# **Brown Doubles**; Adams Sets Mark

Los Altos High's dandy luo, middle distance ace Rick Brown and weightman Chris Adams, highlighted rials in the 52nd state track meet yesterday at Berkeley's Edwards Stadium and solidified their school's bid to be-come the first Northern California winner in seven years.

Before 5200 spectators. Brown won his 440 and 880 heats and then achored the Knight's mile-relay quartet to another heat victory. Adams, meanwhile, set the only CIF meet record of the day in the discus with a 190-4 toss and was second in the shot put at 62-21/4 heave.

Today's finals start at 12:30 p.m. with the pole vault. Track events begin at 3 p.m. with the 440-relay.

In the 880, Brown was running fifth at the 440 mark, but entering the final curve he turned on the speed and coasted to an easy win in 1:53.9. Fifty-five minutes later he came back for the 440. With about 200 yards left, he again kicked out and zoomed ahead, winning in 48.0.

The Cal-bound senior was not finished, however. This time he had a longer rest, one hour and 15 minutes, before the mile relay.

Trailing by 15 yards, the baton was passed to Brown. About 100 yards from the finish he began sprinting to win the race in easy fashion by 10 yards. He was timed in 47.8 as the Knights were clocked in 3:16.1.

Adams, a 190-pound senior who is also going to Cal, set the only record with an average throw for him. He has thrown 201-0, but his 190-4 toss in the discus wiped out the 189-1 mark set by Jim Peters of Piedmont in 1969.

Only three San Franciscans gained the finals, two in the weights. In the discus, Keith Rowen of Lincoln placed seventh in the trials with a toss of 167-7 and in the shot Chris Callero of Riordan was 10th with a heave of 56-11.

Lincoln's Wolfgang Schmulewicz also advances to to-day's final in the two-mile in

which there were no trials. Los Altos qualified six, as did Castlemont of Oakland and El Cerrito had five.

# Brown, Adams, Andrew and relay team qualify for finals

BERKELEY—Edwards Stadium emptied out in a hurry and suddenly the foot traffic outnumbered the cars on busy Bancroft Way.

Four athletes wearing the powder blue warmups of Los

Altos High trudged along the sidewalk, picking their way through the mob of humanity, but not with total anonymity.

"Hey, Superman!" hollered a passerby in mixed admiration and envy.

One of Rick Brown's teammates nudged him with an elbow and smirked.

For Brown surely was Superman Friday as the best of California's preps competed in qualifying tests for today's 52nd annual state CIF track and field championships.

Up in the pressbox one scribe, getting his first look at Brown, exclaimed:

"That guy is inhuman."

Well, the adults and the adolescents are in agreement.

Brown is out of this world.

Frank Berry of Crenshaw (Los Angeles) made it clear enough to anyone who bothered to watch the first heat of the

Berry finished third in that race. He got off very fast. Too bad. Berry missed a good show. Brown broke leisurely from his standup start, but after 100 or so yards he pushed his "catch

up" button which means it's time to pass anyone who shows his heels.

Brown closed so quickly that by the second turn it was all over. He breezed home in 48 flat to easily to qualify.

After Berry had finished his race, he could hardly wait to rush up to Locke's Donald Fisher—a friendly competitor from Los Angeles—who ran fifth.

You could almost lip read from the uppermost row of the stadium, as Berry crooked his thumb in the direction of Brown:

"Hey, man, where'd that cat come from?"

Not too many minutes earlier, Brown tore around the last turn of the 880 and breezed home in 1:53.9. Again he had played catch-up successfully.

He caught the tape across the letters one more time in anchoring the Knights' mile relay team to a 3:16.1 victory. The slowest Oakland Tech quartermiler was timed in 49.1—but incredibly the OAL champs finished second to Los Altos.

When Larry Davis got the baton from leadoff man Bob Thompson he had eight runners in front of him. He passed six of them in one turn around the track in hitting 48.7.

