CCS Hot, SPAL Not In State Track Trials

BERKELEY - The Central Coast Section prospered while making the best showing in its history, but SPAL athletes drew a near-blank Friday in the trials for today's finals of the State Track Meet at Edwards Stadium here.

While 24 of the 42 individual finals, which were held this afternoon, the season ended Friday for five of the seven individual SPAL representatives, including three from Sequoia.

Menlo-Atherton's Ken Mur-

phy was the only "legitimate" finals qualifier, finishing sixth in the long jump at 23-13/4. Carlmont's Hans Templeman did not have to qualify in the two-mile, for which no trials were held.

The SPAL's lone relay entry, Gunn's mile relay team, CCS entrants qualified for the amade the finals, but just barely. The Titans were clocked in

3:20.9 for third in their heat and the last qualifying time. Sequoia high jumpers Ron Bosch and Jim May, and Cherokee 180 low hurdler Ce-

zar Oravillo were among the trial casualties, while Gunn's Julian Lucas and Dave Bagshaw also lost out.

Bosch and May, who had bests of 6-6, failed to clear 6-4 needed to qualify, but they weren't the only good jumpers who didn't make it. Justin Ceabe of San Francisco's Wilson had cleared 6-8, but was climinated also.

Oravillo finished ninth in his low hurdle heat with a 20.5 effort, while Lucas finished sixth in the same heat with a sub-par 19.9 clocking.

"Bosch was the most disappointed, because he's a senior," observed Sequoia coach Buddy Miller. Both May and Oravillo are juniors.

"But I was not disappointed in them, only disappointed for them. Any time you get to the State Meet you've had a pretty fair season," Miller added.

Lucas wasn't expected to make it in the hurdles, but was regarded a strong 440 threat. However, his 49.2 was fourth in his heat and missed qualifying by about two yards. His best was 48.3, a mark that would have qualified him eas-

Both Lucas and Bagshaw, who clocked 14.9 for seventh in his high hurdle heat, were still slated for action on Gunn's mile baton unit along with

Tom Paul and Dale Krebs,
As expected, Los Altos' super star Rick Brown easily qualified while conserving his energy. He recorded relatively conservative clockings of 48.0 in the 440 and 1:53.9 in the 880 and anchored the Knight mile relay squad to the top time, 3:16.1.

Joining Brown with easy qualifying efforts were teammates Chris Adams in the weights and Jim Andrew in the 440 at 48.5.

Adams tossed the platter 190-4 to set a meet record, although the mark won't count today. Trials marks can be valid as records, but they don't carry over to the finals. The CCS made an excellent

Los Altos Takes State Track; Serra's Lynn Swann Wins LJ

BERKELEY — Bay Area and Northern California high school athletes reached the peak of their prestige in the 52-year history of the State Track Meet Saturday, appropriately held in Berkeley's Edwards Stadium.

After an overwhelming team victory by Los Altos High, a third place by Oakland's Castlemont and impressive showings by other Central Coast and North Coast Section athletes, the boys from the southland will have to wait at least another year to poke

their usual fun at the north.

Led by those supermen in disguise, Rick Brown and Chris Adams, who set a national discus record, Los Altos' 29 points gave Northern California its fifth team title and the Bay Area only its second crown. The last NorCal winner was Edison of Fresno in 1963.

Los Altos grabbed four first places while Serra's Lynn Swann fittingly ended a fantastic prep career by taking the CCS' fifth gold medal with a 24-2¾ long jump.

The three finals qualifiers from the SPAL all failed to

place, as Menlo-Atherton's Ken Murphy was 11th in the long jump, Carlmont's Hans Templema 15th in the twomile, and Gunn's mile relay team finished last.

While Swann was able to say, "I'm happy, that was my lifetime best," after winning by a scant quarter inch, the long jump was a study in misery for the unfortunate Murnhy

Bothered by a groin injury, Murphy managed a best of 21-11 and spent most of the time writhing in pain on the ground while courageously trying to continue. He jumped only three times.

"The trials Friday and then the finals were just too much for him," said M-A coach Plato Yanicks. "He was in terrific pain." Murphy's 23-1 effort had qualified sixth Friday, but the trial marks didn't carry over into the finals.

