EUGENE - The Munich Express was ahead of schedule Saturday afternoon at Hayward Field.

Steve Prefontaine stated his Olympic ambitions in unmistakable minutes and seconds by shattering his own American and collegiate record in the 5,000 meters.

The Oregon junior blitzed a four-man field and the clocks in 13:29.8, eclipsing the mark of 13:30.4 he set last summer at Berkeley in the U.S.-Russian meet.

Lost in the hub-bub that followed was Oregon's 99-63 dual meet victory over Washington State.

Records were not the first order of business in the 5,000 meters. "All I planned to do was go through the motions and qualify," Pre said. "But after the first mile in 4:16 I started to wonder what it would fell like to go through two miles in 8:40 and then I started to think about the record.'

Six days earlier, in the annual Oregon Twilight meet, Prefontaine ran a 3:56.7. mile, the fastest in the nation this year. He also was the country's best time at three miles (set Saturday), six miles and of course, 5000 meters.

"It will make people in this country conscious of me," he grinned.

Even long-time Prefontaine-watchers were caught up short by Saturday's brilliant run. A cold, bitter wind battled him down the back straightaway and, after the

first five laps, he was alone. He ran the first lap in 62 seconds and an ex-Duck Ken Moore, who was along for training and exercise, howled in disbelief.

"I was unconscious of the pace," Prefontaine said, "I was so relaxed it felt like a 67." He went 62, 65, 64, 65 (4:16) for the mile, turned

two in 8:40 and was clocked in 13:04, flat for three miles.

The wind was a hindrance, he admitted, "I had to lean against it," but cold was never a factor.

Moore agreed and added, "The last time I ran in these kind of circumstances I was behind Gerry Lindgren in Se-attle when he set the Ameri-can record for three miles (12:53 in 1966).

Matter of maturity

It was Prefontaine's first race at three miles of 5,000 meters and the record came on the heels of that 3:56.7. mile and a Tuesday workout he called, "one of the hardest I can remember."

The ability to come back, he explained, is strictly a matter of maturity. "I'm a year older and a year stronger than I was in Berkeley against the Rus-sians." And he'll be four months older against the world in Munich world in Munich.

The Olympic syndrome was much in evidence Saturday at Hayward Field. Meet and school records fell and lifetime bests were common practice.

Pete Shmock, who threw the shot 64-11 in the Twilight meet, bounced back with 65-1/2 against the Cougars. "It was a much better thrown," he grinned, and he wasn't talking about the extra 21/2 inches, "The 64-11 was all psyche; this one was tech-nique."

Wilkins excited

Oregon's Mac Wilkins erased his own school record in the discus with a cast of 190-10. Got it on the initial try and said, "I was so excit-ed I couldn't throw after that."

Wilkins' best was three feet short of the Olympic qualifying standard but he has no reservations about his ability to meet the mark. With a little better wind he'd have gotten in Sat-urday. "Ideally you want the wind quartering from the right (for righthanders) right (for righthanders). This time it was from the left. On a calm day I'd have thrown five feet farther and with some help from the wind a lot farther."

· Freshman vaulter Tinker Hatfield won his specialty at 15-7, a lifetime best, and gave 16 feet an honest try.

Rorem tops Hearvey

Collectively the Ducks won where they figured for the most part. WSU's Gra-ham Hutchinson upset the game plan a little by winning the steeplechase in 8:47.0 and Dave Rorem out gunned Oregon's Al Hearvey to take both sprints.

But the Webfoots got some of it back when freshman Ed Bilusak took the tri-ple jump, and Wilkins and Don Philpot collabortaed with Shmock to sweep the shot.

Oregon's team effort was handicapped by the absence of Bouncy Moore (long jump), Rick Ritchie (mile), Marty Hill (high jump) and Steve Bence (880), who were scratched for reasons of rest and recovery.
