

CAL STATE HAYWARD

Basking high atop the Hayward foothills, the Cal State campus occupies a 354 acre site which includes a panoramic view of the San Francisco Bay Area. The master plan calls for a physical plant to eventually accommodate 22,000 full and part-time students by 1978.

When classes first convened at the old Hayward High School in 1959, Cal State enrollees totaled 175. At its present permanent site, Cal State has an enrollment of approximately 12,000 and is growing by the rate of more than 1,000 students per year. The college faculty roster numbers about 650.

Physical facilities now in use include the Fine Arts Building, Science Building, Music Building, Meiklejohn Hall, Cafeteria, Corporation Building and yard, PE Field House, Carlos Bee Residence Hall, PE Building and outdoor PE facilities — football Stadium, 14 tennis courts, a nine-lane all-weather track, and practice and playing fields. The \$2.3 million PE Building was completed in fall, 1966.

Cal State provides an opportunity to earn the baccalaureate degree in 31 majors and the master's degree in 19 fields of study. Preparation for postgraduate studies and professional careers is possible through special curricula that will lay a foundation for entrance into law school, theological school, medical school, and other specialized institutions.





Entering his fourth year as the president of Cal State Hayward, Dr. McCune has been most instrumental in the growth of the college campus, and the development of studies offered. A graduate of the University of California, Los Angeles, where he received his Ph.D. in Political Science, Dr. McCune rapidly became one of the leading administrators on the college scene.

Dr. McCune has held teaching and administrative positions at Occidental College and at the San Fernando Valley State College in Southern California. From 1963 until 1967, Dr. McCune was State College Dean of Academic Planning for the California State Colleges, before accepting his present position as president of Cal State Hayward.

Active in professional associations in political science, he has served as a consultant to various governmental units, and has held positions as a personnel and management consultant, and as a public administration analyst.

Dr. McCune is a former member and Chairman of the California State Scholarship and Loan Commission, and continues his activities in professional and community groups.

DR. ROBERT MORFORD Chairman, Physical Education Department

Dr. Morford, who has served the physical education department as chairman since 1965, has developed Cal State's physical education program into one of the finest academic programs on the West Coast. Dr. Morford, in charge of curriculum development and the instructional program in health and physical education, was formerly an associate professor at the University of Alberta from 1964-65. Prior to his position in Alberta, Canada, Dr. Morford attended the University of British Columbia where he received both his bachelor's and master's degrees. In 1964 he was awarded his doctorate at the University of California, Berkeley.

One of the leading authorities in the United States in the field of Sport History, and Sport Culture, Dr. Morford has brought to the physical education department at Cal State the academic status that physical education majors at the Hayward campus take pride in.



PIONEER ATHLETIC PROGRAM

With the 1966 completion of Cal State's \$2.3 million dollar Physical Education Complex, Cal State's development of fine athletic teams on the hilltop campus was given a great boost. Major impetus to the continuing development of a truly fine athletic program and physical education facilities now housed in this imposing plant have expanded to include a greater variety of sports activities. Cal State offers to its students the opportunity to compete on the intercollegiate level of sports competition, or on an intramural basis within the college program.



The P.E. complex houses a 5,000 seat gymnasium; two Olympic swimming pools; an auxiliary gym and dance studio; and a large weight training and gymnastic facility. The college stadium is one of the finest facilities on the West Coast, boasting a ninelane all weather track set inside a stadium bowl which will seat more than 10,000 for football games and track and field events. The college stadium, overlooking the San Francisco Bay, is adjoined by two baseball diamonds; one soccer field, and fourteen all-weather tennis courts.

In the past three years, Cal State Hayward has played host to two NCAA National Championship events. In 1968, Cal State hosted the NCAA College Division Championships in track and field, and in June of 1970, hosted the NCAA College Division Tennis Championships.