Brown, headed for a spike career at Cal, became the first in meet history to win both the 440 and 880. His 47.0 anchor split for Los Altos' victorious (3:15.6) mile relay team only added luster to an already brilliant day.

Brown's season state best of 1,50.6 in the 880 and 47.7 conquest in the 440 prompted Knight coach Leo Long to offer, "This is a real breakthrough, because it shows a kid can double in the 440 and 880. This is when greatness comes, when people are challenged."

As great as Brown was, the meet's most dramatic moment came in the first event when Adams set a national record with a 201-31/2 discus throw, bettering his own pending 201-0 mark.

Like a 450-foot homer launched by Willie McCovey,

the crowd of 13,000 knew the discus was going "out" — over the 200-foot mark — as soon as Adams let fly.

The fans responded with a tremendous cheer as the platter soared like a bullet in a low trajectory, obviously clearing the magic 200-foot line, for the best official throw in prep history. A 211-4 toss last year by George Amundsen of Aberdeen, South Dakota has not been officially approved.

"I just knew it was a good throw," said Adams, while Long could only say, "Once it took off, you could tell. It was a great achievement." Adams also took third in the shot at 61.714

Although Jerry Culp of Oceanside set a meet record with a 7-01/4 high jump, it was Randy Fulkerson of Santa Fe, all 5-71/2 of him, who stole the crowd's heart with a 6-10 leap for second.

Other CCS stars were Crestmoor's Chuck Bommarito, second in the 220 at 21.7 and fifth in the 100; Dave Chamness of Awalt, third in the mile; Wayne Smith of Mills, fifth in the mile; Steve Bowen of Sunnyvale, fifth in the discus; and Jim Andrew of Los Altos, fourth in the 440.

The two-mile race had to be one of the best in prep history with six men at 9:03.6 or better, led by Ron Johnson of West Torrance in a meet record 8:55.6. Templeman ran 9:30.6 and Bob McCarty of Menlo Park and St. Francis was 18th in 9:34.0.

The super powerful Southern Section, which includes more than 300 schools, led with 90 points and 27 medals, but the CCS scored a highly respectable 45, by far its best ever, and claimed 12 awards.

Changes Made In State Meet

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Review of films of last weekend's state high school track meet in Berkeley have revealed three place changes but none that would change the team winner, Los Altos.

In the 100-yard dash, Chuck Bommarito of Crestmoor was moved from fifth to third and Albert Riley of Edison in Fresno was moved from sixth to fourth. Dropping from fourth to fifth was Vince Breddell of Kearney in San Diego and dropping from third to sixth was Ralph Ligons, Pittsburg.

In the 830, Bob Franck of Whittier finished fifth and the original fifth placer, Glenn Harmatz of Lakewood, was dropped to eighth. Sixth and seventh places were not affected.

The announcement of the changes was made by Bill Russell of the California Interscholastic Federation.

"He said to go up there like I was stuffing the basketball backwards. I was shaking after I did 6-4, but I just kept going. I should have had 6-8, but I've never been that high and don't know how to kick my legs over."

Both Viera, a junior, and Redmond are back-flip jumpers in the style of Olympic champion Dick Fosbury.

Viera went out for track this season just to keep active and played basketball most of the time during the season. Most

"I blew my mind," Viera gasped afterward, still not believing what he had done.

Redmond was less pleased with his own performance and didn't want to take any credit for what Viera had done.

"It was all him," the disgruntled Redmond said. "I thought I had 6-10 in me and I thought I had 6-10 in me and I thought this was the day. But I just jumped badly."

Some of the top competitors were too small, too big and too skinny at yeserday's State High School track meet in Berkeley's Edward Stadium. The 13,000 witnesses had to testify, however, that those same athletes were also too much.

Especially Los Altos High's Rick Brown, seemingly

too skinny, and Chris Adams, supposedly too small.

Brown became the first State meet double winner in the 440 and 880 and anchored a mile relay victory. Adams broke the national high school discus mark wih a 201-3 toss and took third in the shot put as Los Altos became the first Northern California eam to win he Stae championship in seven years.

After Adams, only 6-0, 190, started the meet off with his spectacular throw, Brown, all 140 pounds of him, start-

ed to do his thing.

