



## 1971 STANFORD TRACK AND FIELD OUTLOOK

As it was for the football team, 1971 could very well be the "Year of the Indian" for Coach Payton Jordan's track and field squad. Payton ran an active fall conditioning program and entered a number of athletes in indoor competition through the winter months. Payt has always been a great proponent of "the winning attitude", and he states flatly that this year's team has it!

As usual, the Indians will undertake one of the toughest dual meet schedules in the most competitive athletic conference in the United States. Beyond that, the targets are the Pacific-8 championships in Seattle on May 21-22 and the NCAA championships, also in Seattle, June 17-19. This year's team has better balance than any Stanford team in recent years, and the main goal is to turn the tables on last year's losing record.

Coach Jordan will call upon a pleasant blending of new young talent and a nucelus of "hungry" veterans. Spearheading the new "team attitude" are senior co-captains Rick Tipton and Allen Meredith, both men past Pacific-8 champions in their respective events. Tipton won the conference high hurdle championship two year's ago with a clocking of 13.9, and Meredith took the triple jump title last year with a leap of 52-3, a new Pacific-8 record. In addition to Meredith, this year's team will highlight three other Stanford record holders in miler Duncan Macdonald (3:59.6), 2- and 3-miler Don Kardong (8:45.2 and 13:28.0) and intermediate hurdler Randy White (51.5). No less than nine of this year's Indian team presently hold Stanford frosh records: Pete Fairchild, 880 (1:52.2); Decker Underwood, 2-mile (9:04.4); Rick Tipton, high hurdles (14.3); Randy White, intermediate hurdles (52.2); Pete Dreissigacker, discus (167-3); Tom Anderson, long jump (24-10 1/2); Rod Utley, triple jump (50-0); Casey Carrigan, pole vault (16-0); and, set in the early season this year, Steve Hopkins, javelin (223-3).

New additions to the team will add speed and depth to the sprints, a decided weak spot just a year ago. Predominent in the group are two young speedsters from Texas, Ken Curl (9.3 and 21.2) and Rufus Shaw (9.5 and 46.4). Frosh footballer John Winesberry from Tulsa is another promising prospect in the 100 (9.7).

Newcomers Dave Hustwick (1:54.3) and Dan Cautley (4:09.8) will bring fresh talent to the 880 and mile respectively, and the field events will be bolstered by Reggie Ishman in the high jump (6-8), Tom Lindsay in the pole vault (15-0 1/2) and Hopkins in the javelin (223-3).

Distance runner Don Kardong and pole vaulter Casey Carrigan were both named 1970 track and field All-Americans by virtue of placing high in the NCAA championships at Des Moines, Iowa. Kardong added yet another laurel by picking up All-American honors with a third place finish in the 1970 NCAA Cross Country Championships. Sprinter Chuck Francis enjoyed a great summer of achievement by winning the Canadian Championship in both the 100 and 200 meter events.

The 1971 Stanford track and field team will present strength, speed and depth in virtually every event, with the exception of the high jump and the shot put. Even in these two there are some bright and promising competitors who could pick up vital points. The big difference between this and last year's squad will be a sprint crew that could very well challenge the best in the Pacific-8. And, that optimistic "winning attitude" that Coach Payton Jordan talks about with such enthusiasm.

OUTLOOK: Much improved over 1970! If the Indians can avoid injuries, this could be the most outstanding collection of sprinters in Stanford track history. Senior CHUCK FRANCIS realized his full potential last summer by winning both the 100 and 200 meter championships in his native Canada. FRANCIS and veteran RICK TIPTON (9.5) give the Indians a nucleus of swift veterants to go with a talented combination of new comers. Texans KEN CURL (9.3) and RUFUS SHAW (9.5) have the potential for a 1-2 finish in any race they enter. CURL's best times were as a junior in high school, and he was injured most of 1970. SHAW, a receiver in football as well as a sprinter, is perhaps best at the quartermile, where he was a member of the national high school recordbreaking 440 yard relay team. Veteran KEVIN McNAIR (9.7) will also bid for points in the sprints.

440 YARD RELAY TEAM: Any four of the above easily have the potential for breaking the all-time Stanford mark of 39.7, established as a world record by Eric Frische, Dale Rubin, Bob McIntyre and Larry Questad in 1965. In many meets on the 1971 schedule, the 1971 Stanford sprint crew could cause a "swing" of up to 15 points over 1970.

