# For Most of Us, This is THE Meet

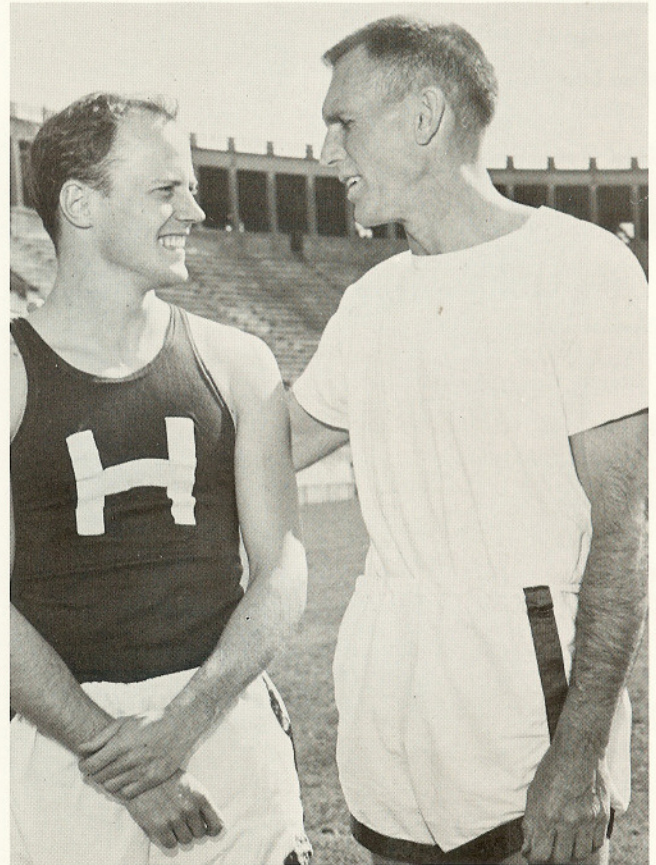
For those who participate, the Harvard-Yale/Oxford-Cambridge meet is a particularly exciting occasion. Although there are a few athletes on both teams who are of international caliber or who might place in NCAA competition, for most this will be THE meet of their athletic careers.

Yet the meet itself is only part of the total experience. This is especially true for those in events where it was not obvious from the season's times and distances who should be selected for the team. This year the Harvard-Yale meet, with its usual pressures on both teams, was given additional stimulation when 25 of the 32 team positions were to be determined by the outcome of 15 events. In prior years when freshmen athletes were competing separately from the varsity, there were sometimes special post Harvard-Yale meet trials to determine who would win a position.

For the British team this year, the meet is part of a 7,000 mile trip which will include several other competitions in the U.S. and Canada. Because the meet is held every two years and the teams alternate in traveling, each team makes the trip abroad once every four years. For the Americans this means that everyone has two opportunities to make the team during his four years in college but only one opportunity to travel. As in other facets of life, those who are born too soon may face as freshmen a group of seasoned varsity seniors who tend to overpopulate an event on those years when the meet is away. The English, however, are even more subject to penalties related to birth; because Oxford and Cambridge generally have three-year degree programs instead of four, some athletes miss the year of the away meet entirely.

The difference between going to a foreign country as a member of an athletic team and going to it as a tourist is similar to the difference between going to a dinner as a guest and going as a waiter. Before the

