Meet of Champions, Westwood, April 15, sunny, upper 70's,
lt. wind, Tartan track, att. 10,307

Kjell Isaksson may make the 18 foot pole vault a weekly occurrence. Exactly one week after clearing 18-1 at the Texas Relays, the small Swede bested 18-2 at the UCLA "super all-comers meet." The world record performance was necessary to win the competition as Steve Smith led after leading a trio (including Isaksson's countryman Hans Lageqvist) over 17-7.

The high-flying threesome passed the opening height of 16-0 3/4, Smith made 16-6 3/4 on his first try, Lagerqvist on the second. Isaksson again passed and the "strategy game" was on. It was Smith's turn to pass at 17-0 3/4, while Isaksson easily cleared it on his first vault of the afternoon, Lagerqvist again needing two attempts. Falling by the wayside at this point were Bob Seagren and Dick Railsback.

The bar was raised to 17-7 and by now, the crowd of 10,307 was paying close attention, almost to the exclusion of some rather spectacular happenings elsewhere in the stadium. The two Swedes both missed their first attempts, Smith made it look easy with a several inch clearance. Isaksson made his second try with lots of daylight to spare, Lagerqvist on the third and it looked like California's first 18-footer was only minutes away.

Now they were shooting at 18-2 (5.54 meters), the first time three men in one competition had ever attempted the 18 foot barrier. Lageqvist never could come real close at this height, but Isaksson and Smith "just missed" on their initial vaults. Isaksson had another near-miss on his second try; Smith, obviously feeling the pressure, went through a couple of "false starts", then sailed under the bar.

Vaulting quickly, Isaksson caught the announcer in the middle of a "promo" for UCLA's Mardi Gras and topped his week-old record ~~XXXXXXXXXXXXXXXX~~ on his final vault. The time - 3:30 pm PST. Smith could still have won with a clearance, but was completely psyched by now and again went under the bar.

Isaksson's attempts at 18-4 were clearly anti-climactic although his ^{second} ~~first~~ try was very close; With three inches to spare on his record jump, could Isaksson be the world's first consistent 18-foot vaulter?

The pole vault pit wasn't the only "hot action" site of the day. Next door at the shot put ring, Al Feuerbach was putting a superb series together. Opening with 67-11 $\frac{1}{2}$, he popped a fifth-best-ever 70-3 $\frac{1}{2}$ on his second sput, then "cooled down" with 68-11 $\frac{3}{4}$, 68-1 $\frac{3}{4}$, 69-1 $\frac{1}{4}$, and 69-9 $\frac{1}{4}$. Come-backing weight lifter Ken Patera put himself in the Olympic team picture with a PR 65-11 $\frac{1}{2}$, leading a field of Richard Marks (65-0 $\frac{3}{4}$), Lachen Samsam (64-6) and Bruce Wilhelm (62-8 $\frac{1}{4}$).

Lee Evans took the 440 with a 44.9 clocking, beating undoubtedly the finest field ever assembled for a non-championship meet. Evan's patented homestretch charge nipped fast-starting Wayne Collett by a tenth at the tape. John Smith, looking more and more recovered from his hepatitis bout, ran 45.9 to grab third from Fred Newhouse (46.2) and freshman Benny Brown (46.3). Len VanHofwegen brought up the rear in an Olympic qualifying 46.7.

~~XXXXXX~~ Ralph Mann led from start to finish in demolishing an almost equally-strong intermediate hurdles field with a 49.4 watch-stopper. Roger Johnson outleaned Ron Whitney, 50.1 to 50.2. Following were Jim Seymour (50.6), Wes Williams (51.5) and Terry Musika (51.7). Williams might have challenged had he not hit the final hurdle and trotted home.

Evans and Collett hooked up again in a classy 220, but both were out-sprinted by Warren Edmonson who held off Collett (both 20.6), with Evans a step behind.

UCLA took three of the top four triple jump places, Harry Freeman the surprise winner with a legal 53-1. James Butts got third at 52-9 $\frac{1}{4}$ and newly-eligible Milan Tiff fourth at 50-1 $\frac{1}{2}$...easily the best-ever college team trio. Oh yes, India's Mohinder Gill just missed winning with a windy 53-0 $\frac{1}{4}$.

In other highlights on the track, Tracy Smith prepped for his Olympic long-distance quest with a "speed-work" mile win at 4:05.5, Jim Crawford "moved up" for an 8:36.0 two-mile triumph, Jeromee Liebenberg ran a near-solo (one other runner) steeplechase (8:41.4), and the Army's Earl Harris barely held off Cal International's Willie Turner in the short relay as both teams clocked 39.7.

On the field, John VanReenen topped a classy discus field with a 206-11 heave as five others bettered 190. Arnie Robinson got a legal 26-6 $\frac{1}{4}$ long jump to go with a barely-windy 26-7 $\frac{1}{2}$ in leading a championship-class field. Henry Hines picked off second with a windy 26-2 while Bob Beamon, still looking for that big jump, finished sixth at 24-10.

Isaksson Does It Again! Raises Record to 18-2

Kjell Isaksson, faced with losing the event to Steve Smith and losing the headlines to Al Feuerbach who earlier delivered another 70-footer in the shot put, rose to the occasion Saturday, clearing 18 feet, 2 inches to break his own world record in the pole vault in the Meet of Champions at UCLA.

