

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



BERKELEY - High school athletes will journey from the desert, the mountains, Smogville and Fogville to take part in the 50th running of the California Interscholastic Federation's State Track and Field Meet at the University of California's Edward's Field this weekend.

Activities get under way Friday afternoon at 4 o'clock and conclude Saturday at 4:15 p.m. in a meet that will determine 'the State's only official high school champion.

The meet hasn't even started and two records already have fallen. The entry list includes 506 athletes from 215 of the

state's high schools. Both figures are record breakers.

This year's meet, hosted by Carlmont High under the direction of Loren Lansberry, Don Berry, and Andy Darby, will vary little from the previous 49, including the fact that Southern California is a heavy favorite to walk (or run) away with most of the medals.

The host school has the man favored to become the SPAL's first state champion since 1956 in Jim Penrose, who last year placed in the discus and this year is the state leader in that event at 181-11.

Ron Larrieau of Palo Alto was the league's last state champ, winning the mile in 1956 at Chico.

But when a section has high jumpers that go over the bar at 6-10 and 24-foot long jumpers that don't even qualify, you know it has a few athletes doing more than just inhaling smog.

For instance, Centennial and Compton Highs, both of Compton, are going at this meet as if it were a dual meet and are the premeet co-favorites.

Centennial has a 440-yard relay team that toured the track in 41.3 and a 9.9 sprinter in Tom White and a 9.7 century trotter in Edesel Garrison. When Garrison isn't smoking up the runway, he's resting for the 440 where he brings in the fastest qualifying time of 47.5.

Centennial's mile relay team also holds a slight margin over Lincoln of San Diego in the fourlapper with a time of 3:16.6.

Compton has plenty of sprinters and middle distance runners. but what people talk about most down south are its high jumpers. Reynaldo Brown and Patrick Bradford take turns beating each other around the seven-foot mark.

Otis Haley of Wasco (near Fresno) will give the fans plenty to cheer about in the high jump. Haley, who stands a shade under six feet, has cleared the bar this year at 7-13/4.

Other Southern California notables in the field events are Compton's Leonard Herring.