Cal State is a member of the Far Western Conference, and a member of the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA). The college participation in all major FWC and NCAA events. The Pioneer athletic program has developed into one of the most competitive collegiate programs on the coast, with competition provided for both men and women. The women's athletic program is competitive on the intercollegiate level in field hockey, swimming, track, basketball, and volleyball.

The Pioneers of Hayward in recent years have developed many teams which compete throughout the nation, and those men and women who are of national caliber in competition, are provided the opportunity to compete at NCAA national championship events throughout the United States.

AL MATHEWS Director of Athletics

Entering his first year as Cal State's director of athletics, Al Mathews succeeds Lew Comer who held the post for the past seven years.

Mathews is highly thought of by faculty members and students, and offers to the athletic department many years of progressive service experience and background in physical education and athletics. A member of the Faculty Senate at Cal State, Hayward, Dr. Mathews is continually involved with both faculty and student organizing committees. He is currently chairman of the Division of Education Library, and a member of the Auxiliary Foundation.

Mathews has been director of the NCAA Summer Youth Sports Program here on the hilltop campus for the past two years, and was again recently selected to the post for this coming summer program.

In 1957 Mathews served as an assistant baseball coach at the University of California, the year the Bears won the NCAA National title. From 1959 through the 1963 season Mathews coached the Cal frosh squad finishing his final season with Cal's best ever frosh record of 27-2.

As the head baseball coach at Cal State, Mathews is considered to be one of the top baseball coaches in Northern California. A former All-Pacific Coast player while attending Cal, Mathews' experience as a player and coach have proved to be most valuable to the players at Cal State.

Since taking over the position as director of athletics at Cal State, Hayward, Mathews has shown that he has the dedication and knowledge to continually upgrade the athletic program on campus for the betterment of both faculty and students, and the community surrounding Cal State, Hayward.

DON CHU Trainer

In the two years that Don Chu has been the head trainer at Cal State, the training program on the Hayward campus has developed into one of the most progressive in the collegiate ranks. Mr. Chu formerly played football at Fresno City College as a defensive back, and at Cal State Hayward also as a defensive back. He received his B.S. degree from Cal State in 1967, and was awarded his Certificate of Physical Therapy from Stanford in 1968. Chu then completed his master's degree on the Cal State campus while serving his first year as the Pioneer trainer in 1969.

Chu's background in athletic training varies from prep ranks, to the professional system. For three years, Don was the head trainer for the Alameda (continued)

County All Stars; he served as trainer for the Examiner All-American Games in San Francisco, and was selected to serve as the trainer in the American Basketball Association for Miami, Houston, and the Oakland Oaks.

Mr. Chu recently spoke at the AAU National Sports Medicine Conference on "DMSO (Diethyl Sulfoxide) and Athletics Injuries," in San Francisco along with other noted speakers from throughout the nation. Mr. Chu is currently working toward his doctorate at Stanford University.

MAL ANDREWS Head Track Coach

As the head track coach at Cal State, Hayward, the dynamic Andrews has built the Pioneer track program into one of the most prominent programs in the nation. In his first year on the hilltop campus, Hayward played host to the NCAA College Division National Championships, and since that time the Pioneers have been a con-



tender in the national championships in the NCAA. In the two years that he has been at Cal State, his teams have produced five NCAA All-Americans, with four Pioneers named to the dream team in 1970. In his first year at Cal State, Andrews guided the Pioneers to a second place finish in the tough Far Western Conference, and last year in 1970 championships the Pioneers were again runner-ups.

Andrews is one of the most respected track coaches in the country today, noted for his ability to work with his trackmen as athletes and students. His time during his busy day is devoted to working with his students and his trackmen in their physical development as well as their academic pursuits, and he is well thought of throughout the campus by students and faculty.

Andrews was a two year letterman in track and field at Los Angeles City College, participating in the long jump, sprints, and hurdles. At the University of Arizona, coach Andrews was named to the NCAA All-American team in the long jump, and was an alternate to the 1956 Olympic team in the long jump.

A graduate of the University of Arizona, coach Andrews holds a B.A. degree in physical education, from the same institution.

