# Carey 13th In State Track Meet

LOS ANGELES—Los Altos High School junior Chris Adams accounted for the Central Coast Section's lone championship Saturday by taking home the discus title in the 51st annual state high school track and field championships at UCLA's new tartan track,

An enthusiastic crowd of 12,-340 watched Los Angeles High win the team title with a score of 22 points. The Romans had been picked to score as many as 39 points, but faltered in the sprints.

The CCS also picked up additional state meet places in the discus with Gunn's Tom Birtwhistle capturing second with a toss of 185-1 behind Adams' winning effort of 188-0, a state record for a junior.

Northern California swept the discus event as Jon Gledhill (Pacific High of San Leandro), Doyle Nelms (Porterville) and Hillsdale's Mike Davis finished 3-4-5.

That sweep had to be savored as the rest of the laurels fell on the shoulders of Southern and Central California ath-

Carlmont's Chris Carey, the only SPAL entrant in the finals besides Birtwhistle, couldn't keep up with a record-setting pace in the twomile and finished 13th in 9:19.0.

Ruben Chappins of Elcelsior High (Norwalk) ran a 56.0 last lap to defend his title in the two-mile with a new state meet record of 8:57.0.

Carey started in the back of the pack and steadily worked his way up to seventh in the 27-man field before sliding back as the pace quickened.

Other state meet records were set in the pole vault when South Torrance's Steve Smith went 16-0 and in the 120 high hurdles when Jerry Wilson of Fresno's Roosevelt High zipped to a 13.7 clocking. Wilson also won the 180 lows.

Reynaldo Brown of Compton became the seventh athlete to be a three-time winner by taking his third consecutive high jump title. He repeated his 1968 feat in Berkeley by jumping 7-0.

Burlingame's Eugenio Amaya garnered some CCS points by taking second in the mile.

Serra's Lynn Swann, who qualified for the long jump finals with a 22-81/4 leap Friday, couldn't top that mark Saturday and didn't make the last cut for the finals.



Berkeley miler John Dean and low hurdling teammate Kirk Davis distinguished themselves with good times as three records fell and two were tied.

While Los Angeles' Romans were having a holiday, scoring 22 points to win the team title for the first time since 1920, new standards came in the pole vault, two-mile and 440, while those in the high jump and high hurdles were tied.

Roosevelt of Fresno, whose Jerry Wilson equaled the high barrier mark with a 13.7 victory and also took the lows in 18.3, finished second with 16

points.

Central of El Centro, with Willie Robinson doubling in the sprints, and South Torrance, whose Steve Smith defended his pole vault title with a record 16-foot effort, tied for third with 12 points.

Ruben Chappins of Excelsior repeated as the two-mile champ by turning in a 55.9 fi-nal lap to win in 8:57 in a race that saw the first three run-ners finish under nine min-

utes.

Three class and age records fell while Chappins was bet-tering the eight-lap mark by

3.5 seconds.

Larance Jones of Lemoore took the quarter in 46.6, a tenth of a second under the record, and Olympian Reynoldo Brown went seven feet, equaling his own CIF mark, to win the high jump for the

third straight year. Castlemont's relay time is the second best ever in the Eastbay, missing by 2-10ths of a second the Knights' second

LOS ANGELES — Harris Flowers was only partly right in his prediction, but he's not shedding any tears over the part he missed.

"We're aiming for 41.8 in the trials, 41.4 in the finals," the Castlemont track coach related Friday morning at the Oakland International Airport while waiting to board a flight here. "We can beat those southern teams."

The Knights missed equaling the projected time by a 10th of a second in the Friday afternoon trials for the 51st State High School Championships, and by 4-10ths in the finals yesterday at UCLA.

But Flowers, as well as juniors Quentin Pruitt, Milton Turner, James Irvin and Charles Gibson, were all smiles anyway when the latter flashed across the finish line first in the 440 relay.

Not considered a serious threat because their previous best time was 42.1, the Knights thus avenged their narrow defeat by Centennial of Compton in last year's

meet. Castlemont clocked 41.6 in that race.

A very dejected Jon Gledhill of Paciric "was dipping my arm, not getting enough height to my throws" and finishing third in the discus at 179-1. The mark is 10 feet below his best of the season.

Bill Hammett of Castro Valley was replaced by Chip Hough of Saratoga in the high hurdle finals. Hammett thought he was in the race until the last minute.



