Ryun finishes 4th

'Pre' easy winner in Indoor 2-mile

Even the most rabid Steve Prefontaine fan found seeing to believe Saturday night as the tireless University of Oregon junior won his third straight Oregon Indoor Invitational two-mile title at the Memorial Colsieum.

It wasn't so much the what as the how, though.

Encouraged by a standing-room-only crowd of 10,-062, Prefontaine ran 8:26.6 to erase the record he set here last year and with it the finest two-mile field in the 12-year history of this meet.

But he wasn't perfect.

There may have been a question in 10,062 minds when they incd up for the two-mile. But there was no doubt about the meet's "most valuable athlete" when it was over.