JOEL GROSE Assistant Track Coach

Coach Joel Grose will be in his second year at Cal State as an assistant track coâch. Again this year, Grose will be working primarily with the performers in the field events, where he is recognized as one of the top field event coaches in the area.

Grose was formerly the head track coach and football coach at McClatchy



High School in Sacramento from 1958-59, where his team won the CIF Sectional Championships in track in 1959. Following his coaching stint at McClatchy, he then took over the job at Johnson High School also in the Sacramento school system, coaching football and track from 1960-61. In 1963, Grose received his doctorate in physical education from the University of California, and then was named director of athletics at Sonoma State College.

While at Sonoma State, Grose developed that college's first track and field program, and served as the head track coach and athletic director from 1963-68. Coming to Cal State, Hayward in 1969, Dr. Grose has been working the professional courses in physical education, and serving as an assistant football coach and track coach.

JIM SANTOS Assistant Track Coach



Coach Santos is in his first year at Cal State, after coaching track and field in four states throughout the country.

After coaching stints in Idaho, Oregon, New Mexico, and Illinois, Santos' experience has been greatly varied from teaching in high schools and on the college level.

While serving as the

mead track coach at the Bloom Township High School in Chicago Heights, Illinois, Santos' teams won two consecutive Chicago suburban league titles, and two consecutive Chicago district titles. During this time, his teams produced three prep All-Americans, sent two preps to the Golden West Meet, and in his last year in Illinois he was selected to coach the Illinois All-State team at the Junior Champ Nationals.

A 1962 graduate of Fresno State College, he received his master's degree in physical education from Eastern New Mexico University.

Santos is currently the head cross-country coach at Cal State and serves as the women's track coach.

A most beautiful thing in our "Whole Team" coaching and assisting attitude. If Maury Wills in baseball and Attles in basketball can play and coach; so then can Don Webster (20.6 and 46.3), and Bayless, run and coach in track. It gets even better when former Hayward All-Americans, record holders, and personalities come back to the campus and assist us in their respective events. Assisting this year are two-time All-American Larry Woods (1:50.4-880); All-American Ron Pennington (1:50.7-880); Nate Slaughter (25'7-L.I.); Sylvester Johnson (51'9-T.J.); Frank Arias

(6'10-H.J.); Steve Witt (14'7-P.V.); and others. And Finally, picking up leadership soul is mile star Willie Eashman (4:08.0), and new comers Mike Boschetti (174' Dis.), Steve Rutherford (15'0-P.V.) and others.

Be it now resolved that the men to beat in 1971 are Don Webster, Kermit Bayless, Willie Eashman, Andy Weber (219'-Jav.); Mike Boschetti, Bruce Lindsay (15'7-P.V.), Frank Bautista (14:18 3-M), Mile Relay (3:08 Soul), and our 440 Relay.



JIM SANTOS Women's Track Coach



With seven years of experience in women's track and field, Santos' girls track teams have won state AAU championships in Oregon (2), New Mexico (1), and Illinois (1).

His hurdlers throughout the years have won every major hurdles title in the nation, winning: 1) AAU outdoor championship, Girls, 2) USTFF in-

door championship, 3) NAIA indoor championship, 4) junior Olympic title; and in 1968 placed a hurdler on the United States Olympic Team as an alternate.

His girls have also broken three age group world records, two national AAU national records, and his women's track teams have produced six national champions, and two Olympians, and a Gold medalist in the 1968 Mexico Games.

Coach Santos was recently selected to work in the Olympic Development Camp for track and field performers by the AAU, and in the past has been a members of the DGWS advisory committee and the AAU national advisory committee, and has served as a speaker throughout the country at track and field clinics for women.

WOMEN'S TRACK AND FIELD

The women's track and field program at Cal State should challenge many of the track teams throughout the nation this year at the DGWS Nationals in May. Fielding one of the strongest teams in the United States, the coeds of Cal State loom as one of the favorites to capture their first-ever national championship in women's track and field.