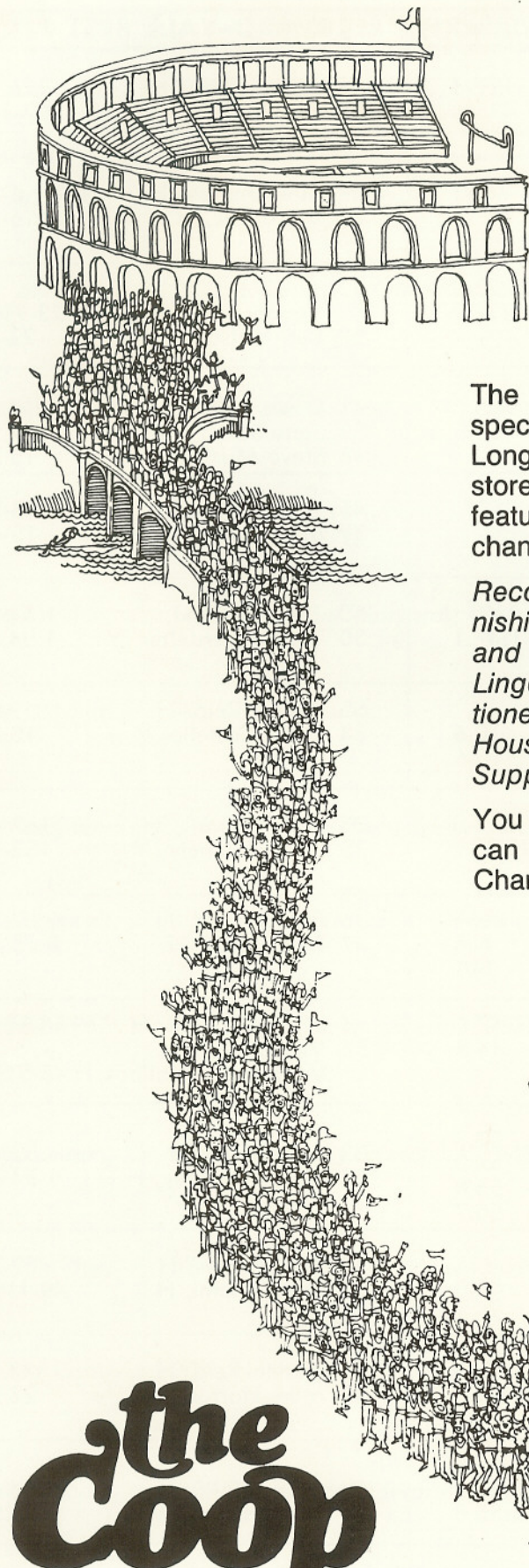

meet there are several joint training and social sessions over several days at each of the host colleges. This year not only does Oxford-Cambridge get to visit Harvard and Yale, but Harvard and Yale get to visit and work out with each other. For the overseas teams this is a way to see a part of university life abroad and to participate in some of the festivities. British teams in the past have found the imbibing sites and celebrations of Alumni Day to be a delightful attraction.

The Oxford-Cambridge/Harvard-Yale meet itself highlights the idealist's notion of intense but friendly competition. Spectators and teammates watch with special interest where Oxford and Cambridge or Harvard and Yale athletes try again to win against each other. The efforts in each event draw far more attention than team standings in the final score. But the meet IS taken seriously by the athletes, even to the point of friendly psychological ploys. Do not be deceived by some English distance runner casually sipping a Coke between his events. Or by the American javelin thrower who really lets one sail during the warm-up throws. At the banquet later in the evening these will be stories of the meet and many years from now they will be part of someone's memories.

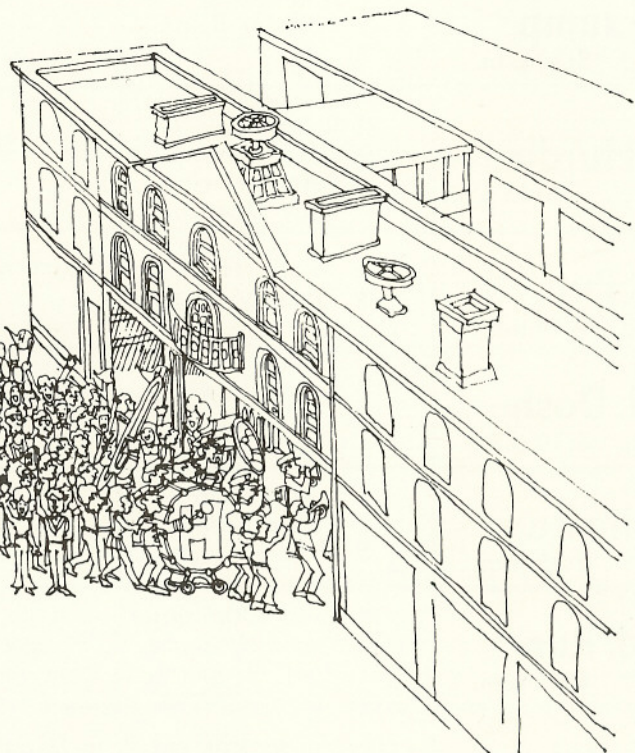

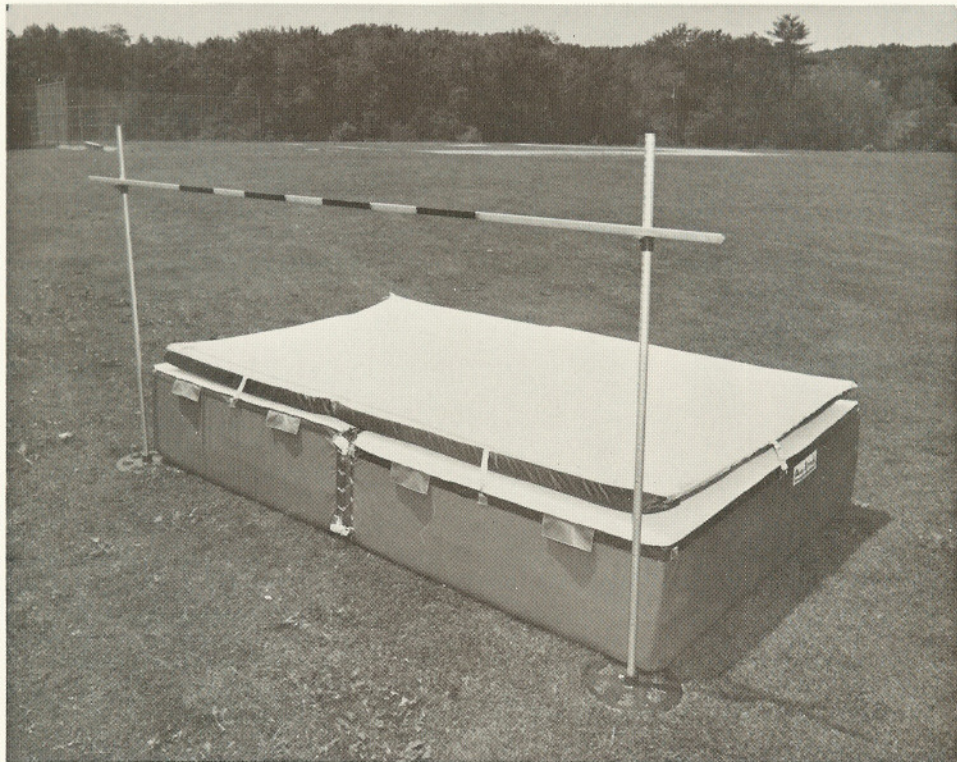