#### Lemoore's Jones Runs 440 in 46.6

LOS ANGELES — Prohibitive favorite Los Angeles High came on strong in late events to beat off a field of upset-minded central and southern Califronia schools to score 22 points and win the 51st CIF State Track and Field meet yesterday before a packed house of 12,500 at UCLA.

Roosevelt High, led by double hurdles winner Jerry Wilson, was next with 16 while Central High of El Centro was third with 12.

Three meet records were broken and two tied in another meet that provided slim picking for Northern California schools which were led by Castlemont of Oakland and Los Altos, both with six each.

The Castlemont Knights scored their points early in the 440 relay when Quintin Pruitt, Milton Turner, James Irvin and Charles Gibson upset a favored field in 41.8 seconds. Chris Adams of Los Altos won the discus with a toss of 188 feet in an event dominated by northern and central California schools. Tom Birthwhistle of Gunn was second at 186-1 and Jon Gledhill of Pacific, San Leandro third at 179-1. NorCal boys took the first five discus spots.

San Francisco schools were limited to a pair of fifth places — Derreck Kelley, Mission, 14.4 in the high hurdle hurdles, and Willie Eashman, Washington, 4:14.4 in the mile.

John Pettus of Washington appeared to be a winner in the 220 with a 21.5 clocking, but was disqualified for running out of his lane.

Oakland made a representative showing in four other events that saw junior James Beaver place third in the 880 at 1:52.8; Audie Murphy placed fifth in the 220 at 21.9 and the Oakland Tech mile relay foursome that came in fifth at 3:19.6.

Ruben Chappins of Excelsior, Norwalk, led an array of record shattering two milers with a strong finish in 8:57.0 to erase the old mark of 9:00.5 set by Pete Romero of Reedley in 1967. Two others also were under nine minutes, Ron Johnson, Torrance, 8:59.0, and David White, El Modena, 8:59.8.

Two other records were set. Steve Smith, defending pole vault champion from South Torrance cleared 16 feet and Larance Jones of Lemoore blazed to a 46.6 clocking in the 440 yard run.

Wilson tied the high hurdles record of 13.7 for the second straight day en route to his double while Reynaldo Brown of Compton joined seven others who have won a state crown three straight years with a record-tying 7-0 effort in the high jump.

Other Bay Area place winners were Greg Redmond, Ygnacio Valley, who cleared 6-6 to tie for third in the high jump, and Kirk Davis, Berkeley, fourth in the 180 low hurdles at 18.8.

## NorCal Stars Make Strong Showing

Los Angeles

"WE LOST the races we should have won, and won the race we should have lost."

So said one perplexed, but happy, Los Angeles High School student after the Romans won the California State High School Track Meet Saturday at UCLA. Coach Ed Bravo's LA team won with 22 points, considerably less than some pre-meet predictions.

Still, it was enough as surprising Fresno Roosevelt came in second with 14 points, mainly on the strength of a brilliant double win by hurdler Jerry Wilson.

Los Angeles High, which hadn't won this meet since 1920, was expected to run 1-2 in both sprints, win the pole vault and the 880. That would have given the Romans a minimum of 32 points. Although they didn't accomplish any of these desired goals, students vigorously waved signs declaring a "Roman Holiday."

Instead, LA finished second in the vault and 880, took third and fourth in the 100 and had a lonely third in the 220. The unexpected win came in the closely contested mile-relay, which the Romans won in an exciting 3:15.2, identical to runnerup Cententical (Countries)

nial's (Compton) time.

\* \* \*

NEVERTHELESS, LA's win was expected, though the point-spread was not. The authentic surprise was the superlative performances of Northern California athletes, who won a third of the 15 events in this 51th meet in which three States records were set and another two equaled.

The meet had been figured to be an exclusive Southern California showcase this year. But, before 12,340 at the Saturday finals, the predominately Los Angeles crowd reserved some of their biggest ovations for the extraordinary feats of NorCal athletes.

Wilson's double in the 120 highs and 180 lows naturally was in the vanguard of the NorCal efforts. His high hurdle time 13.7 equaled the Meet record set by Jerry Proctor of Pasadena Muir in 1967 and matched by Wilson and LA Washington's Charles Rich in the trials. His superlative 18.3 in the lows was 4/10ths better than the listed record on a turn and only 1/10th off the straightaway mark set by Manuel Murrell of Long Beach Poly in 1965. For his exceptional performance, Wilson, who is headed for Fresno City College, was named the meet's outstanding athlete.

\* \* \*

L ARANCE JONES of Lemoore, bound for Fresno State set one of the three records. He breezed to a ridiculously easy win with a 46.6 440. This beat runnerup Bill Sims of Whittier, who had a best of 47.1 this year, .9 of a second. It also bettered by .1 the record held by two others.