OUTLOOK: Good to very good! Young RUFUS SHAW (47.8) could make all the difference in this event as veterans JIM KAUFFMAN, RANDY WHITE and PETE FAIRCHILD are going to be needed elsewhere. The presence of SHAW can allow one or more of the others to pass up the 440, saving strength and energy for the mile relay. Freshman JOHN WINESBERRY has a 48.5 relay clocking, and could also be an entry here. Other possibilities are junior intermediate hurdler MARK HAIGHT and sophomores TOM LONG or JOHN ANDERSON.

MILE RELAY: Based on times and potential, an Indian quartet should run well under the 3:10.5 Stanford record set in 1940.

OUTLOOK: Should be a consistent point winning event for the Inidans'. The half mile is deep with experienced runners, led by the talented PETE FAIRCHILD (1:49.4). FAIRCHILD ran his best times in 1969, but could not match that level of performance in the 1970 season. With an opportunity to concentrate on his speciality, PETE should extend his potential in 1971. DUNCAN MACDONALD, TIM NICHOLSON and DAVE WHITEING are also promising participants in this event. Others who could see 880 duty are the versatile DON KARDONG, DAVE HUSTWICK, RETT ERTL, ROGER ON, TOM JORDAN, and LARRY MUELLER.

MACDONALD (3:59.6) has probably not yet reached his potential as a miler and will have many opportunities to "save" himself for this event in 1971. Freshman DAN CAUTLEY, a two time state high school champion from Wisconsin, will carry considerable responsibility in the mile. The presence of CAUTLEY should free DON KARDONG and ARVID KRETZ for the longer distances this season.

OUTLOOK: The presence of All-American DON KARDONG (4th in 1970 NCAA 3-mile) and the rapid improvement of ARVID KRETZ give The Tribe a tough 1-2 punch in the 2 and/or 3-mile runs. Both enjoyed outstanding Cross Country campaigns, and picked up valuable experience in indoor competition this fall and winter. Newcomer BERNIE LAHDE could add point winning depth in either event. The loss of Brook Thomas and Chuck Menz in the 3000 meter steeplechase leaves the Indians without any experienced runners in the event. Sophomore RICK GEISLER (4:17.4 in the mile) will be an entrant, as will classmate LEO TIRADO (4:26.0). Also in training for this event are freshmen PETE FITZMAURICE, ROBERT HAYMAN, BOB SCHUCHARD and MIKE PALOMINO.

He enjoyed an outstanding indoor season in the 60 yard hurdle event and promises to be in top form for the 1971 outdoor season. RICK will also see duty in the 100 and the 440 yard relay. JOHN ANDERSON (14.4), MARK HAIGHT (15.1) and TOM LONG will also scramble for points in this event.

He's looking forward to reaching his peak in this senior year of competition. DREISSIGACKER enjoyed a fine frosh campaign a year ago and possesses outstanding potential in this event. DAVIS and DREISSIGACKER are among the hardest workers on the team and an inspiration to the younger competitors behind them, including freshman JIM ROYER (152-5) who is aiming for a spot in the discus crew.

# 1971 STANFORD TRACK AND FIELD COACHING STAFF

#### PAYTON JORDAN Head Coach (15th Year)

The extremely successful coach of the 1968 United States recordbreaking Olympic track and field team, Payton Jordan has been a tireless worker in developing champions in this country for more than 30 years.

Jordan molded the U.S. contingent into a cohesive unit which won more medals and broke more records that any other team in history. But, Payton's accomplishments prior to his selection as Olympic coach are, perhaps, even more impressive.

During the summer of 1967 the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics elected the former all-time great sprinter to its Hall of Fame for his coaching efforts at Occidental College. In his ten years at Oxy (1946-56) Jordan produced ten league championships, two NAIA titles and a 4th place finish in the NCAA finals. The path that took him to head coach at Occidental, and later to Stanford, began at the University of Southern California, where he was a three-sport star. Even before enrolling at SC, Payton had clocked times of 9.6 in the 100 and 21.1 in the 220 at Santa Monica Junior College. During the next two years on the Trojan campus, he captained the track squad, played rugby and started at halfback on a strong Trojan football team. After graduation, he ran the 100 in 9.5 to set a world record for grass tracks and later ran an unofficial 9.3 on a dirt track. In the service, he was an All-American halfback while competing for the Great Lakes Naval Training Station.

After his brilliant ten years at Occidental, Jordan moved to Stanford in 1957. In his 14 years on "The Farm" he has steadily built up the track and field program in the face of increasing academic pressures and rising admission standards. Competing in the Pacific-8, the toughest athletic conference in the country, Stanford has consistently held its own, a particular highlight being a 2nd place finish in the 1963 NCAA championships. The Indians always seem to produce a number of "world class" athletes, the most recent of which have been high jumper Peter Boyce, discus throwers Dave Weill and Bob Stoecker, sprinter Larry Questad and miler Ernie Cunliffe. Boyce, Weill, Questad and Cunliffe were all Olympians.