Andrew ran the third leg in a hurry—48.3—and left only one rabbit for Brown to catch.

Brown buried Tech's Maurice Jackson with a 47.6 leg, and explained afterward:

"Our plan was to qualify easy—well not easy, within reason—but..." said Brown. It didn't require further explanation. Jackson was a challenge and Brown had to respond to it.

Leo Long, Los Altos coach, readily admits that he has been pointing his kids towards a state championship.

If today isn't the day, there will be much disappointment.

Following Friday's action, there was bubbling confidence.

"We're just as pleased as punch," said Long, as he reassembled his team in the parking lot across from the stadium.

"Everything's great. We qualified where we wanted to. In a way, I'm even glad Larry's (Larry Davis) out of the 880. I think we would have scratched

him anyway so he could concentrate on the relay.

One thing which may have swayed Long was the 1:52.7 performance by Castlemont's Nathan Burks in the half. That was the fastest time of the day.

Castlemont figured to be the team to beat—as far as Los Altos is concerned. Burks is something the Knights didn't expect to contend with, inasmuch as he ran only 1:56.6 in the OAL meet.

Long won't come out and predict doubles for Brown and Chris Adams, his deluxe weightman.

"That Ricky Brown is something, isn't he? And Chris, he's in great position for a double. And look out for Jim Andrew."

Adams, the defending state champ in the discus, wheeled one 190-4. The national record holder with a best of 201 didn't bother to take off his sweats, but led the field of qualifiers.

In the shot put he rolled up his sleeves and got off a 62-21/4 toss, second only to Randy Withrow of Pasadena, the top qualifier at 62-41/4.

In all, the Midpeninsula bat-

ted .667, with a dozen qualifying out of 18. Those figures do not include the two-mile nor the triple jump which required no preliminaries.

Perhaps the most heroic effort of all was that of stubby little Julian Lucas of Gunn.

Barely edged out in his heat of the 440—fourth in 49.2—he jumped the gun once, then ran out in the 180 lows.

But with his team virtually dead in the mile relay, Lucas took them from fifth to third with an anchor leg 48.7 in which he wore down El Cerrito's Manuel Evans.

After he had run to a 1:53.9 triumph in the first heat of the 880, he came back with a 48-flat quarter that was the best of the day in that event.

And he ran both races with smooth, fluid effortless strides, easier than your next nine-hole trek around Muni links, or a tour through the aisles of Safeway.

As if to prove the dreadfully tough double was no more taxing than a stroll, Brown saved his finest heavier.

As if to prove the dreadfully tough double was no more taxing than a stroll, Brown saved his finest heroics for the last trial of the afternoon — in the mile relay. Anchoring a Knights' foursome that made up ground off the fine carries of Larry Davis and Jim Andrew, Brown clocked 47.6 as Los Altos nipped the tape in 3:16.8 and then waited in vain for someone else to match the mark.

San Mateo County lost 62½ per cent of its State Meet delegation, but showed the best promise in several seasons of returning to this side of the Bay with something more than a program.

A total of six athletes carried the colors of this high-rent section of the Peninsula into battle—led by Crestmoor sprinter Chuck Bommarito, who survived the qualifying in both the 100 and 220.

The Falcons' fleet junior, running out of the ninth lane, won his heat in the furlong (with a 21.8 mark) after he powered through the last 20 yards of the 100 for a third place in 9.8.

For many years, California Interscholastic Federation officials would not allow an individual to enter both the 440 and 880-yard runs in the State Prep Track Meet.

"It was to protect the athletes," explained one of the CIF brass. How true, but which athletes?

There was some question as to who needed the protecting from whom today when the finals of the 52nd annual State Track and Field Championships began at Cal's Edwards Stadium in Berkeley.

Rick Brown of Los Altos



High became the first runner to enter both those events in the semifinals yesterday at Edwards. He also anchored a mile relay.