Chris Adams, a junior at Los Altos, led a NorCal sweep in the discus with a toss of 188-0, his best this season. NorCal's other win came in the 440-relay where Castlemont of Oakland surprised everyone by winning. The Knights had finished second in their

qualifying heat in 41.9 and had only a best of 42.3 this season. Smooth baton passes and hustle, though, enabled them to run 41.8 and barely edge Lincoln of San Diego, whose time was identical.

The three defending champions were involved in the three remaining records. Vaulter Steve Smith of South Torrance went 16-0, two-miler Ruben Chappins of Norwalk Excelsior ran 8:57.0 and Olympian Reynaldo Brown from Compton cleared 7-0, equaling his high jump record, and won the event for the third straight year.

S MITH BROKE the old mark of 15-6½ set by Paul Wilson of Downey Warren in 1965. LA High's Robert Pullard, national co-holder of the prep record at 16-7, finished second, making 15-6, but missing three times at 16-0. Chappins ran the most thrilling race. He stayed in fourth or fifth place for the first seven laps, then sprinted the final 440 in 55.9 to win. His time was 2½ seconds better than the 9:00.5 set by Reedley's Pete Romero in 1967. The pace was so fast that the second and third place finishers also were under the old record.

San Francisco athletes managed two fifths. Washington miler Willie Eashman ran a career best of 4:14.4, only 2.3 seconds off the winning time and Mission hurdler Derrek Kelley ran 14.4, .4 slower than his qualifying time, in the 120 highs. Washington sprinter John Pettus was sixth in the 100 at 10.0 and was disqualified in the 220 around a curve for going out of his lane (thereby running less than the full 220). He had the fastest time, though, 21.5.



### L.A. High Wins State Prep Title

It was Los Angeles winining its first championship since 1920.

It was three recordbreaking performances and three other standards being equaled.

It was the three defending champions - Excelsior's Ruben Chappins, Compton's Reynaldo Brown and South Torrance's Steve Smith-retaining their titles.

It was the 51st annual California State track and field championships at UCLA Saturday. And it was all that and much more before a capacity crowd of 12,340.

Each event was exciting from Ricco Sanchez courageous triumph over James Baxter in the 880 to the mile relay in which Baxter turned in a 47.9 nnchor leg to bring Los Angeles the victory in £3:15.2.

Despite taking the title with 22 points, Los Angeles won only that one grace. But the Roman supporters were not too disappointed and cheered lustiby when coach Ed Bravo accepted the team championship trophy.

The record-breaking efforts were by Chappins in the two mile (8:57.0). Smith in the pole vault (16-0) and Larance Jones of Lemoore in the 440 (46.6).

Chappins, noted for his overpowering kick on the last lap, did it again Saturday. He ran the final squarter in 56.4 in defeating a pair of juniors, West Torrance's Ron Johnson (8:59.0) and El Modena's Dave White (8:59.8), both of whom broke the old record of 9:00.5 by Pete Romero of Reedley in 1967. Smith cleared 16-0 in

Paul Wilson in 1965. The

pre-meet favorite, Robert Pullard of Los Angeles High who cleared 16-7 last week, could do only 15-6 and finished second. Smith has now defeated Pullard in all four of their meetings.

Jones, who was third last year, ran right past Whittier's Bill Sims in the stretch to win easily and lower the record by one tenth of a second.

The record-tying efforts came in both hurdles by Roosevelt of Fresno's classy Jerry Wilson-and by Brown, with a 7-foot leap in the high jump.

The victory for the unflappable Brown gave him his third straight championship. He is the seventh athlete in State history to perform that feat.

#### Rich Edged

Wilson took the 120 highs in 13.7, edging Washington's Charley Rich and then clocked 18.3 in the 180 lows to beat out Jones, who did 18.4.

Along with Wilson, El Centro sprinter Willie Robinson also claimed a pair of victories, winning the 100 in 9.6 and then taking the 220 in 21.7 when the apparent victor, John Pettus of Washington of San Francisco, was disqualified for running out of his

Another disqualification occurred in the 440 relay, won by Castlemont of Oakland in 41.8. Edison of Stockton, which set a state record of 41.4 in the heats, had trouble with its final pass and accidentally stepped into the infield, causing its ouster.

Three other events were also won by Southland entrants. South Torrance's Decker Underwood produced a strong effort in taking the mile in 4:12.1; Blair junior James McA-