Headed by Marilyn King, one of the finest pentathlon athletes in the nation who is preparing for a berth on the 1972 Olympic team, Cal State finds that their depth is bolstered by several outstanding Bay Area girls. Barbara Pickel of Hayward was the 1970 AAU Girls National Champion in the javelin, and was one of the top ranked pentathletes in the country, who will team up with King in the field and running events.

Freshman coed Cis Shaefer from Fremont was ranked 7th in the final AAU standings last year in the 880 and has consistently been one of the finest middle distance runners in the country. Shaefer will be running with junior Linda McCain who was one of the top ranking women in the nation last year in the mile and 1500-meter run. With Shaefer at 2:08.3 in the half, and McCain at 4:41.3 in the 1500-meters, the Pioneers could have two very outstanding distance running girls in the nationals.

In the field events, freshman Carol Knight will make a strong challenge for a national title, as she is ranked fourth in the discus in California, and fourth in the shot with throws of 142'7 and 36'11 respectively for her events. Pickel, who has thrown the javelin 157'7 could be a strong favorite in the DGWS meet, and with Pickel 14.7 and King 14.1 in the 100-meter hurdles, the Pioneers loom as a very formidable team this season in the hurdles.

Dixie Heywood, who is from Oakland, returns to the track after three years away, and her speed could prove to be most valuable in the short sprinting events. Heywood who was third in the 220 in the AAU nationals three years ago could be a surprise to the Bay Area track fans.

With several meets scheduled for Cal State, the Pioneers appear to be one of the strongest women's teams in the nation, and they will be looking forward to their trip to the DGWS Collegiate Nationals in Cheney, Washington May 15 for a bid for a national championship.

Coach Santos is relying heavily from the many top ranked girls to gain points for Cal State, as well as from the many newcomers to the Cal State women's track and field program.

AL MATHEWS Baseball Coach

Head baseball coach Al Mathews takes charge of the Pioneer squad for the eighth season.

While attending the University of California, Coach Mathews lettered in baseball and basketball for the Golden Bears, and was selected to the All-Pacific Coast team as a pitcher in 1953. Following his graduation from

the Berkeley campus, Dr. Mathews went into professional baseball with the Detroit Tiger organization for a two year period.

In 1957 Mathews served as an assistant baseball coach at the University of California, the year that the Bears won the NCAA National Championships. From 1959 through the 1963 season Mathews coached the Cal frosh squad finishing his final season with Cal's best ever frosh record of 27-2.

Entering Cal State in his eighth year as the head baseball coach, Coach Mathews' teams have consistently been in contention of winning a Far Western Conference title, finishing in the runner-up spot three times. Mathews' teams have produced outstanding pitchers throughout his tenure here at Cal State, Hayward, and his emphasis on good defensive baseball has aided his pitching staff throughout his seven years on the hilltop campus.

Coach Mathews was awarded his doctorate in physical education in 1966 from the University of California, and is now serving the college as Cal State's director of athletics.

JOE BROCKENBOROUGH Assistant Baseball Coach

Coach Brockenborough is now in his second year at Cal State, Hayward as the assistant baseball coach, and is again being counted on to aid Mathews in developing the Pioneers into a conference contender this season.

A 1967 graduate of Lewis and Clark College in Oregon, coach Brockenborough played soccer and coached baseball on the

Lewis and Clark campus. Prior to his stint at the Portland campus, Brockenborough played semi-probaseball in Canada in the Vancouver area.

A former high school coach at Lake Cowichan in British Columbia, coach Brockenborough offers the players at Cal State a great deal of experience from his varied background, in both his coaching experience and playing experience.

Brockenborough is currently completing work toward a master's degree in physical education at Cal State, Hayward.







1971 PIONEER BASEBALL PROSPECTUS

The 1971 edition of the Cal State Hayward baseball team hopes to rebound from the school's "worst ever" season of 10-25 in 1970.