Isaksson, 24-year-old physical education instructor from Sweden, went over cleanly on his third try, bettering the 18-1 he established last Saturday in the Texas Relays.

The official record is 18-0¼ set by Chris Papanicolaou of Greece in 1970. Isaksson failed three times at 18-4, coming fairly close on his second attempt.

Smith, 20-year-old Cal State Long Beach sophomore, was second at 17-7, the same height cleared by third-place Hans Lagerqvist of Sweden. Olympic champion Bob Seagren of the Striders was fourth at 16-6 3/4.

Isaksson's vault capped a day of spectacular achievements on a clear, warm day favored by aiding breezes.

Feuerbach pushed the 16-pound shot 70-3½, exceeding his previous best of 70-0½. He had two more puts over 69 feet.

Olympic champion Lee Evans, sporting a new hairdo of tightly wound curls, overcame Wayne Collett in the stretch to win the 440 in 44.9 only 4/10ths of a second off John Smith's world record.

Collett was second in 45.0, followed by Smith in 45.9. Fred Newhouse was next in 46.2 just ahead of

UCLA freshman Benny Brown, who took fifth with a lifetime best of 46.3.

World record holder Ralph Mann powered to a 49.4 victory in the 440 intermediate hurdles and Arnie Robinson came through with another big mark in the long jump, winning with a wind-aided 26-7½.

UCLA's Harry Freeman set a stadium record of 53-1 in the triple jump, but the big news of the event was the appearance of former AAU champion Milan Tiff in a UCLA uniform. Tiff, a transfer from Miami (Ohio), was fourth at 50-1½.

Isaksson said he was even more thrilled than last week when he first pushed through the 18-foot barrier.

"This time I had to do it," said the 5-8, 150-pounder. "Smith was ahead of me on least number of misses. This one was more satisfying."

What's next?

"I think I can do 18-4," he said. "I have to adjust to a heavier pole. The one I'm using now is too soft."

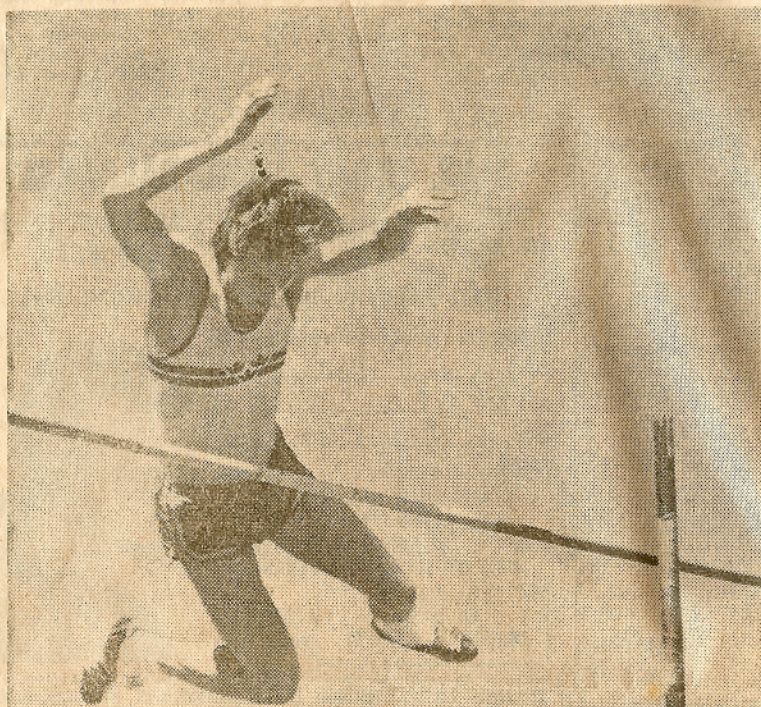
He will meet Smith next in the Mt. San Antonio Relays, April 29. Smith competes today in the Long Beach Invitational at Cal State Long Beach.

"I was terrible," said Smith who didn't come close at 18-2. "The way I went over 17-7 I thought this would be the day. But I went to a heavier pole at 18-2 and I couldn't handle it."

"Maybe by the time of Munich I'll learn how to do this stupid event."

Feuerbach, who threw only 65-10 last week in the San Diego Relays, explained his resurgence.

"When I got home," he said, "three guys told me all at once that Randy Matson had thrown 69-2 in the Texas Relays. That woke me up. The next day I went out and did 68 in practice. The next day I did over 69.

"I only weigh 245 now so I didn't know what to expect. I'll be at 250 next week when I meet Randy in the Kansas Relays. I don't care what I throw, I just want to win. I want to keep my streak over him going."

Feuerbach has won seven in a row from the big Texan, still the world record holder at 71-5½.

"I hope to get the record within the next three weeks," said Feuerbach. "The meet I'm pointing for is the San Jose Invitational May 6. That's my home circle. That's where I train. If I'm going to do it, that should be the place."

Collett suffered through another day of frustration, also finishing second in the 220. UCLA's Warren Edmonson was the winner in 20.6, the same time given Collett.

But Wayne's frustration was nothing compared to that of another quarter-miler, Hugh Brown of the Striders. In the mile relay, Brown was leading on the third leg, but when he went to pass off, he discovered something missing—namely his anchor man.

Jim Seymour, wherever you are, Hugh Brown is looking for you. Be careful. He's armed with a baton.
