***New Stadium Record: John Powell in Discus at 208-0, breaking old mark by Gary Ordway (PCC) of 203-10, 4/17/71

Powell, Anderson Lead SJS Spikers

Ex-Spartans John Powell and Marion Anderson stole the show quality-wise but San Jose State coach Ernie Bullard was pleased with his charges quantity-wise in their track and field opener at Bud Winter Field Saturday against Hayward State and San Francisco State.

Powell uncorked a tremendous discus throw of 208-0 to erase the former stadium mark of 203-10 by Gary Ordway of the Pacific Coast Club last year, and Anderson won the long jump at 25-6½.

Bullard, pointing the Spartans toward what figures to be a very close duel meet with California at Berkeley Saturday, was elated with the showing of sprinters Ted Whitley and Frank Shields, quartermiler Dennis Maas, halfmilers Al Baker and Lee Marshall, triple jumpers J.C. Ragster and Larry Scott, and weightman Greg Born.

The diminutive Whitley, surging over the final 30 yards, won the 100 in 9.6.

"Ted's a fine competitor," Bullard lauded. "He won over some good people today and I wouldn't be surprised to see him do 9.3 this season."

Bullard also feels Maas will make steady progress during the campaign.

"Dennis had a tendency to underrun the first 220 in junior college, but he can really close," Bullard remarked. Maas ran 48.4 in placing second to former Spartan Elmo Dees.

The Spartan mentor was especially pleased with Baker and Marshall, who both were clocked in 1:55.8, because they have been handicapped by illness and injuries.

Ragster, a surprise bonus as a walk-on from Sacramen-

to City College, and Scott both produced their lifetime bests in the triple jump at 49-1½ and 48-10½, respectively. Ragster had previously done 47-11 and Scott 47-0½.

Shields ran 9.8 in the 100 and 21.7 in the 220, while Born, 6-1, 235-pound senior from Sacramento, won the shot put at 58-9 and came close to his personal best in the discus with a throw of 169-4.

"I'm pleased with my showing," Born related, "in view of the fact I've had trouble with my knees and haven't worked out much during the last three weeks."

Born, who improved from 55-6 to 60-6 in the shot last year, isn't bashful about his goal for the season.

"I'm definitely going for the school record — which means 64 feet — and I'm sure I can do it," Born declared. "I just have to work on my technique."

Richard Marks set the shot put standard with 63-10½ in 1969.

In other highlights for the Spartans, veteran Bill Crawford won the high jump at 6-9, equalling the best mark he produced for SJS last season; Maury Greer ran 4:11.2 in the mile; Russ Royal, a new addition to the event, threw the javelin 182-4; and Chuck Sherman threw the discus 175-3.

"All in all I was very pleased with the meet," Bullard added. "We showed well in many areas — even in the javelin, which is our weakest event, I think both Royal and Frank Rock, who didn't throw today, are capable of getting up around 200 feet."

Bullard held several men out of the meet rather than risk having them aggravate

minor injuries, including the two men he considers the big keys to the season — horizontal jumper Phil Quinet (25-2 and 49-10) and sprinter-hurdler Larry Glenn who has bests of 9.6 for the 100, 51.9 for the intermediate hurdles and 46.0 for a mile relay stint.

Other Spartans who didn't compete include quartermiler Tim Hayes and pole vaulters Royal, Roger Martin and Mike Sampson.

The 33-year-old southpaw veteran of 16 major league campaigns permitted just one hit — a misjudged blooper — as he pitched the equivalent of 3 1-3 innings in facing both sides of the squad game.

Rosario's scratch hit came off a screwball, the pitch with which McCormick became a 20-game winner five seasons ago. Now, McCormick is trying to regain his old time screwball magic that disappeared with a back injury which he had corrected in a summer operation last year.

"I have to be encouraged by my first outing of the spring," said McCormick, "but it would be presumptuous on my part to take the initiative at this point on any contract talks."

Charlie Fox agreed that any contract talk with McCormick would be premature — but a club spokesman said Mike would be given a contract — for a reported \$30,000 — later.

"Mike did move his fastball in and out," said the manager, "and he did turn his screwball over very well. But remember this was just a squad game — like sparring in the ring. Mike must win any contract in a real fight — against strangers."

McCormick will get his first chance against enemy batters Wednesday against the Clubs at Scottsdale.

Sam McDowell preceded McCormick on the mound Saturday. It wasn't any surprise when McDowell's control was off. He is noted as a slow starter.

Sudden Sam walked two and uncorked a couple of wild pitches.

"I haven't thrown a good fast ball yet," said McDowell who allowed two singles during 2 2/3 innings.

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The University of Southern California ran the world's fastest 880-yard relay race Saturday with a time of one minute and 21.1 seconds at the Meet of Champions.

The team of Leon Brown, Edesel Garrison, Willie Deckard and Don Quarrie eclipsed the previous world mark of 1:21.7 set by Texas A&M in 1970. The USC mark cannot be accepted as an official world record, however, because all members of record relay teams must be citizens of the same country. Quarrie is from Jamaica.

The race inaugurated a new Tartan track at the Los Angeles Coliseum,

where Earle Milburn, the American clocked in 13 off his own world Juris Luzi captured the Al Feuerbach won the shot. For Feuerbach's victory in a holder Randy Feuerbach's doors is 67-11 record holder