Jordan also has entensive experience on the international level. Four summers ago, he helped prepare the Yugoslavian National team for the European Championships in which it earned its first individual Gold Medal. A decade earlier, he helped the Greek Team prepare for the Olympics. During the 1964 Olympic Games, Payton was first assistant coach. He also assisted the U.S. team in the Maccabiah Games in 1965, the U.S. World Games team three years ago and coached the U.S. Deaf Games team in 1965 before being named head coach of the U.S. 1968 Olympic team.

Payton is remembered by many as the organizer and motivating force behind the fabulous United States vs. USSR competition in Stanford Stadium in 1962, often referred to as the most outstanding track and field event ever held in Northern California. The two day event attracted more than 150,000 spectators and added up to the most inspiring and emotional athletic meeting outside of an Olympic Games.

Elected President of the National Collegiate Track Coaches Association in 1958, Payton has been a vice president of the International Association since 1966. He has also worked on the U.S. Olympic Committee since 1961 and on the NCAA Rules and AAU track and field committees for four years each. A founder of the Southern California Striders, the 54-year-old Jordan virtually introduced indoor track and field competition to the San Francisco Bay Area.

Payton is the author of several articles and two books on Track and Field, including "Champions in the Making" which he co-authored with Stanford assistant track coach Bud Spencer in 1968.

#### MARSHALL L. CLARK

#### Assistant Coach Head Cross Country Coach (3rd Year)

The highly successful coach of Stanford's cross country team for the past three years, Marshall brings unmatched enthusiasm and dedication into his 3rd year as an assistant to Coach Payton Jordan.

Clark met with instant success in his first year as head cross country coach in 1968, guiding the Indians through an undefeated season and into a 2nd place finish in the NCAA championships behind Villanova. That year, Marshall turned out the first two Stanford cross country All-Americans since 1964, Brook Thomas and Greg Brock. Don Kardong has since won similar honors, in both 1969 and 1970. Kardong was a third place finisher in both the NCAA and AAU championships this past winter.

For the past two years, Coach Clark's cross country team has finished third in the Pac-8 championships. Just like Jordan, Marshall is a graduate of the University of Southern California where he received a B.S. degree in 1957 and a Masters in 1958. The lanky Indian coach lettered on the Trojan track and cross country teams of 1955, '56 and '57 and was a member of the 1955 NCAA championship squad. Marshall competed three years for the Southern California Striders, excelling in both the 440 and 880.

Clark spent his next ten years coaching track and cross country at Los Altos High School in La Puente and at Monterey's Seaside High School. He headed the Los Altos track programs for nine years, before moving to Seaside in 1967. His cross country teams had an overall record of 79-18, while his track squads compiled a 56-31-1 mark. Marshall piloted six league championship cross country teams during that span, winning one CIF Southern Section Title, and three league championships.

#### BILL MOULTRIE AND BUD SPENCER

#### Assistant Track and Field Coaches

Bill Moultrie will be working with the sprinters and 440-relay quartet this spring. Moultrie is a graduate of Texas Southern University, where he was a sprint star. Bill coached at Ravenswood High School in Palo Alto before coming to Stanford. Last fall he was Stanford's Freshman football coach.

Bud Spencer, one of the greatest sprinters ever to attend Stanford, will be working with the sprinters and quarter milers this spring. Spencer was a member of the 1928 U.S. Olympic team, running a leg on the 1600 meter relay. He is a former record holder in two events, having run a leg on the U.S. relay quartet which established new marks in the mile and 1600 meters. Spencer is the co-author of "Champions in the Making" with head coach Payton Jordan.

#### STANFORD STADIUM

All of Stanford's home track and field meets are held on the campus in historic Stanford Stadium, one of the largest and finest arenas of its kind in the country. The Stadium was built in 1921 with a seating capacity of 60,000 which, through subsequent additions, has now been raised to almost 90,000.

Stanford Stadium is the home of Stanford football in the fall, but it is internationally known as a track and field facility. Just last fall a rubber based "Medalist" running surface was installed on the 440 yard oval, and "Tartan" surfaces were installed for all field event runways and takeoff areas. The discus and shot put rings are cement circles. These improvements have brought Stanford Stadium into the "all-weather" category where track and field facilities are concerned, and, according to Coach Payton Jordan, "We have not missed a day of practice due to weather since our new surfaces were installed." In the recent past, Stanford track meets have had to be moved to the all-weather facilities of either Footbill College or San Jose State. This will not be the case for any future meets scheduled for Stanford Stadium.