What he needed was more competition, not protection. Brown kicked home first in all his events with awesome nonchalance.

He won his heats with 1:53.9 in the 880 and an unpressed :48.0 in the 440 and

then came back to make up 15 yards and win by ten with a :47.6 mile relay anchor. Los Altos' winning relay time was 3:16.1.

Brown, so slender he looks too frail for any type of athletics, and teammate Chris Adams, who qualified in the discus at 1904 and shot put at 62-21/4, were the main reasons a Northern California school was

favored to take the team tititle for the first time in seven years.

Los Altos, with six solid spots nailed down in the finals, appeared a cinch to become only the ninth Nor-Cal school in 52 years to win the team championship. Castlemont of Oakland also had six qualifying spots.

Top Castlemont entrant was Milton Turner, who won the high hurdles in :14.0 and came back with an 18.7 to tie the stadium record in the 180 lows. Jimmy Davis of Santa Ana and McKinley Mosley of Bak-


ersfield also ran: 18.7. Alfonzo Hall of Morningside had the best hurdle mark of the day, a: 13.7 in the highs, but it was wind-aided.

"That sort of thing should be illegal," she said.



Bolstered by an extraordinary performance from half-miler Nate Burks, Castlemont is back in the running for the team championship in the 52nd California Interscho-lastic Federation State Track and Field Championships this afternoon at Edwards Stadi-

With Burks clocking a career best of 1:52.7, almost a full four seconds faster than he has ever run before, the Knights matched pre-meet favorite Los Altos with four victories and six total qualifiers in yesterday's trials at the University of California available. University of California oval.

Besides Burks' wire-to-wire

triumph, Castlemont got first places from hurdler Milton Turner in 14 seconds flat and Milton 18.7 as well as its 440 relay team in 42.1. Shot putter Charles Montgomery and quarter miler John Roberts also qualified for today's finals.

However, Los Altos has iron-man Rick Brown, and that alone makes them tough. Brown won his 880 heat in 1:53.9, came from last entering the second turn in the 440 to win in 48-flat, and then anchored the mile relay team to a 3:16.1 victory with a 47.6 anchor leg. Chris Adams,

the California-bound weightman, got the Peninsula Knights their other first place by adding 15 inches to the State Meet record with a discus throw of 190 feet four inches.

Adams also qualified second in the shot put at 62-21/4, six places ahead of Montgomery in what could be a critical battle. Jim Andrews got Los Altos their other finals berth with the fourth fastest 440 time of 48.5.

Competition begins with the pole vault at 12:30 p.m. today The races start with the 440 relay at 2 o'clock.

Santa Ana's quarter mile

baton group thrilled yester-day's crowd of 5,200 by tying the meet record of 41.4 in the very first running event. Edi-son of Stockton set the record during the trials last year.

Right behind Castlemont and Los Altos with five quali-fiers is El Cerrito, with its 440 relay team that won in 41.5, non-winning sprinter Sammy Burns off times of 9.7 and 21.7, come-through miler Mike Palomino and Mike Britt, who made the 220 field in 22-flat.

Palomino came from behind in the stretch to pass fading Bob Manning of De La Salle, who went out with a 60.7 first lap and led for the first three, to grab the third and final spot in his heat with a lifetime best of 4:17.4.

Morningside of Inglewood, led by hurdler Alfonso Hall, also pulled down five berths in the finals.

Among other outstanding marks yesterday was the 3:16.8 mile relay by Tech, which led until Brown booted Los Altos home in the stretch.

The Bulldogs, who are com peting in the State Meet event for the third straight year aftgoing undefeated against dand Athletic League Oakland competition over the same span, set an all-time record for Eastbay prep quartets. With all four runners going

under 50 seconds, Tech's time was 4-10ths of a second better than the area standard set by Castlemont last Saturday at the Kennedy Games.