From a turnout of over 40 players, Coach Al Mathews will try to select a team that will hit better (.21.0 as a team in 1970), and pitch better (team E.R.A. of 4.7 in 1970).

The pitching staff in 1971 should be better than that of 1970. Five pitchers from the 1970 staff return; they are Pat McElroy, Bob Thompson, Jim McPhee, Mike Marcoulis and Marc Hansen. Of these, McElroy was the team's most effective pitcher and should be even better in 1971 if arm problems do not continue to hamper him. The othe four pitchers pitched well at times, and it is hoped that a year's experience will help. Newcomers Harvey Gable, Rod Barnes, Pete Archerda, and Kevin Burnett round out the staff. Of these, Gabel is expected to be one of the two top pitchers. He was 7-0 at Reedley Junior College in 1970 and has appeared sharp in early season.

Catching is a strong point, with two-year letterman Jay Kleven returning and newcomer Mike Treat, All-Golden Gate Conference catcher. These two give the best catching depth ever.

The infield is a real question mark. Only All-Far Western Conference second baseman, Erik Houts, returns so the other infield spots are available. First base will be played by either Dan Gabbard, junior college transfer from Palomar J.C. or returnee Joe Ramirez. The shortstop position is wide open. Manny Rodriguez, third baseman from the 1970 team or Milt Murata, transfer from West Valley J.C. are battling for the position at present. Several players are vying

TED WRIGHT Tennis Coach

Coach Ted Wright is now in his fourth year here at Cal State, Hayward, and he offers to the tennis crew an international background of experience.

Prior to his first year here at Cal State in 1966, Coach Wright was associated with the tennis teams at the University of Illinois from 1965-66, and previously with UCLA from 1959-65, and the University of Southern California for two years from 1957-59.

While a student at the University of Otago in New Zealand, Coach Wright participated in basketball, tennis, diving, water polo, and tennis. Then upon his graduation, he coached and played for the New Zealand basketball champions from Wellington.

Wright has had the distinction of playing in all of the major tennis tournaments in New Zealand, and in the Western United States. In 1960 and 1967 he was he was selected to umpire tennis at Wimbledon, and will again umpire this year at Wimbledon.

In Wright's four years as tennis coach at Cal State, his teams have won 45 matches and lost 38. In the 1970 NCAA College Division Nationals, hosted by Cal State, Hayward, the Pioneers placed eighth in the 24 team draw.

Coach Wright is a graduate of the University of Otago in New Zealand, and received his doctorate in 1964 from the University of Southern California.

INTERCOLLEGIATE TENNIS 1971

Coach Wright, in his fifth year as tennis coach at Cal State, hopes his 1971 team can improve upon the 1970 team's fourth place finish in the Far Western Conference. This current season should be the best ever for Kirk Bassler, runner-up to the FWC Champion Mike Talmadge in 1970. Kirk, a senior, will be the strength and experience of the tennis team. Steve Argyres, No. 6 in 1970, will again be counted on to help this spring.

New players are numerous and varied in abilities. Hall Clement, a lefthander in his senior year has every possibility of making the team. Russ Cohan, a transfer from Foothill College, will greatly help the team as soon as he is fully recovered from mononu-

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The Far Western Conference with seven teams competing, will be a struggle between U.C. Davis and Sacramento State. U.C. Davis was third in the NCAA College Division Championships, but they lost their top three men. Sacramento State is expected to be strong again this year along with always tough Chico State.

An indication of just how well the team will fare this season, will be gauged from the Pioneers' performance at the Northern California Men's Intercollegiate Tennis Championships being held at Stanford University, February 24-27.

If the Pioneers can find a consistent No. 2 man to back up Kirk Bassler, and replace David Engelberg (he graduates in March), then the upcoming season could be a winning one. With twenty-six players out for tennis we trust that ten players will emerge to help us give a good account of ourselves and maintain a suitable standard of competition against our scheduled opponents.


