïack's fifth place time was 1.1 seconds better than the area standard by Morgan Groth of Alhambra in 1961. Luka and the Castlemont quartet bettered their own day-old records.

Billie Kidd of the Knights took a fourth in the 100 with his fourth 9.8 of the season. Bob Ballard of Bellflower, coming up on the outside to edge Garrison, won the race in 9.6.



Centennial Wins State Track Meet

A seven-foot high jump and an ensuing near-miss at a national record 7-1½ by Reynaldo Brown of Compton climaxed the Centennia Interscholastic Federation state high school track and field championships at Edwards Stadium yesterday.

The attempts at a best-ever height by the defending champion junior kept most of the 12,000 spectators in their seats long after Edesel Garrison of Compton's Centennial had clocked 46.7 to become the state's fastest two-turn schoolboy quarter miler of all time.

Garrison, who placed second in the 100-yard dash and came back with a 46.6 leg in a winning mile relay to account

Centennial Had It Figured Out

The six trackmen who comprised Centennial of Compton's winning team in the 50th annual California High School Track and Field Championships spent Friday night with Coach Bill Gill analyzing their chances.

They went so far as to write down how the meet might develop. Optimistically, they came up with Centennial winning all five events they entered.

Saturday, before 12,000 at Cal's Edwards dium, the Apaches nearly fulfilled their predictions. They won three events and captured seconds in the others for 26 points and their third team title in 14 years.

"We intended to win everything," star quartermiler Edesel Garrison said, shaking his head in disappointment. Garrison, a 6-2, 185-pound senior headed for USC, personally accounted for 10 points, winning the 440 and placing second in the 100. He also anchored the winning mile relay team for six more points.

Garrison shared individual honors with junior Reynaldo Brown, a 7-0 high jumper from cross-town rival Compton High. Garrison ran the fastest two-turn 440 in California, winning in 46.7. It equalled the one-turn mark by Jerry White of Corcoran in 1956. Brown, who won the high jump last year at

91/4, Saturday defeated National prep record-holder. Otis Hailey of Wasco who went out after clearing 6-10. Brown's 7-0 erased the meet mark of 6-10 held

by four others.

Brown now has a shot at becoming the first three-time winner since Les Steers of Palo Alto won three straight high jump titles in 1935-37.

Garrison powered to a 46.6 mark in the milerelay. The Apaches got another win in the 440-relay.

in 41.5.

Garrison used an exhausting technique in the "I just ran all out until I couldn't sprint any 440. more. I didn't try to pace myself at all," he said.

Although Centennial followed the form chart to

victory, others provided some surprises.

Kerry Hampton, muscular 17-year-old from San Francisco's Poly, captured the 120 high hurdles in 14.0, his personal best. "I thought I could win if I got a good start," Hampton said, then added, "I did."
He became the first San Franciscan to win this
event. Within an hour, he raced 19.2 in the 180 lows for fifth-place.

Other outstanding San Francisco performances were recorded by two St. Ignatius athletes. Miler Klaus Hofmann took third with a personal best of 4:11.1 and high jumper Clyde Sadler grabbed fourth with an all-time best of 6-8.

The most thrilling races were the 880 and mile. In the half, favored Greg Jones of Long Beach Poly wilted in the stretch as Pittsburg junior George Alfaro raced by to win in 1:52.3. Alfaro was behind by 30 yards and in seventh place at the 660-yard mark.

Miler Cliff West of Sacramento's Kennedy, with a 60.9 last quarter, nipped favorite Tom Davidson of El Cajon to win in 4:09.0. Davidson fell face first at the finish after leading the entire race. This was a meet for juniors. In addition to the

Hailey, who with Brown had gone over 6-10 on his first attempt, failed in his three efforts at 7 feet, giving Brown his second straight State title. Brown then missed three times at

BERKELEY - They saved the best for last at the 50th State track and field meet Saturday and the man in the spotlight, Compton's Reynaldo Brown, responded with a record - breaking perfor-

Almost 30 minutes after Centennial had finished wrapping up its runaway team victory before 11,000 fans at Edwards Stadium. Brown soared over the bar at 7 feet on his first attempt to set a meet record in the high jump.

But there was more to come. Still in the competition was Wasco's Otis Hailey, who earlier this year had established a national record of 7-1 1/4.

Hailey, who with Brown had gone over 6-10 on his first attempt, failed in his three efforts at 7 feet, giving Brown his second straight State title. Brown then missed three times at 7-112. "I felt my first try at 7-

1½ was my best jump of the day. I just got off a little bit on my sixth step, and hit the bar with my arm as I went over," said the Tarbabe junior who will try next year to become only the fourth man in State history to win three straight titles in the same event.

Third Win

Centennial, led as usual by the fabulous Edesel Garrison, finished with 26 points to give coach Bill Gill his third team title in 16 years. Compton was second with 13 points.

Garrison, who took second in the 100, was at his best in the 440, where he equaled the state record of 46.7, set by Corcoran's Jerry White in 1956. However, White's race was around one turn and Garrison's was a two-turn event. The clocking was the fastest turned in by a prep this year.

"That's the fastest open quarter I've ever run," said Garrison, who was to no one's surprise named runner of the meet. Brown was similarly honored in the field events.

"I ran this race differ-ently than I'd ever run before. I just ran all out until I couldn't sprint any more. I didn't try to pace myself at all. But I still think I can run faster," he

Despite going "all out" Garrison still had enough left to anchor the Apaches' mile relay quartet to a two-yard victory in 3:14.3, best time in the country for a high school team this year.

Garrison's anchor was 46.6 as he held off the charge of Fremont's John Smith, who clocked 46.8 to give the Pathfinders second place.

Relay Records

State records were set in both the 440 and mile relays since this is the first time the races have

Centennial equaled its preliminary clocking of 41.5 in nabbing the 440 event as Thomas White, who took second in the 220, came from behind on the anchor leg to give the Apaches a slim win over Castlemont of Oakland.

Four juniors came away with championships besides Brown, They were CIF Southern Section twomile champion Ruben Chappins of Excelsior, who laid back until the chappins of Excession, who laid back until the final 220 and then pulled away to win in 9:05.7; Merced's Heulon Hewitt, who leaped 24-7 in the long jump; South Torrance's Steve Smith, with a best-ever 15-2 1/2 in the color points of the second sec pole vault to edge Bonita's Bob Richards, who also cleared 15-2 1/2, and Pittsburgh's George Alfaro, who nipped Long Beach Poly's Greg Jones at the tape in the 880 in 1:52.3.

Shocking Loss

Jones, the Southern Section winner, led for the entire race up to the finish. "I thought I was 10 yards ahead," he said. "I didn't see him until I crossed the tape. I thought he around was cheering the crowd was cheering me."