Brown's Swift Times

He made it look all too easy in the 880 even though he did hit the tape in 1:50.6 to set a new Edwards Stadium high school record. Fifty minutes later he was hitting the tape again after running a 47.8 in the 440. This all but locked up the title for Los Altos, the first all-white team to win the state championship since 1946.

Brown finished his day by anchoring the mile relay in 47.0 as Los Altos won in 3:15.6 after having been dead last going to the No. 2 man. Los Altos outdistanced second

place Santa Ana 29-19, in the final point standings.

Both Brown and Adams have indicated they will attend California next year.

Jerry Culp of Oceanside broke Reynoldo Brown's seven-foot high jump meet record with a 7-0¼ leap. Culp was one of the few conventional jumpers in a field that included several back floppers and one incredible little (5-7½) competitor named Randy Fulkerson.

Fulkerson, from Santa Fe, used what was described as the "rear over teakettle method" to take a second at

6-10.

A strong kick through the last 330 yards allowed Ron Johnson of West Torrance to breeze to a record 8:55.6 two-mile victory, at least 15 yards ahead of Long Beach Poly's Jim Chaffin, who finished in 8:58.8

Sprinter Allen Carter, a junior from Bonita. pushed his 210-pound frame to a victorious 9.8 in the 100. Carter should be heard from often next year as he gained over

1800 yards as a halfback last season.

Serra High of San Mateo's multi-sports star Lynn Swann did again what he had done during his prep career. The football-basketball standout did just enough to win again—a 24-2¾ long jump.

Swann Keeps Cool

It was a lifetime best fo Swann, who beat a field considered too much for him to jump with. The USC-bound super athlete thought the wind psyched out most of his competitors. "I just didn't think about it," said Swann in his usual cool manner.

And about usual manners, Rick Brown didn't think yesterday was anything super for him, rather just another

uay.

"I didn't feel any different," said Brown. I've been

doing it all year."

So be it. But the fans still thought it was just too much.



latter's third place in the shot put and a fourth by Jim Andrew in the quarter, gave Los Altos a 29-point total which outdistanced runner-up Santa Ana by 10.

Mike Britt, in one of his few victories over teammate Burns, finished fourth in the 220 and Tech's mile relay team, after leading most of the way, wound up fifth.





BERKELEY - Los Altos ran the slowest victory lap in the history of the state meet Saturday.

The Knights struggled around the track with a silver trophy about as big and as ugly as a Gallapagos tortoise.

But they savored every step. That homely piece of metal was emblematic of the 52nd annual California State CIF prep track and field team championship.

The Knights had traded in their shining armor for a crown.

Rick Brown had made history by winning an "impossible" double.

Chris Adams had broken the national prep record in the discus for the second time.

And just for kicks, the Knights put the finishing touch to it all by running away with the mile relay after they had already clinched the title.

It was some kind of day for Leo Long.

"They paid the price - they worked like the dickens," said the sun-tanned and emotiondrained coach as he stood in the middle of the infield at Edwards Stadium.

"We did it without a sprinter." said Long. "I can't remember when somebody won the state meet without a sprinter. We felt if Ricky wins the 880, nothing would stop us."

Nothing did stop them. Not Morningside, not Castlemont, not Santa Ana.

Brown was stupendous. He ran six races - including the anchor legs in the mile relav -and was unbeaten.

Deceptively fragile in appearance, just a slender, quiet kid with violet-shaded glasses, Brown can accelerate as he chooses - like an Apollo making a course correction.

and Percell Keeling of Morningside were left in the dust by Brown, who raced to a 1:50.6 victory in the half mile.

Brown says he is tempted to try the intermediate hurdles sometime soon.

Would he recommend running both the 440 and 880?

"Sure. It's just psychological. They don't do it because they think they can't do it."

Adams, who plans to begin decathlon training this summer, is anxious to improve his mark of 62-9 in the high schoolweight shot.

"I did 64-7 last week in practice and I figure I can do 65 feet."

He has been credited with a 9.8 100 and a 19.7 in the 180 low hurdles.

Adams believes his toughest challenges in the decathlon will be the mile, high jump and pole vault. He sim-