Since its construction, the Stadium has been the site of several national and international meets, among the most recent the 1960 United States Olympic Trials and the 1962 Dual Meet between the Soviet Union and the United States. These two events broke all previous standards in the United States for attendance, caliber of competition, color and drama.

Stanford track and field athletes have been breaking countless world, national, regional, and event standards for nearly three-quarters of a century. Many participants have been members of Uncle Sam's Olympic Games squads and a number have won Gold, Silver, or Bronze medals. From a team standpoint, the Indians have won national, conference, and relay titles. The school's record over the years is one of the finest in the country.

The Indians' track and field history can roughly be broken into three great eras -The "Dink" Templeton Regime of 1918 and 1921-1939, The Jack Weiershauser Regime of 1946-56, and The Payton Jordan Regime of 1957 to the present.

The late Robert Lyman (Dink) Templeton was one of the greatest coaches the sport has known. His record speaks for itself. His teams won the then blue ribbon ICAAAA Meet four times, the NCAA thrice, and turned in a dozen world record performances.

Although Templeton's star pupils were legion, the name of <u>Ben Eastman</u> stands out above them all. Under Dink's guidance, Ben revolutionized middle distance running in the short space of two weeks. The world mark in the 440-yard dash of 47.4 had been set in 1916, and it was fairly generally accepted that this mark was quite safe. And it was, for 16 years, until March 26, 1932. That day at Angell Field, Eastman travelled the first 220 in 21.3 (faster than the flat 220 was run in the meet that afternoon) and broke the tape nearly 20 yards in front of the second-place man in the time of 46.4, a full second ahead of the old mark.

But Ben wasn't through rewriting the record books. Two weeks later, on April 9, he set out to break the half-mile mark of 1:51.6, set by the great German runner, Dr. Otto Peltzer in 1926. Lack of experience in the longer race caused him to run his first lap too slowly, but the second was a masterpiece and Ben broke the tape in 1:51.3.

Templeton always had great weight men. Never to be forgotten was the tremendous 1-2 punch of Harlow Rothert and the late <u>Bric Krenz</u>, 1928-30. The former set a world record of 52-1 5/8 in the shot put and the latter did likewise in the discus, 167-5 3/8, and each was close behind the other in his specialty. John Lyman was the first man in the world to put the shot 54 feet (54-1) in 1934.

The pole vaulters were headed by <u>Bill Miller</u>, 1932 Olympic Champion at 14-1 7/8, and <u>Bud Deacon</u> who cleared 14-2 3/4 in the University Championships in 1934. There were plenty of fine sprinters including <u>Clyde Jeffrey</u>, who held the school record, 9.4, for 24 years. The high jumpers, of course, were headed by 1928 Champion <u>Bob King</u> (6-6 5/8).

Another of Dink's prize pupils was "Iron Man" <u>Jack Weiershauser</u>, a star in the sprints, 440- and 220-yard low hurdles. He teamed with <u>Jim Kneubuhl</u>, <u>Ray Malott</u>, and <u>Stan Hiserman</u> (present coach at the University of Washington) to set a new world record in the 880-yard relay.

Later as head coach himself, Weiershauser - the "Iron Man" of the Dink Templeton era - coached two of the greatest all-around track and field athletes ever: <u>Bob Mathias</u>, 1948 and 1952 Olympic Decathlon Champion, and former world record holder, and <u>Gay</u> Bryan.

Mathias' efforts in the Olympic games are well known. In dual meets, he often entered five events, winning three and placing second or third in the other two. He still holds the All-Time Stanford record in the 110-meter hurdles at 13.8.

Bryan, on April 29, 1950, had the greatest afternoon ever turned in by a Redskin in a dual track and field meet. Against UCLA, Gay entered and won five events: high jump  $(6-4\ 3/8)$ , 100 (10 flat); high hurdles (14.7), 220 (21.9); and long jump (23-1 1/2). In the Big Meet of May 7, 1949, he won four events: the 100 (9.8), high jump (6-4), 220 (21.1), and low hurdles (23.8), and placed second in the long jump by an inch.

The Weiershauser era also saw the greatest group of Javelin throwers in Stanford history, including Bud Held, John Bugge, Bob Kimball, Leo Long, Kirk Nieland, Chuck Harlow Jr., Chuck Coker and Hank Roldan.

The Payton Jordan era is highlighted elsewhere in the book.

It is impossible, of course, to list all of the outstanding athletes who have competed in track and field at Stanford in such a short space. Many more names can be found in the records below.