Burks' time makes him the Eastbay's third fastest prep half miler ever, just one-half second behind 1968 state champion George Alfaro of Pittsburg

Castlemont desperately needs a double from hurdler Milton Turner, a nother come-through performance from Nate Burks in the 880, a strong showing from Charles Montgomery in the shot put, a high finish by its defending champion 880 relay team and a couple of points from quarter-miler John Roberts.

"Turner has to give us that 12-point base to work from," Flowers declared. "If he does, we've got a shot.

Turner, who has the best times in the state for both hurdle races this season, tied for the second best time in the highs yesterday with a 14.0 and tied for the best mark in the lows in 18.7.

But he struggled a bit in the highs, despite winning his heat, with a false start in addition to skimming three hurdles.

"When Jared Butler (of Pittsburg) false started right next to me twice and was disqualified, it bothered me for some reason. I didn't run the first three hurdles very strongly and was off-balance all the way."

Burks was the biggest surprise of the trials, leading from start to finish in a 1:52.7 clocking with runners that had gone nearly 4½-seconds faster than his 1:56.6 previous best.

"I was scared before the race," Burks admitted, "but I thought I'd qualify second or third in my heat. I expected to go about 1:53.0, but I figured they (Mickey Senior of Montclair and Morningside's Percell Keeling) would go faster.

"I felt good all the way, physically, but mentally I kept waiting for someone to come up and pass me. But now I think I can go 1:52.0 in the finals if I run a faster first lap."


Burks, like everyone else in E dwards Stadium, was a mazed with Brown, who Nate figures is the man to beat in the 880.

# Los Altos Nears State Title

BERKELEY — The question buzzing around Edwards Stadium after Friday's trials in the 52nd Annual California Interscholastic Federation Track and Field Meet was, "is Rick Brown for real."

The answer comes today

in the form of a State championship, or a near miss, for Brown and his Los Altos teammates.

Brown, the only individual to bring a stir from the estimated 5,200 trials crowd, set the stage for an unprecedented 440-880 double today by qualifying in each eyent.

In addition to his 1:53.9 half-mile and 48.0 quarter, Brown made up 15 yards on Oakland Tech's anchor man in the mile relay (3:16.1) to give the Knights their fourth individual trial victory. His anchor leg was 47.6.

Brown's times were off his State-leading marks,

but with six races in two days, he ran under control except in the relay.

Defending State Meet champion Chris Adams led 12 discus qualifiers into the finals with a toss of 190-4, breaking his meet record of 189-0. In a bit of a surprise, Adams also qualified well in the shot put, finishing second to Pasadena's Randy Withrow. Adams tossed the 12-pound ball 62-21/4 to trail Withrow by only two inches.

Adams is attempting to become the first state competitor ever to win a weight double.

With Brown and Adams meeting pre-meet expectations, and Jim Andrew coming through with a third place finish in his 440 heat (48.5), the Knights appear to be in the driver's seat for the team title.

While no other Central Coast Section teams are in title contention, Friday's qualifying proved to be the best ever for CCS individuals.

A total of 24 section athletes gained entrance into today's 12:30 p.m. finals, eclipsing last year's previous best showing of 16.

Crestmoor's Chuck Bommarito became the first CCS sprinter to win a heat in the trials. The muscular

San Bruno resident recorded a 21.8 in the first 220 trial and also finished third in one of the 100 heats with a 9.8 clocking.

Another CCS sprinter, Cupertino's Boris Scalier, also gained one of today's nine spots in the furlong. Scalier finished third in the third heat.

Milers Dave Chamness of Awalt and Wayne Smith of Mills made the finals by running third in their respective heats.

Chamness, a 17-year-old junior, finished in 4:19.3 while Smith was almost two seconds faster, 4:17.5.

Castlemont, another threat in the team chase, will put its hopes in the churning legs of hurdler Milton Turner. Turner won his heat in the 120 HH in 14.0 and came back later with an 18.7 clocking in the 180 LH. Turner's time in


